We submit that the honor conferred upon Mr. Mercier is spiritual in its nature and therefore of no interest, honor or advantage to the Dominion, for its concern in the Quebec Premier is purely temporal. Whether his particular accident of birth and association has made him a Roman Catholic or a Protestant should be a matter of complete public indifference, so long as he is morally and intellectually equipped for his statesmanly duties. And, being one or the other, it lies with his conscience and his heart whether he shall, by diligence in faith and conformity in worship, win those honors the Church may have at disposal, or by religious neglect forego those honors. In distinctions thus won the people at large should not be asked to evince the pleasure.




