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KILLED AT PETERBORO.

Mr. Clemens, aged 76, Run Down by a Train. Track Express—No Inquest is Necessary.

Peterboro, May 9.—An unfortunate accident attended with fatal results occurred here to-day in the P.E.R. noon express was entering the western outskirts of the town, by which Mr. Clemens lost his life. The old gentleman, who was here visiting his son and who was 76 years of age, went for a morning walk and when returning home took the G.P.R. track to reach his home. At the place where the accident occurred there is a sharp curve in the track which prevented the engineer seeing the old gentleman until it was too late. The engine struck him and hurled him from the track. The train was immediately stopped and the unfortunate man taken to the Nichols Hospital. He died a very short while after arriving there. The engineer immediately reversed his engine, applying the air brakes and blowing the whistle, but the victim evidently did not hear it. The coroner did not deem it necessary to hold an inquest as there was no blame to be attached to the train hands.

COL. FREDERICK HAIN KILLED.

The President of the Manhattan Elevated Railway Was Killed. Rochester, N.Y., May 9.—A sad accident occurred this afternoon at about 3 o'clock at the Manhattan Elevated Railway. Col. Frederick K. Hain of New York, who has been at the sanitarium for medical treatment for the past two months, was run over and instantly killed by a freight train on the N.Y.C. railway. Col. Hain has been suffering for many months from nervous prostration caused by overwork. He was president and general manager of the Manhattan Elevated Railway. For 11 years he had held this responsible position and had entire charge of the road. He was 59 years of age and leaves a wife.

RUSSIA HAS NERVE.

She Threatens to Seize a Strich of the Peninsula of China. London, May 8.—The People's publication a despatch from Shanghai stating that the Russian consul threatened to forcibly seize a stretch of the peninsula at Chefoo, to which Great Britain has a long standing claim. The British Minister has protested against the threatened seizure and it is understood that China also objects. Four warships are off Chefoo landing, apparently to support the consul.

Railways Will Charge Bicycles as Baggage. An agreement has been entered into between the different Canadian roads, to go into effect on the 15th inst, and it is announced that each bicycle or tricycle will be charged for the space for fifty pounds of excess baggage. They may be checked through and collected at the same as baggage, except where a transfer by wagon is permitted. Bicycles must be packed in a special case, and except to points on or over the lines whose rules permit their baggage checked to local points only. They will be checked only for passengers accompanying them and pressing their passenger tickets. The charge will be separate from and have no connection with the charge for any excess baggage. It is understood that the lowest charge will be 25 cents, and the railway companies do not assume any responsibility for damage. The railways in the agreement are the Canadian Pacific, Canada Atlantic, Erie & Huron, Grand Trunk system, Kingston & Pembroke, Michigan Central, Quebec Central and Toronto, Hamilton & Buffalo. This leaves the Intercolonial Railway out.
