**Cable News.**

LONDON, Sept. 8.  
The Standard prints a despatch from Constantinople to the effect that the Porte through the Turkish Ambassador at Washington, has negotiated a loan of ten millions with an American syndicate.

LONDON, Sept. 8.  
The post office at Lewisham, a southern suburb, was set on fire Sunday night, by an explosion in a letter box, and considerable damage was caused before the blaze was extinguished by the police. The trouble is attributed to militant suffragettes.

LONDON, Sept. 8.  
According to the Liverpool Post, it is now certain the Duke of Connaught, the present Governor General of Canada, will be the first Viceroy of Ireland under Home Rule. Prince Arthur, the story holds, will succeed his father in Canada, and will receive the title of Duke of Kent. The Post further says that in the event of the Duke of Connaught being prevented from accepting the new office, it will be offered to the Duke of Norfolk, the leading Catholic layman of England.

BERLIN, Sept. 8.  
German strategy and tactics with the bravery of the Greek soldiers, were responsible for the Greek victories in the Balkan war, according to King Constantine of Greece whose speech on the 6th inst., when he accepted a Field Marshal's baton from Emperor William, was published to-day. The Emperor when he presented the baton in the presence of a company of German generals said it was well earned on the battlefield. His Army, he continued, was proud of King Constantine's victory which was proof that German principles, if rightly applied, always ensured victory.

TOKIO, Sept. 8.  
The police arrested the ringleaders of mobs which were assembling here to-day, and their proposed meeting was not held. The Premier received the organizers at yesterday's meeting, and informed them there was no necessity to send armed forces into China at present. According to another version, the Premier said the sending of troops into China might bring about the partition of that country by the Powers. The city is filled with rumors that the occupation of Chinese territory is impending. The Chinese Government has apologized to Japan for the murder of several Japanese at Nanking, and has ordered an investigation. The Chinese note voiced the desire that a peaceful solution of the affair be reached through diplomatic channels.



"In short," said the old man, "your great connections cast you off, and if it hadn't been for me, plain Reuben Vale—"



## One Way to Conserve Energy.

BY RUTH CARBON.

It is not always physical effort that makes us physically tired. When night-time finds us utterly spent and weary in mind and body, we are apt to blame our condition upon the physical effort we have made, the actual work we have accomplished. ## Household Notes.

Never buy wilted vegetables if it can be avoided.

The best kindergarten lunches are chiefly of fruit.

Toasted bread or croutons give a rich flavor to soup.

Heavy soups should be kept for the main dish at luncheon.

Little fabric dusters are far more hygienic than feather dusters.

Firm, close ticking is an important matter in selecting pillows.

Pears may be used instead of apples to make delicious fritters.

Marshmallow sauce is a good accompaniment to coffee ice cream.

Bread and butter sandwiches filled with brown sugar are excellent.

Put a teaspoonful of peanut butter in fridge when nearly done. It is delicious.

Wood ashes are splendid for removing flower-pot stains from window sills.

To clean willow furniture, apply salt and water with a brush and rub thoroughly until dry.

Grease the bottom of granite or tin pots before placing over the fire and the black will wash off easily.

It is a good plan to keep a piece of sandpaper above the sink. It is very good to clean pots and pans with.

Apply kerosene liberally to any copper vessel which has become discolored; then wash with hot water and soap.

When washing windows, try putting a little turpentine in the water. It will do wonders in brightening the glass.

The right way to peel onions: Begin at the root of the onion, peeling upward, and the juices will not fly into your eyes.

If you get ink on your fingers, wet the head of a match and rub it on the ink spots. It is much quicker than to let it wear off.

When you buy new tinware, rub it well with lard and heat it thoroughly in the oven. Tinware treated thus will never rust.

Windows that stick can be made to move very freely by rubbing the sides of the jambs, where the window slides, with soap or paraffine.

When the feet of stockings are worn out, cut them off and slit the legs clean down. Sew several together and use them to polish stoves.

Stains can be removed from wicker chairs and tables by using oxalic acid and an old tooth brush. Dip the brush in the acid and brush the stained parts well.

If stockings become stained from the inside of the shoes, put one teaspoonful of borax in the water in which they are washed. This removes the stains.

When frying oysters, try adding a little baking powder to the flour in which they are rolled. The oysters increase greatly in size, are "puffy" and altogether very delicious.

If the common wayside golden rod is transplanted into rich soil and given thorough cultivation, it will develop into a magnificent plant five or six feet high, bearing great feathery plumes of bloom to beautify the garden.

Light colored slippers can be cleaned by taking a piece of clean white flannel dip a piece in menthylated spirits and rub the slippers all over, being careful to rub the way of the grain. Do not rub them with any part of the flannel which has become soiled.

Bread should be removed from the tins as soon as baked and cooled in the fresh air uncovered. When cool, it should be kept in a tightly covered tin box or stone jar. The bread box should be scalded and dried in the sunshine at least once a week. A cloth should not be kept in the bread box.

## Laying Foundation Stone of Church at Whiteway.

## Vicious Attacks

### On Sir Robert Bond and the Savings Bank.

The most absurd and vicious attacks that have ever disgraced Election campaigns in Newfoundland are those associated with McGrath. The worst of all are those he is engaging in now, for he not only makes a vile attack on the honour and integrity of Sir Robert Bond but he is trying to raise a scare against the Government Savings Bank, which is calculated to embarrass an institution which it is the manifest duty of every one to safeguard, but more particularly is it the duty of the Government who are responsible for the safety of the institution. What are the Hon. Sir E. P. Morris, John R. Bennett, R. A. Squires and M. J. Kennedy, who are among the Governors of the Savings Bank doing to protect it against the malicious attacks of Mr. P. T. McGrath? Are these men content to stand for these attacks of McGrath and to stand as Governors of the Savings Bank at one and the same time? McGrath boasts that he fooled the people in 1909 on a Confederation scare to vote for the People's Party. McGrath tried to raise a scare on Non-Sectarian education and failed. McGrath compared Coaker to Dowie, and tried to ruin the commercial enterprises which are associated with the Fishermen's Protective Union movement, and failed miserably. Driven to despair, he is now trying to instil fear into the breasts of the fishermen that their money will not be safe in the Government Savings Bank, and he does not stop at this bank, for he includes other banks. Of all persons in the whole of Newfoundland with whom he could have associated such a scare, Sir Robert Bond is the least vulnerable, for with no other person's name is the safety of that bank more indissolubly bound than that of Robert Bond. The security of the Savings Bank ultimately rests on the solvency of the Colony. Sir Robert Bond saved the Colony from insolvency in 1895, and in that way indirectly saved the Savings Bank. But he did more. He saved the Savings Bank directly, and the Governors of the Savings Bank passed a resolution telling what he did and thanking him for doing it. When the Savings Bank was in need of a loan after the Crash in May 1895 he raised a loan in Canada for \$150,000 at 5 per cent. per annum. \$100,000 of this he could obtain only by rendering himself personally responsible to the

Cable News.

Special to The Evening Telegram.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.

The Tariff Bill passed the Senate by 44 to 17, amid a burst of applause from the crowded galleries and from the floor. Senator La Follette voted with the Democrats and was joined a few minutes later by Senators Underwood, Kitchin, Rainey, democrats, and Payne, republican. President Wilson expresses great satisfaction. Chairman Simmons predicts an immediate stimulus to business. As passed, the Bill represents an average reduction of more than 4 per cent, from the rates of the original bill, and 28 per cent from the existing tariff. The Senate has introduced many important amendments. Their differences will be forthwith adjusted by a joint committee of both Houses. Leaders predict the Committee will not tarry more than a fortnight.

ST. JOHN'S, Sept. 9. Street went to the rescue, but was also killed. The story was kept secret by the Eskimos for several months, but reached the ears of the mounted police at Chesterfield, two months ago. A party has been sent to investigate.

LONDON, Sept. 9.

Chancellor Lloyd George will inaugurate his Land campaign at Bedford on October 11th. The committee appointed by him to study the question has concluded its labors, and the report will be issued soon after the meeting. The adoption of small holdings, cultivated by tenant occupiers, will be recommended, the tenancy to be safeguarded by land courts. Reforms for agricultural laborers will include fewer hours, wages boards, holidays. The Government is basing all its plans on the Parliament last till 1915, and it is thought a dissolution will occur in June or July of that year, which would be before the new Irish Parliament actually sits, as a delay of fifteen months between the House of Commons and the actual constitution of the Irish Parliament is expected.

LONDON, Sept. 9.

Entertained by the British Press, Sir George Reid, High Commissioner of Australia, said Australia loves peace, but is busily equipping herself for the fighting line, resolved to make ready to help in the defence of the flag that has always protected her. She does not wait for a larger share in Imperial Comrades, or turn aside to enjoy the old pastime of party con- flict. The British fleet is the first line of the World's defence against lawless dreams of conquest.

MONTREAL, Sept. 10.

Members of Thaw's family and his lawyers were dumbfounded when they heard of his deportation. J. M. Greenfield, K.C., confessed himself "simply paralyzed," and attributed the action as contrary to law and a disgrace to the country. All that could be done was to bring Mr. Robertson, Assistant Superintendent of the Immigration Department, before the court of King's Bench, but that would do no good to Thaw's case, of which he had been in charge.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10.

Hon. C. J. Doherty, acting Minister of the Interior, says that he rejected Thaw's appeal from the decision of the Immigration authorities, and his department was therefore carried out. That the writ of habeas corpus, or the writ of prohibition, issued at Montreal, did not enjoin the Immigration authorities from taking this step, is the view held by the Minister.

COLEBROOKE, Sept. 10.

Thaw was arrested by Sheriff Drew, five miles from Colebrook, and before noon today, and brought here. The Sheriff had no warrant, but held him as a fugitive from justice.

### Out in the Fog.

Yesterday men of experience suggested that people who would go out in the country would do so at great risk. Fog alters the landscape so that one does not know where his position is. He with some other friends saw the danger and hearing that a neighbour's boy was missing they ranged the hills this morning. They knew the direction he with others took and they kept there until they heard him cry. The poor child was frightened almost to death but despite the fog they soon got to town and restored him to his parents. The lad had become detached from a party of berry pickers he was with. There is a moral in all this. People should refrain from going in the country in foggy weather. Yet people would go yesterday it being a holiday. We have sad experiences of this proclivity amongst our people in the past. Fatalities have occurred. We hope none have occurred on this occasion. Up to 12.30 this

morning most people were accounted for who were out in the country.

### Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
COLLEEN, N.H., To-day.  
Harry K. Thaw slept on American soil last night, barricaded in a hotel room here, after one of the most exciting days of his career. He was for three hours a free man, and during that time drove madly in an automobile for fifty miles through the hills of Vermont, New Hampshire. Noon he ran into the arms of the New Hampshire Sheriff, and was brought to Colchester, where he retained Counsel to resist extradition. William Travers Jerome rushed hither on a special train and will take charge of the case for New York State to-day, seeking to have Thaw as a ward of the State, returned to Massachusetts. Thaw, fearing being kidnapped at the hands of the officers from New York, asked for special guard from the chief of police Kelly. Twelve special constables, all armed, were patrolling the street about Thaw's hotel last night. This morning Judge Chamberlain, of the Superior Court, will hear the applications of Thaw's lawyers, for a writ of habeas corpus. The fugitive telegraphed lawyers far and near for the purpose of fighting his return to the bitter end.

OTTAWA, To-day.  
It is stated here that the Duchess of Connaught, notwithstanding reports to the contrary, will accompany the Governor General to Canada, on his return next month after the marriage of Prince Arthur. Cheering reports have been received here of the health of Her Royal Highness, but it is understood she will not take an active part in the social life of the capital as formerly. Great care will have to be taken, guarding against over-exertion on the part of the Duchess, whose continued good health depends upon rest, and freedom from strain. It is understood Princess Patricia will necessarily take a more prominent part in the social side of vice-regal functions. The correspondent is authorized officially to deny the report that the title Duke of Canada will be assumed by Prince Arthur of Connaught. It is stated that in responsible quarters the idea was never entertained. No decision has as yet been made as to the successor of H. R.H., but the name of Lord Methuen is mentioned. Colonel Lovell, Military Secretary of the Duke of Connaught, will leave Canada early next month and will immediately take command of the first battalion of Scots Guards at Aldershot. His successor Major Parquar, Coldstream Guards, will arrive here early next week.




