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

HISTORICAL MEMORANDA.

On the 10th March, 1875, 111 members of Zion Church withdrew from that fellowship, for the purpose of forming a new Congregational Church under the pastoral care of the Rev. J. F. Stevenson, LL.B., one of the joint-pastors of Zion Church. On Sunday, March 14th, 1875, after an appropriate service conducted by Mr. Stevenson, the Church was duly organized, and Mr. Stephenson was unanimously chosen Pastor. At the same time the Church, by formal Resolution of the united brotherhood, received the name of "Emmanuel Church." As the Church possessed no local habitation of its own, the public services on the Lord's Day were held in the Montreal Gymnasium Building; and on week-evenings, in the Lecture-Room of Erskine Church. In the month of June, 1875, ground was broken for the erection of a new churchedifice, on a site occupying the corner of Stanley street, and facing St. Catherine street.

On April 15th, 1876, the corner-stone was laid by the Pastor, assisted by Rev. Dr. Wilkes. To the Pastor a silver trowel was presented, bearing the following inscription:—

Presented to the
REV. JOHN FRDERICK STEVENSON,
On the occasion of his laying the
Corner-stone of EMMANUEL (Congregational) CHURCH, Montreal.
April 15th, 1876.
"Except the Lord build the house, they labour in vain who build it."

The jar deposited in the corner-stone contained the following:—

2. A copy of the Church Manuel for 1875.

- 3. A list of the names of the Building and Finance Committee.
- 4. The names of the Architect and Contractors.
- 5. Newspapers.

- 8. Various current Coins of the Realm.

On January 14th and 15th, 1877, the building was opened for Divine Service with special Dedicatory Services.

Number of members received since the organization of the Church, 360.

Number in fellowship, January, 4th, 1885, 238.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the Members of the Church was held on the evening of January 19th, 1885, in the Lecture-Room of the Church,

The Pastor, the Rev. Dr. Stevenson, occupied the chair.

- 1. Devotional service and Pastor's address.
- 2. The Report of the Board of Trustees, together with the Treasurer's Statement, was read; and, on motion, received and adopted.
- 3. Owing to expenses incurred by the fitting up of an organmotor and the payment of special assessments, etc., there was a deficit on the year's accounts of \$1000: whereupon, on motion of Messrs. Wilson and J. S. McLachlan it was re-solved that a special subscription-list be opened for the removal of the deficit, now reported. Messrs. Wilson and Reid were appointed a committee, with power to add to their number, to solicit subscriptions.
- 4. The Church re-elected by ballot the following brethren to serve on the Board of Trustees for the current year:

 Messrs. Cornish, Porteous and Walker.

5. The Annual Report of the Church Board was read; and, on motion was received and adopted.

6. The Rev. Dr. Cornish was re-elected Church Secretary, the Church at the same time again expressing its cordial thanks to him for his services continued during the past year.

7. On the question of the mode of appointing brethren to serve on the Church Board, it was Ordered:—That a Nominating Committee be named by the Chair, to present a

list of nine names for election by the Church.

8. The Pastor nominated Messrs. H. Lyman and Wm. Reid as the said Committee, who withdrew, and returned with the following list of names for presentation to the Church, viz:—Messrs. Bizzey, F. F. Blackader, H. Sanders, R. G. Brown, W. R. Ross, J. B. Sutherland, Don. Campbell, S. P. Leet and R. W. Cowan.

9. On motion, the list of names submitted was adopted.

Ladies Mission Society, and of the Labrador Mission were read and received, the Church recording its high appreciation of the value of the work being done by these several societies, and tendering its thanks for the same.

11. The Report of the Sunday School Committee was read and received and adopted: and the office-bearers and

Committee were appointed.

read. It reported satisfactorily on the regular attendance and discharge of his duties by Mr. A. C. Lyman and recommended his re-appointment as organist for the present year.

13. On motion, the above report was received and adopted, with thanks to the members of the Choir; and the following were appointed as the Committee on Psalmody:—Messrs. Learmont, Henry Lyman, Gurd, Andres, A. C. Lyman, Porteous, T. Costen and Downs.

- 14. The Report of the Young People's Association was read and received. This Association has for its objects:—
 The advancement of the cause of Christ and the interests of our Church; also the promotion of Sociability and Literary Culture among the young people of the Congregation.
- 15. The Pastor, and Messrs. Alexander and Jamieson were appointed the Committee on the use of the Church Building.
- 16. Mr. H. W. Walker, the Secretary, presented a Report of the proceedings of the Building Fund Union during the past year, with the Treesurer's statement, which was received.
- 16. The question of opening an adult Bible-class was introduced, and it was the unanimous feeling that such a class would be of great service. Mr. Hague, in response to the wish of the Church, kindly engaged to conduct the class on Sundays, at 3 p.m., for which he received the thanks of the meeting.
- 17. On motion, it was resolved:—That a Church Directory be published, as heretofore, with the several Reports now received and adopted, under the care of the Church Secretary.
- 18. The above minutes were, on motion, taken as read, and confirmed.

After singing and prayer the meeting adjourned.

PASTOR'S ADDRESS.

MY DEAR BRETHREN :-

I am thankful that the mercy of God has given us again a year of peace and of considerable prosperity. The congregations have been good, often large, and the power of God has, I trust, been present with us to heal and to bless. May it be so inceasingly. May the manifest favour of the God of our fathers be with us also.

It is still a matter of anxiety to me that so many remain members of the Congregation only who ought to be united with the Church. I believe that if parents and other near relatives would use all the influence with our young people that they might use, it would cease to be true. Let us earnestly seek to do our duty toward the young. Get them if possible to commit themselves to the right side early in life. We can plead the special promises of God and the example of the Lord Jesus. And there is no gift that can be laid on the altar of Christ more acceptable than the heart of one who is still young.

May the blessing of our Heavenly Father rest on all who bear office in the Church. I commend the Deacons, the Church Board, the Sabbath School, the Ladies' Aid Society, the Missionary Associations, to your help and your prayerful sympathy. It would be a good thing if every member of our number to whom it is possible would choose one or more of these, or kindred forms of activity, and throw his energies into them. Work for Christ in some definite way, I pray you. It is the best means of elevating our heart into communion with him, and strengthening our faith and love. The busy heart and hands are less than any likely to fall into temptation. Work for Him, and give all you can to His cause and you will be the safer and the stronger.

During the last months of the year, our official staff has been enlarged by the election of two additional Deacons. The brethren appointed to the office, have, I believe, the confidence and affection of the Church. They have mine also, and I welcome them very heartily as helpers in the good work of Christ amongst us.

Try, brethren, to fill your places in the worship of the Church in the year to come. Think of, and, if possible attend, our Sabbath-evening service and our Prayer Meeting. It is good and profitable to meet for prayer and converse, and those who do so find their reward. I wish more of our number would attend to this duty.

I earnestly beseech thr blessing of God on you all, as individuals, as families, and as a Church. May His Spirit be amongst us. May the number of the Church grow, its piety be deepened, and the whole tone of its life elevated and purified. Pray for each other, brethren, and pray for your Pastor also, that the quicking power of God may be upon us.

REPORT OF CHURCH BOARD.

In accordance with our established usage, it devolves upon the Church Board to present a resume of the life and work of the Church during the tenth year of its history.

It is matter for thankfulness that they are able to report that, during the past year, the health of our esteemed Pastor has been such that he has been enabled with regularity to carry on his ministrations among us, and that the grave anxiety once felt on account of his health has been dispelled by a marked improvement. Death, however, has not spared our ranks. Mrs. Haight, truly "a mother in Israel," and Mr. Henry Vennor, an honoured member and office-bearer, in both the parent church and in this, have been called to their rest and reward in a ripe old age; whilst Mr. Macphie, after a lingering illness, has been removed in the prime of his manhood-all these, though dead, yet by the uniform consistency of their lives and the excellence of their characters, speak to us who survive, calling upon us to imitate all that was good and wise in them. The death of Mr. Vennor and the advancing years and infirmities of some surviving members of the Diaconate, seemed to indicate the expediency of filling up its ranks. The Pastor and Deacons, after careful consideration of the matter, laid before the Church a recommendation to this effect; and the Church resolved to elect three additional Deacons, which was duly done in accordance with the provisions of By-Law IX. The choice fell on our brethren Messrs. J. M. M. Duff, Thos. Costen and C. T. Williams, of whom the last-mentioned desires to be relieved from the duties of the office, much to the regret of his brethren. Thus the number of the Diaconate is nine, to which the number of the elective members of the Church Board will have to correspond. It is hoped that by these changes greater efficiency will be given to the administration of the affairs of the Church, especially in the matter of the systematic visitation, in the various districts of the members of the Church and congregation.

In the month of June, the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec, by invitation of the Church, held its meetings with us. Our brethren, Messrs. Wm. Reid and Popham were appointed delegates to represent the Church on the Union, and Mr. Scholes at the meeting of the Provident Fund. The meetings were of more than ordinary interest, and the arrangements for the entertainment of our guests were made with great care and success by the Committee charged therewith and the Ladies' Aid Society, for which service both received the well-deserved thanks of the Church.

The Annual meetings in connection with Home and Foreign Missions were held on Feb. 24th and 25th, the sister Churches in the city being invited to unite with us, at which meetings the Rev. Thos. Hall and J. G. Sanderson represented our Home mission work, and Rev. R. Winsor, of the American Board, spoke of missions in India. The attendance at the Public meeting, though respresenting the three Churches, was not large, but the addresses were good and stimulating. It is to be regretted that a livelier interest is not taken in these important departments of Christian effort.

In the Autumn, the Pastor delivered a series of four evening discourses on the creed of the Agnostic, the creed of the Formalist, the creed of the Worlding and the creed of the Christian, which attracted good congregations and appeared to be much appreciated. There has been much thought and discussion among us on our Sunday-evening services, with the view of making them of a less formal and more evangelistic character by having several short, pointed addresses and prayers. The church without taking any formal action in the matter, left it in the hands of the Pastor to act according to his own discretion, and he has held such a service on the evening of the first Sunday of the past four months, at which very stirring and practical appeals have been made by himself and others whom he has invited to take part with him. Mr. Geo. Soltau, who in other places has done good service as an evangelist, in conjunction with the Pastor, held a series of meetings among us, extending over a week, from which it is hoped good results may follow.

During the Pastor's vacation the pulpit was supplied by Revs. R. K. Black, of Granby; Geo. Willett, of Cowansville; Principa! Grant, of Kingston; and Geo. Robertson, of Melbourne. The Church roll has been carefully revised, and letters of Dismissal have been granted to, or names have been removed of, several members who have been absent from us in other places for some time past, and in this way the losses by removal have been really greater than belongs properly to the year.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

Your Trustees, in presenting their report for the year 1884, regret to have to record a dificiency in the ordinary revenue of the year, arising from a decrease in the subscriptions, and from some exceptional expenditure during the year. The Treasurer's statement which will be submitted will give the details.

They have pleasure in announcing a further reduction in the Church Debt, from the Building Fund Union, of \$1,300.

The Church building has been well maintained during the year.

The new motor for the organ has been found to work satisfactorily.

The question of re-arranging the Choir-seats, either by raising them or by removal, has engaged the attention of the Trustees, but no definite plan has yet been decided upon.

The matter of Electric lighting, has also been under consideration, and the best available advice taken, which points to the prudence of further delay, until the systems of lighting by Electricity have made further progress. In the meantime, new lights have been placed in the pulpit, which it is hoped will be found to be an improvement

In accordance with the Act of Incorporation, the following members of the Board retire this year:—Dr. Cornish, and Messrs. Porteous, and Walker,

TRUSTEES' FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

The trustees in presenting their annual statement, regret exceedingly to have to say, that the expenditure for the year 1884, has exceeded the income by about \$1000. The year commenced with an addition to the number of contributors, and the trustees felt encouraged to undertake the much-needed additions, of an organ-motor, and a new furnace, also improvements in the basement of the building: the total amount thus expended, and the payments of the special tax levied by the city on account of Dominion Square make up the \$1000, now deficient.

Unfortunately, notwithstanding the increased number of subscribers, the amount contributed has fallen off to a smaller figure than we have known since 1876. Appended hereto, is a statement showing the average contributions for the past ten years, and it will be noticed from this state ment, that in

1875,-10 years ago-66 contributors averaged nearly \$100 each.

1879,-5 " " 103 " " " 70 " while 1884,- 156 " " but 44 "

No doubt, commercial depression and losses, and also the many calls to assist the charitable institutions of the city, go far to account for this serious falling off in the revenue of the Church.

It will be an exceedingly pleasant result of this meeting, if this existing denciency of \$1000 can be cleared off and the eleventh year of the Church's history entered upon free of debt as to current expenses; and if this is accomplished, the new Board of Trustees will no doubt be careful to mainain that happy condition of things. The Treasurer's statement shows a balance from 1883 of \$16.75. Contributions for the year \$6,956.07. Hymn books sold, etc., \$13.75; making a total of \$6,986.57. The expenditure amounts to \$7,683.48, leaving a balance due the treasurer of \$696.91 and outstanding accounts still to be paid of \$309, making a total deficiency of \$1,005.91.

REPORT OF THE YOUNG LADIES' MISSION SOCIETY.

As we review the year which has just passed away, we feel that, though we have not increased in numbers as we could have wished, we may look back with pleasure on what has been done, and forward with hope to a more prosperous and useful future. We feel that the interest in our work is growing, and we hope it will continue to do so, till every young lady in our Church shall join us. When our meetings began in October, after the summer holidays, we began a new branch of mission work, which we had only spoken of in the Spring. Miss Grace Lyman courageously went about trying to get up a class for the Chinese now living in our city. She visited all the laundries and invited the men to come on Sunday afternoon and be taught. Mr. Budge kindly placed one of the rooms of the Y.M.C.A. at our disposal and there a most interesting class meets every Sunday.

There are eleven young ladies enlisted in this Mission and the same number of Chinese come, and seem to appreciate the instruction they receive. Some of them are almost entirely ignorant of our language and there are many difficulties to be met, but, as a rule, the men are intelligent and all are respectful and grateful, so that the teachers feel repaid for their trouble, and we hope that the good seed thus sown may not be without fruit. We promised at the beginning of the year to raise the sum of twenty-five dollars to support a scholar in Mrs. Winsor's school in North India. We have just sent it away to the Am. Board, and are glad that we have been able to do so, though we feel it to be a very small sum. It has been obtained by the orders for work which some of the ladies of the Church have given us, by subscriptions from the members, and by a collection taken up at one of the Meetings of the Young People's Association, when Prof. Penhallow gave a very interesting lecture on "Japanese Customs and Curiosities."

We regret that owing to her continued absence from the City, our President, Miss Wilkes, has had to withdraw, our Secretary and Treasurer have also left us, so we begin the year with new officers.

Miss Lily Lyman has been elected President, and Miss Grafton Sec-Treasurer.

We hope in this new year to be able to have a Young Ladies' Prayermeeting connected with our other meetings, and invite all the young ladies of the Church and congregation to join. We have also some home mission work in prospect in working on clothes for a poor family in the City.

LABRADOR MISSION.

Several sums have been received, but considerably more will be needed to meet the requirements of the Mission. Contributions will be asked for in February as usual, and a liberal response is earnestly hoped for.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PSALMODY.

Your committee have nothing special to report in their department of church-service during the past year.

The choir-practices have been regularly held with a fair attendance except during the summer months. The great desire of your committee has been to promote congregational singing, they believe that their efforts have been acceptable to the Church, and that an improvement has been made.

In October last the services of Mr. R. A. Becket were secured, a gentleman in every way qualified for the position of teacher, and to whose care and efficiency is largely due the improved condition of the Choir.

The thanks of the committee are due to the members of the Choir, for their attendance and careful attention during the past year.

They would recommend to their successors in office that they make an extra effort to induce more members of the Church to become members of the Choir Your Committee beg to tender their thanks to the trustees for the kind and prompt manner in which they considered and acted on the suggestions of last year regarding a motor, and their readiness to meet the views of the committee, as far as it was in their power. Since the introduction of the motor a great anxiety and annoyance has been avoided, and the tone of the organ appears to much better advantage.

They take pleasure in recommending the re-appointment of Mr. A.C. Lyman as organist for the year 1885.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL.

The number attending the Sunday School during the past year has been larger than preceding years. Sickness has been prevalent, interfering for the past two months with the regular attendance of some in the younger classes. One death has occurred during the year, that of Eva Leet, aged 8 years, which took place in December last. Though young in years, she was a devoted Christian; her delight in the Sunday School and affection for her teacher showed itself not merely by a very regular attendance at the School, but in coming to her teacher with lessons always well prepared and in bringing others to the Sunday School. In her sphere she was a little missionary; of her it may be truly said, "She hath done what she could."

To contribute to the efficiency of the School, your Committee decided that a special effort should be made to add to the Library. In the previous year a number of books, which had been in the Library since the organization of the School, and which had been read by the scholars, were given to a Congregational Sunday School in Waterville, Que.; this year a further number were selected from the Library, and through the hands of one of our teachers were sent to a mission Sunday School. It is needless to say these donations were received by the Schools with gratitude.

A Library Committee selected 84 volumes, which were added to the Library; these, with the books retained in the Library, have been all recovered and re-numbered, and a new catalogue has been printed and distributed among the scholars. In addition, a separate Library was also selected, specially for the Primary class, to be under the direction of the

teacher of that class. The expense of these additions, with the printing of catalogues, etc., amounted to \$109.70, and to meet this expenditure the Church kindly made a special collection, which amounted to \$79.15.

Your Committee suggest that additions of 50 vols. be made from time to time, and with this end in view they recommend that a special Library Committee be appointed annually by the General Committee. The additions alluded to have stimulated to greater interest in the Library than heretofore.

Much interest has been manifested in Missions during the year just closed, and Missionary services have been held. Last spring the School was visited by the Rev. Mr. Winsor, Missionary from India, of the A. B. of C. for F. Missions, and the scholars by their vote agreed to collect \$25.00 towards the support of a scholar in one of the Schools directed by Mr. Winsor, and this amount they have collected. The sum of \$23.25 was also collected and remitted to the A. B. of C. for F. M. towards the building of the new steamer "Morning Star," which was built in the spring of the year and sailed for Honolulu last summer, commanded by Captain Bray.

The collections for Missions amount in all to \$127.83; add to this \$3.56 a balance from last year, and \$131.39 appears at the credit of Mission account. The sum of \$68.61 has also been collected for the Building Fund of the Church. These amounts added together, viz.:—

Such a sum shows the results of small amounts when regularly and systematically collected. May these littles be the instruments of great good.

Your Committee regret that Mrs. Chas. T. Williams has, in consequence of continued ill-health, and acting on medical advice, been obliged to relinquish charge of the Primary class. Your Committee sincerely trust that her absence from the School will be temporary; in this wish the scholars of her class heartily join. We cannot allow the opportunity to pass without bearing testimony to the continued devotion of Mrs. Williams to this important class, and the affection and respect of the little people for their teacher we are confident must be very gratifying to her.

In this connection we may state that, from this class, a number of new classes have been formed during the year.

The customary annual excursion of Church and School took place last June to Missisquoi Park.

The Sunday devotional meetings of teachers have been held monthly, as formerly, at the close of the School exercises.

To give a more cheerful and attractive appearance, a number of texts of Scripture, printed in illuminated letters, have been placed on the walls of the School-room.

Much attention has been given to improve the singing. It is hoped this enjoyable part of our service may prove a medium of blessing to teachers and scholars.

To contribute to a thorough preparation of the lessons of the School, the scholars have been supplied with the Scholars' International Handbook of Lessons, containing notes, explanations, etc., for the lessons of the year. These books are intended to assist the scholars, but are not supposed to take the place of careful preparation of the lessons at home.

There is still a felt want, viz., an adult Bible class. It may be here stated that at the request of some connected with the Church, Mr. Geo. Hogue has consented to conduct such a class, if one were organized. It remains for the Church to move in this direction.

It having been ascertained that a number of the Chinese resident in city were without religious instruction, it occurred to Miss Grace Lyman that a class might be formed for the purpose of supplying this instruction. Miss Lyman, with the co-operation of eleven young ladies connected with the Church and School, have organized and conducted such a class for some time past every Sunday afternoon at 4.30 o'clock. A teacher is alloted to each scholar. This mode of teaching is found necessary. A room for this special purpose has been kindly placed at the disposal of the young ladies by the Y. M. C. A. It is very gratifying to these young ladies to know that their efforts are appreciated by the Chinese, as shown by their regularity of attendance, their interest in the lessons and their degire to be taught.

In former years we have alluded to the changes in the school caused by teachers and scholars leaving the city. The year just closed has been no exception in this particular. These reflections should awaken all to renewed effort and faithfulness.

We are again indebted to the kindness of Prof. Penhallow for a most entertaining lecture, on the Manners and Customs of the Japanese, during which he exhibited a number of articles, both useful and ornamental, which he had brought with him from that distant land.

At the last meeting an open debate was held on Prohibition, the arguments pro and con were well sustained.

This winter's course was inaugurated by a public entertainment in the lecture-hall of the church. From the proceeds of this we were able to hand to Dr. Stevenson for the Congregational College the sum of \$21.02.

Our Association has now become a firmly-established institution, and is extending its usefulness in the Church by bringing the young people of the congregation more together and by giving them pleasant and instructive evenings.
