New Orleans, Oct. 28.-Capt. Brenner, of the British steamship Chilian, from Kingston, Jamaica, reports the severest hurricane ever experienced a Grand Caymans Island, lasting from the 17th to the 21st inst. One hundred and seventy houses and a large number of ruit trees were destroyed. the island was submerged, and a large number of cattle washed away. Brenner says that he boarded the Norwegian barque Niard, from Porto Rico for New Orleans, with coffee, which was wrecked during the hurricane at Grand Caymans. 



SUDDEN DEATH AT THE POOR HOUSE.—On Thursday morning an old man named Wil-liam Smith, an inmate of the House of In-dustry, was found dead in his bed. Dr. Gustin, Coroner, held an inquest in the afternoon, the verdict being that Smith had died from natural causes. 


