GERMANS ROUTED

Troops Retreat Like Disorderly Mob and 100,000 Are Liable to Be Cut Off By French and British, Who Are Converging on Roye--British Advance Eight Miles at Chaumes and French Achieve 14-Mile Gain East of Montdidier--Fifty Thousand Prisoners.

36,000 PRISONERS ARE TAKEN AS ALLIED ADVANCE GOES ON

More Than 1000 Officers and 500 Guns Fall Into French Hands as Villages and Towns Are Captured and Left Behind--Enemy Throws in Reserves Regardless of Cost.

PARIS, Aug. 11.—The number of prisoners taken so far in the allied offensive in Picardy is now estimated at 36,000, including more than 1000 officers. More than 500 guns have been captured, according to the latest advice.

BRITISH ADVANCE UPON ROYE TO SURROUND GERMAN ARMY

British Cavalry Penetrate Six Miles South of Chaumes to Town of Nesle, Cutting Off Retreating Forces of Von Hutier--Germans Scurry Across Somme River Towards Old Hindenburg Line--Thirty-One German Divisions Met and Defeated in Allied Attack.

WITH the British Army in France, Aug. 11.—The allied forces continued their victorious advance all along the line last night and today, pushing in the general direction of the upper reaches of the Somme.

CANADIANS TAKE CHAULNES; ALL COUNTER-ATTACKS FAIL

Montdidier Falls to French First Army, While British Troops Overcome Enemy's Resistance at Lihons and Make Substantial Progress.

London, Aug. 11.—Strong German attacks, delivered with fresh reserves, against the British at Lihons, and north and south of that village, were repulsed today, and in the fighting the Germans suffered great losses, according to the British official communication received from Field Marshal Haig this evening.

The pivot of the German resistance at this stage of the battle, it now appears, is the town of Noyon, about midway between Montdidier and Soissons. The enemy is throwing in reserves from this base in an effort to prevent, regardless of cost, the allies from gaining control of the Noyon-Ham road, which is choked with material, guns and troops.

On the French Front in France, Aug. 11.—When the French troops entered Montdidier at 12.30 o'clock Saturday afternoon the Germans had not yet completely evacuated the town, clinging to the outskirts of the place with the help of machine guns, some of which were being served by the officers of the detachments, all the men having been killed or wounded.

German Retreat at Montdidier Assumes Rapidity of a Rout

Great Victory Has Been Won Allied Victory Daily Assumes Larger Proportions and General Withdrawal by the Enemy is Looked For.

Paris, Aug. 11.—The allied victory is daily assuming larger proportions and the military experts are discussing the possibility of a general withdrawal by the Germans, some of them even declaring that the retrograde movement already is becoming a general one.

London, Aug. 11.—An official communication issued by the air ministry this evening announces that an air raid has been made on Karlsruhe, and that there was an explosion in the Karlsruhe station.

MAY PULVERIZE GERMANS IN MONTDIDIER POCKET

Three British Armies Have Concentrated on Von Hutier's Men, While French Are Menacing the Rear, Where Retreat Is Disorderly.

Paris, Aug. 11.—With his right flank menaced, and with a third French army under General Humbert menacing his rear to a point where his retreat is disorderly, General Von Hutier's army, it would appear, will have to fall back beyond the Roye-Lessigny line to escape a veritable pulverization from the concentration of the three armies under Generals Rawlinson, Debeney, and Humbert.

PARIS CELEBRATES BRITISH REVENGE

French Press Gives Large Share of Victory to Higher Command.

Paris, Aug. 11.—In speaking of the present advances the French press gives a large share of praise to the British high command. Premier Clemenceau's newspaper, L'Homme Libre, after alluding to the splendid plans for the operations, says: "Ludendorff's operations were inspired by the tactics of General Byng in the Battle of Cambrai. These were improved upon by the French general in our two counter-offensives of Montdidier and Soissons and were brought to their final period by Field Marshal Haig."

The Victor has this to say: "Once again, British tenacity has shown how to profit by the lessons of adversity, to draw from them an incentive to victory and choose a good opportunity."

The Journal points out how excellent, both as regards time and place, was the plan of the attack and concludes its article by repeating its title, "Bye-bye the British."

In the Echo De Paris Maurice Barres writes as follows: "This attack, in the details of which were so minutely prepared, is greatly to the credit of Field Marshal Haig. We know the traditional dogma of the soldiers of Great Britain, who stand up to the hardest knocks and only bide their time in order that they may strike with all their force. WAR SUMMARY THE DAY'S EVENTS REVIEWED

Unofficial reports filed at British headquarters in France early yesterday afternoon showed that the British and French were close to Roye and had excellent prospects of surrounding a large part of Von Hutier's army, perhaps 150,000 men. The British cavalry had pushed on from Chaumaines for a distance of six miles and were only two miles from Roye. In the big restaurants last night the guests were celebrating what they characterized as 'Haig's Revenge!'"

Roye, on which the allies are converging from the north and south, is an important road center and the retreating German columns have to pass thru that town and the narrow gap to the south bounded by Noyon. Roye is miles in the former German rear in front of Amiens. The allies managed early in the battle to enfilade the roads and to work tremendous execution among the masses.

In the heavy fighting the British and French have extended the front of their attack from the original 20 miles to pretty close upon 40, and have pressed in the Germans on two sides of a triangle for a distance of 10 to 15 or 16 miles. The chief fighting yesterday proceeded on the Allied right wing, with the army of General Humbert engaged. On the right and right centre the French mingled with British units, stormed Montdidier early on Saturday, and they also attacked the Germans from the south on the 13-mile front between Roye and Montdidier. This attack brought them gains of 10 or 12 miles and they are still marching on. They have taken many villages and last night they had reached the line north of Machemont and Cambrome, near Roye. In their centre the French and British made an important advance on the whole front between the Avre and the Oise, making 14 miles in three days, and reaching the line of Arracourt and Thilly. On the Avre front the allies have taken 8,000 prisoners and 200 guns.

On their left the Canadians and Australians captured Chantilly and reached the region of Lihons. They defeated German counter-attacks yesterday. North of the Somme, English troops advanced between Etinehem and Dernancourt

VALLIANT U. S. SOLDIER WINS VICTORIA CROSS

LABOR'S PLATFORM NOW ANNOUNCED

William Varley Issues Strong Planks on Behalf of His Party.

WHITE MAN'S CANADA Stable Nation Can Be Built Upon Its Citizens' Happiness.

William Varley, soldier-labor candidate for Northeast Toronto, stated last night that the labor party believed that this state could be best attained only by recognizing the fact that life and happiness is the highest aim of every citizen.

1. Gradual demobilization. Only those soldiers unable to engage in their usual or selected occupation to be discharged from the army.

2. The development of a proper system of labor exchange as a means of labor mobilization at the end of the war.

3. The adoption of the electoral system of proportional representation.

4. The establishment of trade boards, similar to those in Great Britain, to regulate unorganized male and female industries.

5. The establishment of industrial councils on a basis of parity between the employer and employees, these include one provincial council for each organized trade and one district council for each unorganized trade.

6. The establishment of rural credit banks to assist agriculture and co-operative selling associations. Also a provincial centre for the marketing of fertilizer, natural or artificial.

7. The establishment of a commission to effect the industrialization of the present manufacture of war products could be used for after war purposes.

8. The conservation of natural resources: by (a) the refusal to grant further concessions to foreign interests, and (b) to develop the resources of the country under provincial control and ownership.

TRADE AFTER THE WAR Will Canada Get Her Share?
