An Apple Packer Justified.

To the Editor of the Monitor: - DEAR SIR, - An article in your last issue, copied from the St. Croix Courier, set forth a picture upon the character of Nova Scotia apple packers generally, and upon myself in particular, and I desire you to publish this statement. On the 11th day of last Sept. I gathered under the trees in my orchard five barrels of wind-falls which had been recently blown off by a heavy wind. I kept the different varieties separate, and when I had rolled three or four of Kings, 1 of Red-Striped Toppin, 1 of Strawberry Pasternak, and 1 of partly Green-striped and partly Green-striped. I branded the barrels with the name of the fruit and with my own name. I put no other marks on any of them.
