War News

Messages Received Previous to

McKENNA'S BUDGET. LONDON. The Commons met shortly after 6 o'clock to hear the fourth speech of the war, and since McKenna took over the leadership. There was a large attendance of members, and the well filled, chiefly by men, who had direct interest in the new taxation proposed. The fact that the new taxation bill, the annual bill of the people, is the largest in the history of the country, and that there is a view a national debt of £2,500,000,000 with a debt charge which will be the annual expenditure amounting for a generation, the government took but little interest in the speech. McKenna said that the allowance would have to be met by the difficulty of framing estimates in view of such a shortage of tonnage and upon foreign trade. He had the war would last during the financial year. The actual expenditure during the past year was £59,000,000, or £31,000,000, estimate, said the Chancellor, the amount of £284,000,000; he estimated the amount of £52,000,000. The Chancellor was able to give his speech in a cheerful strain. Figures published on March 30 showed that the revenue estimates by £31,000,000, expenditure had been over £59,000,000, or £28,000,000, deficit at £1,325,000,000. He said the deficit would be made up by borrowing. There were over one hundred petitions to the Ministers on the paper, so it was late in the night before the Chancellor rose. He clear and concise speaker, though his speech was filled with figures, which would have made the assemblage before the members followed his exposition of the financial situation with the greatest interest. The Chancellor proposed putting a tax on amusements, including theatres, picture establishments, and matches and horse races. These would be graduated according to the charge for admission. For one penny on railway tickets and between ninepence and one shilling with a penny tax for each additional shilling; an additional tax of one penny on sugar. This, it was estimated, would yield £1,000,000.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

PARIS, April 4. In the Argonne we shelled the German works, especially in Montaucon and Malancourt district. East of the Meuse the situation was quiet.

WAR OFFICE STATEMENT.

PARIS, April 4. A powerful German attack against the first lines of the French south of Douaumont was repulsed to-day. The Germans were driven back in the direction of Chaffour Wood, which lies to the northwest.

The Municipal Bill

THE PUBLIC MEETING. The Legislature is expected to close within three weeks, and so there has been a notice sent out calling a public meeting of the citizens of St. John's to discuss the provisions of the Municipal Bill.

Turning now to the Bill we find that the Council is empowered to spend money from the several funds of the city for building workmen's houses, and to borrow such money for the purpose as the Governor in Council may authorize.

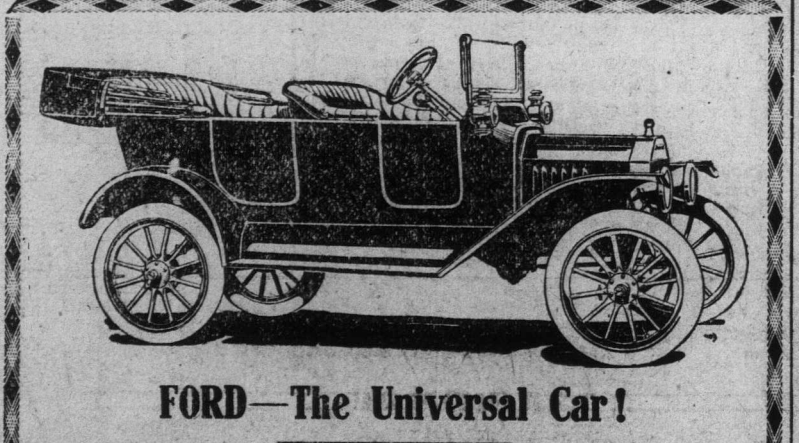
The Council is to be empowered to enter into an agreement with the Government of Newfoundland

(a) To use a strip of land westward of Job's Bridge; (b) To take control of Crown Lands between Temperance Street and the Battery; and (c) for the use as a street of the old Railway track.

Provision is also made for the expropriation of any land or interest therein, within or without the city, required for any public work or service of the city, value to be settled by contract or arbitration.

Notwithstanding anything in a building lease to the contrary, a lessee may purchase during the currency of the lease the freehold of the land, or obtain any extension of term. Values are to be settled, in default of agreement, by a Conciliation Board, appointed by the Governor in Council.

A Gallery of Tenants.

By RUTH CAMERON.



A letter friend has been clever enough, and kind enough, to find a subject on which I have never touched.

"In your many interesting articles," she says, "I have never noticed one on the tenant's treatment of the landlord."

"I know there are disagreeable and unreliable landlords, also good tenants, for I have had some of them, but this article is not for them."

"I have had tenants who have lived in my house for three or four years and gave me every reason to think they were comfortable, yet as soon as they had decided to move they said everything disagreeable about the house, such as that it was damp and took twice as much coal to heat as necessary—things that were not true. They seemed to be trying to prevent my renting the house."

Not because they didn't have the money.

"I have had others who would agree to pay in advance and after a couple of months would gradually fall behind until they were not in advance nor on time, but behind. And these were not people who were in lack of funds. They simply did not pay any regard to their agreement."

"Others, after hiring by the month, would move out by the middle and pay half a month's rent and you are lucky if you get that."

"The tenant has the advantage of the landlord. We have to give thirty days' notice and can only dispose for a few reasons, while they can leave you without a day's notice in mid-

winter, thermometer at zero, with plumbing to freeze, and to get a new tenant the best way you can, which may not be in months.

The Rent is Her Bread and Butter.

"Now I am a small property owner; the income from this property means my bread and butter. These things I have mentioned may be legal, but they are not kind. I have tried to treat my tenants kindly and fairly and only ask the same in return. I have rebelled inwardly many times, but have said nothing, suffering injustice rather than have it said I had trouble with my tenants."

As nine-tenths of my readers must have had at some time in their lives experience either as landlords or tenants, this certainly is a subject with a wide appeal and I am grateful to my letter friend for bringing it up.

I would like to add to her picture gallery of difficult tenants the tenant who takes a house at a certain rent on the distinct agreement that no further papering or any but necessary repairs be made, and then, having gotten in, proceeds to ask for one thing after another in the hope that the landlord will give in rather than change tenants.

The Tenant Who Doesn't Care What He Destroys.

Also the tenant (I suppose the most common offender) who is absolutely careless in his use of the property. How many people who would be nice with their own things, people who consider themselves thoroughly honest and moral, will abominably abuse a hired house!

In the children's library in my home town I have a little motto, "Treat a thing that is borrowed a little better than if it were your own."

I recommend the spirit of this to many grown-up children. Of course a house is hired, not borrowed, but

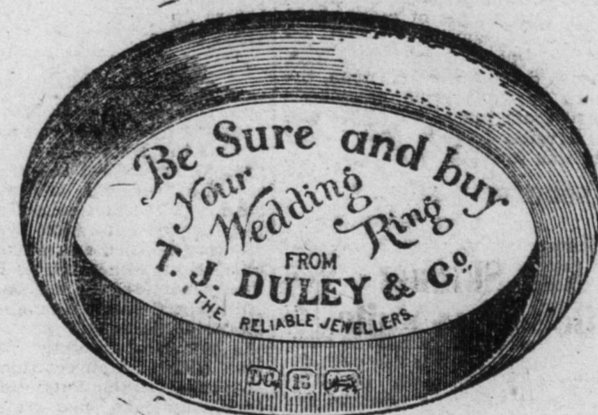

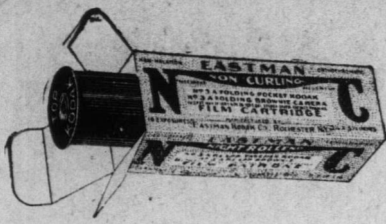

A Commercial Entente. Two Fighting Families.

Sir Geo. Parish has recently pointed out the financial strength of the United Kingdom, and has rightly remarked that, if we are selling our American securities, we are investing the money in our own Dominions and in Russia and France. That is true, and it is urgently needed saying. But there is a corollary of the statement, and it is this: That the Dominions and our Allies have borrowed money from the British Government, and they will have to pay interest on those borrowings. (Belgium and Serbia, to whom money has been given unconditionally, are excepted from this statement.) Now, if Russia, for example, has to pay to Britain year by year certain large sums of money until the debt is redeemed, she will also require to send us goods both in order to equalize the exchange and to cover her payments on the loan. She could pay in sugar, or agricultural produce; but this would mean an agreement as regards international commerce between the Allies, whereby we agreed to take Russian and not German sugar for the future. The policy of a commercial entente between the Allies must receive attention; it will be necessary not only to discourage German goods but to encourage Allied goods, and a fortiori, Dominion goods.—United Empire.

At the House.

TUESDAY, April 4th, 1916.
Mr. Lloyd presented a petition asking that the railway extension work, originally intended, be carried on in the south side of Trinity Bay; also asking for the improvement of the Labrador mail service.

Petitions were also presented by Mr. Stone, Mr. Piccott, Mr. Currie and Mr. Abbott on various public matters.

The House then went into Committee to consider certain Resolutions relating to the Weights and Measures Act. The Resolutions provide that cattle feeds and poultry feeds shall be sold by weight with the net weight on each sack, the net weight of weight to be 100 lbs. Hay and straw is also to be sold by weight and 2,000 lbs. to mean a ton instead of 2,240. On barrels of port, beef and jowls the net weight is to be stamped on each package. The Imperial gallon is to be used in measuring paints, oils, varnishes and turpentine and to use the term "gallon" as heretofore in the sale of such articles shall be a violation of the Act. Hardware is also to be sold by weight with the term hundred weight to mean 100 lbs. Regarding pit measurements, the cord is to be equal to 128 cubic feet, without deduction of air spaces between the logs. The fees for weighing scales are higher than those already in force. Coal and salt is to be sold by measure or weight. Provisions are also made for the weighing of oils. The provisions of the Act requiring the net weight to be stamped on packages do not come into effect until January 1st, 1917.

Several members spoke on the Resolutions and many amendments submitted, probably the most important was that of Mr. Coaker who urged that two public coal scales, one in the East and another in the West End of St. John's be established for the protection of the buyer and consumer, as at present all the weighing of coal is done by those who own the coal and there is no check kept on them. He emphasized the necessity of having erected the two scales asked for as the matter was in the public interest.

The Colonial Secretary was heartily in accord with what the previous speaker had said, but thought it was a matter for the City Government to deal with.

In that event Mr. Coaker said the Government would have a chance to make provision for the scales when the City Charter reached the House.

The Resolutions gave effect to a Bill which was read a first time and to be fully discussed in Committee later.

Mr. Coaker asked the Rt. Hon. the Premier if Hon. D. Morrison has any claim against the Colony on account fees for the Hague Arbitration; if so, for what amount, and what steps he proposed to take.

The Premier replied that an application had been made for compensation and Mr. Morrison was advised to make his claim through the Supreme Court.

The Leader of the Opposition (Mr. Lloyd) asked for a statement of expenditures made under General Contingencies for the twelve months ending March 31st, 1916.

A statement was tabled by the Finance Minister.

Mr. Clift (1) asked the Colonial Secretary what steps had been taken to carry out the suggestion of the Auditor General relative to the appointment of Directors on the Board of Companies, on the capital of which the Government guarantees payment of interest and was informed that there was nothing yet done in the matter; (2) he asked the Finance Minister for a statement of all loans, if any, obtained from the Bank of Montreal, or any other Bank, from June 30th, 1915, to date and a statement of one loan for \$500,000, which was got, was submitted; (3) Mr. Clift asked the Premier for a detailed statement of all expenditures made under the head of Encouragement of Agriculture from 30th June, 1915, to April 1st, 1916. The Premier gave his stereotyped reply "being prepared."

Mr. Stone again jogged the memory of the Minister of Public Works for answers to the session in relation to large expenditures of the public monies.

The House went into Committee on Supply and the vote for Agriculture was again taken up.

Mr. Lloyd moved that the vote be deferred, pointing out that Mr. Clift had asked for a statement of the expenditure of \$20,000 on Agriculture last year and stated that it was not desirable to pass the vote until that information was tabled. The Leader of the Opposition also urged that the vote for the Postal Telegraph Department be not proceeded with until some definite information in reference to the trouble which has occurred in that department be given to the House. He drew attention to a statement promised to be given by the Colonial Secretary regarding more recent trouble. He asked that a report of the enquiry be tabled before the House closed, as the charges were grave and ought not to be left over until next year.

The Colonial Secretary said it was owing to the illness of the Commissioner that the enquiry was not finished, but intimated that the Executive would sit on the matter in a day or two with a view to getting the facts of the misconduct at the Telegraph Department brought before the House.

Mr. Coaker emphasized the importance of having the report of the Postal Telegraph Enquiry before the House closed. Matters had been so bad there that it was due the House and due the country to have the information tabled. Allegations as to the Postal scandals were made twelve months ago and the matter should not, under any circumstances, be kept a secret for another year. He advised the Government to lay some sort of a report before the House, if not he would bring in his information and let the country know what he knew of the alleged public scandals.

The House then went into Committee on the Tuberculosis vote. The report of Dr. Rendell was dealt with and Mr. Coaker, the Prime Minister, Mr. Piccott and Mr. Bennett expressed their views briefly thereupon. Mr. Coaker did not believe the country was getting the benefit of the \$24-

000 expended for the cure of consumptives and urged that some of that money should go for old age pensions. The Committee then rose and asked leave to sit again this afternoon.
