An Alternative Proposal. The Imperial Government then quotes the despatch from South Africa on Aug. 19, con-taining an alternative proposal, identical with that which the Imperial Government is said to have substituted, and the com-munication then proceeds as follows: "The Imperial Government sees no ground for misapprehension on the part of the South African Republic as to its answer re-garding non-interference and suzerainty, as the Imperial Government had already stated it would not press for the appointment of a joint commission of enquiry, in view of the fact that such an enquiry would, in the opinion of the Government officials of South Africa, prejudice the right of full independence repeatedly recognized by the Imperial Government.
