ALLIES DRIVE OFF GERMAN REINFORCEMENTS IN BALKANS
Hon. A. E. Kemp is Sworn in as Canadian Minister of Militia

ALLIES OFFSET FOE'S GAINS IN TRANSYLVANIA
Germans Lose Ground Elsewhere, While Fighting Roumania.

FIRST ATTEMPT FAILS
Rapid Approach of Midwinter Favors Allies—Outcome Not Foreseeable.

London, Nov. 23.—"It is for Hindenburg to decide whether the gains of the German army in Roumania pay for the losses sustained on the other fronts by the withdrawal of divisions to operate there," said Major-General P. B. Maurice, chief director of military operations of the war office, in discussing today with an Associated Press correspondent the latest military developments.

Villa Retires in Defeat After Attacking Chihuahua
El Paso, Tex., Nov. 23.—Francisco Villa withdrew his surviving forces in defeat from Chihuahua City at 8:30 o'clock tonight after a battle of seven hours, during which he made fruitless attempts to carry Gen. Trevino's protecting forces by assault, according to reports from Mexico.

WAR SUMMARY
THE DAY'S EVENTS REVIEWED

WHILE the Germans have thrust their right wing a considerable distance into Roumania in an attempt to reach Bucharest, the situation has not yet become desperate for the allies, for it seems that Von Falkenhayn has dangerously stretched his front and the allies have a chance of taking advantage of this fact the same as they did when Von Kluck raced towards Paris.

On the Cerna, near Orsova, the Roumanian forces are being fiercely attacked by the foe. This announcement by Bucharest shows that they have not yet retired from their exposed positions owing to their loss of Craiova, but that they are still maintaining their ground. The expectation that the Russians will give the Roumanians timely aid apparently does not relieve them from the necessity of preparing to evacuate Orsova and points along the Danube rendered unsafe by the occupation of Craiova by Von Hindenburg.

LIGHTING IS RESTORED AT PORT OF ST. JOHN'S
Regulations Put in Force Month Ago Have Been Suspended.
St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 23.—The regulations by which lights were ordered extinguished or dimmed and the port of St. John's closed a month ago, "as precautionary measures taken against the incursions of hostile ships of war," have been suspended by Gov. Davidson. The notice of this suspension, published under the name of Arthur Mewa, deputy colonial secretary, gives no indication of the developments responsible for the return of normal conditions. During the period of restriction lighthouses were out of commission, shops were closed early or conducted behind shuttered windows, automobiles showed only faint side-lights and streets were kept dark.

FOE IN ROUMANIA TRIES OLD GAME
Von Falkenhayn Moves on Bucharest Like Von Kluck on Paris.
Paris, Nov. 23.—Henri Bidou, military critic of the Journal des Debats, compares the German Gen. von Falkenhayn's attack with his right wing, which resulted in the taking of Craiova, to Von Kluck's enveloping movement on Paris before the battle of the Marne. He points out that Von Falkenhayn's strategy was to fix the attention of the Roumanians on his central attack in the region of Kimpolung, while his right wing was rapidly and unobtrusively sweeping on towards Bucharest. At the same time, Field Marshal von Armin, in Moldevia, and Von Mackensen, in Dobruja, were fighting battles of determination, which, however, were to be, if possible, followed up.

GERMANY PROTESTS.
Berlin, via London, Nov. 23.—An official communication issued today, dealing with the expulsion of the ministers of the central powers from Greece, says Germany has protested most sharply to Greece and all the other neutral states, and also to France and Great Britain, against this mockery of international law, of the free right of neutral states to decide questions for themselves, and of the most elementary principle of international morality.

RUSSIAN DREADNOUGHT IS SUNK BY EXPLOSION
Two Hundred of Crew of Imperatritsa Maria Missing, Says Official Statement Issued at Petrograd.
London, Friday, Nov. 24.—Russia officially announces the loss of the dreadnought Imperatritsa Maria. A statement issued at Petrograd, reads: "The Russian dreadnought Imperatritsa Maria has been sunk by an internal explosion. Two hundred of the crew are missing."

ADMIALTY CLASHES WITH WAR BOARD
Important Resignations May Result, Says The London Mail.
London, Nov. 24.—According to The Mail, a critical situation has arisen in consequence of the government's repeated postponement of consideration of the British war board's demands for fuller powers and the admiralty's refusal to agree to this.

ALL FORMS OF SECURITIES PLACED ON CONTRABAND LIST
London, Nov. 23.—A royal proclamation issued today declares that henceforth cheques, drafts, orders of credit and any negotiable instruments relating to the transfer of money, credit or securities will be treated as contraband.

TEUTONS KEEP UP BATTERING AT ROUMANIA
Germans Launch Fierce Attacks on Cerna, Near Orsova.
ADVANCE IN DOBRUDJA
Allies Occupy Two Villages Across Danube—Russians Arrive.

London, Nov. 23.—The situation in Roumania continues to create anxiety. The German official communication issued in Berlin tonight declares that in Wallachia, Roumania, all operations are progressing in accordance with the plans of Von Falkenhayn. The Roumanians in an official communication received today for the first time since Sunday, admit that they have evacuated Orsova, and that they have retired westward. They assert that they have extricated their forces from the Jiu Valley, where they were apparently in grave peril of being cut off. These forces form part of the Roumanian first army. These forces, they say, now occupy their old positions.

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NEW TAXES IN FRANCE WILL RAISE BIG SUM
Additional Revenue of Six Hundred Million Francs is Expected.
Paris, Nov. 23.—New taxes, which it is estimated will yield 600,000,000 francs, have been decided on by the appropriation committee of the chamber of deputies after many weeks of consideration. Among the measures will be an increase of the income tax from two to five per cent, the taxes on the yield from securities from four to five per cent, and on sugar from 25 to 40 francs per metric hundred-weight. There will also be increases in the taxes on tobacco, wines, beer, letter postage, softs, chocolate, tea, vanilla, mineral waters, and a great variety of other articles, and also on horses, billiards and dogs.

MACEDONIA DRIVE STILL PROCEEDS
Furious Resistance of Reinforced Germans Fails to Stop Allies.
TAKE MORE VILLAGES
Franco-Serb-Italian Forces Make Considerable March Northward.

Special Cable to The Toronto World.
London, Nov. 23.—Capture of two more villages and the driving of the Bulgarian reinforcements, sent to aid the Bulgarians, further back are reported in official communications on events in Macedonia, north of Salonica today. The Serbians fought a violent action on their whole front yesterday against the Bulgarian forces. The Bulgarians having apparently been withdrawn as unequal to the task of confronting them and after they had repulsed counter-attacks by the Serbs, they advanced in places. It was announced at Serbian headquarters that the area of Serbia now liberated now aggregates 1200 square kilometers or nearly 500 miles. North of Monastir the French are continuing the struggle under very difficult conditions, yet they and the Serbians broke down violent counter-attacks launched by reinforcements received by the enemy, and then the allies advanced to the assault and they captured the village of Paralovo, taking 300 prisoners.

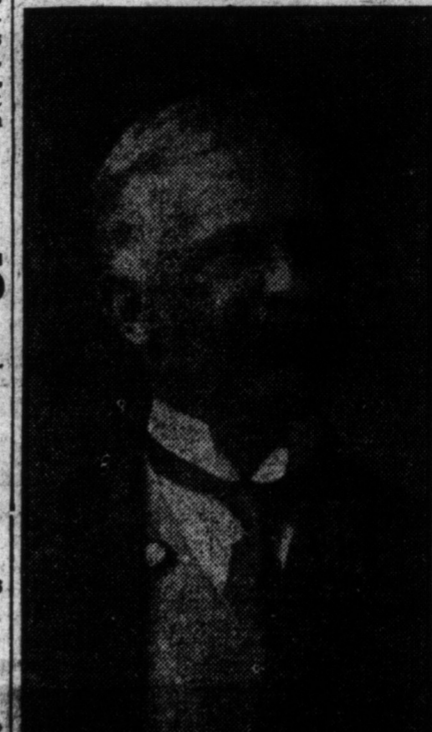
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KEMP SUCCEEDS SAM HUGHES DATE SET FOR BY-ELECTION

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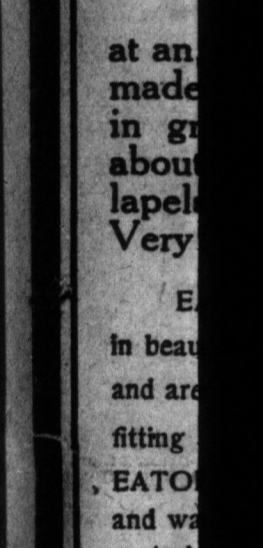

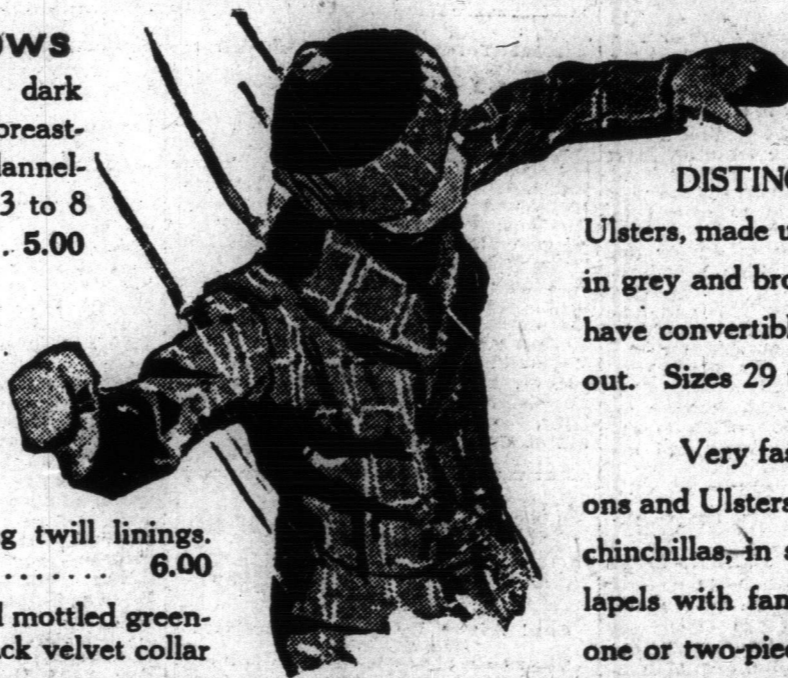

URGES COALITION GOVERNMENT PLAN

George Wrong, Disapproving Proposed Election, Pleads for Unity.

PREMIER TO TAKE LEAD

Writer Believes Canada's Conspicuous Men Would Accept Service Call.

Editor World: Less than nine months after the war had begun, when it seemed that a general election was imminent, I made an appeal against political strife at a time when the country required, above all, unity in facing a great task.

Let us realize what would happen in case an election became certain. At least two months of campaigning would ensue, and during this period the members of the government would be largely occupied with this domestic contest.

A negative resolve to avoid strife is, however, not enough, an aggressive unity among our people is necessary. This unity is now more real than the mere political partisan will admit.

Much has happened since the spring of 1915, the danger of a general election was averted. In Great Britain the system of party government then in operation has been found inadequate and a coalition has been formed.

It is then proposed to our course to meet the crisis. The prime minister should call upon the leader of the opposition to join him in a coalition government.

An election now is not necessary. It ought not to take place. But probably the only thing that will avert it is a real union of political parties to carry on the government.

MAJOR ALEX. MILNE GIVES UP HIS LIFE

Well-Known Toronto Citizen Reported Killed in Latest List.

EIGHTEEN ARE DEAD

More Than Forty Names of Local Men Mentioned as Casualties.

More than forty Toronto names are included in the latest casualty lists. Six men are reported killed in action, twelve as died of wounds, two as missing and 20 as wounded.

Major Alex. Milne, one of the best-known Torontonians, is reported as killed in action on Nov. 15, according to word received yesterday by his father at 40 Division street.

Before going overseas he was the Ontario representative of the British-American Bank Note Co., and also secretary of the Toronto Horse Show Association.
