An Apology.

Our issue of Sent. 1st was delayed beyond all reason, owing to the editor having been laid up and unable to attend to business. Scores of the aggregate of the Ontario Rifle Association matches and all the scores of the Dominion Rifle Association matches were omitted, together with a good deal of the missing matter in this number, and to complete the record of the season will insert some more in our next and trust our subscribers will bear with us. New arrangements are being made, whereby local news from the large military centres will be livelier than it has been, and we hope to show a great improvement in the course of the next few weeks.

The D. R. A. Matches.

The features of the D. R. A. matches was undoubtedly the protest against the use of 1894 ammunition, and the rejection from the aggregate by the executive, of the scores made in the "Macdougall" and "Hamilton Powder Co."

We presume the executive deliberated carefully over this matter before giving their decision but we think that we are voicing the opinion of the large majority of competitors in stating that such a measure should not have been decided upon, on the rather negative evidence of the use of 1893 ammunition by some of the competitors. Our opinion is that if there was not evidence enough to incriminate any of the competitors and prove conclusively that they had used the '93 ammunition, there was not enough to warrant such a step as was taken.

Moreover, we believe that this was the feeling expressed by a good proportion of the executive committee.

The Ranelagh Cups won by the team of the 12th at Bisley were on view in the tent of the council, and together with the St. George's Challenge Vase, won by Sgt. King at Bisley, attracted much attention. Well done, Canada. The Queen's may come next.

The development of the social phase of the D. R. A. meeting is a most pleasant feature of the meeting and one which will tend in a great measure to assure its success and bring new shots to the matches. Many will be attracted by the prospects of a pleasant week to whom rifle shooting alone would not be an inducement to leave their homes.

The Vics' Maxim attracted much attention, and its signal victory in its trial with the Gatling, was the cause of much joy in this popular regiment's camp.

We again have to apologize for the incompleteness of this issue and trust our readers will bear with us. Next issue will, we hope, be on time and will need no apologies.

At Levis Camp.

Lieut. Col. d'Orsonnens was summoned to the Levis camp last week. It is reported that the commandant of St. Johns, who is also the deputy adjutant-general for this district, is to be transferred to Sherbrooke, where, it is said, the headquarters are to be established, and that Major Young will be placed in charge of the R. AT THE RANGES.

Three Annual Prize Meetings of Important Rifle Associations

Continued.

The Big D. R. A. Meeting.

This is how the *Empire* correspondent describes the opening day of the D. R. A. meeting Monday August, 27th :-- Late this afternoon a tremendous storm passed over the D.R.A. camp on the banks of the Rideau. The like of it has never been previously seen in the history of the association. It was not caused by atmospheric condition ; it was a storm of indignation; a storm in which there were many words expended, and cuss words at that. To-night on the camp ground, but especially in the Russell house rotunda, scores of competitors are discussing the situation, and the excitement is intense.

The origin of the trouble appears to be as follows: Both at the Montreal and Toronto rifle meetings there were complaints about the ammunition. It was of '94 make, and is generally conceded to be much inferior to that produced by the Government factory in 1893. In fact, expert shots say that last year's make could not be improved upon. Early this morning the executive of the association met and appointed the following gentlemen as the Match Committee to conduct the meeting : Major Mason, of the 13th Battalion, Hamilton, chairman; Major Sam Hughes, M.P., Lindsay; Major Weston, Halifax Rifles; Major Blaicklock, Royal Scots, Montreal, and Capt. Hartt, St. John. At the same time a small committee of expert shots was chosen to report upon the quality of the '94 ammunition to be used to-day. Meanwhile the Deputy Minister of Militia was requested to supply a sufficient quantity of the make of 1893, in the event of the decision being reached to discard the '94 ammunition. Between 5 and 6 o'clock a formidable looking protest, signed by about 100 competitors, was lodged with the executive, asking that the Macdougall Challenge Cup match, the last of the day be shot over again, on the ground that certain competitors had substituted the ammunition of '93 for that of '94, thereby giving them a great advantage over those who had fired the cartridges furnished by the association. Now the rule under this head is specific; it says that "in all matches none but the ammunition issued by the D.R.A. shall be used or allowed." Th re is

NO LOOPHOLE OF ESCAPE.

A competitor must use the ammunition furnished to him by the association; if he contravenes the rule, he renders himself liable to expulsion from the matches. It is in regard to this protest that the present row prevails, and over which there is so much controversy to-night. Unquestionnably the ammunition was bad, some of the best shots having made miserable scores at the 600 yards range, and in nearly every case where they paid 50 cents for challenging, the shot was found not to be in the target. It is singular, however, that proof of the substitution of 1893 ammunition for 1894 is not forthcoming in a single case, and the Executive Committee are, therefore, greatly puzzled what to do. Wrappers with the 1893 stamps upon them have been picked up on the range. But as the Metropolitan Association's matches were fired here a week ago, when 1893 ammunition was used, and there has been not a drop of rain since, the presence of 1893 ammunition wrappers is easily accounted for. The men who are asking for the match to be fired over again are the ones who made the poor scores at 600 yards, they having, as a rule, made good scores at 400. It is said by some competitors, who believe in the integrity of their fellows, that it evinces a very unsportsmanlike trait to raise this protest for the purpose of having another trial. "Why can't they take their medicine like little men, and stand the consequence of their bad shooting?" remarked a Toronto rifleman to The Empire to-night. "I made poor shooting in the Hamilton Powder Company's match, and yet I did not blame the ammunition, and ask for a second trial. If the Executive decide that the Macdougall match be shot over again, they establish a dangerous precedent; where it will end no one knows. In common fairness, if the match is to be refired, they ought to allow us to shoot all the matches over again."

The Executive had a meeting to-night to discuss the situation, but no decision was reached. It was agreed to sleep on it and meet for final decision at 8 o'clock to-morrow morning. As the scores now stand in this match Lieut. Hutcheson, of the 43rd Battalion, is cup winner.

The weather taken on the whole to-day has not been favorable; the sky was overcast all day and the light very trying. Some competitors say they had difficulty in distinguishing the barley-corn on their rules, while the black and white of the targets would blur with the peculiar light.

The Nursery fell to Gunner Sharpe, of Montreal, while the top man in the Hamilton Powder Company match was Capt. R. J. Spearing, of Sherbrooke. He made a possible. The following are the day's scores, the Macdougal list being withheld pending the Executive's decision :

THE SECOND DAY.

The Match Committee of the D. R. A. did not take long Tuesday morning to reach a decision in reference to the competitors' protest made against the am-

munition. It was decreed that the scores made in the Macdougall match should stand, but that they should not count in the grand aggregate. In other words, the decision implied a condemnation of the ammunition, and a substitution by some competitors of '93 make in place of that served out by the association, although no proof of the latter was forthcoming. In the Dominion of Canada commenced the opening afternoon and finished the second morning, ammunition made in 1893 was used, and there was a noticeable improvement in the shooting. For instance this year there were two 97's out of the possible 105, while last year the first prize was taken with a score of 95. Last year 81's came in, while this year under precisely similar conditions, 18 86's were counted out. In this match there is a team prize to be awarded to the highest team of six from any battalion named after the match is concluded, the cup to become the property of the corps of the battalion whose team wins it three times in five years. Last year the cup was held by the 43rd Ottawa Battalion, with a total of 525 points. To-day it was won by the 3rd Victoria Rifles, of Montreal, with the magnificent score of 551, or an average of 91 5-6 goints per man, the highest average made by a team of six men on the Rideau ranges.

The Caron Cup, in the Minister of Militia's match, held last year by the Victoria Rifles, of Montreal, fell this year to the Victoria Rifle Club, of Hamilton, while the first individual prize of \$50 was captured by Lieut. T. Mitchell, of Toronto, who, by the way, is up to-night to top man in the grand aggregate.

The weather was on the whole, favorable, the wind fairly steady, although the light changed. The sky was overcast and threatening, but no rain fell. During the afternoon there were many visitors on the range, chief among them being Major-General Herbert. Late in the afternoon a supply of Martini-Metfords was issued and many riflemen for the first time tested the new weapon.

In the morning a great misfortune befell Sergt. Grey, of Charlottetown. He put on a score of 91 in the Dominion of Canada match, but when his rifle came to be tested it was found that the minimum pull of the trigger was less than six pounds. The result was that Sergt. Grey's score was disallowed. He loses the prize of \$8, and what is more, with 91 points off the grand aggregate, he is offectually debarred from coming within the Governor's 100 and competing for Bisley.

THE MACDOUGALL 'CHALLENGE CUP MATCH.

The cup presented by Lady Macdougall, with a badge and \$530 added by the D. R. A. Open to efficient members of the active militia, members of the staff, and officers of the active force who have retired retaining rank; and to all officers, non commissioned officers and men of Her Majesty's regular army and navy stationed in Canada who are also members of the association. The cup to be the property of the member winning it twice consecutively. An additional badge will be given to each competitor who makes the same number of points as the winner of the cup. Entrance fee, \$1. Ranges, 400 and 600 yards; 5 rounds at each range; position, any with head to target at 400 yards; and any at 600 yards.

N. B.—The cup to be held by the winner for about a year, and then to be returned to the treasurer of the D. R. A. on or before the 17th August, 1895.

THE KICKERS' MEETING.

The annual meeting of the competitors was held Tuesday evening in the Drill Hall, Lieut.-Col. Tilton in the chair. Among the shots this little meeting is familiarly known as the kickers' meeting, and the name was applicable enough. Several minor grievances of the competitors were ventilated; then came the big kick of the day, that about the bad ammunition and the alleged frauds in connection with the Macdougall match.

Capt. Hood, of the P. W. R., started the ball rolling by enquiring why the executive had seen fit to use the 1894 ammunition, knowing it to be inferior to 1893.

Major Mason, of the 13th, Hamilton, a member of the executive and chairman of the Match Committee, explained that the 1894 ammunition had been ordered because the cartridge factory authorities had offered to put it up in more convenient packages. Major Provost, superintendent of the factory, had said that it was equal to 1893 make, the same powder being used. As soon as the inferiority of the ammunition was proven steps were taken to procure 1893 ammunition. As to the Macdougall match, fired before the 1894 ammunition was discarded, there was proof that competitors had used 1893 instead of that served out, and, as this was unfair to those who used the authorized ammunition, the match had been struck out of the aggregate.

Major Sam Hughes, also a member of the Match Committee, explained that he had personally investigated the matter, and found that 1893 ammunition was used, although the rules restricted the competitors to ammunition supplied by the association. There had been many cases of men calling themselves militiamen and marksmen running up and down ranges offering 40 cents a package for ammunition to give them an unfair advantage over other competitors. These men had confessed to him on his promise that he would not expose them that they had used 1893 ammunition.

Lieut. J. D. Taylor, of the British Columbia Garrison Artillery, created much amusement by solemnly reading a rule of the association to the effect that any member having knowledge of a breach of the regulations by any competitor and not at once reporting it to the executive should torfeit his prizes and entrance money.

Finally a resolution was passed on a division, requesting the committee to refer the question of the McDougall match and also the Hamilton Powder Company's match, with a view of deciding whether either of these matches, or both, should be struck out from the aggregate.

Lieut.-Col. Hood then drew attention to the fact that Major Ibbottson, the commandant, Capt. Kirkpatrick, adjutant, and most of the members of this year's Bisley team were present, and called for three rousing cheers for them, which were given with a will.

Major Ibbotson and Capt. Kirkpatrick fittingly responded, and the kickers' meeting for 1894 was over.

THE THIRD DAY.

The Executive Committee of the D. R. A., Wednesday reached the important decision to eliminate the scores made in the Hamilton Powder Company's match, as well as the Macdougall, from the grand aggregate, these being the two matches fired with bad ammunition.

The programme of the matches was confined to the Walker Battalion match, for teams of six, and the Henshaw match, one of the most trying matches of the series, consisting of seven shots of 200 vards standing, and ten shots at 600 yards, any position. The weather was all that could be desired. The temperature all the week had been acceptable and the competitors had very little cause for complaint.

The Walker Challenge Cup, the six badges and \$48, was captured by the Toronto Kilties, 48th, who deserve great credit for their splendid victory. A small cup, which becomes the absolute property of the highest individual scorer, was captured by Staff-Sergeant G. Brooks, of the Royal Grenadiers, with a score of 98 out of a possible 105. This is the best total made on the range this week at Queen's ranges. The high scoring made since the '93 ammunition was brought into the use is remarkable. Last year the Walker was

made up from the scores recorded in the Dominion of Canada match, which is at the same ranges, and was captured by the famous 12th Battalion, with 520 points, so that the shooting to-day shows a net increase of three points per man. This is largely due to the benefit of coaching which was not allowed last year owing to it being an individual match. Last year the Henshaw was captured with a score of 73, and 62's came into the prize list. To-day Pte Murdoch, of the 13th, scored 75 points, while eight 65's counted out

The ruling out of all the aggregates of the scores made in the Hamilton Powder Company and Macdougall matches has played sad havoc with some of the competitors. For instance, Capt. Spearing, of Sherbrooke, would have tied with Lieut. T Mutchell for first place in the grand aggregate had these scores been allowed. As it is, the Executive's decision dropped Capt. Spearing down several points. Last year the grand aggregate was taken by Staff-Sergt, Simpson, of the 12th. Color-Sergt. Skedden was 48th in the list then, while Lieut. Mitchell was 15th.

The weather was very pleasant for shooting. The light was good, and most of the time a steady wind blew from

left to right. Several possibles were made at 500 yards range, including Capt. Mercer, of the 20th. Mercer, however, went to pieces at the 600 yards range, only scoring 30. Chamberlain kept up his record and made an excellent 45, his total being 95.

Lieut. King, of the 45th, was in particularly hard luck, his score of 92 including one miss. Spectators who were watching this competitor say they saw the disputed shot hit the target. Lieut. King challenged the marker's decision, but it was given against him.

A test was made at 600 vards of the comparative merits of the Maxim gun and the Gatling, the result being an easy victory for the Maxim gun by 25 to 13. During the trials Sergt. Bridgeman, of the Royal Canadian Artillery, had one eye injured by the bursting of a cartridge.

THE OLOSING DAY.

The Dominion rifle matches for 1894 are concluded, and Friday night the city of tents on the banks of the Rideau was deserted. The shooting of the day was the most interesting as well as exciting of the whole week. The morning match was for the Governor-General's prize, valued at \$500 divided into three prizes of \$250, \$150 and \$100. The competitors were the first hundred in the grand aggregate, but before they got to work, seven ties for the last six places in the 100 had to be shot off. Of the seven men Lieut. Blanchard, of British Columbia, was the unlucky one, those coming into the 100 being : Staff-Sergt. Bell, Montreal Garrison Artillery, 24; Private Mason, 43rd, 21; Capt. J. T. Hart, retired list, New Brunswick, 20; Sergt. Graham, 48th, 16; Lieut. Astell, 54th, 15, and Private Neill, 71st, 15. Blanchard made 14.

In the Governor-General's match coming back to the 500 yards range there were some excellent scores. The best was that of Lieut. Davidson, of the 8th Royal Rifles of Quebec, who had 68. Private Heller, of the 29th Waterloo, and Sergt. Marris, of the 13th Battalion, had 65 each. Hayhurst, of the 13th, had 66. Naturally the chief interest at the 600 yards range centred in the doings of these men. Hayhurst was 92 and had a shot to go. It was possible for him to win the plum of the meeting, the first prize. He made an outer, which gave him a total of 94 and lost him any of the money prizes. Marris finished next. He was firing on target 17, about the centre of the butts. He had made 90 and had one shot to fire. When it was noticed he had scored a bullseye there was a loud applause. Then over on the right of the line there was some cheering. Heller, of Waterloo, had also finished with 95. A crowd now gathered round the butt on which Davidson was lying. He had commenced a little later than the other competitors and made a bad start. His first two shots were magpies; then he find the inner, next he made a bull, then an inner and then a bull. On his last shot depended the \$250. If he made an inner he would beat either Marris or Heller. Everyone was on the tiptoe of expectancy. Doubtless Davidson felt the strain. The wind, which had been blowing steadily from the right, now became gusty. Twice Davidson laid down his rifle for a rest. Once more he brought it to his shoulder and fired. It was a magpie. Thus, for the three money prizes of the meeting, three men, Heller, Marris and Davidsou, had

Tied with 95 Each.

About half an hour later, with 300 or 400 people behind them, these competitors laid down on the 600 yards butt to shoot off the ties. For their sighters Davidson and Heller found the bullseye, while Marris scored an inner. Their five shots on score were as follows :

Each shot was closely scrutinized by the spectators and scores of glasses were chief statistical officer, and his staff for levelled at the target. At the third shot their courtesy and assistance to the cor-Heller and Davidson were absolute ties prespondents, and for the prompt manner the same at the fourth shot, while Marris of in which the returns were made up. was three points behind them. At the promotion of the prize-Value last round the silence around the butts was intense and every eye was strained on the target. Heller was the first to fire. What would it be? The situation was a most trying one. Heller is quite a young man, and to his credit be it said he never fired a military rifle before this spring. The trigger was pulled and the target lowered. Then there was a perfect "Oh !" from the crowd. The marker had signalled on outer, making Heller's total 18. Every eye was now concentrated upon Marris. If he made a bullseye he could tie Heller, but this he failed to do. He scored a magpie, giving him a total of 16 and putting him below the Waterloo boy. Now for the last shot. Davidson only required a magpie to capture the first prize. His sight was good, his aim sure and his nerves steady. His last shot was a bullseye, and when it was signalled a great cheer went up. The Quebec men were greatly rejoiced thereat. They seized their man, bounced him, and then gave him three hearty cheers. Then some one called for three cheers for Heller, the plucky Waterloo shot, who had demonstrated what a young man is capable of; and last, but not least, that steady old shot, Marris, of Hamilton, was given a rouser. Apropos of Heller's success, and as an indication of what any man may be capable of if he only tries, it may be stated that another competitor, Pte. Spencer, of the 13th, took to rifle shooting for the first time this year, and has carried off many prizes at this meeting. He was not very successful this morning, otherwise he would have stood well up for the Bisley.

With the Governor-General's match concluded, the statistical department was able to make out the Bisley team for 1895, the positions being determined by the total of the scores in the grand aggregate match added to those made in the match for the Governor-General's prize.

It will be observed that the 13th Battalion, Hamilton, will have four representatives to send over; the Governor-General's Foot Guards and 43rd Battalion three each. The fighting "12th," which had such a splendid representation at Bisley this year, is down for two men for next year.

The Ontario team again captured the London Merchants' Cup with a very good score. The British Columbia boys, who have shot remarkably well throughout the whole meeting, took second money.

A noteworthy performance of the week was the great shooting of Capt. Wilson, of the 33rd Huron Battalion, in the extra series. Out of a possible 120 he put 116-25 at 500, 24 at 600, 34 at 800 and 33 at 900. Staff-Sergt. Simpson, of the 12th, ran him closely with 115-25, 24, 33 and 33.

All the returns were made up at 6 o'clock. The newspaper representatives, who have been treated with the greatest consideration, held a meeting and unani-

We clip the following from the Montreal Gazette :

At the Brigade office on Saturday, Sept. 15th, a meeting was held from which it is expected will come a good deal of good for the forces of this city in the near future. It was a gathering of all the commanding officers of the city, the only absentees being Lieut.-Col. Strathy, who was out of town. Lieut.-Col. Houghton was in the chair, and no time was lost in discussing the different subjects for which the meeting had been called. Lieut.-Col. Houghton at the opening stated to the assembled officers, Lieut.-Cols. Starke, Butler, Cole, Mc-Arthur, Aubry and Prevost, Majors Macaulay, Hon. J. S. Hall and Roy, that the meeting was called at the request of the Hon. Minister of Militia, who would be in the city on Monday (to-day) to discuss with them some of the improvements that have been asked for and which were needed. The first question that came up was the drill hall floor. At first opinion was divided between asphalt and wood

blocks, but when the points were explained all voted in favor of rectangular wooden blocks with a rider that they were opposed to any other kind of pavement. The question of telephone next came up and also an electric service of call bells with the different armories, and it was decided to ask the minister to have a 'phone placed in the Brigade office. The last question discussed was the Cote St. Luc ranges, which all agreed were not large enough and were short of the necessary number of targets, besides not having any place where the caretaker could stay and look after government property.

A motion was passed requesting the minister to see that ten new targets be placed on the present ranges, as well as a caretaker's house, but if this could not be done, then that new property should be acquired. Two or three good sites were mentioned for new ranges and a committee was appointed to look these over and report to-day. It was also decided to ask the department to refund the amounts paid out by the different regiments for transportation for the men to put in government practice at Cote St. Luc ranges and then the meeting adjourned until eight in the evening at the Military institute, when the only subject discussed was the Martini-Metford rifle, but no resolution was passed as some of those present wanted to gain more information about the weapons first. The officers will dine with the minister to-day, when the different questions will be put before him. Another matter that came up, but on which no definite action was taken, was of closing up the rear gallery in the drill hall and turning it into a large hall which could be used for meetings and as a gymnasium. All were in favor of the idea, but preferred to wait until they had seen the head of the Militia department.

GENERAL NOTE 3.

At the Drill hall on the evening of the 7th there was a very pleasant entertainment in the Sixth Fusiliers' armory, which was enjoyed by all present, and is a good start for the fall affairs. Among those who took part were : Captain Chambers, Miss Ada Reid, Miss L. Palmer, "Bill Adams," Mr. Greenwood and Mr. James Armstrong, who gave a very interesting and instructive illustrated lecture on the Afghan and Egyptian wars.

Sergeant-Instructor Arthur Hawker, of

the Duke of Connaught Royal Canadian Hussars, has started a fencing class among the members of the local forces and altogether has a dozen pupils.

Thursday evening, Sept. 6th, the officers of the Eighty-Fifth held their regular monthly meeting in the armory, and, although there was much disappointment at the regiment not being able to go to camp this summer, still hopes were expressed that it would be all right next year, and in case there is the work of recruiting will commence at once with the city companies.

Lieut.-Col. Wilson, commanding the Royal Canadian Artillery, was in the city the other day after having been out in the country inspecting the Shefford Field Battery. He will be down here again on the 12th instant, to take charge of the Artillery camp at Laprairie, which opens on the following day, when the officers and non-commissioned officers of thirteen batteries will go into camp and spend some time at gun practice, the farmers and land owners of that place having come to terms with the department.

Lieut.-Col. Butler of the Prince of Wales Rifles has, it appears, handed in a protest to the Brigade office in regard to the target returns. This is in connection with the award of the Sir Donald Smith cup. We have not seen ts terms but hope that there is no suspicion of "cooked" scores. Should unfortunately, any reports of such have come to Col. Butler's ears, we trust that the matter will be investigated to the end and the offenders brought to book.

The field battery camp is well started at Lapraire, and is under the command of Lieut.-Col. Wilson, Royal Canadian Artillery, who has as his staff Capt. Pelletier, adjutant ; Major Drury, supervisor of unnery ractice with assistants Capt. Ogilvie and Lieut. Burstalli Veterinary Surgeon Massey and Surgeon-Major Campbell. The camp is situated near the old quarters, while the gunnery practice will be done up country, planks being used for targets. The camp is composed of 66 men and 33 horses from A Battery at Kingston, but the guns to be used for the practice are those of the Montreal Field Battery, whose detachment will open the firing on Monday next. On Tuesday the Quebec and Sherbrooke Field batteries will do theirs; Wednesday the London and Welland; Thursday, the first brigade from Guelph ; and Friday the Ottawa and Durham. The following Monday the Kingston and Gananoque put in their practice, and the two following days the Hamilton and Toronto batteries. Yesterday was a miserable one in camp, but still the work of preparing for the practice next week was actively pushed, and the result will be that everything will be in first class order by Monday morning, when, on the 7 o'clock boat, the Montrealers will go over for their trial. The target practice returns of the different detachments will be awaited with interest, aa it will tend to show the efficiency at this work of the different batteries. Artillerymen hope that this camp will be a yearly one.— Gazette.

The Feather Bonnet Question.

At the quarterly meeting of D company, Royal Scots, held in non-coms. mess room, among the many items of interest to the company was the feather bonnet question. The men of this company think it a great hardship to be compelled to wear a head dress that virtually does not belong to a Highland battalion. They naturally contrast their position with that of the 48th Highlanders in Toronto, who had the feather bonnets presented to them by the inhabitants of that city before they donned the Highland costume. So many Scottish societies being in this city it is strange that some influential Scotchman does not take the matter up and boom the Scotchmen of this city on the subject. The company also propose to have a dinner early in December. Pavmaster-Sergeant James Kelley having had the honor of being the president of this fine company for the past five years, the company having heard that Sergeant Kelley got the post of honor of representing Clan Maclennan, of the Order of Scottish Clans, at the late Royal convention in New York, they determined by a unanimous vote to make him a present of a new patrol jacket. The company is in a good state financially.

The War in the Orient.

During the course of the next few months a highly important chapter will be added to the history of the two great nations of the Orient, and the developments are bound to have results that will be both far-reaching and beneficial to one if not both of the belligerents. It has already been noted that a close analogy is found to exist between the general conditions of the China-Japanese war and the Peninsular operations ninety years ago. Corea is separated from China, as is Spain from France, by a difficult natural frontier, most easily traversible at its flanks. The main route from Pekin to Seoul, like that from Paris to Madrid, passes within a short distance of the sea, and the land contest is being fought out on the territory of a decayed monarchy that is now in a state of poverty and general stagnation. The historians tell us that if disaster had befallen the British fleet Wellington's position during the early part of the Peninsular war would have been hopeless, and so it seems may Yamagata's become if communication with the Japanese warships is cut off. The poverty of Corea is so great that provisions for the army during a prolonged military operation could not be found. The naval engagement off Yalu was indecisive, and it is hardly probable that another will be attempted until the scattered Chinese squadrons have been united. Regarding the reinforcements that Li Hung Chang is sending to check the advance of the Japanese, it is difficult to learn much. A fourth of the army is said to have escaped from Ping Yang, numbering probably about 5,000. Port Arthur, which is situated at the opposite side of the entrance to the Gulf of Pechili from Ping Yang, is, however, a strategic outpost from which troops have been despatched in large numbers ever since the outbreak of the war, and it is probable that the Japanese force of 75,000 men in Corea is now about equalled by the Chinese. But in the matter of arms, drill, discipline, organization, and leadership there is not a doubt that the Japanese forces are far superior, and it does not seem probable that the Chinese will be able for some time to come to offer any effectual resistance to the occupation of the peninsula. Japan, through her achievements thus far, has won the applause of Europe and the civilized world, and has joined the sisterhood of nations. She has a united national spirit, a richly-endowed territory, 40,000,-000 of loyal people, possessing intellectual resources of the highest order, while China is disintegrated by warring tribes and lactions, and weakened by the prevalence of a spirit of opposition to the reigning dynastv.
