Belgians and Indians Hold Huns in Stiff Hand to Hand Fight

Germans Launching Heavy Attacks in Western Theatre But Gain Nothing—French Hurl Forces at Them in Blinding Snow Storm

Paris, March 9.—Night attacks in a blinding snowstorm, were delivered by French near Perthes in the Champagne district in an effort to roll back the Germans defending a railway line. The French were successful in taking a line of trenches, but German reserves rallied to the support of the advanced troops and the French were not able to advance beyond the German trenches which they had occupied.

Near St. Mihiel, in the Meuse Valley, the Germans lost some of their trenches through a surprise attack by the French. Some guns, small arms, ammunition, provisions and blankets were taken by the French.

In West Flanders the Germans delivered an attack in force against the Belgians and Indian troops holding a line of trenches among the dunes. The attack was launched on Sunday night, and the fighting lasted from nine o'clock till dawn. It was a picturesque battle upon the north coast with the roar of battle mingling with the reverberations of the sea. A hand-to-hand struggle went on fiercely beneath the fitful flare of burning gun-powder and the wavering rays of searchlights.

Several persons are reported to have been killed in the aerial raid over Ostend.

FAIL IN ATTACK ON ALLIES
New York, March 9.—A Rotterdam special to the London Daily Express and the New York Herald says:

The Germans made a heavy attack on the allies in the dunes on Sunday night. They began by a bombardment of the trenches at half past eight o'clock and followed this up by three infantry assaults. The fighting continued yesterday morning, but there was no indication that the Germans had gained the slightest headway as they repeatedly failed to recover trenches they had lost.

The Failure of German "Blockade" Shown Up By The Admiralty

London, March 9.—Fifteen British steamers sunk out of a total of 8,734 vessels of more than 300 tons, which arrived at British ports or departed from them, from January 21 to March 3, was the record achievement of German submarines, according to figures issued by the admiralty.

Vessels of all nationalities are taken into account excluding, however, those used by the admiralty for naval and military purposes. Twenty-nine members of the crews of the steamers torpedoed lost their lives.

The total number of vessels which arrived at British ports during this period was 4,619, while the number which departed was 4,115.

Twenty-five ships, the admiralty statement says, were unsuccessfully attacked between February 1 and March 5.

Paris, March 8.—The Journal today says that it understands the American reply to the French and British notes of March 1, concerning the blockade of Germany, has been received in Paris and London. Its contents are very much as already announced. It asks the French and British governments for detailed information as to their purposes and particularly what measures they propose to adopt to carry them out.

GREAT NUMBERS OF GERMAN WOUNDED
Paris, March 9.—Evidence given by prisoners is cited in a semi-official note issued by the War Office to prove that German losses in dead and wounded have been very heavy. It is said that one active regiment 6,000 men, lost 700 in an attack on February 16, while a regiment of chauffeurs had all its officers killed or wounded on January 8. The stretcher bearers of a field ambulance have said that every night for three weeks they brought in from 400 to 600 seriously wounded Germans.

Roumania Prepares
Bucharest, Roumania, March 9.—The Roumanian senate has adopted a bill empowering the government to proclaim martial law throughout the country, whenever it deems such a measure to be necessary.

An Illustrative Reserist
Montreal, March 9.—Among a batch of French reserists who left Montreal for New York was Emile Murat, great grandson of Napoleon, brother-in-law of Napoleon and King of Naples. Mr. Murat has been living at New, Alta.

RUSSIAN NAVY HAS STRUCK SEVERE BLOW AT TURKISH FLEET
Petrograd, March 9.—The Russian bombardment of Zungulidak, on the south shore of the Black Sea and the destruction of the docks there, as announced by the Russian naval authorities yesterday, constitute a serious blow to the Turkish fleet, since it is from this point that the Turks hitherto have drawn their chief supply of coal for the navy. Benderegi, forty miles to the west, which is another coaling port, also was damaged.

MORE MIGHTY BATTLESHIPS FROM BRITISH NAVY REACH DARDANELLES AND JOIN IN FIGHT

Irresistible and Majestic Now Help In Cannonading Turkish Forts

London, March 9.—Reinforcements have arrived in Turkish waters for the mighty Anglo-French fleet under Vice-Admiral Carden, which is trying to smash its way through the Dardanelles, according to information received here today from Athens. The dreadnoughts Irresistible and Majestic, two of the most powerful warships in the English navy, have joined the international fleet and they are now taking part in the terrific cannonade against the Turkish forts on the Dardanelles and the coast of Asia Minor. The Irresistible is an 18,000-ton ship mounting 12 inch guns and the Majestic, which is a 14,400-ton man-of-war, also mounts guns of 12 inch calibre.

Although official information states that the strong Dardanelles forts of Rumili Medjidieh Tabia, Hamidieh I and the Mount Dardanelles battery have been silenced, it also indicated that the fleet has not been able to penetrate the waterway for sixteen miles, as had been unofficially reported from Athens and Saloniki.

ALL STRUCK BUT NOT SERIOUSLY DAMAGED.
Although Vice Admiral Carden reports that practically all the ships which have been actively engaged in the operations have been struck by Turkish projectiles, the news that none of the warships had been seriously damaged was received with great joy both in and out of official circles. The slight damage to the ships and the lightness of the casualties form a remarkable feature of this mighty action, in which the cream of the British navy is engaged.

According to an unofficial telegram from Athens the double bombardment of the Turkish inner forts on the narrow of the Dardanelles has been resumed with renewed vigor, while the Zeppelin fleet under Sir Richard Pierce is standing off Smyrna ready to reopen the bombardment of that city.

Although struck by Turkish shells, the British superdreadnought Queen Elizabeth has not been damaged badly enough to cause a cessation of her fire. Some of her crew were wounded but none were killed.

THE UNITY OF THE ALLIES.
A despatch to the Morning Post from Petrograd says: "In order to emphasize the solidarity of the allied powers a striking departure from naval custom marked the entrance of the allied fleet into the Dardanelles. The Russian cruiser Askold was invited to take the Russian flag into the strait ahead of the other flags. The ordinary procedure would have been for the British flag to lead because the British force is the strongest and because the whole fleet is commanded by an Englishman."

INVESTIGATING FIRE ON LA TOURNAINE
Passengers All Safely Landed at Havre Yesterday
Havre, March 9.—A rigid inquiry has been begun into all phases of the fire at sea aboard the French liner La Tournaise, which docked here yesterday afternoon, and landed safely all her passengers.

The fire, which was confined to one of the holds, was extinguished at midnight on Sunday.

"Believing that a large part of the cargo might take fire, and finding we were not able to deal with it easily," said Captain Cassoux, "I decided to send out a call for aid. Meanwhile through holes made in the partitions we obtained a view of the fire, which then was attacked with jets of water and steam. On Sunday morning we had mastered the blaze and the danger was past."

The ship shows no external sign of the fire. It was admitted that military supplies were included in the cargo which was threatened.

Here's What Is Meant By "Sublime Porte"—Palace Gateway from Which The Turkish Government Takes Name



The "Sublime Porte," or high gate of the Turkish governmental palace in Constantinople, from which has originated the term "Sublime Porte" meaning the Turkish government. Formerly the highest officer of the government sat within the gate and public business was transacted there. The term "Sublime Porte" became synonymous with the whole of the sultan's cabinet, or Turkish government.

United States Sends Warships to Mexico To Warn Carranza

Decided Change in Relation to Affairs in The Troubled Republic—He Must Treat Foreigners Differently

Washington, March 9.—American warships were being despatched to Mexican waters today as the latest move on the part of the American government in the Mexican crisis. This action, officials hoped, would bring assurance from General Carranza that conditions in Mexico City, which have become acute, would be ameliorated.

After a conference early today with President Wilson, Secretary Daniels ordered two battleships of the Atlantic fleet from Guantanamo to Vera Cruz.

The sending of war vessels followed vigorous representations to General Carranza recommending prompt improvement in conditions as affecting foreigners and their interests in Mexican territory under his control. Failure to comply, he was warned, would be followed by such action as the American government thought necessary to obtain the desired protection. It was confidently expected today that the latest steps taken by the American government would cause a change in the attitude of General Carranza towards foreigners.

Another Takes Up Task in Greece; Bulgarian Situation a Parallel

Athens, March 9.—M. Gounaris, deputy for Patras, has consented at the request of King Constantine, to undertake the task of forming a new cabinet. It is reported that M. Eudadjis, who was foreign minister in the Tsoukalis cabinet, has consented to take that portfolio.

M. Gounaris will submit his list of ministers to the king tomorrow. It is understood to contain an agreement that the chamber shall be dissolved if the supporters of the ministry are in the minority, which is considered highly probable. The new premier is expected to favor the continued neutrality of Greece.

ALSO IN BULGARIA
Paris, March 9.—A crisis similar to that in Greece has occurred in Bulgaria, according to information reaching Paris in special despatches. Premier Radoslaoff is reported to have been overthrown by the influence of King Ferdinand and the followers of Dr. Chrenedeff, former foreign minister, because he desired to take immediate action against Turkey by occupying Adrianople.

RUINED BY WAR; LEAPS TO DEATH

Los Angeles Man Plunges From Hotel Roof—Leaves Wife \$10,000 Insurance

Los Angeles, Cal., March 9.—Letters left by John H. Reid, former manager of a British oil company, who jumped 150 feet to his death yesterday from a hotel roof show that he chose that means to assure his wife a competence through a \$10,000 life insurance policy.

For the second time war had wrecked Reid financially. First the Mexican strife and then the European conflict swept away his investments. Before taking the leap he selected a coffin and a burial plot.

YOUNG SOLDIER IS CHARGED WITH KILLING COMRADE IN ONTARIO
St. Catharines, Ont., March 9.—The grand jury today is considering the case of Frank Hartley, a young soldier charged with the killing of Theodore Burgoyne, his comrade, on the canal guard post of a prominent family in this city. Witnesses will testify that Hartley last summer, after being reprimanded for being late remarked to Burgoyne while several of the soldiers were talking together: "I've a notion to shoot you," and without any further paucity, raised his rifle and shot Burgoyne dead. Hartley says he is an Englishman, but further than that he refuses to give any particulars as to himself and some think he belongs to a prominent family.

Quebec, March 9.—Private Willis, of the 8th Royal Rifles, was accidentally shot in the arm last night, while doing post duty near the Ross rifle factory on the Plains of Abraham. His own rifle did it.

Winnipeg, March 9.—It is said that a big flour mill has closed an order from the government of Greece for 40,000 barrels of flour.

A special train from Gagetown this morning brought 100 passengers. As only one car was provided the men in the party had to stand.



A NOTABLE ADDRESS

While Mr. Adams was able last evening to congratulate the citizens of St. John on the fact that this is one of the first Canadian cities to take practical steps toward town-planning, it cannot be denied that several of the pictures thrown on the screen, showing the least desirable housing conditions, were pictures taken in St. John.

Perhaps the most valuable feature of such Sunday afternoon gatherings is their bringing together on common ground of different races and different creeds from almost every walk in life. Those who were instrumental in starting the People's Forum idea in Winnipeg built even better than they knew.

While the assembly hall of the high school building was not nearly filled last evening, there was an attendance large enough to be very encouraging to those who desire to see a town-planning scheme or schemes adopted.

TOWN PLANNING

The town planning commission of St. John will ask the legislature to approve of the limits of an area to be comprised in the scheme for a Greater St. John. This is the first step toward town planning, and the first it has been taken since.

Mr. Thomas Adams describes the three-story wooden tenement as a fire trap, the erection of which should be discouraged. After St. John has suffered from a serious fire there will be doubtless a more general agreement with the views of Mr. Adams on this point.

The captain of an Atlantic liner which arrived at Halifax yesterday says that the talk of German blockade of British waters "is all buncombe." It is not even necessary for steamers to follow a prescribed course to and from the port of Liverpool, and other ports on the west coast.

There are entirely too many soldiers under the influence of liquor on the streets of St. John every night. If certain men have respect for the king's uniform or for themselves, is there nothing the authorities can do about it? It is quite true that only a very small percentage of the men assembled at the army and exhibition building forget themselves in this way, but their conduct has a tendency to discredit the whole battalion.

THE PUBLIC FORUM

The Times has more than once suggested that the establishment of a People's Forum in St. John for the discussion of local problems would be of benefit. They have at least two such forums in Winnipeg.

"Winnipeg's school buildings are more and more contributing to community service. Parents' conferences, popular educational lectures, as well as weekly forum and institute meetings, are recent developments that promise much of public good."

Canadian Finance gives a report of a recent Sunday afternoon meeting of the People's Forum in one of the school buildings, in which the relation of economic problems to health and disease was discussed.

BULK OF VACANT LANDS HELD BY 27 PERSONS

In a supplementary report on the vacant lands in the city, submitted yesterday by S. K. Smith, it is shown that the bulk of the vacant lands in the city are held by twenty-seven persons or estates, this being the number of holders of idle lands valued at \$5,000 or more each.

It is somewhat surprising to find that the largest assessment on vacant land is paid by T. McAvity & Sons, Ltd., for their block on Marsh road, Victoria ward, purchased for bona fide manufacturing purposes. T. L. Morrissey with G. O. D. Oddy as a partner in some of the lots, is the second largest taxpayer on vacant land, paying an \$88,700 for the block opposite the customs house. The Turnbull Real Estate Company, owning 550 acres in Stanley ward, is third with \$87,850; the Hazen estates, including R. M. and Sarah Hazen, Johanna I. Street, Margaret Hansard and Sarah J. Fridick, grouped together, stand fourth in the list with \$86,250 on 92 lots in Kings and the North End wards, besides 107 acres; and Hon. J. Douglas Hazen is the fifth largest owner of vacant land, paying on \$27,800 for 48 lots and 95 acres, mostly in Kings and the North End wards.

GOLD NEAR SASKATOON

Saskatoon, Sask., March 9.—Last year, some prospecting work was done in the Beaver Lake district, about 200 miles northeast of here. This at least resulted in demonstrating the futility of one of its promises. Only the other day, however, came news of other two finds adjacent to the route of the new Hudson Bay Railway now under construction, the one being at Herbiak and the other at Wintering Lake. The latter discovery is said to be a placer, and eight small nuggets were brought into the East on 17th inst. Further information is awaited with interest. Old timers confidently predict important gold developments to the north. In the early days, they say, Indians frequently brought in quartz containing free gold in considerable quantities, and occasionally small nuggets; but as there was then no railway north of the original main line of the C.P.R., the remoteness of the source of such samples robbed the proposition of its lure.

"Pivot Steps and Glides Chief Motions in Aeroplane Waltz," Says Joan Sawyer

(Famous Dance Director of New York's Persian Garden)

The aeroplane waltz is not necessarily a professional dance. Smoothness of motion, grace and, above all, alertness are necessary in this dance, which portrays the motions of an albatross in flight. The waltz step is the basic step in the aeroplane dance, and, though there are many "whirls" and pivot steps, the glide and the swirling movement are the characteristic steps of the "aeroplane." The criss-cross, the double tap, the backward spiral, the wing and the lame duck are some of the steps that tax the agility and certainty of movement in the dance—a shaky, uncertain step spells failure in the aeroplane waltz. From the "lame duck," which is a typical step in this dance, to the sweeping courtesy, with which it ends, the dance of the aeroplane is one of the most graceful, as well as one of the most original of the many new dances.

Spring Time Brings Flies—Begin Now on Extermination!

A Fly's Autobiography (Spring brings flies. Flies convey disease—kill human beings—especially babies. Kill the flies.) The first thing I remember is before I had any legs or wings and was wiggling and squirming in a nice warm bed of stable filth, where I spent my time eating and drinking the food about me. "After a while I began to feel uncomfortable and found that I had grown too big for my skin. Relief came soon and my skin came off, and I ate some more manure and enjoyed it. Wet things are very pleasant for a time, but my feet get covered with little pieces of food and things that wiggle around and tickle me so I like to wipe them off on a nice white napkin or tablecloth, and then I get around here. "While I was enjoying the sun I smelled the most delightful smell that had ever come to me. It came from an open window, so in I flew. Things were smoking on a stove and a woman was mixing up some soft white stuff on a table. There were a lot of other flies about, and one that was too busy eating to see his danger got rolled up in the dough and I never saw him again. So I was careful and flew in and out and got a mouthful each time. I got rid of some more filth there, too, for the dough was sticky and pulled it off my feet. "Nearby there was a bowl of milk which smelled good, so I flew over and took a drink. Here I nearly lost my life, and if I had not been young and active, I am sure I would never have escaped. "Several of us were drinking when the woman suddenly put out her hand in our direction, and we all made a jump. "I got hit and fell right in the middle. She hit me, too, but I landed near the edge and struggled out and flew away, but she caught the other two and pinched them and threw them on the floor, and went on mixing her dough, apparently without a thought of what she had killed two of my companions." Avoid overeating and keep the bowels open. 6. Take a moderate amount of brisk exercise in the outdoor air daily. 7. Avoid dust and other irritating substances of the upper air passages.



THE FUNNIEST PLAY I EVER SAW

In Which an Umpire Slides Home, Then Runs For His Life

I believe the funniest thing I ever saw on a baseball field was soon after I started out in the old Indiana and Illinois league in 1910. There was an umpire named McLoughlin (not Slik) who was a wonder. He used to write letters to himself telling what a great umpire he was, and he always was recommending players to big league managers and showing the players what he had written. You may imagine how popular he was with us.

One day we were playing in Danville, Ill., and McLoughlin appeared on the field in his uniform and a linen duster. We asked him the reason for the duster and he said he was going to revolutionize umpiring and the game itself and that he never again would miss a decision on a close play. He was vague about how the linen duster was going to accomplish these things, but felt certain of it.

In the sixth inning the score was a tie, Danville at bat, one out and a runner on third when the batter hit one down to short and the man on third started home. McLoughlin was behind the pitcher and when the runner started home Mac started after him, gaining at every jump, with his duster flapping out behind. The runner slid to the plate and Mac slid after him, and after sliding across the plate, yelled:

"You're out," although the runner was safe a mile.

The spectacle of an umpire in a linen duster sliding home and then making the worst decision possible was too much for the crowd, and the last we ever saw of McLoughlin was when he disappeared down the street, his duster flapping behind him and the mob chasing him toward town.

While many stories have been told about the city of late concerning the actions of soldiers here under the influence of drink, it is safe to say that not all are true and it is pleasing to be able to record one such instance at least.

He is about thirty six years of age and has been identified with the 12th Field Battery for the last five years. His father is a cousin of Dr. J. B. Crocker of Fredericton.

FIFTEEN FROM THE 71st

Fifteen officers of the 71st York York Regiment are now on active service. The latest appointments of the regiment with the overseas forces are Capt. H. P. G. Woodbridge of Fredericton, and Lieutenant F. A. Kirkpatrick of St. John, who have been provisionally appointed officers of the 58th Battalion, making three 71st Regiment officers to complete this battalion. The other officers are Capt. W. J. Major James Pringle, quartermaster of the 26th Battalion is the only 71st officer with the second contingent, and Captain Osborne, and Lieut. Kirkpatrick are the officers with the third.

POLICE COURT

Arthur Emery, who was arrested yesterday in the North Side of King Square on a charge of drunkenness and using profane and obscene language, was fined \$2 or six months in jail by Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning.

Six men arrested on drunkenness charges were fined \$3 or two months in jail.

NOT HEARD FROM SINCE YEAR 1907

J. D. Rankine, Formerly of North End, Regarded as Dead and Estate is Probated

In the probate court today Judge Armstrong took up the matter of the estate of James Donald Rankine, late of Medicine Hat, Alberta, railway employe. He was a son of Alexander Rankine, formerly of North End, lumber merchant now residing in London. The wife, Lettie Rankine, of Medicine Hat, presents a petition setting forth that she and her husband and children formerly lived in Vancouver, but that in 1906, the climate of Vancouver being too damp for the children, she moved to Medicine Hat. The husband subsequently obtained employment in a lumber mill owned by Harry Richardson at Summerside in the Okanagan District, B. C. She says that in August, 1907, in response to advice being sent him by his wife as to the serious illness of one of his children, who subsequently died, he went to his home in Medicine Hat, remained there for a short time and then returned to the Okanagan District, leaving there in November, 1907, and has not since been heard from, though every enquiry and effort has been made to find him.

Under these circumstances the court presumes that James Donald Rankine is dead, and on the petition of the widow, letters of administration were issued to John C. Belyea of St. John, barrister-at-law. There is no real estate, personally, which consists of the decedent's share in the proceeds of the sale of his homestead next to St. Luke's church in Main street, St. John, nearly \$2,000. J. Roy Campbell, K.C., is proctor.

In the matter of John Donald Rankine and Gerald Christfield Rankine, infants, only children of James Donald Rankine, and entitled between them to two-thirds of the estate of their father, or about \$600 each, on the petition of the infants, joined by their mother, John C. Belyea of St. John, barrister-at-law, was appointed guardian of their estates. J. Roy Campbell, K.C., is proctor.

In the probate court today the will of George Seely, late of Millville, trader, was proved. He gives to his grandson, Walter Samuel White, who, however, died before him, the sum of \$20, the rest of his estate to his wife, Catherine Seely, whom he nominates as executrix. She was accordingly sworn in as such. There is no real estate, personally, including household lot and house in Millville, valued at \$1,400. Messrs. MacRae, Sinclair & MacRae are proctors.

BASEBALL WHISPERS ARE HEARD IN FAIRVILLE

Carleton and Perhaps North End Team in the League—Some Players to the War

Now that the days are lengthening, and the ground drying, the fans are again thinking of baseball and plans for the season of 1915. Last spring the great mistake of the local organization was a late start; consequently, when good pitchers and outfield men were wanted, they had already signed with some city team. This year advantage should be taken of last season's experience.

The Royals are now getting ready, and if the others who are thinking of getting in line want the best material, now is the time to do the scouting and sign contracts.


