## GRAIN MOVING TO THE EAST

First Two Days Saw 210,000 Bushels  
Handled By the Railroad  
Company.

HON. R. R. ROGERS IN TORONTO.

Tells The World That The Crop Will  
Pan Out as Well as  
Predicted.

Montreal, Sept. 5.—Advice received by Mr. G. M. Bowditch, freight traffic manager of the Canadian Pacific Railway, show that the movement of this year's wheat crop has already commenced. On the 2nd there were marketed 92,000 bushels, and on the 3rd 120,000 bushels, which is over twice as much as the quantity marketed during the month of September last year. The actual cars on the 2nd were 48, and on the 3rd 77.

This early movement is hailed with great satisfaction by the officials of the company, who have anticipated the fact by sending every available car and locomotive to the western sections of the road.

Hon. Robert R. Rogers, Commissioner of Public Works in Premier Roblin's Cabinet, was in Toronto yesterday and yesterday afternoon he was seen by the press at the Queen's Hotel and Mrs. Rogers are on their way home from Buffalo, where they visited the Pan-American Exposition.

Mr. Rogers stated to The World that the marketing of the great wheat crop of Manitoba was well under way, and the results of the harvesting were bearing out the prophecies and hopes of the people of the province. "The crop will be all that we expected," said the Minister, "and in no way have the reports sent out overestimated the harvest."

100,000,000 BUSHEL.  
New York, Sept. 5.—The Herald prints the following: Sir William C. Van Horne, chairman of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Pacific Railway, estimated yesterday that the grain crop in the Canadian Northwest would reach a total of 100,000,000 bushels.

## METHODIST MINISTERS AND WAR CANADIAN RULED OUT OF ORDER

in of Ingersoll Defends Action of British in  
Ica—Rev. Dr. Potts Protests That Hell  
is Not Let Loose in Africa.

London, Sept. 5.—The Ecumenical Methodist conference today unanimously decided to hear the secretary read the message of the Archbishop of Canterbury, in which he expressed a hope that some day the Methodists would be united with the Episcopalians and on similar import the message of the Bishop of London, on the ground that they had been addressed to the editor of a religious newspaper and not to the conference.

The Rev. I. Bowman Stephenson of England, in moving that the message should be received, said that the conference would not have had cause to complain had the protest been approached in a proper manner.

Most of the time of today's conference was taken up by reports on the progress of Methodism in the United States, Canada, Mexico and South America.

The proceedings were evoked by an ardent pro-English speech, delivered by the Rev. Joseph Gibson of Ingersoll, Canada, who defended the action of the British in South Africa.

Frequent interruptions arose from the English delegates, one of whom finally declared that if Mr. Gibson proceeded he would have to be answered in a controversial strain, as he was voicing sentiments by no means shared by many present.

## PRESIDENT VISITS THE PAN-AMERICAN EXHIBITION

Reviewed the Troops and Inspected the Canadian Exhibit.

Buffalo, N.Y., Sept. 5.—At 10 o'clock President McKinley and Mr. Milburn, with members of the party in carriages, all escorted by a troop of mounted police and a platoon of the Twenty-Fourth Signal Corps, proceeded to the Lincoln Parkway gate.

The 60th and 74th Regiments of the National Guard, the United States Marine Corps, the 14th U.S. Infantry and the Corporal Cadets were drawn up in line ready to receive the President. As the President's carriage entered the grounds a salute of 21 guns was fired.

What was probably the greatest crowd that ever assembled on the Esplanade at the Pan-American Exposition greeted the President with ringing cheers as he entered the stand erected there. The Esplanade was crowded to suffocation, and the vast assembly overflowed to the Court of Fountains. President McKinley, in trousers the President, who addressed the vast assembly.

After addressing the President was escorted to the Stadium, where he reviewed the columns of troops. After the review he backed into a deep ditch, upsetting the buggy. Total..... 100,183

## BOY FATALLY WOUNDS COMRADE WITH WEAPON LOADED WITH SHOT

Two Twelve-Year-Olds Return From School at Norwood and Engage in Foolish Play—Runaway Accidents Terminate in Death—Other Violent Exits of a Day.

Norwood, Sept. 5.—A boy was shot in the abdomen by his little comrade this afternoon. The accident happened in the Township of Annapolis about two miles from the village of Norwood. Two boys, Thomas Chastan, who was shot, and John Kelley, son of Daniel Kelley, both about 12 years of age, went home from school together. When they got to the Chatten residence they found their parents from school home, and while playing in the house took down the gun to examine it. Not thinking the gun was loaded young Kelley pointed it and snuffed it off several times at the boy Chastan. He then got a gun cap put it on the nipple and began pointed and fired. To his horror the boy was loaded with shot. The whole charge settled on his comrade, piercing the stomach and bowels. The boy is still alive, but the physician says there is no hope of his recovery.

## TREMENDOUS CROP

Windsor, Ont., Sept. 5.—The owners of peach orchards in Essex County are at a loss to know what to do with their fruit. They have thousands of bushels on their hands, and the best market price is \$1 a bushel. A year ago they received \$4 and \$5 a bushel for early Crawford's, the kind that is now so plentiful. Much surprise is expressed at the enormous crop, as the frost last winter so killed the buds that most fruit men thought there would be only a few bushels to an orchard.

CAUGHT IN ELEVATOR HOIST

Two Employes of Electric Light Co. Seriously Injured Yesterday Afternoon.

PINNED BETWEEN HOIST AND FLOOR

Power was Shut Off and Both Men Fell With the Elevator to the Bottom. Arthur Perry of 202 Albany-avenue and John Crocker of 122 Dupont-street were seriously injured while at work yesterday afternoon in the Toronto Electric Light Co.'s works. Perry started the elevator on the ground floor and, in attempting to get it while in motion, fell across the hoist. Before he had time to regain his feet he was pinned between the hoist and the floor. His cries attracted the attention of several other employes, who ran to his assistance in the meantime the cable on the elevator continued unwinding. Crocker jumped onto the elevator, and at the same time some person on the ground floor had turned the power off, causing the hoist to drop suddenly to the door below.

Men Fell With Hoist

Crocker and Perry went down with the hoist, and both were thrown several feet by the sudden drop. Dr. Edmund E. King was summoned, and after temporarily dressing their injuries, sent Perry to St. Michael's Hospital and Crocker to his home. Both of Perry's ankles were badly crushed and he was otherwise badly injured. Crocker sustained a severe shaking up and an injury to his spine.
