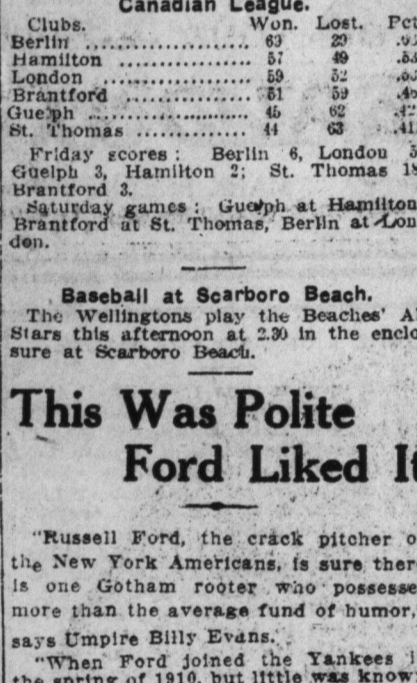
**BUFFALO WINS THE ONLY EASTERN GAME PLAYED**

SATURDAY MORNING, SEPT. 16, 1911 PREPARATORY INOCULATION BY UNCLE SAM.

In the United States it is generally taken for granted that the Dominion of Canada is on the eve of a great revolution. It is making up its mind formally to inoculate itself on the 21st with the realism of American dominance.

The immediate consequence of Canada's inoculation with the American virus would be to illustrate once again how perfectly Uncle Sam prepares the way for annexing new territory. What Uncle Sam doesn't know about helping himself to other people's land is not worth knowing.

Such an experienced manipulator of other people's territory, such an accomplished and successful land grabber, to use a vulgar but we hope inoffensive term, should have no great difficulty in doubling his domains by annexing Canada when he makes up his mind that the time has come for decisive action.

With a frequency and emphasis which give unmistakable evidence of his own secret uneasiness and apprehension, Sir Wilfrid Laurier says that if we don't like reciprocity after giving it a trial for a year or two, we can stop it.

Can we? Not if Uncle Sam wants it to go on. By that time we shall be in the toils and powerlessness. After one year of reciprocity Uncle Sam will have both feet planted hard and fast in Canada, and to attempt to dislodge him against his will would mean war.

Every Canadian who isn't a fool or a knave will vote against reciprocity," said a Chicago visitor the other day. This is a little strong, but vivid and to the point. Certainly every Canadian who is loyal to the Dominion and who to the empire will vote against it. Let us beware of being self-inoculated with the American dominance.

SELECTED COMPARISONS. If The Star had cared it could have obtained quite as great fluctuations in price within Toronto as between Toronto and Buffalo. Not only this, but the prices it represented as current in Toronto were contradicted by its own advertising pages.

PUMPKIN POLITICS. Funny how jealous The Globe is of any paper getting campaign ads. It is actually has a leading editorial article on the iniquity—"concluding as a matter of fact"—of distributing a supplement with Conservative newspapers presenting the anti-reciprocity arguments.

Globe see that what is fish for it cannot be fish for someone else? Does it imagine its readers to be as stupid as itself? Or does it indeed judge them correctly, and can it insult their intelligence with impunity?

The Globe is deeply concerned about the source of the money to pay for The Montreal Star campaign. Does The Globe issue 50,000 extra copies a day for nothing? Is the whole Grit campaign a perfectly gratuitous, and benevolent activity?

As we lead our own lives we judge our neighbors. Nobody doubts that The Globe is fouling its own nest in suggesting that leading Conservative papers are merely actuated by greed. As a matter of fact The Globe is much more the voice of a machine than any paper in Canada, and less conscientiously presents the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the whole truth, to its readers than any newspaper in the country.

But The Globe will not antics its readers from its main point, which is to smash the unholy alliance between Laurier and Taft for the betrayal of Canada.

"But since then," said the speaker, "I have learned more about the conditions in Canada and have changed my views."

Changed Base of Operations. "The government side must be getting the worst of the arguments for they have changed their base of operations. They now say they are not trying to get higher tariffs but are trying to enable the consumer to live more cheaply. Mr. Mackenzie King, who gets up an argument against the other men of his party, recently declared that the farmer was to get a better price for his produce and the consumer was to get cheaper food. How he makes those statements I do not know."

A Great Independent Vote. "We will send a man who will support the future premier," declared Mr. Ward, and the crowd cheered heartily. "A great independent vote is being cast," he said. "We have a gentleman here who has left his party because he thought they were making a false move, and a man who has left their party and who have become a great independent vote will decide the question that is before the electors."

A PAIR OF "JOLIERS." HESPELER, Sept. 15.—A rousing meeting was held in Gray's Hall this evening in the interest of Geo. A. Clark. The hall was crowded to the doors. Hon. Adam Beck, who was the chief speaker, said: "Hon. Mackenzie King was trying to jolly the working-man and Sir Wilfrid Laurier the farmer. 'Liberals have told us,' said Mr. Beck, 'that we have a 50 million market, but they forget to tell us the 50 million have a 3 million market for their surplus produce.'"

PEACE OFFICERS SCRAPPED. OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—An amusing incident occurred at the Pontiac County nominations at Bryson, Que., yesterday, when two of the special constables enlisted by the returning officer, Thos. 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### WANT FIRE MARSHAL FOR THE PROVINCE

Fire Chiefs of Ontario Meet at the Soo—Next Year's Convention Will Be in Woodstock.

**SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., Sept. 15.**—(Special.)—Provincial fire chiefs of Ontario, numbering 20, met in convention here to-day. The first topic under discussion was a paper on "Aims and Objects of the Association," read by Vice-President France of the Bath Wagon Works, Woodstock. France dealt with the work to be undertaken along the lines of a fire marshal and chief of fire protection purposes. The report was adopted.

Municipal inspection and by-laws governing same were dealt with by Chief Bain of Owen Sound. The paper had reference to the inspection of fire chiefs for the protection purposes. The report was adopted.

Chief Finch of Guelph read an interesting paper on "The Feasibility of Having a Fire Marshal for the Province of Ontario, His Duties and Qualifications." A strong committee was appointed to urge upon the provincial government the necessity of creating such an office. The question of pensions was referred to the committee mentioned above to report at the next meeting of the association. The feeling in regard to the appointment of a provincial fire marshal and the pension fund met the unanimous approval of the members of the association.

### STOLYPIN WILL RECOVER

Russian Premier's Condition Declared to Be Satisfactory.

**KIEV, Russia, Sept. 15.**—Premier Stolypin, who was shot down in the municipal theatre here last night in the presence of Emperor Nicholas, the heir apparent and the grand duchesses, is all probably will survive his wounds. Late to-night the surgeons, after a consultation, announced that the premier's condition was satisfactory. They declared that no complications were feared and that there were good hopes for the recovery of the wounded man.

The local police authorities believe that Bogrof, the would-be assassin, is a political malcontent and that the reason for the crime was his hatred of M. Stolypin, due to the premier's reactionary policy. They fear that the attempt to kill M. Stolypin is the first of a series of outrages, which have been planned for the autumn and winter.

At his first examination by the authorities, to-day, Bogrof was silent and refused to give any information concerning the shooting.

Emperor Nicholas visited M. Stolypin at the hospital at 7:30 o'clock this morning and later in the day reviewed 20,000 troops on the manoeuvre field at Kopylow.

### ROME AS A SEAPORT.

The present situation with regard to the long planned canal between the Tiber and the sea is shown in the following abstract from the report of the British Consul in Rome. The municipal administration has been considering the scheme of a canal from Rome to the Tiber estuary. In 1907 the legislature sanctioned a project of a canal 40 miles long, which would connect the Tiber with the sea. The project of the Council was prepared by Signor Caminada, who proposes the building of a harbor near a small village called Pallidoro, about 21 miles from Rome. The cost of the canal is \$12,500,000, half of which expenditure would be recoverable from the state, and the other half by the province.

### Salubrious Climate of Texas.

A new record in surgery was established by the surgeons at Fort Sam Houston, Tex., during the six months the army was mobilized there. Of 131 operations performed, 183 were successful, there having been three deaths as a result of transportation to the army hospitals from other points. The cause contributing to the great success of the surgical work are said by Chief Surgeon-Major Hinton to have been the excellent condition of the men, the efficient sanitation maintained at the camp, and the salubrity of San Antonio's climate. The health report of the city for the month of August substantiates the fact that the climate here is a powerful factor in keeping the death rate to the lowest possible fraction—the rate being only 7.7 per thousand.

The sick rate in the camp ranged from nineteen to twenty-three per 1000, as against forty-two per 1000 in barracks elsewhere. The higher rate, twenty-three, was the result of the bringing 300 recruits from northern points, all of whom were seized with mumps.

### LIGHTNING DOES DAMAGE IN VICINITY OF CHATHAM

Barns and Residences Struck and Power Wires Put Out of Business.

CHATHAM, Ont., Sept. 15.—(Special)—A terrific thunder and lightning storm passed over this city at midnight. It lasted for a full two hours and the rainfall was the greatest it has been this year.

Lightning burned out the Bell Telephone Company's cable on Park-avenue and cut off all long distance communication east and west, as well as burning out fuses and private phones. The Chatham Gas & Electric Company's wires, leading to North Chatham, were burned in two and citizens on that side of the river had no lights. A bolt hit a barn on the premises of R. J. Dunlop, Richmond-street, and tore a portion of the roof off, driving the planks into the hay, but did not set the building on fire. A new dwelling being erected by Albert Tomlinson on Eberne-avenue was also struck. There it tore a chimney to pieces and splintered a chicken coop beneath into splinters.

Reports from various parts of the county are to the effect that heavy frosts have done much damage to the tobacco crop, which is a very heavy one. On many West Kent farms growers of tobacco will realize \$400 to \$500 an acre for the week. One young city man who rented four acres of land just outside the limit has cleared over \$800 on his tobacco, after paying all expenses for hired help, etc. This is a quick return for three months of his city.

### WHY ELECTRIC WIRES ARE COVERED.

If you ask the ordinary individual why the electric light wires are always covered he will mutter something about "insulation" and hurry away on a very important errand. To insulate is to separate, to isolate an object so it can have no communication with any other part or body. Therefore, a wire is said to be insulated when it is covered or wrapped with material to prevent the leakage of the electric current. Electricity is always in a hurry, it is always seeking a short cut to complete its cycle. It would not travel miles and miles through small wires, stopping here to light a house, there to illuminate a street or a factory, again to turn the wheels of a loaded car, or to drive countless machines, if it could help it. It would be only too pleased to jump off the wire if it could and avoid this enormous work by hurrying back thru the earth, which is a good conductor.

Electricity lights our homes, drives our cars, turns out wheels, cooks our food, and does a thousand other tasks. This is work of the hardest kind and the electricians in charge have to be continually on the watch to see that the rascal does this work as he passes along and does not sneak out and take a short cut home.

Dry air is the best insulating material, next ranks glass, mica, porcelain, rubber, lava, oils and fats, and cloth in their order. The wires used about ordinary buildings are insulated with rubber, oils and dry cloth, this combination being lasting, flexible and very durable. Some of the smaller wires, designed to carry weak charges of electricity, such as those for electric door bells, burglar alarms, etc., are merely insulated with a covering of closely woven linen or silk thread.

For the larger sizes, usually a number of small wires twisted into a cable, ranging all the way from the size of a lead pencil to as big as a man's upper arm, more protection is necessary. In most cases the wire or cable is first passed thru a peculiar machine which winds a strip of paraffin or waxed paper its entire length. From this machine it passes to another, which covers it with sheets of rubber composition. This would effectually insulate it, but this insulation has to be protected from wear and tear. First it needs a strong covering of closely woven linen cord. This is put on by a special loom which weaves a tight fitting cover over the wire. If it is a small cable or merely a heavy wire it is then smeared into some insulating solution and dried, being then ready for use. The larger wires are "armored" either with a lead sheath or a cover of sheet steel cut into strips and woven over the entire length of the wire by a large knitting machine, which covers the wire with this protective covering at a surprising rate. The lead armor is spun on while in a

molten condition, much the same way as a spider spins her web.

A horizontal section of a large electric cable, such as is used to transmit heavy currents of electricity, would show an inner core of twisted copper wires which carries the current. Around this appear alternate layers of insulation, usually consisting of waxed paper, rubber composition, linen threads impregnated with oils and a final covering of lead. This is the most effective insulation known to the industry. Not only is the cable flexible and easily handled, but the electric current is absolutely prevented from jumping off the wires. The lead armor prevents the insulating material from abrasion and injury and keeps out the moisture.

Glass, porcelain, lava, mica, etc., not being flexible to any great extent, are used only where the work is adapted to these peculiarities. Glass and

porcelain can be readily molded into any form or shape, and therefore most of the common insulators designed to keep bare wires away from conductive bodies, are made of these materials. It is good practice to suspend the electric wires on poles or towers where they are effectively and perfectly insulated by the surrounding dry air except for the contact points where the wires are suspended. At these points glass and porcelain insulators are used with the best of results.

With all this work to insulate a small wire it is wonderful that it can be sold so cheaply. The low cost of insulating wire is entirely due to the fact that most all of the insulating work is now done by high-speed machinery. The bare wire is fed into a machine from a large reel and it emerges from the other side covered with the insulating material, ready for shipment, and

the workmanship is far better than the most skillful hands could do it.

Bail Jumper in Court. J. W. Taylor, charged with theft of \$100, who jumped \$3000 bail, only to be re-arrested after a trip to Boston, was remanded a week in police court yesterday morning.

### FALSIFIED THE BOOKS.

MONTREAL, Sept. 15.—Adelard Duval was sentenced to three years in the St. Vincent De Paul Penitentiary by Magistrate Lanctot to-day. The accused had pleaded guilty to stealing \$200 from the Laing Packing and Provision Company, but the evidence showed that the accused had stolen the sum of \$1800 in eighteen months, and after his arrest, he returned to the officials of the company the sum of \$1300, but refused to make any statement regarding the balance. The accused had been the manager of a store and by falsifying the books from day to day, he managed to steal the money.

# VOTE IN CITY SHOULD INCREASE BY 10,000

### About 45,000 Electors Expected to Declare Themselves—Comparison With 1908.

A careful canvass of the "election possibilities in Toronto places the total number of votes that will be cast in the five local ridings at about ten thousand over the total of the last federal election in 1908. This is, roughly, a 20 per cent increase in three years.

While it is not difficult to make a wholesale guess at a total for the city, arriving at the number of votes for each riding is a much more complicated task. Some sections are known to be decidedly apathetic regarding federal elections, other parts of the city have a changeable population, and the character of some sections has entirely changed in three years. It is well nigh impossible to go on and give a reasonable estimate of the total number of votes.

Here is the World's estimate of the total returns for each riding. The figures are by no means guaranteed, but they are believed to be within seven hundred or so of the registration totals, and so feels entitled to another chance.

#### Deaths by Drowning

This is the season of the year when deaths by drowning are most frequent. Every Monday morning's paper and every holiday tells of a toll of young lives paid for foolishness or accidents that might in September these casualties will continue.

As the result of our ready acquiescence in many places too ready acquiescence in the belief that a person who has been under water for five or ten minutes, or even fifteen or twenty minutes, is necessarily dead. There are well-authenticated records of the resuscitation of persons who had been submerged for half an hour or even longer.

**STILL TRADE DEPRESSED.**

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—Still business shows a shrinkage of about 15 per cent since the first of the month.

### Wall Street in Calmer Mood And Nervous Tension Relaxes

New York Market Shows Improvement in Cessation of Pressure from Abroad—Domestic Stocks Have No Vivacity.

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—Fluctuations in stocks were narrower to-day than during the erratic movements of recent days. Wall-street grew calmer. The nervous tension of yesterday was relaxed and there was a definite improvement in sentiment. The change arose largely from the cessation of pressure from abroad. Europe bought back some of the securities it recently has thrown on this market. London's balance of purchases probably reached 25,000 shares. Advice from European capitals were more cheerful and there was no trace of a renewal of liquidation.

After an irregular opening the market became heavy. Declines amounted to a point or more for Union Pacific, Canadian Pacific, Northern Pacific, Reading and a few other standard shares, but the majority of stocks lost only fractions. There followed a recovery which placed most of the list above yesterday's close. Gains were as small as the earlier losses and during the remainder of the day the market moved within narrow limits.

Trading fell far below the previous day and net changes were slight. A sharp attack at the market late in the day showed also that the bear party is still to be reckoned with. Speculative sentiment is far from bullish.

New Haven recovered 4 1/2 points of its decline to-day. Western Union developed strength following the favorable quarterly report of the company. National Biscuit was exceptionally weak, breaking five points, and Minneapolis and St. Louis, which recently advanced on the announcement that it was to lease the Iowa Central and form part of a new route from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico, relapsed eight points.
