# NOVA-SCOTIA ALMANACK.

#### IMPORTANCE OF ASTRONOMY.

Whether we consider the object which Astronomy sets before us, or the accuracy and precision of most of its proofs and calculations, or the service which, in various ways, it renders to the nations of the earth, it is, and ever will be, the most valuable, interesting, and sublime science, which can possibly engage the attention of man. This noble science not only deserves our regard as a matter of curiosity, or rather of astonishment and wonder, and as answering the most important purposes for the good of civil society; but still more so, as it opens a scene which impresses the mind with the most exalted, and consequently, the most just and correct ideas, of that eternal and omnipotent Being who contrived, made, and still upholds, the whole. When surveying those stupendous works which move with such order and harmony through the immeasurable fields of space, we are led to exclaim,

"These are thy glorious works, Parent of good, Almighty! thine, this universal frame Thus wondrous fair! Thyself hew wondrous then!"

Although there have been many schemes or hypotheses concerning the heavenly bodies, yet there have been only four which have attained any thing like authority and permanence in the world. These are the Ptolemaic, the Tychonic, the Cartesian, and the fourth, which we do not hesitate to pronounce the true one, formerly called the Pythagorean, but now more significantly termed the Newtonian. This last system has been also styled the Copernican. In the latter part of the seventeenth century, flourished Sir Isaac Newton, a man endowed with a compass of soul, high, vast, and profound; with a penetration which could look through nature and scan her mighty laws; with an intellectual industry equal to the most gigantic enterprise; with a temper, calm, tranquil, and devout. Thus gifted, the immortal Newton rose far above the common level even of learned and scientific men; and, by his single power, reared a fabric of

mathematical and experimental philosophy which forever must stand the boast of wisdom, and the terror of idleness, ignorance and pride.

Let our thought awake—let it take the lightning's wing, and glance from east to west, from pole to pole—behold "one sun by day; by night, ten thousand shine"—take its flight through the mighty range of the fixed stars,

"Those sov'reign glories of the skies, Of independent, native lustre proud, The souls of systems, and the lords of life:—

to the region of unassisted sight, add that of the telescope; and to what the telescope perceives, add what reason demonstrates; then ask, If such be the effect, what must be the Cause? if such the work, what must be the workman? if such the building, how wise, how mighty, the Architect, that reared and beautified, and still sustains the whole? To the Author of such a mass of wonders, who can forbear to say, "Great and marvellous are thy works!"

Nor let the mind stagger at the position, that all these worlds on worlds, and systems on systems, are inhabited; the residences of animated, and most likely of intelligent creatures! As far as analogical reasoning can go, no truth whatever is more certain. If the Author of nature has not left us a drop of water unpeopled; if over the whole surface of our earth, his bounty has sent the streams of happiness, flowing through millions of channels, to as many forms of life; can it be for a moment supposed, that he has left those innumerable regions—compared with which our earth is but a corner, an atom, a mere speckwaste, desolate, and void? Such a supposition is unworthy of our reason, and utterly inadequate to our conceptions of the Author of Nature. And what can possibly be more unreasonable than to suppose those shining orbs were formed merely to give light to the inhabitants of this earth, when, perhaps, not one in ten thousand of them is ever seen, and certainly a single moon would afford us more light than the whole host of them put together? However, therefore, the mind may labour under the stupendous conception, doubtless the fixed stars, and the thousands of thousands of worlds, that with such rapidity and yet with such calmness, revolve round them, are peopled with

myriads of intelligent creatures, formed for endless progression in perfection and felicity! Surely the favour of the Monarch who upholds and sways his benign and equitable sceptre over such an empire, is above all things to be sought; surely the displeasure of such a monarch, is above all things to be dreaded.

One other thought, and we have done. Let not the wise and good suppose that the contemplation of their Creator's Works will terminate with the present mortal state! That event, which is the terror of the wicked, and the lot of us all, will most certainly open to the righteous an arena of stupendous and infinitely varied beings, of which in this infancy of our existence, we cannot form the most distant conception.

"When e'en at last the solemn hour shall come, And wing my mystic flight to future worlds, I cheerful will obey; there with new powers, Will, rising, wonders sing: I cannot go Where universal love not smiles around, Sustaining all yon orbs, and all their suns." June 1st, 1838.

#### SAINT ANDREW.

The tutelar Saint of Scotland, St. Andrew, was one of the Apostles, and the brother of St. Peter; the name of his father was James. He was a follower of John the Baptist, whom he left at the call of his Lord and Saviour, and was the first disciple whom Jesus is recorded to have received. Andrew introduced Peter to Jesus. But little is recorded of him in scripture, ecclesiastical historians enter detail of the latter part of his life. According to Theodoret, he employed himself for some years in journeying and preaching throughout Greece; but Eusebins and other writers speak of Scythia, as the province of his missionary labours. The common statement however, is, that he suffered martyrdon, at Patra, now Patras, in Achaia, having been put to death by order of Egdus the Pro-consul of that province. The year in which this event took place, is not mentioned; but both in the Greek and in the Latin church the festival commemorative of it, is held on the 30th of November. The notion that St. Andrew suffered on a cross, of the form of the letter X, appears to be of considerable antiquity; the oldest writers say, that he was naded to an olive tree. They used to keep in the church of St. Victor, at Marseilles, what was affirmed to be the very cross on which he had been suspended; it was enclosed in a silver shrine, and was of the common form, that is, with one limb perpendicular, and

The Scotfish historian Fordun delivers a legend respecting the relics of St. Andrew, which several of his countrymen have co-

pied. In the middle of the fourth century, it seems, the bones of the saint, which still remained at Patras, were in the custody of Regulus, an abbot, or as other accounts style him, a bishop of the Greek church. In the year 345, the emperor Constantius 2d, gave orders that these precious remains should be brought to Constantinople; but on the third night before they were removed, an angel appeared to Regulus, and ordered him to abstract from the chest in which they were kept, the upper bone of one of the arms, three of the fingers of the right hand, and the pan of one of the knees. Some accounts add a tooth to the list of items. Regulus having done as he was commanded, was, some years after, directed by another vision to take his departure from Patras; and having accordingly set out, he was, after a long voyage, shipwrecked with his companions, in the Bay of St. Andrews, in Fifeshire, then forming part of the territory of the Picts. Heingus, the Pictish king, received the strangers with great hospitality, and by their instrumentality, he and his subjects were soon afier converted, when a Christian church was erected at the place where the missionaries had been driven on shore, and was dedicated to the Apostle, the fragments of whose skeleton they had brought with them. Such is said to have been the origin of the city of St Andrews, and of the assumption of St. Andrew by the Scotch, as their patron saint.

#### ECLIPSES FOR 1839.

There will be but two Eclipses this year, both of the Sun; and both invisible in this part of the world.

The First will be a total Eclipse on March 15th, visible in

Europe, Africa, and South America.

The Second will be an Annular Eclipse, on September 7th, visible in Asia and the North and South Pacific Ocean, and to a

very small part of North America.

Gambart's Comet is expected to re-appear this year, and its perihelion passage is calculated to happen on July 23d. It was first discovered on the 26th February, 1826, and its elements found to be the same as those which appeared in 1789 and 1795; whence it is concluded to be the same body. It accomplishes its revolution in 2460 days.

#### ORIENTAL AND OCCIDENTAL STARS.

Venus will be an Evening Star from February to August, a Morning Star from October to the end of the year.

Mars will be visible every Evening until July; he will then

come in opposition to the Sun.

Jupiter will be a Morning Star from January; an Evening and Morning Star from February till May; an Evening Star till July, and a Morning Star from November till the end of the year.

Saturn will be visible every Morning until April; then it may be seen every Evening and Morning until September, and seen again in the Morning, at the latter part of December.





### Agricultural, Domestic Economy, etc.

Honour to Practical Agriculturists .- NATIONAL BENEFACTORS. The names of those who have enriched our gardens with useful and valuable plants, are deserving of record and remembrance. Sir W. Raleigh introduced the potatoe; Sir Anthony Ashley first planted cabbage in this country—a cabbage appears at his feet on his monument; Sir Richard Weston brought over clover grass from Flanders in 1645; figs were planted in Henry the Eighth's reign, a Lambeth, by Cardinal Pope—it is said the identical trees are still remaining; Spilman, who erected the first paper mill at Dartford, in 1590, brought over the first two thyme trees, which he planted; and they are still growing. Thomas Lord Cromwell enriched the gardens of England with three different kinds of plums. It was Evelyn, whose patriotism was not exceeded by his learning, who targely propagated the noble oak in this country, so much so, that the trees he planted have supplied the navy of Great Britain with its chief proportion of that tim-

ber.—Eng. paper.

Fattening Chickens .- The following process of fattening chickens, we see highly recommended. Take rice and boil it over the fire in skimmed milk until the grain bursts. This food, if given to chickens five or six days, it is said, will make them plump and fat enough to

grace an Alderman's table.

Scalding Hogs.-It is said that to dip hogs into cold water immediately before they are immersed in the hot, makes the hair and

bristles come out with greater ease, and prevents them from "setting."

Recovering Frosted Plants.—It is well known that the injury caused to plants by early spring frosts, is not owing so much to the direct action of the cold, as to the sudden application of warmth afterwards. London nursery-men have availed themselves of the knowledge of this fact, in recovering plants affected by frost during the night. Their practice is simply to sprinkle them copiously with cold water before sunrise. This produces the same effect as the application of cold water to a frozen limb-abstracting the frost so gradually as to produce no injury to the affected parts.

Apple Trees .- A new plan for increasing plantations of apple trees has lately been carried into extensive practice by the horticulturists of Bohemia. Neither seeds nor grafting are required. The process is to take shoots from the choicest sorts, insert them in a potatoe, and plunge both into the ground, leaving but an inch or two of the shoot above the surface. Toads .- We caution agriculturists, and especially gardeners, against destroying toads. They feed entirely on insects and reptiles, and a few dozen of them will clear an acre of ground from cabbage worms. Snakes are also useful in grass fields. They are great destroyers of

Flowers.-It is said if you fail flower pots about half full of quick lime, and cover over this a good mould, the flowers may thus be obtained in a very short time, and all the season. The earth should be kept slightly moistened, and pressed down whenever it rises by the

swelling of the lime.

Industry.—It has been said with great truth, that man must have occupation or be miserable. Toil is the price of sleep and appetite—of health and enjoyment. The very necessity which overcomes our natural sloth, is a blessing. The whole world does not contain a briar or a thorn which divine mercy could have spared. We are happier with the sterility, which we can overcome by industry, than we could have been with spontaneous plenty, and unbounded profusion. The body and the mind are improved by the toil that fatigues them. The toil is a thousand times rewarded by the pleasure which it bestows. Its enjoyments are peculiar. No wealth can purchase them, no indolence can taste them. They flow only from the exertions which they repay.

Bricklaying .- Bricks should always be wet before they are laid. A wall twelve inches thick, built with good mortar, with bricks well soaked, is stronger than one sixteen inches thick, built with dry bricks. If the bricks are well saturated with water, they will not abstract from the mortar the moisture necessary for its chrystalization, but will unite chemically with the mortar, and become almost as solid as a rock. On the other hand, if the bricks are laid dry, they absorb all

the moisture from the mortar, and leave it too dry to harden.

To take Stains out of Mahogany .- Mix six ounces of spirit of salts, and half an ounce of rock salt of lemons, powdered together. Drop a little on the stains, and rub it with a cork till it disappear. Wash off with cold water.

To prevent wounds from Mortifying .- Sprinkle sugar on them. The Turks wash fresh wounds with wine, and sprinkle sugar on them. Obstinate ulcers may be cured with sugar dissolved in a strong decoc-

tion of walnut leaves.

Poison .- To cure the poison occasioned by the sting of a bee, wasp, hornet, &c. wash the part affected with the water of ammonia (hartshorne,) and if much diseased, dissolve a piece of carbonated ammonia (the size of a pea) in water and drink it. This remedy is said to have relieved persons when a sting had nearly caused mortification.

Sweet Fern.—An herb called sweet fern will cure the poison of the

vine usually growing on old posts and trunks of trees, sometimes

called mercury.

Felons.-To cure a felon, make a strong ley of hickory ashes, add a pint of beer, and thicken with wheat bran, then grease the poultice

with lard and apply.

Freezing.-A young man in New Hampshire froze his foot, which was perfectly cured in less than twenty-four hours, by the application of yeast and Indian meal-it is equally beneficial when applied to a burn.

Newspapers.—Persons wishing to take the wrinkles out of their newspapers, may do so by spreading them out and sprinkling them with water thoroughly, and refolding while damp in the shape desired, then put under a press.

To make Hard Water Soft.—We take the hard water from our well, and into one bucket we put one ounce of the carbonate of soda, which disselves immediately when the water is warmed, and it becomes at once as soft and harmless as the purest rain water.

Cement.—Isinglass, boiled in spirits of wine, will produce a fine transparent cement which will unite broken glass so as to render the fracture almost imperceptible, and perfectly seems

fracture almost imperceptible, and perfectly secure.

Nankin colour.—A pail full of ley, with a piece of copperas half as big as a hen's egg boiled in it, will dye a fine nankin colour, which will never wash out. This is very useful for the linings of bed quilts,

Sure Remedy for the Croup.—A distinguished medical friend of ours states, that whenever cynanche trachealis appears, he found a plaster of dry Scetch snuff, to be applied directly across the top of the thorax, invariably effectual. Dr. Shurtleif of Boston also declares—"I have used the snuff in several cases of the croup, and (with the aid of five grains of the powder of ipecac and fifteen of calomel in commencement for an emetic), I have in no case failed in performing a cure. It is mixed with goose oil or lard, and spread on fiannel sufficiently large to cover the neck and breast as low as the pit of the stomach."—Philadelphia Mirror.

Coffee.—In making coffee, there are various recipes for preparing and refining it. The following is the best that has ever come under our view, and is available in all places:—Take the coffee fresh roasted, and not too brown, in the proportion of about two ounces for five persons, and grind it just before using. Put it in a basin, and break into it an egg, yolk, white, shell and all. Mix it up with a spoon to the consistence of mortar, place it with warm (not boiling) water in the coffee-pot, let it boil up and break three times, then stand a few minutes, and it will be as clear as amber, and the egg will give it a sixthere.

Hemlock Gum.—This article has become valuable for the market.

The mode used in this neighbourhood is to cut the bark into small pieces, boil it, and strain out the rosinous gum: every pound of it is worth 37 cents, (1s. 10d.) and it is totally lost in the ordinary mode of clearing land. The druggists, we believe, are giving enough to pay us well for taking care of it, and this circumstance connected with the price that the bark will command at the tanneries, is a powerful inducement to prevent the waste that is continually exhibited over a large extent of the United States and the British Provinces.—Am. pa.






