

In front of the prison there were animals that the police had hard work to remove. The crowd present was made up chiefly of the lowest classes of the popula-

At 4.12 o'clock the little gate of the prison swung open and the public executioner passed through followed by a priest, although the condemned man had refused to accept his administration. Then came Henry in his shirt sleeves and with his arms pinioned. His eyes glittered like those of a maniac and he was deathly pale. As Henry approached the gulletine he cried, "Vive l'anarchi."
