CHIMNEY CATASTROPHE.

THIRTY-SIX PERSONS KILLED IN BRADFORD, ENGLAND.

**Thirty Others Injured—Mills Shut Down—
The Shaft Falls Upon a Factory full of
Operatives.**

Bradford, Eng. Dec. 28.—To-day a tall chimney fell upon a building full of operatives. Many are believed to have been killed. One hundred and twenty-two were removed, of whom two are dead.

LATER.—Thirty-six persons are now known to have been killed by the chimney accident to-day. Fifty others were injured, mostly women and children. Owing to the amount of debris, the exact number killed cannot be learned for several days. Three thousand persons are out of employment, the damaged chimney, being brought to a standstill.

FLOODS IN EUROPE.

**King of the Rhine—Twenty Persons
Drowned.**

Berlin, Dec. 28.—The Rhine and its tributaries from Lake Constantine to Cologne continue to rise rapidly. Many bridges and dams are destroyed. The bridge near Lorsch, Baden, gave way and twenty persons were drowned. The river in France overflowed its banks at Passau and the Danube overflowed in Upper Austria.

**The Banner Train for Hamilton—Double
Tracking the Grand Trunk.**

CHICAGO, Dec. 28.—It is estimated that 11,000 miles of railroad track was laid during 1892 on 316 lines in 44 states and territories. This is 1600 more than up to structure in 1881, the banner year of mile that time. The single state was 953, in construction in 1887; New York third, Iowa; Texas in next, 817; New York third, 762 miles. Of the above lines 140 are still incomplete. The capital invested during 1892 is estimated at \$270,000,000. The new lines are estimated at \$200,000,000. The Chicago and North Western and the Erie and Western railroads report the earnings for the year as follows: Chicago and North Western, \$10,548,000; Erie and Western, \$8,588,750.

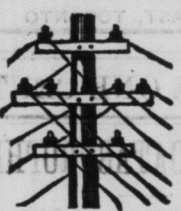
