Construction Work Will be Rushed ead as Fast as Possibe in the Early Spring Says President W. R. Clarke.

FURTHER CONTRACTS FOR GRADING WILL BE AWARDED NEXT MARCH

Four Large Survey Parties Are Now Engaged in Running the New Line Along Towards Fort McMurray.

"You may tell the people that at the earliest possible moment in the spring we will start the work of track laying on the portion of our line already graded. The grading will be rushed ahead as rapidly as possible and we hope to have 200 miles of the road graded next season.

In these words did W. R. Clarke, president of the Alberta and Great Waterways Railway, describe to the Bulletin the plans of the company for next season in the building of the railway line from Edmonton to Fort McMurray, a distance of some 350 miles. Mr. Clarke arrived in Edmonton yesterday afternoon. He will remain here till the middle of next week and will be back again from Kansas City, Mo., early in the new

The railway president emphasized the statement that the work of construction would be rushed ahead as rapidly as possible in the spring and nothing would be left undone to have completed next summer the largest possible mileage stretching towards Fort McMurray.

"We have now in the field," continued, "four survey parties of an admirable type of young men. One party is made up almost entirely of young Scotchmen. They will work on as far as possible this winter, and in the spring those who turn out best be retained for the construction

"What about your terminals in Ed-monton?" inquired the newspaper man, alluding to a subject which has been much discussed of late, but up on which practically no reliable i formation is obtainable.

NORTHCLIFFE TELLS OF TRIP. Many Canadians He Says Do Not Know of Overseas Danger.

anadian Associated Press. London, Dec. 15-In a lengthy interriew Lord Northcliffe discusses his reent Canadian tous. He found the distinct prejudice against Englishmen in Canada was due almost entirely to the fact that England during the last twenty years had made Canada the dumping ground of her surplus cockneys. This prejudice deters many people from going to Canada to reside and invest. He found young men from the hop and fruit growing districts of Kent and Wercestershire settled on prairies whereas they would be invaluable in British Columbia. American immigra tion authorities were much wiser than the Canadian officials, for they put the right men in the right place.

Regarding naval defence Lord Northcliffe does not believe that the average nadian knows anything of the dange his overseas trade. Hundreds ousands of Canadians have never seen he sea and are never likely to. He ound the people of Vancouver and the Maritime provinces who had seen war hips were anxious, but the fact that the whole of Canada's export oversea trade ould be held up by one or two modern reign fast cruisers was quite unknown o the bulk of the people, who were exemely busy making the country int hape for residence and trade.
