



The sacred Congregation of Seminaries and Universities has recently informed this Apostolic Delega ion concerning a plan reported for decision to the Holy See by the most evered and right reverend ordinarof the Metropolitan Provinces of Halifax and St. John's, Nfld.

This was a plan to bring about a federation of all the Catholic and non-Catholic colleges with the aid of a money contribution from the Carnegie Foundation, so that only one non-denominational university would be formed, or the present nonominational college of Dalhousie in the city of Halifax would, in case the federation were approved, be enlarged and equipped with everything necessary to make it a university in the true and proper sense.



#### Fighting the Ice Peril of the Atlantic.

he interplay of two great ocean rents off the Newtoundland day is the key to the icohers sitution, according to Charles Fitzhugh rador current pushing southward and the warm Gulf Stream sweeping to along a battlefront that is constantly changing its position.

As one or the other of these warring currents sacrifices ground or drives a deep "salient" into the others territory the teebergs are carried back and forth along erratic courses. In recent years the drifts of many individual bergs have been charted day by day; in some cases for many weeks together.

In the Labrador current an iceberg tends to survive; in the Gulf Stream it speedily disintegrates. Hence the line of demarcation between these two currents is the boundary between relatively safe and relatively unsafe waters, and the location of this evershifting danger line is a vital problem of the ice patrol.

Although there is some mixing of water along the dividing line, its position is generally easy to determine on account of the different characteristics of the opposing currents Their most obvious and striking dif ferences are in color and temper ature. The water of the Labrador current is green; that of the Gulf stream dark blue. The contrast in temperature, which extends vertically downward for hundreds of feet, is expressed in the name "cold wall," applied to the interface of the cur-

Two Temperatures in One Ship. A case is recorded in which one of the patrol ships, placed across this "wall," measured a water temperature of 34 degrees Fahrenheit at the how and 56 degrees at the stern; a range of 22 degrees! The same day the crew went swimming in tropical water at 70 degrees Fahrenheit, while half a mile to the northward was a huge Greenland iceberg.

A popular impression prevails that the coast guard cutters blow up icebergs as they do derelicts. The fact is that no amount of blasting would have an appreciable effect on one of these floating monsters, consisting of millions of tons of hard, flinty ice.

Since icebergs cannot be destroyed, they must be avoided. By day and in clear weather the mariner can easthe give them a wide berth By night and in the dense fogs that so freently enshroud the iceberg region the task is not so easy.

A sudden encounter with cold watr means that the vessel has entered cold current, but not necessarily that ice is at hand. According to Prof. H. T. Barnes, of McGill University. Montreal, who has been making a study of ice and icebergs for many years, the approach of an iceberg is indicated by a characteristic rise in the temperature of the water, which can be detected many miles from the iceberg by means of a delicate re-

cording thermometer of special type Another novel device for locating bergs, and one in which the authorities of the United States hydrographic office and the coast guard see the greatest promise at present, is an outgrowth of war-time experiments in "sound ranging" under water. A sound sent out by the instrument is reflected back to its source and an indication is obtained of both the position and the distance of the reflecting surface.

#### The Depth Finder.

Under the name of the "sonic depth finder," this device has been successfully used by the navy for sounding ocean depths. Its use for locating icebergs is being tested during this year's ice natrol.

It is proposed to establish an observation post on the shores of Davis Straft, for the purpose of making an actual count of the number of icebares that start each year on their march to southern waters. The most favorable location for such a post would be Cape Dyer. Baffin land. where the Arctic drift sweeps in close to the shore. It takes an iceberg about five months to travel from this point to the vicinity of the Grand

Regardless of future developments, it may be stated that the ice patrol has already almost sholished what was once the greatest peril of a trans-Atlantio voyage. No disastrous collision with ice has occurred within the area covered by the patrol since into service was established.

#### To Restore Suede.

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



In his address the former orlawyer as a citizen. Governor Hiram Johnson and several other leaders of progressive legislation were in the audience. This resulted in his appointment, a few months later. as secretary of the newly organized Industrial Accident Board, which was charged with the hearing and investigation of the complaints of injured workmen, under the newly enacted Workmen's Compensation Act.

Sapiro's two years in this office were ignificant. Finding the existing comensation law crude and ineffective, ne assisted in writing a new law, which was passed by the legislature. Later, as the legal representative of the State of California, he defended the constitutionality of this act in the ourts and won a complete victory. This law has since been copied by many other states.

In 1913 he resigned his office and vent into private practice. Much of his ime, however, was devoted to a study of co-operative marketing systems-a subject in which he had become deepw interested because of a conviction hat most farmers were unjustly handicapped by existing marketing condi-tions. 


