Regarding a Lake of the Woods gold mining property, in which a number of Toronto people are interested. The Rat Portage Miner of the 24th Inst., has this to say: The Cameron Islad gold mine is showing up in great shape. Recently 17 assays of ore taken from 50 to 145 pound lots were made that gave an average value of \$14.11 free-milling gold to the ton. Considering the fact that this ore is from a 20-foot vein, the showing is very remarkable. In addition to this big vein there are eight others, and all of them can be worked from one shaft, an immense ore body that will keep a 40-stamp mill busy for years. The shaft is now 116 feet deep. Drifts 22 and 27 feet deep have been run on the 60-foot level. When the present shaft is down to the 120-foot level there will then be blocked out 22,158 tons of \$14 ore at lowest calculation, which will supply 100 tons of ore for 221 days, equal to the capacity of a 40-stamp mill. While that ore is being milled new ground could be opened, and thus the mill would be kept busy day and night for years to come. The ore can be milled and mined for \$1.50 per ton, so it will be seen that the Cameron Island people have evidence of a fortune in their grasp. A compressor plant for 10 or 15 drills is now being talked of for the mine. The satisfactory development work causes Mr. J. J. Foster of Toronto and Superintendent William Caldwell to be particularly happy—and they have a right to rejoice over the bright prospects of the mine.

IN CONDITION TO SHIP.

Victory-Triumph Will Soon Join the List of Ore Producers.

On the Victory-Triumph operations have begun to open up the Triumph last vein. This vein, of which the croppings have always returned very high gold values, has now been stripped for over 200 feet, and some very fine ore is being taken out.
