### MR. HARDY TAKES IMMEDIATE ACTION AND BOLE ESCAPES.

On Sept. 13 last Mr. Hardy's attention was called through the columns of The World to a petition that had been forwarded to him, per registered letter, on Aug. 12. In the Globe of Sept. 15 Mr. Hardy stated that he had no knowledge of the petition and that he saw it in The World. Having seen the petition, he promised that the subject matter of it would receive his immediate attention. The petitioners requested Mr. Hardy to put the law in motion against Duncan Bole, the scoundrel who stole the ballots of 40 respectable residents of West Elgin. On Friday, Sept. 23, The Globe's leading article attempted to refute the popular impression that Mr. Hardy had done nothing to punish the West Elgin election ruffians. Among other things, it stated that the County Attorney was prosecuting Bole, and that the Government had dispensed with Bole's services as a fishery inspector. It was evident from The Globe's article that the Premier had taken action in pursuance of the petition of the 80 West Elgin electors whose votes had been stolen. These electors called on the Attorney-General to prosecute the criminal who had stolen their votes. The Globe, speaking for the Attorney-General, stated that he had taken action. As to what particular action the Attorney-General had determined on in regard to Bole's prosecution we were not informed, but recent developments have disclosed the Attorney-General's line of action. He ordered a West Elgin constable to be sent to Saint Ste. Marie to arrest Bole under a warrant that had been issued early in June. On Tuesday, Sept. 19, The World published a despatch from Saint Ste. Marie, announcing that Bole had been arrested, but that he had escaped from the custody of the St. Thomas constable. We could not credit the statement of his escape, and delayed comment on the affair until such time as a despatch should be verified. The St. Thomas papers are just to hand, and they confirm in every particular The World's despatch of the 19th. In order to show how Mr. Hardy's servants execute the law, we publish in full The Saint Ste. Marie account of Bole's arrest and his escape:

"An unusual amount of excitement was caused in town by the arrival here on Sunday last of Constable Graham of St. Thomas, who registered at the Windsor Hotel, and proceeded to the barber shop annex, where he declared his intention of arresting Mr. Duncan Bole in connection with irregularities in the West Elgin bye-election. The constable waited on the proper authorities, and having his license appended thereto, he proceeded to the hotel, where he was met by a man who offered him a large sum of money to accompany him to St. Thomas, and to assist him in getting away. He refused the offer, and would like a little time to get his things in shape, and incidentally his potato crop harvested. He assured the constable that he would meet him at the C.P.R. station a little before noon on Sunday, when the train leaves for the east. Constable Graham, having every confidence in the promises made by the man, accompanied him to the station, and on the way he showed him the many signs, historical or otherwise, in the neighborhood. They visited the club, the ship canal, the market place and paper mill, and it is said that Constable Graham was greatly interested in all he saw and heard. Sunday morning appeared in due course, and the constable waited his way to the C.P.R. station, but to his surprise the man did not appear. He then sent a letter to the effect that he had changed his mind, and now thought it better, under the circumstances, to go to St. Thomas by the United States route. Constable Graham was in a hurry to get away, and did not leave town until Tuesday, but Mr. Bole did not accompany him. The hero of West Elgin is staying at the Hotel Iroquois, in the American Sanit. A number of local politicians and officials visit him at intervals. Mr. Hardy gave the people of Ontario to understand that he was doing his best to prosecute Bole. Events that have transpired since that announcement prove that Mr. Hardy's intention was not to have Bole prosecuted, but to give him an opportunity of slipping out of the country and of making a prosecution impossible.
