CHRONICLE.

BY R. R. BOGERT.

AUSTRIA.—Le. T. P. learns that the 20, 24, 30 and 50 kr. will be changed. The effigy will be in a hexagon and the figures in the angles in italics.

BOLIVIA.—The new 100c. is said to be yellow. It will then differ much from the 1868 issue. We hear of the 1c. lake with nine stars.

BELGIUM.—The 35c. is printed in ochre, and has the inscriptions in French and Flemish.

BR. NORTH BORNEO.—The 25c. is surcharged "Two-Cents" in two lines.

BR. SOUTH AFRICA Co.—Additional values 2sh., vermilion, 2sh. 6d., violet, 5sh., orange 10sh., green. Larger size, £1, blue, £2, rose, £5, sage green, £10, brown. The 6d. blue has been surcharged in black with large numerals "½d.", "2d.", "4d.", and the 1sh. "8d." These are no doubt already obsolete for we have the same values printed in two colors as follows, ½d., blue and red; 2d., green and red; 4d., brown and black; 8d., lake and blue.

BRAZIL.—There is an 80 reis letter card similar to the lately issued post card of the same value. On the reverse is a representation of the mint. Buff card, with interior white.

BR. BECHUANALAND.—M. Maury tells us a new emission is contemplated similar to the stamps of Seychelles,

BR. EAST AFRICA.—There are three new stamps, 3a. black on red paper, $4\frac{1}{2}a$. lilac, 8ru. brown. We have also a registry envelope with stamp on the flap, 2a. blue The stamp is circular, and has a scroll below with incription "Registration Two Annas." White paper, size, 132x81 mm.

Br. Honduras.—The surcharge on the Ioc. is in red as well as black, and we have the 3d. stamp printed in blue and surcharged "6 CENTS" in two lines. *Mekeel's Weekly* illustrates a surcharge "SIX" on the Ioc. lilac, which is stated to have been the first issued, but in small quantity only.

CEYLON.—We have the IOC. card with surcharge THREE over the word TEN; also with surcharge THREE-CENTS in two lines and original value erased. The 5c. card is also surcharged 3 CENTS and value erased. In addition to the surcharged cards already noted we have seen the following: The IOC. card surcharged "5 CENTS" and value erased, and the 5c. card sucharged "THREE CENTS" in two lines and the value erased.

CONGO FREE STATE.—There is a 10fc. stamp, yellow ochre according to Le T. P.

CHILI.—The A. \mathcal{F} . of P. says stamps of the values of 15c., 25c., and 1 peso will be soon sssued.

ECUADOR.—Letter cards, 5c., blue on red, 10., orange on blue, stamp of type of 1881. The 5c., blue envelope with French inscription is printed on yellow paper. Size, 124x81 mm.

FIJI ISLANDS.—The 1d. is printed in lilac and surcharged "Four Pence" in black, as well as the 2d. stamp. The 2d. green has been then surcharged "2½d." in large black type, about 13x5 mm.

FALKLAND ISLANDS.—The Stamp News notes the 1d. divided diagonally and surcharged 1/4 in small black figures.

GOLD COAST.—The 21/2d. is printed in blue with value in orange.

GREECE.—Letter cards are expected.

GUADELOUPE.—The 10c. has been surcharged " 5c. " in black, same as the I franc.

HYDERABAD.—The card is to be replaced by one with an inscription signifying "H. H. The Nizam's Government." In the meantime the omission has been supplied by surcharging a crescent and star with inscription. The I anna of first issue is in use as a fiscal printed in vermilion for judicial, and blue for other revenue purposes. Both have been seen with postal cancelation. Above from the Monthly Fournal.

HONG KONG.—The 30c. mauve is surcharged "14 CENTS" in two lines, same type as recent 7c.

INDIA.—The envelope 4a. 6p., yellow, has been surcharged around the oval "India Postage, Two annas and six pies," in black.

ITALY.—The 5c. has been surcharged 20c. in the same manner as the 30c. and 50c. The 2c. unpaid has been surcharged "10" and "30" in black.

JAMAICA.—We have a 21/2d, lilac and blue, same type as the 1d. and 2d.

LEEWARD ISLANDS.—Envelopes of ½d. and 2d. are reported, the latter for registered letters.

LUXEMBURG.—Le C. de T. P. says the new stamps will bear the portrait of the Grand Duke Adolphe of Nassau in the uniform of an Austrian General.

MARTINIQUE.—The stamps noted last month are "05" on the 10, 20, 30, 35 and 40c., and "15" on the 20, 25 and 75c.

MAURITIUS.—Le T. P. has just received registered envelopes, 8c., blue, of several sizes. A new supply of 5oc. envelopes has been ordered in London, to be printed in yellow. The letter rate will be reduced to 1oc. and the stamps of 16, 25 and 38c. will be surcharged with that value.

MEXICO.—The same journal chronicles 4c. and 6c. envelopes, both red. In addition to the 2rls. rose, and 4rls. white of Chipas, already known, the Ph. R. mentions a 1 real, black on green. and 8rls. black on pink.

Monaco.—The new 1 fc. stamp has appeared. The bust of Prince Albert I. to the left in an oval frame. In lower right corner a retangular block on which is seated a crowned female representing the principality. Black on yellow perf. $13\frac{1}{2}$.

NEW SOUTH WALES.—The 2d. card has been changed. It is now straw color instead of white, and inscribed "For the United Kingdom—and other countries to—which post cards may—be sent." Among the set of unpaid letter stamps there is a I shilling.

NEW ZEALAND.- The 3d. brown lilac, imperforated on pelure paper, has turned up. The 21/2d. blue and 5d. green have appeared. Both have head of Oncen to the left with very small crown.

ORANGE FREE STATE.—There are at least three types of numeral in the 1d. on 4d. The 3d. is surcharged "1d." in the same manner as the 4d.

PERAK.—There is an official card, without stamp, black on yellowish white. PUTTIALIA.—The 2 anna blue registry envelope comes with surcharge "PATIALA STATE" in two lines with arms. Sizes, 132x82 mm. and 255x107 mm.

RAJ NANDGAON.—Stamps measuring 30x40 mm. have been issued for this state. In central oval in four lines "Feudatory-State-Raj Nandgam-C. P." All in rectangular frame, with "Raj Nandgam State Postage" at right, value below and native inscriptions at left and top. 1/2 anna, blue on pale buff; 1/2 anna, blue on white; 2 annas, red on white. Imperforate.

ROUMANIA.—The 5x5 bani card has the new stamp.

STRAITS SETTLEMENTS.—Registry envelope, 5c. blue.

SWITZERLAND.—There is a 3fc. stamp, yellow brown.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA.-The 6d. has been printed in brown and surcharged "5D.' in red. The original value has been effectually canceled by a heavy curved line.

SWEDEN.—L'Echo de la T. notes a new 5 ore dark green, with head of the King, and says that a 20 c blue of similar design is in preparation. The letter cards will also be changed.

TASMANIA.—There is a 1d. stamp, vermilion, impressed on envelopes and wrappers to order. It somewhat resembles the 2d. envelope stamp, but is surrounded by 24 dotted scallops.

TUNIS.—The 15c. envelope is of dark blue paper instad of pale blue.

URUGUAY .-- The current stamps have been surcharged official.

WURTEMBURG.—The I. B. J. says the 5pf. wrapper is now dark green on bluish, and the official wrapper dark green on salmon.

It is said about ten million counterfeit stamps of 10 pf. German Empire are in circulation, and letters bearing that value are invariably arriving behind time, as the authorities have been examining all the stamps. The only difference seems to be a slight error in the perforation.—"Philatelic World."

It is to a native Postmistress that the Finns owe it that their own national postage stamps are, in a couple of months' time, to be replaced with the stamps in use throughout the Russian Empire generally. And this is how it came about: In 1889, during the Imperial visit to Finland, the Postmistress of the Post Office at Ekenos kept back a letter, which had been sent by the Czar himself, because it bore a Russian instead of a Finnish postage stamp. The result of this ill-advised act is, that though the Finns will still be allowed to use their own stamps for letters circulating in Finland, all letters intended for other parts of the Russian Empire, or for foreign countries, will henceforth have to be stamped with Russian stamps. The funny man may, perhaps, be inclined to call this a "Finn" de siecle improvement, but the Finns themselves are most excited at the coming innovation.—London Figaro.

DEAR SIR,—My letter referring to the manufacture of a group picture of all C. P. Nominations for officers are now in order, and I have in mind a candidate who has done more in the way of advertising and pushing the C. P. A. than any other member, who has heretofore occupied but a minor position with little or no chance to spread himself and show his ability, and with all these drawbacks is the best known member of the C. P. A. to-day. This candidate I nominate for the position of President, and his name is J. R. Hooper, your present efficient Librarian, and the originator of the C. P. A.

MR. EDITOR,—Our President, Mr. Craig, has let slip a good opportunity of keeping silent. The last number of the Dominion Philatelist, contains an article signed by him, which is a masterpiece of insanity, which I shall demonstrate. In the March number of the above paper I complained that the Exchange Department did not work properly, that the Superin endent did not acknowledge the receipt of our stamps, which are sometimes of grat value, and consequently months elapsed before the sender knew what became of his stamps, that the monies due to the members were not paid them, that the fees owed to the Society were exacted from its members even if the Society were in their debt, that the exchange of stamps was the only benefit which the members could have from the Association, and if they did not have more satisfaction in this respect they would withdraw from the Association, which would necessarily become a thing of the past. These complaints are not new, Mr. Clarke, of Belleville, had also written in a similar way in last February's number.

Mr. Grenny, who is brought into the case, has not uttered a word, did not deny that which I stated, but our President wishes to defend him. Instead of letting us see that our Superintendent does his duty, acknowledges the receipt of our stamps, that he pays us regularly, etc., he calls me an ignorant and impertinent person, as well as one without any experience. Is this a sensible man's

answer? What does it matter in our discussion if I am an ignorant person does that excuse Mr. Grenny for not performing the duties of his position? But, says he, the American Philatelic Association retains the stamps belonging to its says he, the American Philatelic Association retains the stamps belonging to its members much longer than our Society does. I must say that this is a neat way of reasoning. Does their ill doing cure ours? Two wrongs don't make a right. You should make suggestions instead. He goes on to say: If I am without any experience what is the use? Moreover, at the last annual meeting held at Montreal, on the 12th August last, the absence of our President being one of its principal features, the members seeing how badly the Exchange Department worked, adopted the following report, a part of which I now quote.

"To the Officers and Members of the C. P. A .:

"Your Committee beg to report the following:

"The Exchange Superintendent is to only send sheets to those members who send in stamps to exchange, make a cash deposit or give first-class references.

"That a quarterly account be rendered by the Exchange Superintendent, and

all indebted are to remit at once, in default thereof the Superintendent has power to dispose of the stamps, or retain the deposit until such debt is cleared. Fifteen days will be allowed members to settle.

"Members having more to their credit than the amount of stamps taken, not to be called for payments.

"That Exchange Superintendent have option to receive 10 per cent on sales without choice of stamps, or retain present commission of 7½ per cent. with choice of stamps.

"That a list of all members with the amount sent in to the Exchange Superintendent be published monthly in the official organ.

"Respectfully submitted.

"Signed A. E. LABELLE, "J. E. SCHULTZE, " INO. R. HOOPER."

Has the Superintendent adopted a single one of these suggestions? and has the President in any way done anything to have Mr. Grenny put these recommendations in force? Yes, Mr. Grenny did retain 10 per cent commission on my stamps, and his name appears first on one of my lists, and as having been served before all the others. Do you, Mr. President, approve of this want of delicacy.

You also state that you were informed that I circulated counterfeit stamps. Supposing this to be true, does it authorize Mr. Grenny to keep the money coming to me? I shall again demonstrate to you that you are in the wrong, and that your Superintendent makes you say a silly thing. I circulated nine sheets of the total value of \$312.47, on which were a certain number of Mexican stamps, which I received from one of my correspondents, a man occupying a high social position, and whose honor I never found at fault since I have had relations with him. These stamps were not, as you affirm, trash, but stamps varying in price from \$2 to \$25 each. One of the members of the Society to whom one of my sheets had been sent, wrote the following words at the beginning of my pass book: "Look out for the counterfeit stamps, surcharges and fraudulent cancellations on these sheets. The counterfeit detector must have

examined the stamps with his eyes shut." Naturally after this warning the members abstained from taking my stamps, and my list came back to me aimost complete, but the Superintendent had, with his sphinx's eye seen these words, and he, the Superintendent, drew the President's attention to it, so that he, the Superintendent might find some justification for not having done his duty. In the meantime the member who had written these words sent me the following post card.

"3/5/91.

"DEAR SIR,—If you have received back the fragments of 4 & 8 r. of 56-63 of Mexico you had in circulation I shall be pleased to take them in exchange for other rarities. Therefore please send them on approval and I will forward you a fine selection."

Had my stamps been counterfeits would this member have asked them from me afterwards, even only in exchange. Ordinary common sense says the contrary. If our President had seen these stamps, he, with his long experience, his knowledge second only to his great modesty, would at once have seen that these stamps were genuine, exactly as did the member who wished to purchase them at a low figure, and I shall pay him the compliment to believe that he would not have made such an unjust and unfair accusation.

Anyway the remedy, to me, appears a simple one. If our Superintendent neglects his duty, let him render up his accounts, and let some one who understands his work better, and who will give better satisfaction to the various members of the Association replace him. I must apologise, Mr. Editor, if I take up so much of your valuable space, but the question is a serious one, and deserves mature consideration on the part of the members of the Association. If I have not the President's approval, I flatter myself that I have that of the large majority of the members, who at the next Annual Meeting will see and put an end to this sad state of things, by appointing active officers, who will be duly qualified to replace our President, who is merely our Superintendent's tool.

To the Members of the C.P.A.:

GENTLEMEN,—I am induced to draw your attention to the present state of affairs of the C. P. A. I will not say we are dormant or dead, but simply "sleeping." We are not progressing fast enough. Our membership should increase, not decrease, no matter if we only increase at the rate of one per month. Something is the cause of all this? Is it because stamp collecting is dying out? Is our hobby retrograding or on the down grade? I hope not. I noticed a letter recently from Mr. Paul Sicotte, and in it were some remarks showing things as he sees them. I hope every member will come out and state his views, and no man has a right to attack those opinions when given for the good of the C.P.A.

I happen to be well acquainted with Mr. Sicotte. The Montrealers say he is a fine fellow. So do I. We met him at the C. P. A. Convention. He stuck to us through all While a young collector, he is enthusiastic, and above all a perfect gentleman. Therefore I respect his opinions, as I am in honor bound, and I hope it will be the means of stirring up the C. P. A. to life.

I have received several letters asking to allow myself to be put in nomination as President and Exchange Superintendent. I am not anxious for the former office, as long as there are good men in the field. We want a worker for that position. One who will roll up his shirt sleeves, write up reports for our official organ, and attend to our business generally. I am content to stand back when the good men are so plentiful. Although the organizer and promoter of the C. P. A. I have never at any time sought the office of President. It will have to seek me. Probably I am too "cutting" to seek some, but I want to be, as the foot ballers say, "in the rush line." As to the office of Exchange Superintendent, I have decided to accept the nomination against all comers, and hope some others will be pitted against me. Let the best win. In view of this I have decided to formulate my plan of action for discussion.

We all know our present plan now in use by the C. P. A. was used by the A. P. A., and they thought to better it by calling the Exchange Department a Sales Department. After a year's trial we find more dissatisfaction than ever, and not one-quarter of the members are participating in this Department of the A. P. A. as formerly. The Chicago branch has withdrawn from the A. P. A., and I notice the following remarks from an A. P. A. member: "How many buyers has the present A. P. A. Sales (C. O. D.) Department. It is to be hoped that the next conventionwill re-instate our old Exchange Department." Now we see that the old one is preferred, at least by some, while probably the dealers prefer the Sales Department. I cannot see how a dealer can run a society exchange department properly. I do not believe in a Sales Department alone. Our present system is all right with stricter regulations. But if a change is wanted I recommend something after the "Clotz plan," or with additions of my own as follows:

"Let the Exchange Superintendent divide up the members into classes A. B. C., representing respectively an Exchange Department, a Sales Department and Foreign Exchange Department. The latter can be arranged by affiliation with an English, German or French Society, or even with an American Society. In this respect I fought at the last convention for affiliation as a branch with the Great Dresden. Why did it not materialize?

CLASS A.—Exchange Department.—All participating in this are to send in stamps and to accept exchange for same, stamps all to be priced by a standard catalogue to be named by the Exchange Superintendent. No sheets accepted in this of less value than \$2.00. This could also be made so that members had to take at least \$1 from each book sent him, with option to pay in cash, but no member has a right to expect cash.

CLASS B.—Sales Department.—Any member can send in sheets and price them as he likes, no limit of value on sheets. Cash paid for all taken from books in this Department, quarterly or half-yearly.

CLASS C.—Foreign Exchange Department.— Members wishing foreign sheets can send in stamps for foreign circulation, and in return will be put on foreign circuit. Balances of these will be settled every quarter. No sheets accepted less value than \$3.00 each. If we affiliate with the Dresden we can adopt their branch regulations, but the whole management of the three classes should be under one head.

I respectively submit these crude points for the consideration of my Philatelic conferes. If I am not acceptable as Exchange Superintendent, I shall be quite content to step down and out, and be forever "buried in oblivion."


