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



Ottawa Oc\*. 25.—Mail advices from Australia received today convey the intelligence that the government of New South Wales is taking prompt steps to carry out the Paolific cable scheme as far as the contribution of the colony is concerned. As stated recently the lowest tender for the line is £1,886,000, but from reliable information it appears including extras, the total cost of the cable will be £2,066,000, the original estimated cost being £1,730,658. Contributors to the cost of construction are Great Britain and Canada, each of which pay one-third of the cost, and the four Australian colonies, New South Wales, Victoria, New Zealand and Queensland, paying the other third.

Quebec, Oct. 27th.—Twenty-one of the principal shoe factories of this city closed down last evening owing to difficulties with their employes, and from present appearances are not likely to resume operations for some time, probably not before January. This action throws from five to six thousand hands out of employment. The maufacturers have determined once for all to put an end to the tyranny of the unions.

If people knew what an easy task it is to clean portraits and oil paintings they would never let them hang black and colorless on their walls. In nine cases out of ten pictures painted by the last generation of artists, own ed by private collectors or individuals, have almost entirely lost their beauty by being

The following method can be used by any careful person without fear or injury to the icture, and in many cases will restore its surface to its original freshnes and brilliancy

Take the picture from its frame and lay it on a large table, face upward. Have a bowl of tepid water and a good-sized sponge in readiness. Peel a large white potato and cut in half. Then, with the sponge and water, go carefully over the entire surface of the picture. In case it is badly cracked, as so many old oil paintings are, let the sponge be fairly dry, for if water should ooze under the paint it might crack more. Now take the potato, and with the smooth side go over the entire surface while it is wet. Do not scrub hard or stretch the canvas and nessitate its being taken off the strecher.
