
Fleet Was at Hong Kong When That Battle Was Fought.





Customs Collections at Fallis.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Jan. 5.—The customs collections for the Port of Niagara Falls for the last six months of 1905 total about \$24,000, a decrease of \$16,000, as compared with the corresponding six months of 1904.

The decrease is accounted for by the falling off in imports of material for the power development works, which were very heavy in 1904.

EMBARGO AND ELECTIONS.

When One is Over, 'T'other Will Be Considered.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.)
