THOUSANDS WOULD ATTEND SERVICE

Flood of Applications For Admission to Abbey

FUNERAL OF STRATHCONA

Body to Be Taken Past Offices Where He Did So Much For Dominion—Perceives Include Two Canadians

(Special to Times.) London, Jan. 24.—The route of the funeral procession in the absence of Lord Strathcona, Monday from Grosvenor Square to Westminster Abbey will be by way of Victoria street so that the body will be taken past the offices where the late high commissioner labored so strenuously and faithfully in the interests of Canada. As the offices of the sister dominions are on the same street, they will be able also to participate in a silent salute as the cortege passes. Application for seats in the abbey are pouring in by thousands and it will prove a difficult task for Secretary Griffith to allot places to the members of his staff and all those whose prominence in Canadian and imperial affairs would seem to entitle them to consideration. Letters with tickets enclosed were being despatched all day yesterday, and the staff of the high commissioner's office will probably be kept busy today until nightfall in making out passes and completing other arrangements for the funeral. The Pall Mall Gazette expresses satisfaction that it has been decided to hold the funeral in the abbey, pointing out that the funeral will not be merely a memorial service, but that the body of a venerable servant of the empire will actually lie within the hallowed walls while words of comfort and hope are being sung over it.

The Westminster Gazette says that the special remainder ensuring the succession of the late peer's daughter, in addition to which there are several female holders of Scottish peerages. ENGLISHMAN BUYS FARM ON THE RIVER; THE PROVINCE POLICY

R. W. D. Sanford, of Hampshire, England, has purchased from W. W. Corfield the Crab farm of 200 acres at Victoria Landing on the St. John river. He has been several weeks looking over the province and has decided to settle here and undertake general farming. Mr. Corfield said this morning that they had eight or ten other English farmers coming out to settle in this province in the spring. "We have brought out about seventy-five settlers so far," he added, "and all of them have been supplied with at least sufficient capital to go in for farming on a scale which will enable them to command success." Speaking of the provincial government's policy in connection with the farm settlement act he said that it had resulted largely in bringing out farm laborers and settling them on some of the poorest land in the province as they do not need cheap farms. If the men are not skilled farmers, if they located on poor land and had not sufficient capital to work it properly he did not see how the experiment could be satisfactory and he was afraid that these men might become discouraged and send home reports that would not be a desirable advertisement for New Brunswick.

MONDAY'S COUNCIL

EXTRA PAY TO GET HIS PLANS PUT THROUGH

Evidence of Contractor in Inquiry Into Toronto Architect's Department

Toronto, Jan. 24.—At the judicial inquiry into the city architect's department held yesterday by Wm. NEARLY 5,000 ARE VACCINATED

Smallpox Breaks Out Among the Mexicans Interned at Fort Bliss

El Paso, Texas, Jan. 24.—Several cases of smallpox were discovered among Mexicans interned with the federal soldiers and refugees from Ojinaga, Mexico, at Fort Bliss today. The 4,900 or more Mexicans were ordered vaccinated. Physicians said there was no danger of an epidemic. The patients were isolated.

COULD PAY FINE IF HE WERE GIVEN THE TIME TO EARN IT

"We run no accounts here," said Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning, when William Sheridan, of Scotland, asked to be given a month in which to pay the cost of his last night's revelry. "Our business here," continued the Magistrate, "is generally cash business, but if you insist on having 'time,' I suppose we could let you serve two or three months." Sheridan was arrested on charge of being drunk and deliberately breaking a window in the Victoria restaurant in Mill street. He pleaded guilty to drunkenness but said he did not remember anything about the window. Sheridan was asked if he could pay his fine and said he could if he were given a month in which to earn it.

REVOLT IN HAITI GROWS

Cape Haitien, Haiti, Jan. 24.—A general revolt has broken out in the city of Gonaives. The leader is Oreste Zamour, former governor. The city is only 65 miles from Port Au Prince, the capital. General Desormes, who yesterday at the head of rebel forces took Cape Haitien and Fort Liberté, is marching with his army today on Hinche, forty-five miles southeast of Cape Haitien.

THE DREDGES

It is expected that one more day's work will complete the preparations for the lifting of the dredger Leontide at the entrance to Courtenay Bay. Six wire cables have already been placed under the dredge, but there are two more yet to be placed, as well as two or three chain cables. The first attempt to lift the dredge will likely be made next week. The broken turret and part of the lifting of the dredger Leontide at the entrance to Courtenay Bay have been recovered and brought up into the harbor, but have not yet been brought aboard water.

SAYS THAT MR. HIPWELL DID SO QUOTE PREMIER FLEMING RE POLICE CHIEF

J. King Kelley Says Remark Made To Him

REPORT OF CONVERSATION

Statements by David Hipwell, Commissioner McLellan and Very Direct Letter on the Subject From Mr. Kelley Are Features Today in Matter of Interest

(Canadian Press) Montreal, Que., Jan. 23.—William Campbell, a negro, was hanged at eight o'clock this morning for the murder of George Muir near Montreal West, on August 1st last. Exciting moves were made to save his life, up to almost the last minute, and the condemned man's chances for a reprieve seemed good last evening. Late yesterday afternoon W. M. Cooper, Campbell's attorney, unearthed a new witness in the person of Annie Jackson, who swore out an affidavit to the effect that she had seen Campbell in the city not only on the day before the murder, but also on the afternoon that the crime was committed. If substantiated, this would have formed a complete alibi for Campbell.

All boys of the city are to be given the privilege of learning to swim free of charge. Such is the good news handed out by the physical department of the Y. M. C. A. It was decided on a meeting last evening. The Y. M. C. A. have secured the services of W. L. Harvey, of Cambridge, Mass., an expert, who holds fourth place in the New England championship sports, and has a record for saving several lives. F. A. Dyleman presided at the meeting last evening. It was decided to allow all boys eleven years of age or upwards who are attending school to take advantage of this offer, whether they are members of the institution or not. Working boys will be given an opportunity of taking the lessons in the evening.

MURDERER HANGED; POLICE HAVE ANOTHER KILLING CASE NOW TO WORK UPON

Efforts up to Last Minute to Save Campbell in Montreal—Body of Man, Head Battered With Hammer, is Found

(Canadian Press) Montreal, Jan. 24.—With his face horribly cut, and mutilated, the dead body of John Williams, a man armed man of about thirty years of age, was found at the foot of a flight of stairs in a Polish boarding house in Craig street west late last night. A heavy carpenter's hammer on the floor, believed by Detectives Tierney and Beachamp, to be the weapon which caused his death. Edward Quinn and two Poles are being held in connection with the supposed murder. It is the belief of the detectives that Williams was murdered and thrown down the steps.

FORTY-TWO DEGREE RISE IN THE GLASS

Big Jump by Mercury in Twenty-Four Hours

After remaining well below the freezing point without any great variation since the first of the year, the mercury yesterday developed a rather frisky strain and within twenty-four hours had jumped forty-two degrees. From one below yesterday morning about nine o'clock the mercury climbed until the morning of the same hour it registered forty-one above. With the recent fall of snow, this morning's thaw made walking disagreeable. The probabilities say mild weather, with rain or snow tomorrow, getting colder towards night.

MARBLE COVE SEWER WORK HAS BEEN BEGUN

Gives Winter Employment and Also Helps The Department

A start was made this week on the excavation for the Marble Cove sewer from the rear of Clarendon street to the Indian town wharf. At present the work is confined to the rock cut in the middle of the route to be covered. This work can be carried on almost as well during the winter as in the summer, and the progress made these months will advance the project considerably.

BOYS BEFORE COURT

"Tell me your company, and I will tell you mine," said Magistrate Ritchie today, to a boy in the juvenile court. He and four other boys were reported for behaving in a disorderly manner in Sheriff street. The boy said he was only standing on the corner and had not taken any part in the rowdiness. Of the five boys, three pleaded guilty. Policeman Briggs said that there were fifteen in the crowd. He has been able to get the names of the five. He said they were throwing snow, shouting and acting in a very disorderly manner. The magistrate remarked that the parents of children in St. John neglect their children and have little or no control over them and that consequently the children have no respect for their parents. The boys were fined \$8 each, but after receiving a severe lecture were allowed to go with their parents.

Norfolk, Va., 24.—Mrs. Finley J. Shepard, who was Miss Helen Gould, has given \$35,000 for the enlargement of the Army Y. M. C. A. at Fort Munro, Va. She gave the original building. Yesterday was the coldest day in southern England since Feb. 5, 1912.

SLEEP OUT DOORS AT JORDAN SANITARIUM

Patients Grow to Like it. Even With Mercury Much Below Zero

Twenty three patients are enjoying the fresh air cure at the Jordan Memorial Sanitarium at River Glade; "enjoying" it in spite of the fact that since the first of the year until today the thermometer has ranged from three to thirty degrees below zero. Dr. David Townsend, superintendent of the sanitarium, who is in the city today said that the patients have insisted on sleeping outdoors even in the most severe weather. Once they begin to get used to it they do not mind the cold and find the fresh air in the open pleasanter than a warmer temperature inside. Doctor Townsend was returning from St. Stephen where he examined some applicants for admission.

SPELLMAN AGAIN DECLINES TO TESTIFY

Once More Sent to Jail to Spend Another Seven Days

Thomas Spellman, today again refused to give evidence against Cornelius McHugh, charged with allowing him on his liquid premises on or about October 1, for the first time. When Mr. McHugh was summoned to court, however, on December 27 Spellman refused to give evidence which he had already told Chief Clark and he was accordingly sent to jail for seven days or until he should decide to give evidence. He has been brought up on each Saturday since then. This morning he was asked if he still refused to give any evidence pertaining to the guilt or innocence of the bar tender. Spellman again replied that he would not answer these questions. Spellman was again sent back to jail for seven days.

MacRae, who appeared for the prisoner, said he had been working as a sub-contractor on the Avley railway at Gagetown and that he needed a revolver to keep his men in order.

DEFENDS THE CASE

Michael Byrne, arrested a few days ago on a charge of drunkenness, pleaded not guilty at the time and was remanded until this morning when Policeman Howard, who made the arrest, appeared to give evidence. The policeman said that on complaint of the man's little girl, he had gone into the prisoner's house in Market Place, West St. John, to quell a disturbance he was creating. He said the prisoner was cursing and swearing and beating his wife. Policeman Howard said he did not arrest the man then, after he got him quieted, but when the man came out in the street a short time afterwards and made himself objectionable to the public he placed him under arrest. The prisoner was remanded.

THE ALSATIAN IS AT HALIFAX

Maiden Voyage of Fine New Allan Liner

BROUGHT 386 PASSENGERS

Hon. Geo. E. Foster Was One—Hard Weather For First Trip—Alfred Dickens Died On Passage

(Special to Times) Halifax, N. S., Jan. 24.—The magnificent Allan Liner Alsatian arrived from Liverpool at 4:30 o'clock this morning on her maiden trip. In point of excellence and speed the Alsatian excels any trans-Atlantic steamer yet to enter a Canadian port. The time occupied in making the trip cannot be taken as a fair indication of her speed, because from the time she left Liverpool until approaching Halifax, weather conditions were very unfavorable. The Alsatian is capable of developing twenty knots. She sailed from Liverpool at 3:55 p.m. on January 17 (last Saturday), and arrived off the harbor this morning at 4:30, berthing at the North End terminals at eight o'clock. Her daily runs, beginning Sunday were: 364, 447, 418, 292, 325, 380 and 305, a total of 2,601 miles. The passengers, totalling 386, disembarked here, as the giant liner will remain here until next Saturday. During the early part of next week a big reception will be held. Representatives of the Allan Line from Montreal and Boston will attend, besides civic officials. Eight hundred invitations have already been issued. Among the passengers on the Alsatian were: Hon. G. E. Foster. He will likely leave for Ottawa tonight. Major General D. D. O'Brien, manager of the C. P. R. Steamship Line, who is en route to Vancouver was among the passengers. One death occurred on board during the passage, that of Alfred Dickens, en route to Alberta.

ANOTHER LOCAL "HEAD TAX" CASE

Newcomer Gets Work, Then Laid Off Because Non Union—Takes Ticket, Gets No More Work and is Asked For \$5 by City

St. John, N. B., Jan. 23. Sir—Allow me a little space in your valuable paper in regard to the so-called head tax. I was born in the city of London, England, and hearing so much about the boom in St. John, and it being the best city in Canada for the laboring man, I thought I would pack up my belongings and make St. John my future home.

When I arrived in your city I found work to be scarce, and after looking around for a day or so I was informed that I could find plenty of work at the winter port, so I headed my way for the docks, and managed to get a job on the C. P. R. but had worked only one hour when a man came along and asked me for my union ticket, so I explained my position, being a stranger in a strange land, and if given a chance I would get a ticket.

But this would not do, I was laid off and another man put in my place. My next start was to purchase a ticket which I did, and I have not struck a blow since. The next thing on the program was I was stopped by a sergeant of the police whose chief duty seems to be chasing the working man around for a head tax, who demanded \$5 from me before I could work in the city, making a total of \$11 before getting any work at all.

New Mr. Editor, I think it is time that something was done to better the condition of working men coming to St. John, and I think our good friend Commissioner McLellan ought to find an easier job for Sergeant Finlay with less pay, than climbing about on elevators and conveyors looking for head taxes for the sake of the seventy-five cents commission, when he is paid a good salary by the citizens to do police duty.

## Daily Hints For the Cook

New Devil Cake  
 One cup of sugar, 1/2 cup of butter (creamed), 1 egg, 1/2 cup of milk, 1 3/4 cups of sifted pastry flour, 1 teaspoon of baking powder, 1 teaspoon of Vanilla, 1/4 square of chocolate, scant 1/2 teaspoonful of soda. Shave chocolate fine, add scant 1/2 cup boiling water. To this add soda, beat until thick and add to the cake. Bake in angel cake pan. Frost with any favorite frosting. Bake the day you wish to use it. It calls for baking powder and soda which is correct.

Cocoa Cake  
 Cream 1/2 cup butter and 1 cup sugar, add beaten yolks of 2 eggs and beat well; mix 1 1/2 cups flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder and 2 teaspoons of cocoa thoroughly. Beat whites of eggs stiff, measure 1/2 cup milk and then add a little milk and flour mixture, alternately to the egg mixture. To this add whites of eggs and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Bake in shallow pan about 20 minutes and frost with the following:  
 Plain Cocoa Frosting—Mix 1/2 teaspoon cocoa with 1 cup powdered sugar and 1 tablespoon lemon juice and 1 tablespoon boiling water, or enough to mix the sugar into a paste. That settles to a level the moment you stop stirring. Spread at once on hot cake.

LIARS AND THINGS

It is quite useless for a newspaper which has any regard for the truth or the decencies of discussion to attempt to discuss any matter with the St. John Standard. The latter has falsely charged The Times with saying what it did not say, and implying what it did not imply.

Mr. Hazen's remark is worthy of the same contempt which is felt by the citizens of St. John toward his conduct in the matter of the Gutelius agreement, and his failure to rise in his place in parliament to defend the port of St. John against the slanders which have been published.

The Times has only made two charges in connection with this matter. The first is that The Standard misrepresented the board of trade and its president, by conveying to the public the impression that they were taking no action to defend the reputation of the port of St. John and the Bay of Fundy.

If the labor unions put a candidate in the field in the coming civic elections, and several other candidates who are mentioned should also be in the field, the campaign will develop a good deal of interest.

Senator Daniel favors a senate independent of both parties. The independence of Dr. Daniel has not been strongly enough in evidence thus far to indicate that he would make a good leader of such a movement.

The St. John outlook for building operations, especially during the spring and summer, is more favorable than it was a year ago, especially in the outskirts of the city.

If there is any danger of serious results, how would it do to submit the dispute between the city council and Premier Fleming to arbitration? It would be dreadful if a state of affairs developed that would make it necessary to call in the police.

Have you been reading the series of short articles in The Times telling of the wonderful growth and development of the social centre movement and the wider use of school buildings in the United States? The movement is also attracting more and more attention in Canada.

If the city council can see its way clear to begin some public work that would give employment to taxpayers who are in search of work during the severe weather, would it not be a judicious course to pursue, and a wise expenditure of money, even if such work as trench digging were a little more expensive than it would be in the summer?

While the friends of Hon. William Pugsley and all self-respecting citizens regret that his health is such that he cannot for some time to come take any part in public affairs, the St. John Standard continues to make him the subject of personal attack. Comment is needless.

One of the boasts of the tory press was that the government would establish a parcel post at the first of the year, and thus bring the producer and consumer closer together and confer a great benefit upon the people.

USE THE SCHOOL BUILDINGS AS SOCIAL CENTRES

Some Information For St. John People Concerning This Great Movement and Its Results

VI. Clarence A. Perry in an address delivered in Madison, Wisconsin, over two years ago pointed out that the state Universities of Virginia, California, Kansas, Missouri, Texas and Oklahoma had followed the example of the Universities of Wisconsin and begun the promotion of the social centre as a part of their extension work. In Texas' extension division of the state university was then sending out to all parts of the state bulletins describing a model social centre school house. The rural communities of Texas are as much interested as the cities in the movement and the city of Houston bonded itself in 1911 for half a million dollars with which to build five school houses and fit them to be complete social centres. In Kentucky a group of social students known as the Philopole League raised funds by popular subscription to buy a model school house adapted for community use. The United States Bureau of Education has been for more than two years sending out bulletins describing the progress of the social and recreation centre work, and it is confidently expected an expert will be added to the federal department of education to deal with the activities which go on in school buildings after school hours.

The churches are interested in the social centre movement. Mr. Perry says that in Rochester the Ministers' Association recommended that the school centres be open on Sunday afternoon. The Social Service Commission of the Episcopal Church of Wisconsin over two years ago declared itself in favor of the use of school buildings as social centres, and the same attitude was assumed by the State Federation of Churches of Wisconsin. The following paragraph from one of Mr. Perry's addresses goes right to the point: "It has been said that the boy without a playground is father to the man without a job. I believe it is equally true that the girl without a social centre is mother to the woman without a home. If today hoodlums and street-walkers infest our streets, if there are grafters in our common councils, and dishonest men in our city offices, it is because years ago, when the present generation were boys and girls the municipalities did not see to it that all their boys and girls played the proper games appropriate to their youth in the proper way. Fortunately, however, we are not obliged to give up our schools in order to have play centres for the children of our young people can be formed and reformed. A number of cities have found out that the school house can serve its primary purpose as well as a winter indoor play centre. In certain cities this work has been carried on till it has reached a high degree of proficiency."

SALOONS ON THE BOUNDARY

War Waged in Victoria County And Hotels Are Fined

(Hartland Observer) For the last three or four weeks there has been a vigorous campaign waged against the liquor traffic in the county of Victoria, particularly in the parishes of Andover and Perth. This has been carried on chiefly by the Dominion Temperance Alliance and the Baptist and Methodist churches. Five of the hotels of Perth paid heavy fines for illegal selling. Three of the licensed saloon proprietors on the boundary line about midway between Andover and Fort Fairfield were before the court in Andover last week for having in their hotels slot machines.

These cases will be finally dealt with on the 27th. A very largely signed petition from Andover village and the parish of Andover, supported by a deputation of ministers and influential business men, was laid before the governor and council in St. John on January 7, asking that the licenses be no longer granted to the liquor men at the lines. The matter is under consideration by the government.

The feeling is strong among the best classes of the people that such licenses are not only an injury to New Brunswick, but a wrong and an injury to working prohibition in Maine. Should the government turn the petition down, the matter will not end there. Judging from the influence and power of the forces of the temperance party, we are safe in stating the morning of the day has broken when the liquor business along the line must step down and out.

The large lumber and mill concerns of the Province, such as the Fraser Company, are in the forefront of the fight. The liquor during the last year has interfered a good deal with many of the men employed in the different departments of the lumbering operations. The merchants and, indeed, all lines of business feel a deep sense of wrong because the drinking men are spending their earnings in drink and leaving large bills of supplies unpaid. And besides these causes there is the large moral side of the question that has also helped to awaken the public conscience of the community.

NEW BUILDING FOR SALADA TEA COMPANY

Officials of the Salada Tea Company, P. C. Larkin, of Toronto, Can., president, have purchased from the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company a parcel of land at the corner of Berkeley and Stuart streets, part of the old Park Square station property. The price paid was in the neighborhood of \$100,000. The erection of a seven story granite and terra cotta warehouse, headquarters for the business in the United States, will soon begin. Only seventy-five to one hundred men will be employed. The Salada Tea Company, with branches in several of the principal cities of the United States, is among the largest tea dealers in America. It handles only Ceylon and India teas.—Boston Transcript.

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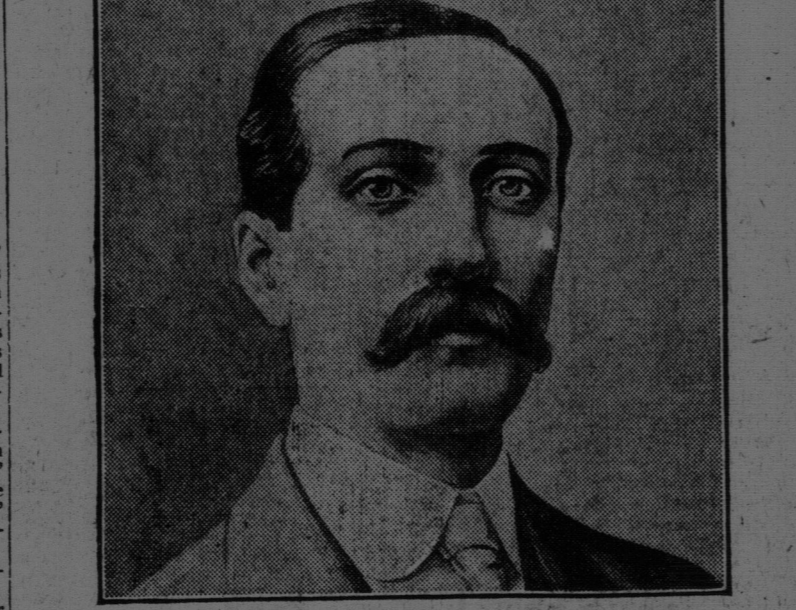

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ASK FOR MORE CHAPLAINS IN UNITED STATES NAVY

Representatives of Many Churches United in Request in Washington

Washington, Jan. 24.—Representatives of all Christian religious denominations have presented a unanimous request to the House Committee on Naval Affairs asking that the number of chaplains in the navy be increased. The committee was urged to insert in the naval appropriation bill the provisions of a bill suggested by Rev. Livingston Bayard, captain, U. S. N., which specifies that there shall be one chaplain for each 1,000 men; that the chaplains shall be recruited on the basis of the same rank and length of service as applies to medical officers; and that there shall be created the grade of acting chaplain.

Those who appeared before the committee included the Rev. Mr. Bayard, Bishop William Lawrence, of Massachusetts; Bishop Alfred Hardings, of Washington; Bishop Earl Cranton, of the Methodist Episcopal Church; the Rev. Dr. William H. Roberts, representative of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church; the Rev. Dr. Wallace Radcliffe, the Rev. C. S. Macfarland, of New York, representing the Federal Council of the Churches of America, and the Rev. Louis J. O'Hern, official representative of the Catholic church.

In his report Mr. Daniels, secretary of the navy, recommended that the number of chaplains be increased, but he also recommended that welfare secretaries for social work be appointed to assist in spiritual administration to the needs of the men. The clergymen opposed this suggestion, but the welfare secretaries might in some cases take the place of the chaplain.

London, Jan. 24.—The Daily Herald, a Labor newspaper, says it has authority to state that Charles F. G. Masterman, financial secretary to the treasury, will be promoted to the cabinet, succeeding John Burns as president of the local government board.

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MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRE

A claim is being made by Mrs. James H. Smith, of Brookline, Mass., on behalf of her husband, that he is a son of the late Lord Strathcona and a full brother of Mrs. R. J. B. Howard, heiress to the \$80,000,000 estate left by the commissioner. They will take steps to obtain recognition of his interests in the vast estate. Mr. Smith says he has been in constant communication with his father.

A scheme to bar Asiatics from the United States has been outlined by Secretary Wilson of the department of labor at Washington. It calls for their being put to an army test on entrance, the same as is required of recruits on entering the army. This, he thinks, would bar all undesirable.

Ten thousand coal porters are on strike in London, Eng., and the general carters' sympathetic inclinations may strike with them, while a lockout in the building trades is threatened. A total of 200,000 men may be affected.

An announcement was made in Dublin yesterday that the trustees of the Irish "Home Rule" fund would make no appeal for assistance this year either in the United States or elsewhere, so confident were they that the privilege would be granted.

N. Charters is still Scott Act inspector for Westmorland county. Though a vote on his dismissal stood nine to six in favor, the warden announced that it may be a two-thirds majority, which in this council would mean twelve members for dismissal.

Athens, Jan. 23.—A severe earthquake occurred today at Lepanto. Almost every house in the town was more or less damaged, and the fortress partially wrecked, but nobody was injured.

LESPERANCE EXPLAINS VOTES FOR MOTHERS; SENATE REFORM

Ottawa, Jan. 24.—In the senate yesterday Senator Daniel advocated that the senate should be an independent body, saying he favored its being made independent of both parties. Senator Denville asked for justice for Maritime Province ports, saying they should be treated as generally as western cities.

The Tory-Nationalist pact at Ottawa is in danger. Supporters of Premier Borden were given a shock yesterday when D. C. Lesperance of Montgomery, Ont., intimated that he would introduce a bill this session to repeal the Laurier Naval Conservatives and Tory newspapers said it was against the wishes of his leader. He denied the rumor that he had been prompted to this by any Liberal or other interests, but said his sense of personal honor and public duty would be appreciated when the second reading of the bill was reached for discussion.

E. N. Lewis, M. P. for West Huron, denied in Ottawa yesterday that he had any intention of introducing a bill for woman suffrage, saying that it was farthest from his thoughts but, if he should decide to do so, the franchise would apply to mothers only.

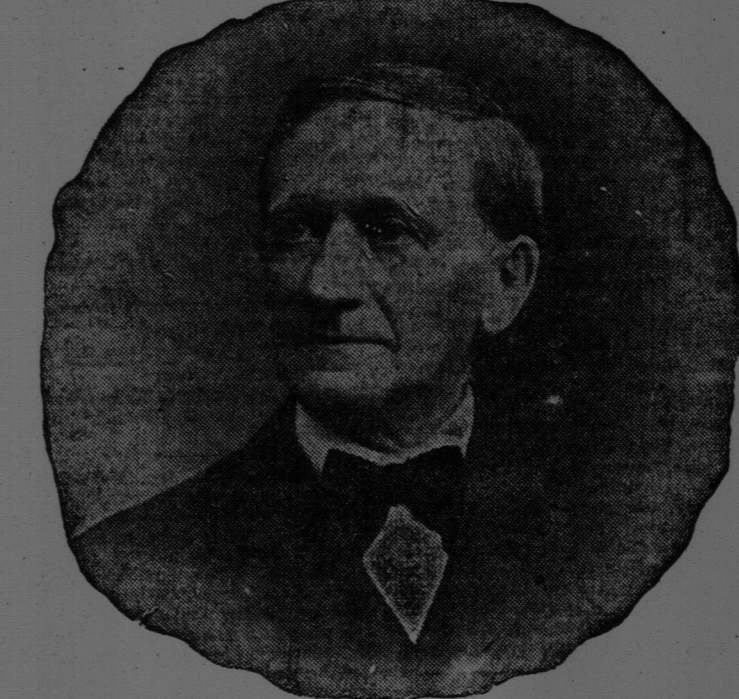

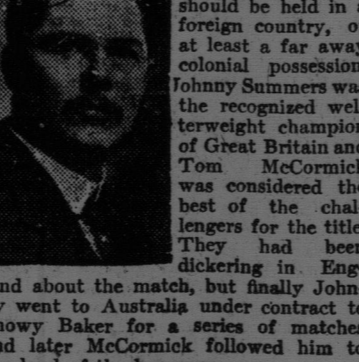

**A Woman's Experience**

**A Revelation of Moral and Social Conditions That Calls For Serious Consideration**

To the Editor of The Times:

Sir:—Just now, when the subject of road-houses is before the public, I would like to say a few words about the matter, and cite an instance that came under my personal observation:

Not long ago a young lady came to this city, took a business course at one of the commercial colleges, and accepted a position. A man whom she had before met, who knew her family, and whom she now met in business, called on her. One day he asked her to go for a drive in his car and, wanting recreation with all a healthy girl's want, and being able to appreciate it the more since she had had office confinement, she accepted his invitation with frank pleasure. He ran the car himself. In the way home he asked her if she would not like something to eat or drink before they reached town, but she declined.

"Some other night then," he said.

One evening soon after they went for another ride. This time, when passing a certain house he stopped the machine and said they would go in. She had detected the fact that he had been drinking a little when he called for her, and declared she wished neither anything to eat nor drink. And she begged him to drive back to town.

He said:—"Well, it won't hurt you to come in and have a drink. Nobody will see or know you. This is a very quiet place. I have an extra coat that you can put on over your own, and pull your hat down over your face a bit more. It isn't wrong, so long as you are not found out. Everybody has a friend along the road here, where he can drop in with a lady and have a social time. Be a sport and come on."

Seeing that his persuasions were of no avail he got angry and used threats. Looking up, the girl saw the bright lights of another car coming speedily their way. "I will make a scene," she cried, trying to jump from the car. "I'll ask these people for help." But he caught her, and, swearing, started the car with further threats. And he, is a respected citizen.

so-called, are a necessary evil, then let it be known to all, if possible, just where these places are, that a girl may not say in bitterness and tears, "I didn't know."

Let parents instruct their children, keep their consciences, treat them as chums and keep the home so attractive that they will not go to questionable places for amusement, lest those who are heedless today may weep tomorrow, and the son or daughter say "I didn't know."

Those boys and girls—or some of them—who are so unfortunate as not to have homes, or who have gone wrong and think they must continue in it, even while loathing themselves, perhaps would be checked if these road-houses were closed. It is a very deplorable and pitiable condition of affairs that these young people find their "fun" in making a face of one of the sacred religious tenets that exist in the lives of two people. It is equally as deplorable and pitiable that many girls make a mistake because the wage paid them is not enough to live on, but merely to exist; and because they crave the pretty clothes and adornments that appeal to every normal girl, they get them through questionable means. And many girls make their first mistake through thoughtlessness, or because they "didn't know."

If some readers raise their hands in horror at what I have said, let them ask the physicians of this town if a really alarming state of affairs in this respect does not exist. And let them not stand aloof in either scorn or pity, but get to know the real reason for this result, get to understand the damning influences that are brought to bear on young men and young women to lead them into temptation, and to understand that girls are swayed, and when body and brain are weary, they have put up to them in the guise of harmless amusement the invitation to have a jolly evening or to "be a sport." And, understanding, let the people of St. John strive mightily to cure the evil.

If houses of ill-fame in this city or its vicinity exist, then let it be known where they are, for the benefit of those who do not go wantonly and deliberately.

I have been associated with girls who earn their own living for a number of years. To tell these girls not to trust him is rather embittering—but it is safe. I thank the editor for space, and beg to remain

**WILL START NEXT WEEK TO TEACH MUSIC IN SCHOOLS**

A start is to be made next week in the matter of instruction in music in the public schools. In the High School building on next Saturday morning Miss Robertson, of the Dufferin school staff, will meet the teachers in the primary grades in the city schools and plans made for a start in the instruction of the children. The instruction in music will be only in the lower grades this year but will be extended to the other grades later.

**FIFTY NOW IN JAIL; HALF FROM CITY**

At Present Time There Are Only Two Women in the St. John Jail

There are at present fifty persons in the city jail—forty-eight males and two females. Most of these are in for drunkenness and are serving periods from ten to sixty days.

About twenty-five belong to the city. The chain gang is generally made up of sixteen of the men best able to work and these are generally picked out from those who do not belong to the city and after they are put to work the gang is completed from local prisoners. They are at present widening the lower end of Delhi street.

It is not customary to send to jail for a minor offense a prisoner, if it can be shown that he has any desire to get his living in that way, yet since about half of the prisoners are from outside places, it is taken that the city is supporting some offenders who should be exported.

**THE MAILS**

An Explanation by Superintendent Groat of the C. P. R.

Business men complain of the delay caused to the mails when the Montreal express is held in two sections and the mails are brought in the second section, as was the case on Thursday. When asked about the matter this morning H. C. Groat, acting superintendent of the Atlantic division of the C. P. R., said that the arrangement was made to give the best despatch to the traffic. The train is divided into two sections, he said, only when it is too heavy for one train and if it were not divided the delay would be much greater.

On Thursday the first section contained only Pullman sleepers and this was sent in advance because it would have no local stops to make and thus could make better time. The regular section, carrying the mails, must make three stops and if it were ahead it would hold back the other section. Under such an arrangement the second section follows the first as closely as possible and under ordinary circumstances would not be more than fifteen or twenty minutes later. The extra delay on Thursday was caused by heavy local traffic along the line and the severe weather experienced, matters which would have resulted in the same delay even if the train had been only of the usual size and had been in one section.

Head Liner Ramore Head, under charter to the Donaldson Line, is due here today from Glasgow. After discharging cargo she will load here for Dublin.

Furness Liner Kanawha, London for St. John, is due at Halifax today.

Royal Mail Steam Packet Liner Carquec sailed from Bermuda today for St. John.

The steamer Manchester Importer sailed from Manchester today for St. John.

Steamer Charterhouse sailed this morning at nine o'clock from Halifax for Manchester.

Allan Liner Corsican is due to sail from Halifax for Liverpool direct this afternoon at three o'clock.

The ice breaker Montcalm will leave Quebec on Jan. 30 for Seven Islands with passengers and freight.

Allan Liner Pomeranian docked last night at the L. C. pier, where she landed her sixty passengers this morning. She has also a good cargo of general freight. The Pomeranian met strong gales and dangerously high seas throughout her voyage. She made only 18 miles from midnight on the 18th until noon on the 20th.
