JUDGES ADVISE THAT IMPROPERLY SECURED PATENTS BE VOIDED

Royal Commission Recommends Action Against Port Arthur Man. NO RIGHT TO TIMBER

Judges Riddell and Latchford have made the following interim report to the lieutenant-governor:

"We, the commissioners appointed by commission of date the 9th day of March, 1920, have the honor to make the following interim report in respect of certain operations of Walter H. Russell, of the city of Port Arthur

"1. The business of Mr. Russell and his companies has been, since 1907, the exploitation of the pulpwood resources of the province of Ontario in the district of Thunder Bay.

"2. The pulp wood which they there obtained has been for the most part put into the United States.

"3. In order to secure certain valuable areas of pulp wood, Mr. Russell conceived and carried into operation a scheme for taking advantage of what he supposed to be the legal effect of the mining acts of the province.

"4. This was done by causing a number of persons closely connected with him, or in his employ, to take out mining licenses, nominally for themselves, but in reality for him and his companies.

"5. Very large quantities of pulp wood were wrongfully obtained in this manner by the means of the Russell Timber Company show that in 1913-1919 there were so procured at least 70,350 cords.

"6. In addition to the above, Mr. Russell and his companies have trespassed for many years upon government lands without shadow of right.

"7. The resolution produced in the council of the Dublin chamber of commerce, calling for a measure providing complete self-government for Ireland, has created much interest.

"8. We transmit herewith the evidence respecting the above matters."

AUXILIARY STEAM PLANT FOR HYDRO COMMISSION NOT TO BE CONSTRUCTED

Owing to High Cost of Material and Labor, as Well as Operation, Scheme is Abandoned—Two Units of Chippawa Plant Ready Next Year.

The final tenders for the construction of an auxiliary steam plant were only received in time for submission to a meeting of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario held yesterday.

In view of the following facts, the commission decided not to proceed with the construction and installation of the plant:

"1. Owing to the high cost of material and labor, the capital cost for a 20,000 h.p. unit would exceed five, and a half million dollars.

"2. The guarantee of the earliest deliveries by the various companies tendering would not permit of the plant being constructed and ready for operation earlier than December, 1921.

"3. It was also estimated that the high cost of operation, and the high price of coal as well as the cost of installation would add at least \$10 per h.p. to the cost of power in the Niagara district.

"4. The Messrs. Hugh L. Cooper and Company, who are preparing an extensive report on the Chippawa-Queenston development at Niagara Falls, advise the commission that the two units of 35,000 h.p. each will be ready for commercial operation on October 1, 1921, provided there is no further interference with the construction program of the commission."

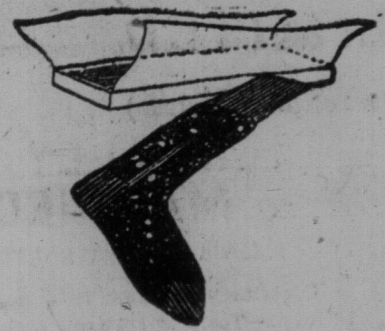

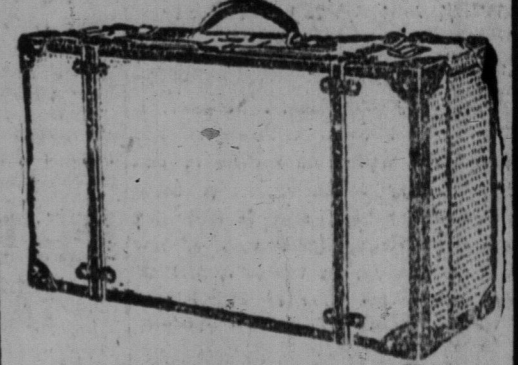

ALLIES RESTRICT ARMISTICE DEMANDS

**Poland Instructed as to Terms
Which She Must Not
Assent to.**

Paris, July 30.—The limitations which Great Britain and France would put upon Soviet demands of Poland in arranging of an armistice, are set forth in a notification which has been despatched to the Warsaw government by the British and French governments. It was learned here today. Poland requested the views of Great Britain and France on possible armistice terms, and the governments at London and Paris have notified the Polish government that they will not permit Poland to accept possible armistice demands involving:

First: Whole or partial disarmament of Poland.
Second: A change in the Polish system of government dictated or brought about by the Soviets.
Third: Acceptance by Poland of a boundary line less favorable than that provisionally drawn by Premier Lloyd George.
Fourth: The use of Poland as a bridgehead, in any sense, between Germany and Russia.
As bearing on the military situation, it develops that vast stocks of munitions from the allies are moving to the Baltic, and from Rumania and Czechoslovakia. These munitions were for the most part, originally despatched for the army of General Denikin, but were delayed on the way until too late to be available for his use. The munitions being sent from Danzig, however, were shipped recently for the special use of Poland. Other munitions are expected to be in process of shipment from Great Britain and France for Poland within a few days.
Would Attack Soviet Army.
Hungary has asked the permission of Great Britain and France to attack the Soviet army. Such an attack would involve permission, likewise, to reorganize the Hungarian army, the demobilization of which was provided for by the Hungarian peace treaty.

HOLD WAR VETERAN ON MURDER CHARGE

Lorne Helmer Accused, Following Discovery of Norfolk Farmer's Body.

Simcoe, July 30.—Lorne Helmer, a young married man, veteran of the great war, in which he served in the Norfolk county battalion, has been placed under arrest, and is now in jail here, following the finding of the body of James Learn under a pile of leaves near his farm in North Walsingham. Learn had been missing for two weeks.

Helmer is said to be accused by his younger brother's confession of having caused Learn's death. The dead man and Helmer had been living on the same farm, and it is alleged that disputes over the occupancy and other matters were the prime factors of the tragedy. This farm is just east of the property of Christian Shoup, who was murdered in May, 1915, by Emerson Shufley.

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VILLA'S SURRENDER WAS UNCONDITIONAL

Mexican Bandit Pleaded for Life and is Given Protection.

Mexico City, July 29.—Francisco Villa, ex-tycoon, diveded of his authority, is now on his way to the ranch of his erstwhile comrade in arms, General Thomas Urbina, near Nievas, Zacatecas, to take up his residence, according to the terms of his agreement with the De la Huerta government.

Walking arm in arm with General Eugenio Martinez around the public plaza in Saltillo, Coahuila, Villa agreed to the most drastic terms ever imposed on any Mexican revolutionist, asking only that his life be protected, and that his men be allowed to resume their positions in civil life.

Villa desired to make the trip to Torreon overland with his men, although the government had decided that he would proceed to Torreon on foot. Two trains were offered Villa's men, but they refused to use them.

DISTILLERIES GET ASSESSMENT CUT

Sir William Meredith Appeals Against Value Put on Land and House.

The court of revision yesterday afternoon decided that the Gooderham & Worts business assessment for 1920 & 1921 should be as wholesalers and not as distillers. This ruling reduces the taxes by one-half, as distillers pay taxes by one-half, and wholesalers only 75 per cent.

The court exempted a number of vacant lots on Dufferin street on the appeal of the public library board, on the ground that the property is now being used for public library purposes.

Among the Rosedale residents whose assessment appeals have been filed is Sir William Meredith. He claims that \$35,133 is an over-assessment on his land and residence at 45 Bincarth road.

John A. Tate thinks \$11,000 too high an assessment on his property at 4 Edgar drive. Robert L. Cramer main- tains that \$9,895 is too much on 30 feet frontage at 6 Edgar drive. Mrs. C. A. Laughton enters an appeal against \$18,500 being too high on her property at 54 Bincarth road.

"Over-assessed," says C. W. James, jr., with reference to a figure of \$17,760 on a vacant lot on the same street.

"Price of land too high," states George Chisholm, 35 Bincarth road, claiming over-valuation as another reason why his assessment of \$13,152 should be reduced.

"Over 60 per cent. increase seems unreasonable," says the comment of Chas. J. Gibbony with reference to an assessment of \$8,860 on 9 Bincarth road.

An income assessment of \$25,000 brings a protest from Jessie D. Dunlop, 15 Highland avenue. She claims it is too severe.

Church Makes Appeal. On behalf of the congregation of Old St. Andrew's Church, Jarvis street, Joseph Oliver, John G. Kent and Robert Weir, trustees, appeal an assessment of \$21,313 on the property purchased by the congregation to be used for institutional work in connection with the church.

The Grand Trunk Railway appeals a \$2,155 assessment on the old Belt Line railway, claiming the figures altogether too high.

The Canadian National Railway have lodged an appeal against assessments on their Trinity street, Cherry street, Don Esplanade, Front street and Eastern avenue properties. The total assessment is \$221,479. The grounds of the appeal are that the property is over-assessed.

ANOTHER SIDE OF TAG DAY AFFAIR

Secretary Veterans' Union Council Gets After Controller.

The following statement concerning the \$18,000 veterans' tag day fund, the disposition of which is being warmly debated in various circles, was issued by W. G. Lane, secretary of the Veterans' Union Council:

"Controller Maguire having issued a statement to the press in regard to Wednesday's conference between the ladies' committee, himself as chairman of that committee, and the representatives of the Veterans' Reunion Council, I desire, as secretary of the council, to issue a statement covering actual facts. To anyone not acquainted with these facts, Controller Maguire's statement is distinctly misleading."

"The present controversy did not arise thru the veterans, as might be assumed by Controller Maguire's statement, but has been caused by him, and him alone. At the request of the veterans, the Canadian National Exhibition consented to place a day at their disposal, to be known as 'Veterans' Day,' and August 28 was agreed to by common consent. This led to the amalgamation of all veterans and the formation of the Veterans' Reunion Council, in whose hands lie the arrangements for their day at the Exhibition, and they are receiving the co-operation of the Exhibition in every possible way."

Three Were Present. "It was decided to wait upon the board of control on their deputation day, July 28. On this occasion the three controllers who were present at the first meeting, from whom the proposal to pass the \$18,000 to the reunion council emanated, were absent, but Controller Gibbons was present, with the mayor. It was agreed that the reunion council should receive this fund in order to carry out their program for the entertainment of soldiers of Toronto. Acting Chief of Police Dickson and City Treasurer Ross were called to the meeting, and everyone was fully agreed. It remained then only for the ladies' committee to fall into line. A meeting was arranged for 2 p.m. that afternoon, at which Mrs. VanKougenet and the Misses Church and Doyle (the ladies' committee), were in attendance with Controller Maguire as chairman of that committee. The meeting was proceeding apparently satisfactorily to all concerned, when, about 2.30, Controller Maguire arrived. A more complete change of attitude on the part of any man is hard to conceive. As a member of the board of control he opposed that grant of city funds, and himself first made the suggestion that the \$18,000 should be transferred to the veterans' reunion council. As chairman of the tag day committee he described this (his own) suggestion as unreasonable, illogical, illegal and preposterous, and opposed it in every imaginable manner. I pointed out his extraordinary inconsistency, but he did not attempt to explain it. A more illuminating illustration of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde would be difficult to discover. The ladies were, of course, delighted with his attitude, as it evidently coincided with their views, and so the deadlock remains, and the \$18,000 also remains—in the coffers of the city."

GEN. WILLIAMS RESIGNS FROM VETERANS' COUNCIL

W. G. Lane, secretary of the Veterans' Reunion Council, has issued the following statement in connection with the resignation of General Williams:

"Owing to the gross misrepresentation of facts, so far as he is personally concerned, in connection with the joint meeting of representatives of the Veterans' Reunion Council and the ladies' committee of the St. Julien tag day, 1918, fund, Major-General V. A. E. Williams, C.M.G., has tendered his resignation as president and chairman of the veterans' council. He also resigns his seat on the council's finance committee."

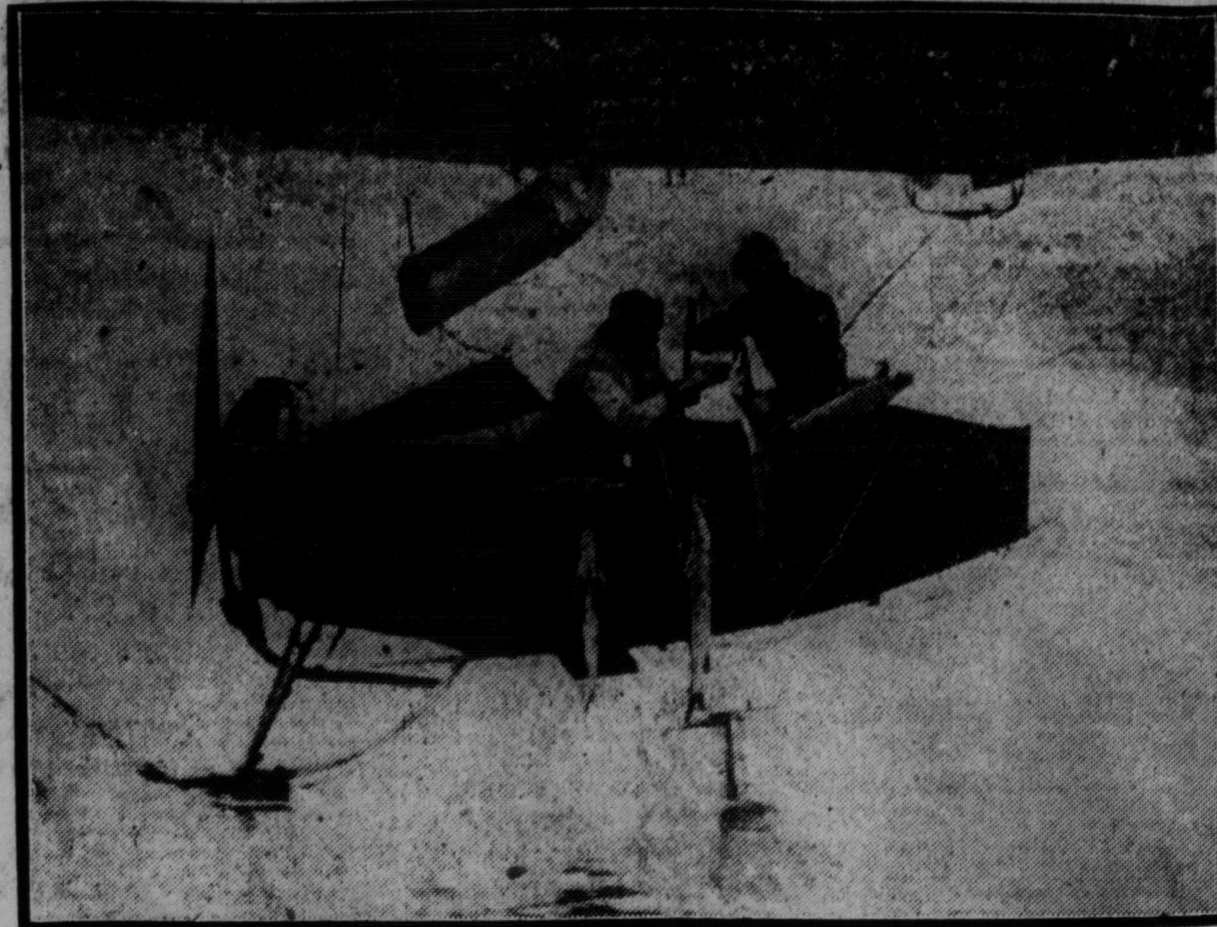

Proposal Vetoed by Business Administration of Board of Education.

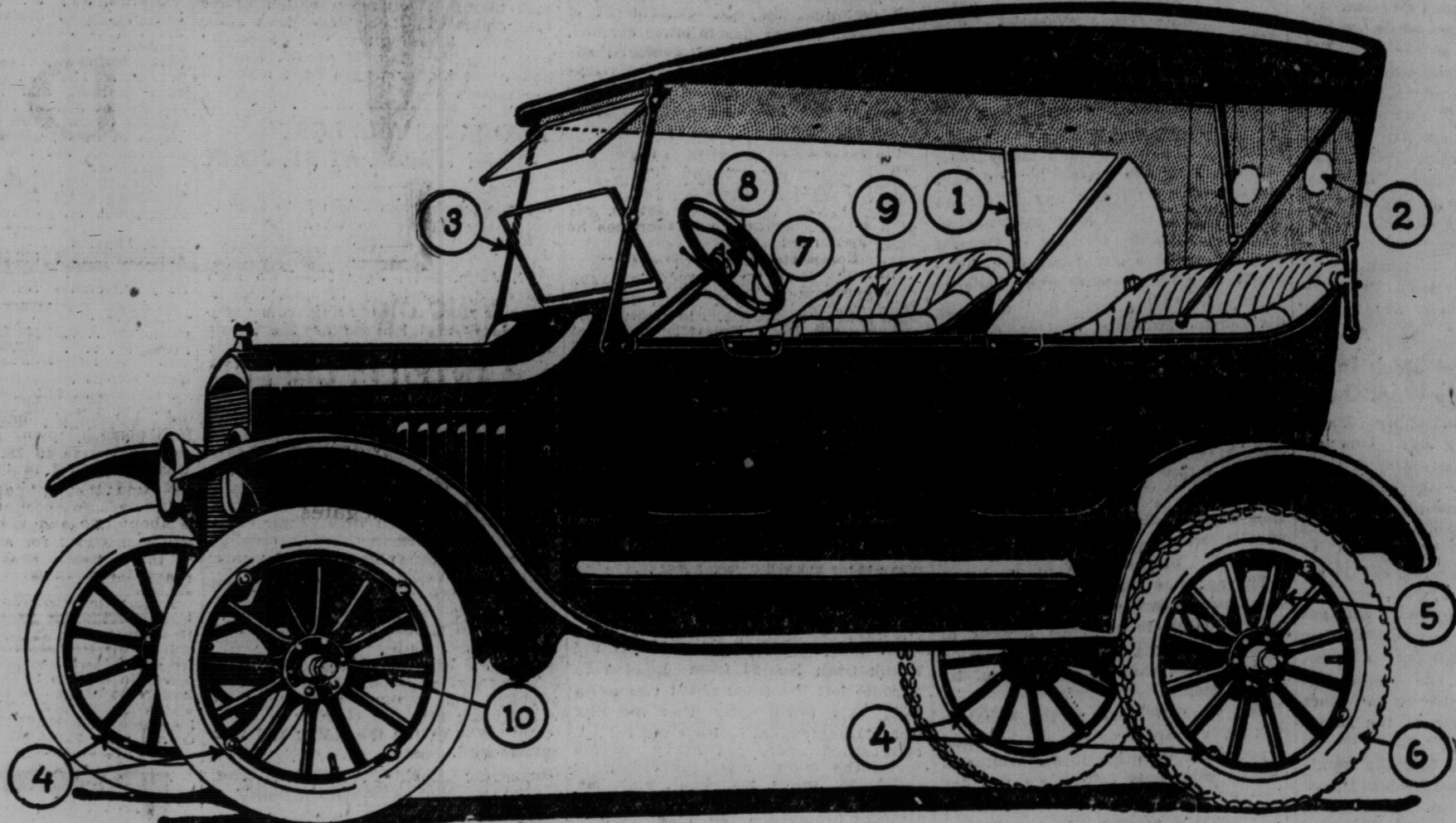

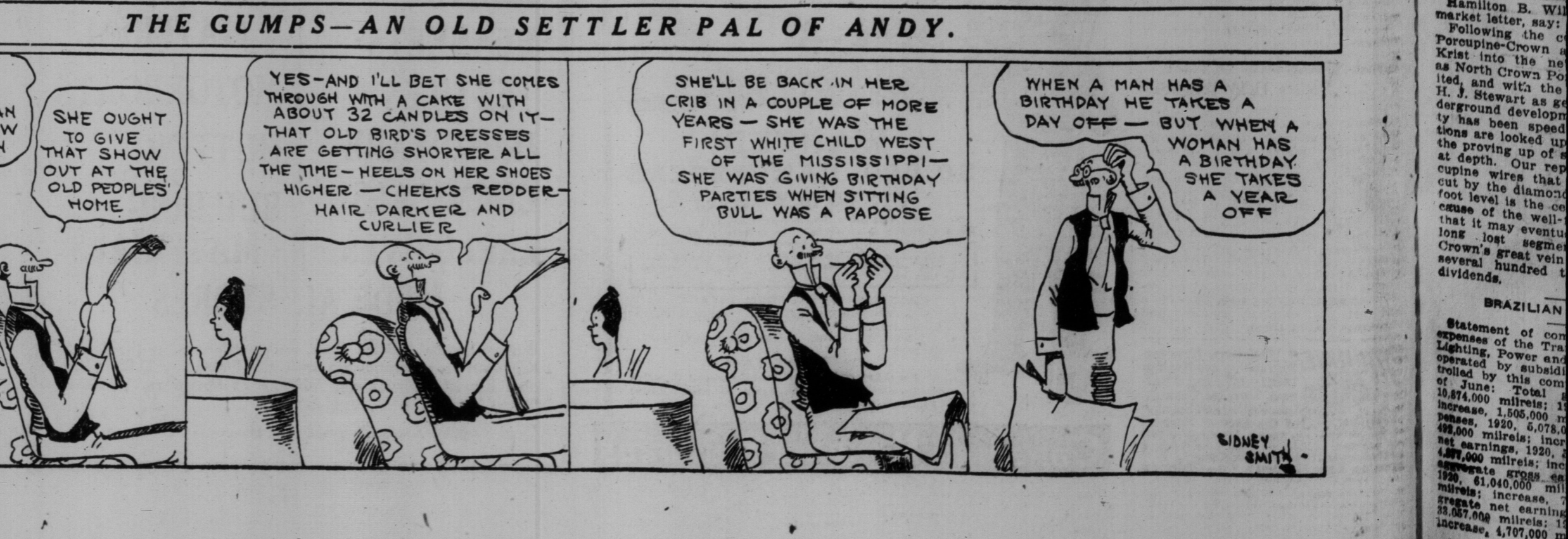
