Chinese Actress Beheaded.

Just a year ago, on a cold day in March, a tragedy was enacted outside the Cheng-yang gate of Peking which is likely to furnish material for many a recital in the future. It was the decapitation of the loveliest of all the Chinese women reformers, the young actress known as Chin

Chilan. This girl in her childhood had been sold off a farm in the interior to a travelling slave dealer; she developed into the leader of a company of comedians, with whom she traversed the south visiting Hongkong and wandering into French Annam.

China does not favor female actresses, but looks to men to assume female parts. Chin Chilan, however, introduced a new era. Her beauty

secured for her the widest fame ever won on the Chinese stage. She played tragedy as well as comedy, and at length was so successful and splendidly patronized that her company numbered fully a hundred members. Everybody was enamored of this wonderful woman.

But a crisis came in 1910 when she arrived at Tientsin and inaugurated a season in the famous T'ieh Hsien Tea Gardens. Crowds poured in from all parts of the district for many miles around. Amid the furor thus created a very wealthy Pooting merchant, madly in love with Chin Chilan, spent three taels (a sum equaling six hundred pounds) on a banquet in her honor. But complications occurred, which led to fatal disclosures. Nobody suspected the enchanting Chin Chilan of complicity with the revolutionaries.

Shortly after that banquet the merchant was mysteriously assassinated, and the authorities not knowing whom to accuse indicted the actress. Not an atom of proof against her was forthcoming; but to the astonishment of the investigators it was found that much of the fortune that she had been making by her success had been passed over to her secret friends in America, who were engineering the revolutionary programme, and that other large sums had been expended in the purchase of arms and ammunition. Her doom was quickly sealed and the beautiful head fell by the Chengyang gate.---New York Sun.

Girl Swimmer Rescues Man Pace Maker.

Detroit, May 18.---Swimming one mile in the Detroit river in the record breaking time of 23 minutes, 45 seconds, and saving her pace maker after he had succumbed to cramps, was the notable feat to-day, of Miss Rose Pitnof, the Boston 17-year-old girl, who is giving exhibitions here.

The American amateur record for a one-mile swim in open water is given as 25m, 40 2-5s, held by J. H. Reilly, and the professional record is given as over 26 minutes.

She rescued C. A. Woodward, a Detroit man, who attempted to make the distance with her, when he was overcome by cramps a half mile from the starting point. Miss Pitnof held him up until a boat reached him.

Owing to the fact that the distance was not accurately measured and that Miss Pitnof had the current with her, it is doubtful if the record will be recognized.

When she completed her swim, the big crowd along the shores greeted her with cheers.

The temperature of the water was about 50 degrees, and the surface quiet rough, making going bad.

The time taken from the dive to the shot of the pistol at the finish was 23m 30s, but 45 seconds was allowed for the time used in helping Woodward.

easily worked over. It also prevents the material from raveling.

When you desire to learn a new pattern in crocheting, first try it with a heavy yarn. After you are familiar with the pattern it may be easily duplicated in finer thread.

Cheese may be kept from going moldy by wrapping it in a cloth dipped in vinegar and wrung nearly dry. Cover the cloth with a wrapper of paper and keep in a cool place.

The habit of biting the nails may be conquered by will power in an older person, but with children cut the nails very close and dip the ends of the fingers in quinine or a little extract of quassia.

It is best to have the wall decoration meet the ceiling without interruption. The wooden picture molding is a beautifier of the room and is no longer considered a help in hanging pictures.

Old stains may be removed from leather by applying powdered pipe clay mixture with water to a paste; apply and allow the paste to remain on the leather for several hours. Repeat if necessary.

To lubricate a door lock, or any that does not work well, use lead scraped from a lead pencil. Put the scrapings on a piece of writing paper and blow them into the lock through the keyhole.

Place a piece of white blotting paper under a vase containing flowers. It will absorb any moisture which may run down the vase. This prevents stains from appearing upon the polished surface of the table.

A good way to bleach handkerchiefs when it is not convenient to hang them out of doors, is to wash them and let them soak overnight in the water in which a little cream of tartar has been dissolved.

Cover your bedsprings with a slip of unbleached muslin or ticking, sewing tapes to each corner to keep it tied on firmly. This will protect your mattress from iron rust, wear and tear, can be taken off and shaken every week and washed clean when soiled.

powder on the hair, which is anything but pretty.

An excellent floor mop may be made from old stockings. Slash them in strips an inch wide, forming a fringe. Stitch several thicknesses of this to a stripe of cloth three inches wide and ten inches long. Saturate this with a good furniture polish and fasten in a mopstick.

When olive oil dressing will not thicken after the necessary amount of oil has been used, beat in a small quantity of dry cornstarch. This prevents the curdled or oily appearance. After standing a short time, the dressing will be stiff and will not taste of cornstarch.

Many people melt the butter and then mix it with the sugar. This makes the cake heavy and is always prohibited in good cake baking. Instead of this put the sugar in a double boiler and let it get warmer. In this way it creams the butter nicely and does not melt it.

A wise precaution before administering or taking medicine is to look twice at the label and the dose once before pouring it out and once afterward. This is a sort of double security against mistakes. Solutions should always be thoroughly shaken before being uncorked.

When putting down new linoleum place a strip of pastebord, covered with glue, under every seam, pushing the edges of the linoleum close together and pressing down firmly under heavy weights overnight. The seam hardly shows and the edges will not break.



British Force in Action.

Ambush in High Grass—41 Killed.

Details have reached London of the fighting against the Anuak tribe in the remote south of the Sudan, in which two British officers, five Egyptian officers, and thirty-seven non-commissioned officers and men were killed. Although the enemy were put to flight, the position of the British force was at one time critical.

The column reached the River Obot (according to a Reiter message from Khartoum) on March 14, and on the morning of March 15th marched south-east at daybreak along the north river bank. Shortly after the start smoke from the enemy's villages on the river bank was seen ahead, and it was observed that there was a thick belt of forest extending from the villages at right angles to the river for about a mile inland.

The mounted infantry, who formed the advance guard, sent back information that the enemy were holding this line of forest. They then moved off half left, with the intention of turning the enemy's right flank. When about one and a half miles distant from the main body the grass became very thick and high, and Bimbashi (Major) Lichtenberg, M. L., found himself at close quarters with the enemy.

He gave the order to dismount and sent the horses back, but the Anuaks, who were in greatly superior numbers, at once opened fire from all sides at point-blank range, and after a most gallant resistance, in which many of the enemy were killed, Bimbashi Lichtenberg, Yuzbashi Ahmed Kamel, Mulazem Awal, Abd-el-Megid Ismail, Mulazim Tani Sayed, Ibrahim Barakat, and thirty-seven non-commissioned officers and men were killed and three men wounded.

Simultaneously with this attack on the mounted infantry firing broke out all along the enemy's line, and our main body became hotly engaged with a force vastly superior in numbers, a large percentage of whom were armed with good rifles, which they knew well how to use. Casualties occurred, and Bimbashi (Major) Kinahan, 13th Sudanese, was killed. All troops without exception behaved with greatest coolness and bravery, the firing being steady and well aimed, and the gun (75cm. Krupp) in particular making excellent practice.

After the fight had been in progress about an hour and a half the 13th Sudanese charged, bayoneting some of the enemy in front of them, while the remainder fled back to the forest and disappeared, leaving many rifles and much ammunition behind.

The wounded were then brought in and the column advanced to the village on the bank, where it "zaribaed" and parties were sent out to bury our dead. The number of dead bodies were nearly 100; but many more must have perished in the thick grass and bush.

El Miralal Leveson Bay marched slowly back via Bonjak to Abobo Post, which place the column reached on March 22. Nothing further was seen of the enemy.

Hotel Question.

The committee of the Board of Trade on the hotel proposition had another meeting last night. There were present: Hon. John Harris, William C. Job, John Anderson, Mayor Ellis and Messrs. G. Shea and J. S. Munn. Nothing of a definite nature can be done until the return of the Prime Minister, with whom it is wished to discuss the feasibility of obtaining a charter from the Legislature and until the return of Mr. W. D. Reid with whom the committee wish to discuss financial matters.

Detective Back.

Detective Sergeant Noseworthy arrived by last evening's express from Alexander Bay. As exclusively stated by us on Wednesday he had been "rounding up" parties who violated the Game Preservation Act and succeeded in obtaining twenty-one convictions. All the cases were tried before Magistrate Miffien, of Greenspond, who came to Alexander Bay.

Coats' Millions.

Death of the Head of the Firm.

Mr. Archibald Coats, for the last twenty years head of the great thread business of J. and P. Coats, Ltd., died on Saturday night at his residence, Woodside, Paisley, aged seventy-six.

The great international combination whose annual profits now exceed £3,000,000, had its origin in a small thread manufactory started by a soldier of the Paisley Fencibles almost sixty years ago. The prodigious development of Coats during the last two decades is one of the industrial romances of modern times. It has consolidated almost the whole of the sewed-up cotton business in Great Britain, and linked itself with the leading manufacturers on the Continent.

£3,000,000 PROFITS YEARLY.

The real beginning of the combination was in 1890, when the present company was started with a capital of £5,700,000. During the previous seven years the profits had averaged £426,000 a year. For the next four years the dividend was 8 per cent. Then it mounted to 10 per cent. The following year, 1896, it was 20 per cent.; and two years later 30 per cent.; when, for the first time, the profits exceeded seven figures. In 1900 the profits were £2,511,945, and a 30 per cent. dividend was accompanied by a 30 per cent. bonus. In 1907 the profits exceeded £2,000,000. For the last three years the dividends have been 35 per cent. and the profits regularly over £3,000,000.

Meanwhile the paid-up capital has reached 10½ millions, and the reserves 8¼ millions. Mr. Archibald Coats was the second son of the late Sir Peter Coats, and, like all members of the family, was very generous in his local benefactions. Mr. James Coats, a millionaire member of the firm, died last March, aged seventy-two.

Takes Quarrel to Grave Side.

Kaiser Forbids Any German Prince to Attend Prince George of Cumberland's Funeral.

Berlin, May 24.—The Kaiser has ordered that no Hohenzollern Prince shall attend the funeral of Prince George of Cumberland, either on his own account or as his representative.

This action is the result of a long-standing feud between the houses of Prussia and Cumberland over the Prussian absorption of Hanover in 1866. The Duke of Cumberland had never given up his claim to the throne of Hanover, and had rejected all efforts at reconciliation with the Hohenzollerns.

Picked Up in a Stray Dory.

Halifax, May 27.—Two of the crew of the Harpell fishing schooner Eva and Mildred, Joseph Bass and Daniel Dooley, Liverpool, astray from their vessel on the L'Anse-au-Loup banks, sixty miles S. E. of Liverpool, since last Friday, were picked up last night, in a small dory, in a bay, in a becalmed condition and landed at Volger's Cove. The vessel is at Liverpool with her flag half mast for six men astray, which includes those picked up. The names of the remaining four are Oscar Johnson, John Newman, Edgar Peoples and Albert Tuff, all of Boston.

Government Will Establish Arbitration Board.

LONDON, To-day.

Lloyd-George presided at the conference, other ministers present being Buxton, Burns, McKenna, and Isaacs, the Attorney General. Another meeting is being arranged for June 3rd. Meanwhile the wholesale markets continue to obtain abundant supplies of meat transported from ships under police protection, the strikers refraining from violence, and the leaders contenting themselves with threatening a national tie-up, unless their demands are soon conceded. It is regarded not unlikely that the strike may come to a speedy end. In the first place considerable volunteer labor is available, although the disruption of shipping is a serious factor. London is amply supplied with provisions. Prices are becoming normal; in the second place the strikers are receiving no strike pay and the men are far from unanimous; thirdly, the Government is using great pressure to bring about a resumption of work. Ministers propose to establish a joint Board of Arbitration with powers over all parties working in the port. If shipowners refuse to recognize the Board, they will get parliamentary powers to compel them to recognize it.

Acquired Immunity from Disease

An idea firmly fixed in the minds of many persons, scientific and other, is that the races of men acquire immunity from the diseases in proportion as they are brought in contact with them. Dr. A. M. Gossage in the new scientific quarterly, "Bedrock," adduces several cogent examples to give us pause in the acceptance of this plausible idea. The instances most often put forward in its favor are, for example, those of a disease like measles, which is comparatively innocuous in England but which decimates the Eskimo and the Flings when it was imported among them; or again, a disease such as malaria, from which it is declared the black man is immune but to which the white man dwelling as a visitor in the tropics is peculiarly susceptible. But Dr. Gossage points out that in the case of measles the comparative immunity which a European child enjoys results from the direct transference from mother to child of immunity anti-toxins which the mother possesses. If the mother had never had measles she would not be able to transfer any degree of immunity to her child. The immunity, in short, is individual, not racial. Again, in the case of malaria, which is really a disease of several kinds, some kinds much more severe than others, extended observations have certainly shown that the adult native of India or West Africa suffers less severely from these malarial diseases than do the visiting Europeans, and it is tempting to conclude that the white race is naturally more susceptible to infection than the black. But it is also possible that the individual black adult may have acquired insusceptibility by previous attacks or residence in the district, and that at birth there would be no difference between the two races—they would start with the same handicap. This hypothesis is supported by the fact that white settlers who do not die become "sailed" by prolonged residence in malarial climates and that the black children suffer very severely and many of them die. Leonard Rogers says that in comparison between Hindu and English children in a district in India the Hindu children suffer most, and the same fact has been noted by Deaderick in the Southern American States.

Disastrous Fire at Change Islands

EXTENSIVE DAMAGE WROUGHT.

On Sunday morning at 8 o'clock a disastrous fire occurred at Change Islands when the mercantile premises of Mr. John W. Hodge, of North End, Change Islands, with the exception of the shop, were totally destroyed by fire. The first seen of the conflagration was in the store nearest the waterfront, and the wind was blowing directly on the other buildings. They also caught, and in a few minutes the whole place was in a blaze. The fire reached such serious dimensions that the entire settlement was threatened with destruction. Numbers of men and women fought and conquered the flames, and by their exertions saved Mr. Hodge's shop from ruin, although the rest of his premises, consisting of several stores, were completely wiped out. Some cod traps and other goods were saved by being thrown into the water, but most of the goods was lost. The dwelling houses in the neighborhood were in imminent danger. Some of them caught fire but were fortunately saved. Mr. Hodge's loss is partly covered by insurance. The origin of the fire is unknown and an enquiry is now being held by Magistrate Cook of Fogo.

Rain Quenches Forest Fires.

According to passengers and train hands by last evening's express the forest fires at Jumper's Brook and elsewhere are at an end. Yesterday it was raining heavily north, which no doubt quenched the fire, and the conflagration at Jumper's Brook was evidently fought to a finish by the lumber company's men.

Mr. H. E. Cowan's Messages.

Yesterday Mr. Cowan received these messages:

From Glenwood yesterday morning: Reported Jumper's Brook, Badger, Scissor's Cove wiped out; telegraph line to Botwood destroyed; Norris' Arm, Glenwood, Lewisporte, escaped. The day is damp, mists are subdued. From Botwood yesterday afternoon: Storm of wind. A large crowd fighting fire above upper houses. No damage to settlement yet. Prospects hopeful. Later—Raining and the wind has changed.

From Glenwood, last night—Mason's Cove, Brown's Arm, Salt Pond, directly north of Lewisporte, wiped out. People destitute.

Dr. McDonald's Message.

Dr. McDonald, of Salvage, also sent the following despatch to Hon. S. D. Blandford: "Shocking destruction of property by forest fires yesterday; the settlement of Squid Tickle, St. Chadd's, burnt to the water's edge; no lives lost; provisions and fishery supplies burnt; immediate assistance wanted." A reply was at once sent to engage all the men possible to check the fire.

Mr. Drover's Message.

At 5.30 p.m. Mr. M. Drover received the following message from his son, William, at Brown's Arm: "Forest fire here yesterday; saved mill, all lumber and new store; everything else swept including the old store, our house and entire contents; Mienie (his wife) and child found refuge at Porter's; fire extinguished; no further damage; raining now; will be at St. John's on Saturday; half the houses in Scissor's Cove burnt; we had terrible experience."

Messages to the Inspector General.

The substance of the messages received from the fire zone by the Inspector General is to the effect that no property was destroyed at Lewisporte; twelve houses were burnt at Scissor's Cove, where fifty-seven people are homeless and destitute; eight houses were burnt at Salt Pond and Mason's Cove, where families are also destitute. Brown's Arm is destroyed, only the mill and shops standing.

PARIS, May 30.
Fox, the Moroccan capital, is practically surrounded by hostile Moors. General Lyantry, the French resident Governor, says the situation remains serious.

Special to Evening Telegram.
NEW YORK, May 30.
A statement from Yuan Shai Kai, just received here from Peking, outlines the Chinese leader's plan. Based on universal conscription in this twentieth century, says Yuan, the newly constituted state must needs possess a strong army to maintain its independence. China is in a different position from England in encompassing the east, and from America. China must be modeled on such great continental powers as Germany and France.

Special to Evening Telegram.
HALIFAX, May 30.
John Donaldson, who conducts a small road house and shop at Birch Cove, four miles from Halifax, was shot and killed this afternoon, and an employee named Cody wounded, by a stranger who entered the store and began shooting. Cody gave a description of the man who did the shooting, and he was later arrested at Windsor. He says his name is Stanley, and that he hails from New Glasgow. The motive was evidently robbery.

Special to Evening Telegram.
BERLIN, May 30.
The General Council of International Transport Workers' Federation, whose headquarters are in this city, are preparing to back up the appeal of the British strikers and to proclaim a world-wide boycott of British shipping. Joseph, President of the International Union, announced that a cable vote of the heads of the organizations in nineteen countries, including the States, as to whether an international boycott should be called, could begin as soon as a full report had been received from London. He declined to discuss the probable result of the vote, saying there had been altogether too much chattering before hand in British labour circles. The General Council, he declared, would avoid this mistake, and the boycott would be declared without warning.

The General Council of the International Transport Workers' Federation at present consists of five Germans, as the result of an arrangement for a system of rotary executive authority and the establishment of the headquarters of the Federation in turn among the various nations affiliated to it.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, May 30.
Labour leaders threaten to call an immediate national strike of transport workers and riverside labourers, to be followed by an international strike, unless the result favourable to them be reached at a Conference to be held with the Board of Trade. To this Conference the Trades Unions will send delegates, although the employers have refused to take any part in it.

The organizing secretary of the Dockers' Union said this morning that the question of a national strike depended upon the Conference. If the result proved unsatisfactory, nothing could prevent it, and it would be followed by an international strike. Continental workers, he said, have already decided to strike, and it is only a question now of the confirmation of their decision by the international executive.

Employers do not take much notice of this threat. Previous experience has shown that continental workers, far from supporting British dockers, have been rather pleased to get the additional work coming to them as the result of such strikes.

Later in the day, despite the militant spirit displayed by the organizing secretary, the national strike movement received a serious set back, when the executive committee of the Sailors' and Firemen's Union, which is the strongest body of national transport workers' federation, decided against it. Notices were sent out by this body that there would be no stoppage outside London, unless the order was signed by the secretary of the Sailors' and Firemen's Union. This appears to indicate a split in the ranks of the Transport Federation, of which the Firemen's Union is the strongest body.

Many more non-unionists went to work this morning, which is likely to lead to some trouble, as nothing is more calculated to arouse the anger of the strikers than their appearance on the scene.

The transport workers' strike committee has decided to ascertain how far it can depend for support on transport workers outside London. At a meeting this afternoon a resolution was adopted asking the National Executive Council of the Transport Workers' Federation to meet at once for the purpose of calling for national support for the fight for the principles of trades unionism.


