

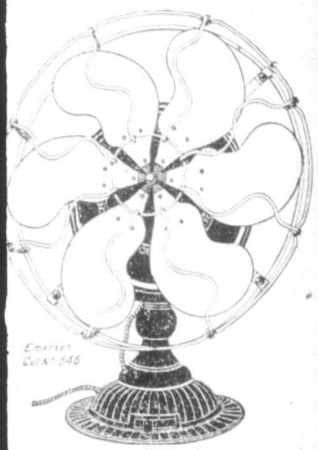

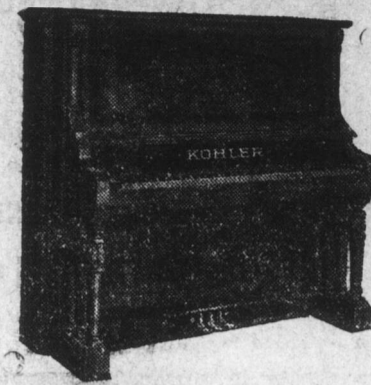

The Evening Chit-Chat By RUTH CAMERON



If all the young women in the United States would not only abstain from smoking cigarettes themselves but would sign a pledge to keep others away from the habit, this country would, in one year, shoot ahead of other nations on progress and uplift. Such is the statement of a Massachusetts woman in a Boston paper. The pledge she refers to runs— "Making my own declaration of independence from King Nicotine, I promise to use my influence to get others likewise to keep from smoking cigarettes or using tobacco in any form." No, I am not going to join hands with the lady and plead with my girl readers to please, please try to break themselves of this terrible habit that threatens the progress of the country. What I want is to protest against this and similar newspaper articles which give the impression that cigarette smoking is one of the habits of the average woman of America. Household Notes.

Browned flour makes delicious brown gravies. Put it in a pie plate and set on top of the stove or in a very hot oven. When it begins to brown it should be constantly stirred until brown all through. A teaspoonful of warm olive oil or camellian oil poured into the ear and held there for a few minutes will destroy a bug in the ear, and it will then easily pour out, bringing with it the dead insect. If a few beans, either lima or string, have been left over, make them into a salad, add a few chopped olives, a few capers and some Spanish red pepper. French dressing is preferable to mayonnaise. In ironing the plat of the back of a shirt waist on which tiny buttons are sewed, try laying it on a flannel or heavy Turkish towel, as you do your embroidery. The buttons sink in as the material is ironed. When beating white of egg for sponge cake, when it becomes dry and tight, test its stiffness by turning the dish containing it upside down. If it is beaten to the proper point not a particle will become detached. A delicious little appetizer for the supper table consists of large green olives, cut in half, and with the stones replaced with caviare paste. One is served to each person, on a lettuce leaf, garnished with narrow sections of lemon. For whitening boards or cleaning

A Strange Recovery. How a Gentleman Came Into Possession of an Ancient Clock. Here his attention was attracted by a small clock of unusual design exhibited for sale in a second-hand shop. An irresistible impulse prompted him to stop and examine the clock, vainly trying to recall where he had seen it before. As he did so, the vigilant tradesman came forward. The clock was produced, and upon opening the door the strange interest the clock possessed for the Birmingham visitor was explained. Inside was a brass plate, which the prospective purchaser instantly recognized as bearing the name of his grandmother. As a boy-visitor to his grandmother's house some forty-eight years ago, the clock had always exercised a peculiar fascination for him, and upon the death of the old lady he understood that it had been claimed by some relative of her husband. How it found a place in the Sunderland second-hand shop is a mystery, for the old lady had died in her quiet native Devonshire village. The clock now adorns my informant's Edgbaston residence."

Alcohol Extracted From Sawdust. A Story About Mark Twain and the Table-Log. There is a story of Mark Twain to the effect that he was once asked whether he was in favor of Prohibition, and he replied that he was not, adding, "What is the use of Prohibition when a man can saw off the leg of a table and get drunk on it?" He was, of course, referring to the fact that alcohol has been made from sawdust. For quite a century past chemists have been experimenting with a view to seeing whether alcohol could be obtained from wood and other cellular substances in commercial quantities. Despite the many experimenters who have engaged in the task with a zeal for their, perhaps, of a better cause, their efforts have been hitherto unsuccessful. All they have been able to do is to transform the wood into sugar by hydrolysis, and to convert the sugar thus obtained into alcohol by fermentation; but these processes are too costly to render them practicable from a commercial point of view. According to the report of the United States Consul at Bremen, Germany, the trackless trolley car is proving feasible in its use in that city, where two such systems have recently been installed and are working successfully. Constructed without rails, a large expense is saved. The systems mentioned are operated in the outskirts of the city and designed to supplement the established system. Probably the trackless cars will never be able to take care of the general traffic of a large city, but the success of this experiment indicates that in the future they will be a large factor in accommodating transportation in sections where the traffic is too light to demand the regular service.

The Lights Went Out.

As Mr. Cassin was speaking in the House in reference to our articles of warning to fishermen and denying the statements we made about Capt. Corkum's purchase of herring in Fortune Bay, the lights blinked. As he was repeating his statement to fishermen that there was no need to take warning, the lights went out completely and remained out for quite a time, and although he commenced to repeat his advice to disregard the warning of the Telegram, when lamps were brought in, he ceased again almost as suddenly as the lights were extinguished. He promised to continue his speech to-day and his remarks will no doubt elicit much interest. We have little doubt that Sir Robert Bond will be able to turn considerable light on the doings of Capt. Corkum in the purchase of herring, which will enable the Government to probe a little more deeply into the Corkum incident.

Did Good Work.

The s.s. Heathcote, which arrived here Wednesday morning, was about five weeks over at Bell Island and did a deal of dredging around the D. I. & S. Co.'s pier. When the old pier was destroyed hundreds of tons of ore, which was in the pockets, went into the water, and the ship took most of this material off the bottom where it had since lain. The ship was formerly the Norwegian s.s. Unvers, and is a fine vessel of 1,595 tons net. She is now lying at Shea & Co.'s premises.

Job's Marconi Men.

Messrs. R. Crane and D. Sarloff who arrived here by the S. S. Florizel, got out in the Beothic and Neptune to the sealfishery in charge of the wireless apparatus on both. Both are expert operators and the work of installing the mechanism begins this afternoon.

Wanderers Can't Come

Word was received this morning from the Halifax Wanderers to the effect that they would not be able to come here to play a series of games with our boys. The gentlemen in charge have wired the Amherst Wanderers to know if they can come, and expect an answer to-night.

The last visit he made was about two years ago. He spent several weeks in St. John's on that occasion, and gave an entertainment at the Methodist College Hall in aid of the Alexandra Workers. He and his son had been planning to come here again next summer.

Vessels Towed In.

The John Green is towing in the Atilla coming from Brazil to Baine Johnstone & Co.; she picked her up at Bay Bulls this morning. The D. P. Ingraham is also towing in the Devonia also from Brazil, to A. Goodridge & Son, she was taken in tow at Tripassey this morning. On the way down the Ingraham also picked up the Clementine from Oporto, and is towing in the two vessels.

Here and There.

POLICE COURT NEWS.—In the police court to-day two drunks were discharged, and a postponed civil case was adjudicated upon in the Central District Court.

PROPERTY PICKED UP.—A leather purse and a cigarette case picked up near St. Bon's College, Wednesday last, can be had by the owner from Sergt. Olyphant at the Court House.

BAD ROADS.—The road to Portugal Cove owing to the heavy snow drifts is in a bad condition. In some places the snow is up over the telegraph wires.

SIGHTED THE CLEMENTINE.—The s.s. Florizel in coming down the shore yesterday sighted the Clementine at 3 p.m. off Ferryland. The vessel appeared to have lost her main topmast and foreboom, and no doubt had a period of very stormy weather.

TASKER LODGE.—The annual meeting of Tasker Lodge, A. F. & A. M., took place last night. Bro. H. E. Cowan, P.S.W., was elected W.M. for the coming year. Bro. A. Findlater was re-elected Treasurer. The installation will take place on St. Patrick's Day, March 17th.

EUPHRATES HELD UP.—Conception Bay is now full of heavy ice. The s.s. Euphrates is at Portugal Cove and the Captain was unable to make even an attempt to get across. The Progress is at Bell Island and there is no possibility of either steamer moving till a change of wind comes.

LOOKING FOR BERTHS.—The crew of 12 men of the Florizel, who had been on the ship all the time, are intending to if possible to secure berths to the sealfishery in her. They think it unfair to be kept from going on the ship and intend approaching the principals of Bowring Bros. on the subject.

KILLED MANY SEALS.—During the past week seals have been very plentiful in the neighborhood of Twillingate and at least two hundred bedlamers and old harps have been shot by the shore folk, who have been out on the ice hunting them daily. The pelts will be sent here later in the season.

HE FELL OVERBOARD.—Yesterday the Jean was hauling out from Crosbie's premises one of the men who was at work there casting off the lines fell overboard. He was quickly fished out but the water was intensely cold and he was chilled to the marrow. He had to go home quickly for a change of clothing.

STILL VERY ILL.—Mr. Thos. Burton, of the Thos. Smythe Co., who had three ribs broken recently while trying to prevent a coasting accident to his little boy, is still very ill and is now suffering from an attack of bronchitis. He is confined to his bed, but it is hoped that with good care and proper treatment he will recover in time.

MR. R. PHIPPAARD DEAD.—The death occurred last night at his residence, Water Street, of Mr. Richard Phippard. Mr. Phippard, who was a native of Placentia, had been in failing health for several years past and his death was not unexpected. He was a stone mason by trade and was highly respected and well liked in the community. His sorrowing wife and family the Telegram extends its condolences.

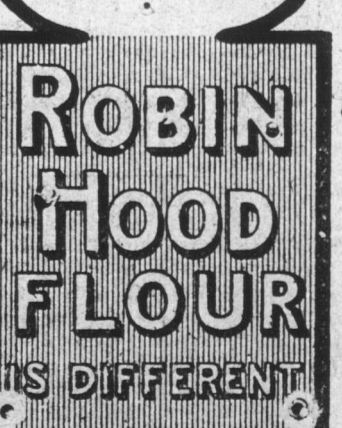

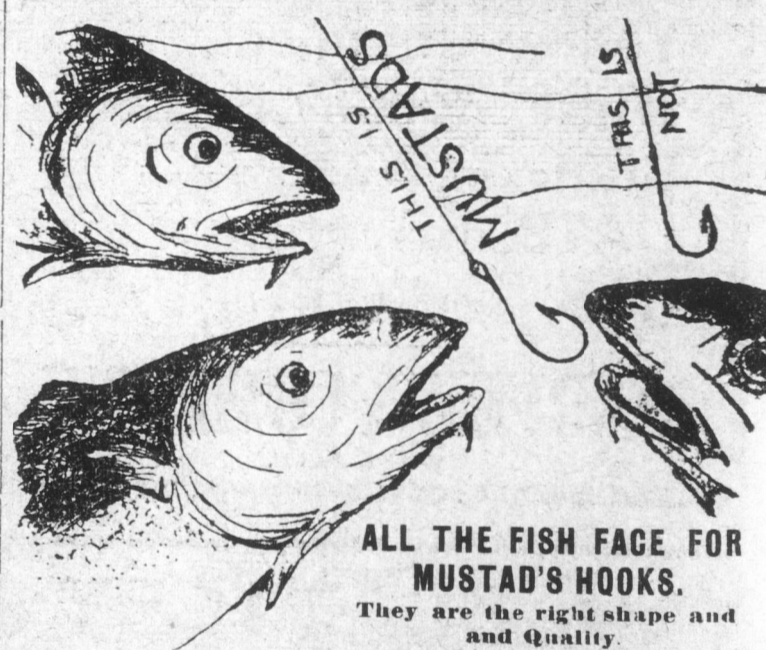

Several cases of cannibalism, as a result of the great Chinese famine are reported to-day from the Province of Kiangsi, the centre of the starvation zone. A man, woman and two children were killed, and their flesh eaten by villagers in a community in West Taying Mountains, South of the Tea District.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Feb. 17.
Relations between Russia and China are strained to breaking point. Russia to-day notified the Government of Britain, France and Germany of her intention to make a military demonstration on the Russo-Chinese frontier, owing to China's persistent violation of the St. Petersburg Treaty of 1881. Russian troops will be sent at once into the district of Ili. The extent of the demonstration, it is added in the diplomatic note, will depend entirely upon the attitude of China. The vital questions involved are Free Trade in Mongolia; extra territorial rights of Russians in China; the establishment of a Russian consulate at Kobdo, Mongolia, on the frontier between the possessions of Russia and the Chinese Province of Ili, as defined in the Treaty.

A military demonstration by Russia against China must be viewed as a threat of punishment, rather than as a forerunner of actual war, as the military resources of the Chinese Government are decidedly limited. The army organization is of mediocre, and the extensive plans of military re-organization are maturing slowly. At present China must rely on 100,000 Provincial troops, only part of whom have been trained in European methods.

The interest in the Russo-Chinese situation depends chiefly on the attitude of the Powers, and especially of Russia's understanding with Japan. The other Powers would appear to have paved the way for any conceivable measures against China.

Fishermen, Take Warning Read, Mark, Learn and Digest

The Proposition Made to the Premier by Mr. Trefethen—He Asked for Special Concessions to Handle All the Herring of Newfoundland—Syndicate Will Can Lobsters, Handle Boneless Fish, Bait and All Other Kinds Fish—They Will Get Special Exemptions and Subsidies for Doing So.

TREFETHEN'S PROPOSITIONS.

Sir Edward P. Morris.

Dear Sir—In accordance with our interview we are ready to undertake the building and installation of Cold Storage Plants in different sections of Newfoundland and Labrador as per a bill passed termed "An Act respecting Cold Storage." We are willing to undertake further operations along modern and scientific methods employed in our country, the United States, providing the right concessions can be obtained along the proper lines as a protection to our investment or any outside capital we might interest in the undertaking. While the effort is of great importance to us, it seems that it is of far greater importance to Newfoundland or in our vessels for export.

First. In addition to Cold Storage Plants and in connection with same would ask for a term of fifteen years to allow us the SOLE PRIVILEGE OF OPERATING glue and fertilizing plants to take care of all fish waste, now practically worthless to our fishermen and which could all be used at a price.

Second. Would ask for the privilege of erecting smoke houses for smoking your product home FACTORIES for CANNING caplin, LOBSTERS in any KIND of tin, and cutting and packing your CODFISH and OTHER FISH you produce along modern lines.

Third. Would ask your Government to overlook and protect for us any new methods introduced by us in packing, preparing, preserving of the different brands of fish, our labels, etc. to the exclusion of all others.

Fourth. Would ask your Government to grant the lands on which buildings and factories are to be located free. Also timber lands of sufficient size to manufacture boxes, barrels, tanks or in fact anything pertaining to lumber needed in the operation of the several plants which we might build and if necessary and convenient in the construction of the factories and plants needed for the carrying on of the business.

Fifth. Would ask your Government to grant water power wherever essential and obtainable where plants are located of to be located, to furnish power for operating and lighting.

Sixth. Would ask the imposition FREE OF ALL DUTY oils needed for preparation of fish, TIN METAL FOR CANS, gasoline engines FOR FISHING PURPOSES, GASOLINE AND LUBRICATING OILS FOR ENGINES USED FOR FISHING PURPOSES, in fact any commodities essential and necessary to promote and bring about the best result for the fishing interests as a whole.

Seventh. Would ask SPECIAL CONCESSION after Refrigerator plant was erected at Bay of Islands or any

other bays or localities where herring were plentiful to HANDLE THE WHOLE PRODUCT for smoking, cold storage or OTHER PURPOSES, if it could be proven that we had made improvement in methods that had been of financial benefit to Newfoundland, and a large portion of product could be cured at home.

Eight. Would ask not as an agreement but to obtain the sentiment of the present Government, if they would favour the subsidy of vessels or steamships to market the product of their industries in the fishing or other lines?

Ninth. Would ask the privilege of erecting and maintaining ice houses, the ice to be used in the proper conduct of the fresh fish business to preserve our product after purchase when landed either on our premises at Newfoundland or in our vessels for export.

Tenth. Any reasonable concessions not embodied in this, would expect the Government to grant if necessary for the conduct of the business and essential to the successful carrying on of same, including transportation concessions by rail through Newfoundland to shipping points.

Eleventh. We agree to erect at least two Cold Storage Plants of capacity of from one to three million pounds as necessary may require within the period of two years from date of concessions if granted, also smoke houses, factories and glue plants which would be needed to operate in conjunction with storages.

Twelfth. We agree further to erect at least one storage plant per year for the three years following up to a period of four years, with the factories for packing and cutting fish, glue plants, etc. that may be profitably operated during that period.

Thirteenth. In conclusion we agree to engage Newfoundland labour in the conduct of our enterprises herein mentioned with the exception of skilled labour which might not be obtainable.

We should expect the full support of the Government in carrying on the different enterprises mentioned. It is very necessary that an early option or agreement be entered into in order to have one or more storage plants in operation next year.

Dear Friend—We have just received telegram from Mr. Palsen stating that the documents had been signed and presume that they will reach you by the time that Mr. Palsen arrives home.

I have been making all preparations to form our company and we are get-

ting together the best people connected with the different lines to handle the product. It is our intention to happily surprise you in the near future with new methods which we shall introduce in our enterprise which we hope to develop in the very near future in the carrying out of this undertaking.

We see by the Gloucester Times that you are contemplating going to Washington to take up with our Government matters pertaining to the free entry of your product into our country. While our country, we presume, will show a willingness to have green fish entered duty free, we would take the liberty of impressing upon you the importance of your getting the very best concessions you can obtain for your manufactured product; by this we mean boneless cod, fish prepared in Newfoundland, all kinds of canned fish, sardines, or in fact any prepared fish. The proper concessions made along these lines, as you can very well appreciate, means more labour for Newfoundland, and better prices for that labour.

Our contention all along has been that a free tariff would be on food product the equitable difference between the cost of labour in our country and in Newfoundland. The difference in transportation, your country being so far away, would mean in the cost of transportation, enough additional difference in the cost of the product to allow a fair profit for the producer here. Even Mr. Lodge in a statement last week under pressure has come to look at these matters in about the same line, and you should avail yourself of the opportunity as it must mean much to your people. We trust that you will not think that we are taking any undue liberty in writing you along these lines, assuring you that we have only the best interests of all concerned in so doing.

QUIT A BUSINESS IN LOBSTERS.

January 2nd, 1911.

Sir Edward P. Morris,
St. John's, Nfld.

Dear Friend—Your telegram came to hand saying that you had received my letter, but that you had not received documents. Replying I would say that after thinking the matter over it would have been impossible for you to have received the letter that I sent in the mail with the documents, which were forwarded by registered letter to insure safety, and it must have been a previous letter that you referred to. We had the documents executed and signed the very next day after Mr. Palsen's arrival and I presume they have reached you by this time.

I presume that Mr. Palsen informed you we have purchased the Lark Harbor property, and we shall begin to build our plant as soon as the spring season opens, so that we shall have it in readiness by fall. Expect to operate plant in buying halibut, salmon and other products as soon as the season opens, and are contemplating doing quite a business in lobsters as well. Also expect to erect a smoke house for curing spring herring, and shall undertake to do all we can at the plant before establishing the freezing plant as it would be impossible to complete that until later in the season.

I have been very busy since arriving home, as my other business has kept me employed and I have been getting things in shape to start this enterprise right just as soon as the documents reach me, signed by the Governor and ratified by the Legislature. Wish that you would visit me

The Government's Fishery Policy.

If there was any doubt as to the intentions of the Government in the matter of their fishery policy it was removed yesterday afternoon. When the Cold Storage Resolutions came before committee of the House Sir Robert Bond rose and said that since the adjournment of the debate on the subject he had looked carefully into the Cold Storage Act of last Session, upon which it had been alleged by the Premier the Agreement before the House had been based. The result of his examination of the Act of last year had convinced him that the Agreement made by the Government with the American Company was in violation of that which the Legislature last Session decided should form the basis of any Agreement to be made with a view to the establishment of Cold Storage in this Colony. Not only had there been a very material departure from that, but such a departure as gave additional force to what he, Sir Robert, had been contending, namely, that the lessees under the Agreement contemplate something other and more than Cold Storage and the export of fish for food purposes.

Sir Robert Bond then read the following sections of the Cold Storage Act, 1910.

Sec. 1. It shall be lawful for the Governor-in-Council to guarantee on behalf of the Colony for one or more years, not exceeding fifteen, the annual payment to any person, firm or company engaged in the business of cold storage and other business connected with the fisheries and bait supply of the Colony, of a sum by which the net annual profits of such person, firm or company may be less than five per cent. on the capital invested by any such person or paid up in any such company, provided that the total amount of such guarantee to all persons or companies shall be limited to an amount of capital which shall not exceed five hundred thousand dollars.

Such guarantee shall be subject to such terms and conditions as to the annual volume of work, class of fish handled, prices to be paid for fish, countries to which fish is to be exported, and location of plants, as to the Governor-in-Council may appear expedient.

Sec. 8. The Governor-in-Council may make such regulations as he considers necessary in order to secure the sufficient enforcement and operation of this Act, and he may by such regulations impose penalties not exceeding fifty dollars on any person offending against them, and the regulations so made shall be in force from the date of their publication in the Royal Gazette, or from such other date as is specified in the Proclamation in that behalf.

These sections do not apply to the Contract before the House. If they did there would be no need to pass a new Act confirming this Agreement with the American Company, for the Governor-in-Council under Act of 1910 had full power to make an Agreement in accordance with the terms of that Act without submitting such Agreement to the Legislature.

Why, asked Sir Robert Bond, was the House now called upon to confirm this Agreement with the American Company? Because it is the intention of the Government and the lessees under the Agreement that Section 1 and

"It may be all right," says Tucker, "but to me it seems a waste of good English to be giving people a lot of Whereas to read in an agreement. Why 'twould twist the brain of any common man to try and unravel a Bill up in the House of Assembly. Even the members themselves get bogged, and lose days and days trying to understand the meaning clear to one another."

"Supposing," says Tucker, "I wanted you, Delaney, to come to work for me for five years and you had to chop up wood and carry up coal, so look for stray hens and put in an odd pane of glass, and during your stay with me I asked you to run for the doctor for me one night when I got sick, would you be justified in standing there and telling me 'twould be your agreement?"

"Well," says Delaney, "I might be, but if you made out an agreement between you and me and I said I had to do anything I was told in respect of this that would cover the amount. My idea of those Bills in the House is that we have too much frills on them, for you just watch a man describing them from his place in the Assembly, and he'll give you the Bill with all the trimmings on it first, and then he'll say: "In other words" and will proceed to enlighten you by talking straight unvarnished language which every one can understand."

Now, why in the name of common sense don't they frame the Bills in the plain language? They are dealing with men like these lads and the day for Tosing a swag unvarnished meaning and wasting money in idle and heat, cross-frills over the construction of a paragraph should be over. We are living in a time when frills shouldn't count and we shouldn't get down to the modern idea of saying what we have to say in plain language.

"I see," says Tucker. "The opponents are having their members petition for the Government to dig wells in some of the Districts. Well, the plain, unvarnished gall that takes the cake. The next thing we'll see in the House is a member petitioning for some one to be appointed to wind the clocks in every house in every outport. The member that brings in such a petition should be ordered to go to the outport and dig the well himself. He will have plenty time in the summer to do it, and 'twould be a first-rate way for him to get up his muscle."

"I hate to see a member in the House presenting a big batch of petitions," says Delaney. "He makes me tired; for he generally gets up in a half-sleepy state of mind and keeps his hat on. Oh, is there anything that

The Books and Annual Statements of the Bank have been submitted to independent audit annually, beginning 1906.

Section 8 of the 1910 Act shall not apply to this Company. Why should they not apply? There could be no other reason than that the lessees be exempt from any restriction as to "the countries to which fish is to be exported," or as to "the location of plants" or to any "regulation" of their business.

Sir Robert next dealt with the question of the exemptions from duty. It had been contended, he said, that when the Agreement before the House was entered into it was the intention to alter the tariff and place the articles exempted from duty in the Agreement on the free list. He could not accept this as correct, for if reference was made to the third paragraph of the Resolutions it would be found that it provided that the "articles when imported by the lessees were not to be sold." There could be no possible reason for inserting such a clause as that unless they were dutiable articles under the tariff, for there could be no possible objection to the Lessees selling what entered this Colony free of duty.

He then drew attention to an article published in this paper on the 14th February to the effect that Capt. Corkum, an American fisherman, was reported to be loading herrings for export from Fortune Bay. He read the report from the Evening Telegram, and asked the Government if the report was correct.

The Minister of Customs said it was not correct.

Are the Government, asked Sir Robert, prepared to state their policy in respect to the fishery question raised by Agreement before the House. Had the Government considered that acquiescence in this Agreement required the policy under the Treaty of 1818 as well as under the Bait Act.

In order to test the real intention of the Government, and to put the question of bait supplies to foreigners and exemption from duties beyond all doubt he would on to-morrow move the following Amendments to the Resolutions, which he handed in at the table.

Whale Meat Project.

Mr. Kampf, who represents a wealthy German syndicate, called at our office this forenoon to put us right in connection with statements made in our article of yesterday referring to the curing of whale meat. Our observations on the matter were in the main correct, but Mr. Kampf says that it is not the intention of the company, which he represents to supply the material to the German navy as food. He says they will handle all the whale meat they can secure in the Colony, will erect cold storage plants in different places and will have at least two steamers fitted with cold storage chambers running to this country to take the product to Germany. The handling, storing and processing of the fish will give a deal of extra employment to our people.

Mr. Geo. Trainor, of Mr. J. P. Cash's store, arrived here by the Florizel. Mr. Trainor went to Lynn, Mass., where his mother, who recently died, resided, and had the melancholy satisfaction of being present at her bedside when she departed.

Copper Smelting Bill.

Sir Robert Bond said yesterday that he heartily supported the measure if its operation was not intended to be limited to smelters erected after the passing of the Act. Some years ago the Tilt Cove Company, operating in Notre Dame Bay, had erected smelters at Tilt Cove at very great expense. He believed the company has not been utilizing them for some time, as it did not pay. It would be manifestly unjust to deprive that company of the benefit of any bounty now to be extended to encourage smelting, because it would place that company at a disadvantage to all others who may erect smelters in connection with their copper workings.

The Premier replied that the Act was intended to apply to all companies. Reference had been made by the Premier to the Messrs. Monbray. He, Sir Robert Bond, thought the country was fortunate in having a branch of that firm established in this country. He knew sufficient of the firm to say that a more reputable and reliable firm of Mining Engineers was not to be found in Great Britain or possibly in the world of engineering. He hoped the firm would be abundantly successful in their operations here.

The Layman's Missionary Movement.

A men's meeting in the interest of the Laymen's Missionary Movement was held in the lecture room of Cochrane Street Church last evening. The chair was occupied by the Hon. H. J. B. Woods. After devotional exercises by the Rev. E. R. Matthews, B.A., Mr. Arthur Mews was called upon and spoke on the origin of the Laymen's Missionary Movement, followed by Mr. W. Clarke on the growth of Methodism in the Colony, and then by Mr. H. N. Burt, who gave some interesting statistics as to the amount contributed for missions by the Cochrane St. congregation. Mr. C. Hatcher's vocal solo and Mr. F. Snelgrove's piano solo were well received. A general discussion followed and committees were appointed to carry on the work. At the close of the meeting refreshments were served by the ladies of the W. M. S. It is hoped the members of the congregation will rally round and contribute to this world-wide movement. Weekly contributions are asked for in envelopes, to be provided by the first Sabbath in March.

Dunlop Appeal Dismissed To-Day

This morning the Chief Justice gave judgment in the appeal against the verdict of Dunlop. Yesterday the argument was heard. Mr. Howley appeared for the prisoner and the Attorney General for the Crown. The Chief Justice with the concurrence of Mr. Justice Johnson and Mr. Justice Emerson dismissed the appeal. It is understood that Dunlop will come up for sentence next Tuesday.
