of the words and sentences cannot fail to put the
Scholar in full possession of the import of what
they read, and successfully to develop the pow-
ers of their mind; and the same remarks apply

Arithmetic, and every branch from the first ele-
ments to the finishing lesson.

CROWN LANDS SETTLEMENT.
From the Toronto Globe.
The Crown Land Commissioner has mat-
ured, and is about to carry into operation,
with the sanction of the Ministry, a scheme
for the settlement of the lands of the
Crown which lie to the north-west of To-
ronto, and which have not hitherto been
surveyed.
The basis of the plan is, the formation
of direct roads from Toronto to Owen
Sound. This road is opened and
partly ploughed through Robitock and Al-
bion, to Hurontario Road, a distance of
forty miles; beyond that point it will be
opened through the unsurveyed townships
of Melancthon, Luther, Amaranth, and
Proton, striking the Owen Sound Road
about the township of Holland. Another
road will be from the lower part of Notta-
wasaga Bay, and going West, will strike
the Owen Sound Road at nearly the same
point as the one from Toronto; it will then
be continued to a point on Lake Huron,
about forty miles above Goderich, called
Pine Brook.
The advantage to Toronto of this scheme
is evident. It brings Owen Sound between
twenty and thirty miles nearer Toronto
than Hamilton, besides opening up a large
tract of country, the trade of which will
inevitably find its way to Toronto. The
Hon. Commissioner and his colleagues,
for the thanks of every inhabitant of
Toronto, for their attention to its inter-
ests.
The land on each side of these roads will
be laid out in lots of fifty acres each, with
one eighth of a mile frontage; they will be
granted on the same conditions as those on
the Owen Sound Road, which require the
clearing of sixteen acres within five years
the keeping the road in front of their lot in
repair, &c.
We believe that in all one hundred and
fourteen miles of road will be opened at a
cost of £30 a mile, and that emigrant labour
will be employed on the work as much as
possible. Mr. Price is now in town hav-
ing arrived on Wednesday. We believe he
will shortly proceed to the scene of op-
erations, to give the benefit of his personal
attention to the commencement of the work.
It is gratifying to see the Government thus
actively promoting well-designed plans for
improvement in the Province. It shows
that they are not only able and willing to
grapple with the great questions of civil
and religious liberty, considered by those
who do not know their importance, as mere
matters of theory, but that they are pre-
pared to carry out measures which will be
of direct practical advantage to the country.
BRUTAL ASSAULT.—Dane Rumour has
been busy at Guelph during the past week
with horrid accounts of the conduct of a
number of men who were at work on Owen
Sound road yesterday week. One report was,
that a shoemaker, who recently left
Guelph, was shot on his way to Sydenham;
another statement was to the effect that a
person from Wellington Square was stabbed
near the Peel bush; and it now appears
that a person named Murphy, who was
going northward with his wife and family,
was dreadfully beaten in the Township of
Arthur, and is at present unable to proceed
further. The attack is said to have result-
ed from a misguided feeling of zeal for
what Irishmen are too apt to call religion;
but what truth there is for such a statement
we cannot say. It is much to be regretted
that such people cannot leave behind them
their prejudices and love of violence when
they leave their native land, and it behoves
the more educated of both opposing par-
ties to induce a better example, and indicate
better prospects than the spirit of revenge
would induce. Let it not be said that Can-
ada is closely imitating Ireland in all that
is vile neither let it be known that near-
ly all the quarrels, fightings, and murders
that take place in the Wellington District
are amongst, and confined to Irishmen.—
Guelph Advertiser.

MEETING OF SYNOD.—The Synod of the
Presbyterian Church of Canada met, on
the evening of Wednesday last, in the In-
dependent Church, Adelia Street, in this city.
The Rev. J. M. Rogers, Minister at Peter-
boro' Moderator of last year, preached an
appropriate discourse. The Synod was after-
wards constituted in due form, and the Rev.
D. Mackenzie, Minister of Zorra, was chosen
Moderator for the present year. The
Court was afterwards employed in arrang-
ing routine business, appointing committees,
&c.—British Colonist.

FRIDAY MORNING, June 20.
ARRIVAL OF THE BRITANNIA.
FRANCE.—There is much confusion in France
though affairs are generally more quiet.
Prince de Joinville has been arrested at
Paris.
Prince Louis Napoleon, and M. Thiers,
have been elected for the Assembly.
It is rumored that M. Lamartine and
Ledru Rollin would resign, and Thiers
would probably succeed them. Lamartine
is suspected of conniving at the affair of the
15th May.
A decree has been passed to prevent tur-
bulent assembling in Paris.
The soldiers were obliged to charge a
large assembly at Port St. Denis, with fixed
bayonets. None were killed, but many
were arrested.
The Committee on the Constitution de-
clared for a Democratic Republic; besides
the past rights, the people are to have free
education, and the right of labor and assist-
ance.
A great banquet of 100,000 was to come
off at Vincennes, and created some uneasiness.
IRELAND.—Ireland is greatly excited.—
The Repeal Association and the Irish Con-
federation have united in one body, called
the Irish League. They will try peaceful
efforts for repeal. No further efforts have
been made to indict Megher or Smith
O'Brien, although the confederation have
issued a manifesto quite as daring as
Mitchell's treasonable writings. Mitchell's
fortune sold enormously high as relics.
There is little prospect of any important
outbreak against the Government.
GRAT BRITAIN.—The Chartists are
making frequent disturbances in England.
Three have been arrested and examined.
SPAIN.—Spain requires all Englishmen
at Cadix to give security for their conduct.—
Arrests are numerous at Madrid.
RUSSIA.—The cholera is raging in Russia.
One hundred and fifty cases occurred in
Moscow in one week.
AUSTRIA.—Nothing important. The
Emperor has gone to Innsbruck, and refuses
to return to Vienna. Some disturbances
between the people and the nobles—the
latter leaving Vienna.
The bankers Rothschild, and other rich
men fled. The foreign ambassadors had
also gone to Deobing.
ITALY.—Charles Albert has captured
Peschiera and defeated 30,000 Austrians at
Goito.
The Pope is recovering his popularity.
