LADY SOMERSET GIVES VIEWS ON DIVORCE REPORT

Holds It Wrong Where People Are Married in Religious Sense

EVIL TO OPEN DOOR WIDER

Sees in it Lessening of Ideal of Married Life Among Poor, Where it Has Been Well Maintained—Building up the Drink Victim

London, Nov. 23.—Commenting on the majority report of the divorce commission, which makes divorce easier, Lady Henry Somerset says: "I hold there can be no such thing as a divorce between two people who have been married in a religious sense, and have made vows before God that they will live together for better or for worse. Divorce may be permissible where the ceremony has been of a merely state character, as at a registry office."

"It is a very terrible evil, of course, for an individual to have to live with another under certain circumstances, but it is a great safeguard for the life of the nation. There is a great mass of unhappiness, misery, and sorrow where the circumstances are such as are made the ground of a demand for further luxury in the marriage tie, but it is a very great evil to open the door any wider, and to lessen the ideal of married life, especially among the poorer people, with whom, on the whole, it has been maintained in a very fine way indeed."

"As to drunkenness, and the drug habit, I am afraid it is not decreasing among women. Among men I believe it is, notably among commercial travellers, where one now finds numbers of teetotallers. Certainly among women, the drug habit is increasing. But taking the view I do of divorce, temporary separation for a period of a year or two may help us very greatly in our work at Doughty and elsewhere. The threads of the old life are quite broken, and in very many instances it is seen that the husband and wife have been able to come together again after the lapse of a few years, and to take a new view of life altogether."

"The proposal to permit divorce for insanity is based on the supposition that insanity is an incurable disease. But it is nothing of the kind. A person who is classed as an imbecile can, and very often does, recover his or her sanity. And the person who recovers can regain control of will and faculties. In some instances, of course, the condition is so bad that the brain is impaired, and then the case has to be treated as one of insanity."

"I wish those who advocate divorce for insanity would help to pass some law by and by, which I pray they will, giving power to treat insanity in the first stages as early insanity, and shut the patients up. At present we are asking them to strengthen their will when they have no will, and to give up their liberty when they have neither self-control nor power. If they get them in time, as I do some, they can be cured; but it is less hopeful when they get older and more under control of drink or other drugs."

J. R. HUMPHREY DEAD; END CAME SUDDENLY Formerly Was Well Known in Lumbering Business in New Brunswick

Moncton, Nov. 23.—J. R. Humphrey passed away at one o'clock of heart trouble. He was around as usual until about ten minutes before he died. For the last three years he had been unable to work, and had made his home mostly with his daughter, Mrs. McManis.

Mr. Humphrey was seventy-four years old. His wife died eight months ago. He leaves three children—Mrs. D. W. Lacey and Herbert, of Lawrence, Mass.; Mrs. J. R. McManis of Moncton, N. B.; two brothers, J. B. Humphrey and Seth, and one sister, Mrs. John Orsmond, all of Appaquai. He will be buried at River Bank, near Appaquai, Saturday morning on the arrival of the maritime express.

Little Beauty Chats

When the Hands Seem All Knuckles

HERE is nothing much uglier than a pair of knobby hands. Even if one were to put on rose-colored spectacles I am afraid the knuckles would not look a whit less red and hideous. Since it is not within the power of man or woman to look with favor upon hands that boast ten noticeable knuckle-bones, there is something to be said for some treatment that will induce them to clothe themselves in pink and white dimpled flesh.

I know you are so eager to acquire pretty knuckles that you will be sadly disappointed when I tell you that the plumping treatment that I have in mind will not give you those until such a time as you work rapidly but not so rapidly as that. Do not grieve though, as I think, it will command itself to you even if it does not work with lightning speed.

The very first thing I must ask you to do is to plunge your hands in a bowl of hot, sudsy water and rub and scrub them until every bit of grime has vanished. Unless you take this bath, the plumping treatment will not give you such good results. The very two hands are absolutely clean, immerse them in a bowlful of hot milk to which has been added two drops of oil of rose. Hold them in the fragrant milk for ten minutes or until such a time as the skin is red as a beet, when you can call a halt.

The next thing for you to do is to knead the knuckles with cow's cream, massaging along the line of the knuckles with a gentle circular movement of the fingertips. Continue in this manner for, say, ten minutes, then stop.

The above is the daytime treatment. Now I will tell you what you must do for your knuckles at night.

Coat the knuckles thickly with the following massage cream—when you get up in the morning, rub it into the skin.

Glycerine 4 drams
Oil sweet almond 4 drams



Take these two treatments every twenty-four hours for the next two months and your knuckles will be soft to the touch a layer of dimpled flesh.

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Daily Hints For the Cook

CHOCOLATE BLANCMANGE. Add one-half cup of minute tapioca, one half cup of sugar and a half teaspoonful of salt to three cups of hot chocolate or cocoa, and allow it to cook fifteen minutes. Then remove from the fire, flavor with vanilla and pour into a glass dish. Serve cold with cream.

BAKED SWEET PUDDING. One cup sugar, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 cup whole wheat flour, 2 cups pastry flour, 1 cup currants and raisins (1/2 cup each), 1 egg, 1/2 cup milk, 1 teaspoon cassia, 1 of soda, 1 of nutmeg, salt, allspice, and 1/2 teaspoon cloves. Bake an hour, or a little longer—serve with your favorite sauce.

SPONGE CAKE. Beat the yolks of six eggs until thick, gradually add one cup of sugar, then add three tablespoonfuls of water, one level spoonful of salt, one half tablespoonful of this constant, and one cup of flour. Beat until light, add one cup of milk, one cup of sugar, and one cup of flour. Bake in a shallow tin for forty-five minutes in deep tin.

MANY LABOR DISPUTES IN CANADA, BUT STRIKES ARE FEW STATES EVIDENCE ABOUT FINISHED IN DYNAMITE TRIAL

Ottawa, Nov. 23.—The annual report of the department of labor notes an upward tendency in wages attended by an increase in the cost of living. The success of the industrial disputes act is indicated in the fact that in five years 124 disputes, in which it was involved, have arisen, and only fourteen cases did the conciliatory proceedings fail to prevent a strike. Last year there were ninety-seven industrial disputes as against ninety-four in the year previous.

Indianaapolis, Nov. 23.—The government has almost completed its presentation of testimony at the "dynamite conspiracy" trial. District-attorney Miller announced tonight the government case would end tomorrow or Saturday. Then the defence will begin its case in denial of the charges that the forty-five men on trial aided in the McNamara dynamite plots by illegally transporting explosives on passenger trains.

LIVE ON \$3 A WEEK? \$3 A MINUTE, SAYS AUSTRIAN PRINCESS

She Had a Bully Time in New York Even if They Wouldn't Let Her Smoke—Guest at Canadian Club Dinner

(New York Herald.)
New York, Nov. 28.—The Princess Coloredo Mansfeld of Austria and the Countess d'Etchegoyen called on the Maristans last Wednesday.

Included in their party were the Earl of Carlisle, Colonel Patterson and Captain Cartwright of the British army.

They arrived in New York about three weeks ago and stayed at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel. Visits were made by the party to several of the prominent clubs and they were extensively entertained in Washington, Philadelphia, Toronto and Boston.

The princess and her party were guests of E. Medley Scovill, vice-president of the Canadian Club at the Canadian Club dinner and a luncheon was given in their honor by Mr. and Mrs. T. Kennard Thomson at the Engineers' Club of New York.

It cost the Princess Coloredo Mansfeld of Austria \$5 a minute, instead of \$3 a week, to "do" New York. The princess herself, who sailed on the Maristans this morning, is authority for the figures.

"But," she declared with a smile and a shrug of the shoulders, which is the conventional equivalent of "I should worry," "I enjoyed every minute of my stay in this country."

The Princess, who on her arrival proclaimed herself as uninteresting, because poor, announced that she intended limiting her American expenditures for a room to \$3 a week. She immediately repaired to the Ritz-Carlton and engaged a suite of apartments. It was not thought at the time that she got a rate within her allowance, and now the Princess herself admits it.

"I like the American men," the Princess declared just before she sailed; "they are so intellectual—so vivacious. You may be sure it will not be long before I'm back again."

The Princess, who smokes cigarettes, brought jewels reputed to be worth \$5,000,000 with her to New York.

Returning with the Princess are her mother, Mme. la Comtesse d'Etchegoyen and Adalbert, her brother. The Princess travelled in this country for several weeks incognito, being known as the Vicomtess Etchegoyen.

"This is smoke," remarked the Princess on the day she arrived, a passenger aboard the Carmania. "I would rather have American dollars."

However, it was barely a week ago that the Princess proved she liked smoke as well as dollars. She was at the Hotel Touraine in Boston. Cigarette in hand, the Princess took a prominent station close to the grand staircase and began to puff while the other women present expressed their amazement in smothered "Oh's" and "Ah's."

The manager of the hotel called up to her and in his somewhat stammering request that Mme. la Princesse desist from her smoking that cigarette in public. The cigarette was all right, the manager soothingly declared, smiling with evident pleasure, but, as Mme. la Princesse knew Boston was not Paris, though no offense to Paris was intended, the Princess ceased to fume, as they say in Paris when they mean to smoke, but she began to fume, as they say in Boston, when they mean to become pensive.

"But is—la—la—la!" remarked the Princess just before her departure this morning. "I would not let a little incident like that mar the pleasure of such a visit as mine has been. It is a foolish prejudice," she added, "that which prevails in America against women smoking in public."

Mme. la Comtesse d'Etchegoyen was suffering from a severe cold, which had reduced her voice almost to a whisper. Indeed, Mme. la Comtesse confessed that had it not been for the fact that her nurse for the moment was out of the apartments at the Ritz-Carlton, she would not have dared talk at all.

Despite the condition of her voice, however, Mme. la Comtesse was able to express enthusiastic admiration for America and Americans. She liked New York and she liked Boston.

"I had no idea," she said, "that Americans could be so polite and courteous."

MONTROSE IN PORT

Incidents of First Voyage of Season—Quick Grain Handling

The C. P. R. liner Montrose, Captain Webster, docked yesterday from London and Antwerp with 177 passengers and 2,000 tons of freight. The Montrose left Antwerp on Friday, Nov. 15, and during the passage Captain Webster reports heavy fogs along the English coast, and says that the ship met with continuous westerly gales until Rabla Island was reached. The course was run north of the Virgin Rocks, and no ice was encountered, but wireless messages from the C. P. R. liner Montfort reported a berg in latitude 47 38 north, longitude 49 23 west, and from the Columbia a berg in latitude 47 35 north, longitude 49 28 west.

Captain Webster says that an unusually large school of whales was passed off Brit Island, and a waterlogged dory, painted yellow, was noticed off Gannett Rock. The officers of the Montrose are: Chief officer, H. Heald; second, R. K. Watkins; third, H. A. Moore; fourth, F. Mayors; chief engineer, G. A. Vine; chief steward, A. Longman; surgeon, W. J. Kerr; purser, G. F. Philpotts.

A record run of grain was made at the C. P. R. elevators at Sand Point on Wednesday night, when 22,000 bushels of grain were put into the Allan Line Corvica in two hours and fifteen minutes over a single belt, and this rate was kept up during the loading of 72,000 bushels. The Corvica has taken a total of 80,000 bushels, 8,000 having been added yesterday morning.

R. J. Anderson is foreman of the west side elevator, taking the place of Martin Peterson, who is now in charge of the Montreal Harbor Commission's elevator No. 2. H. A. Smith has been promoted to the position of assistant foreman, and J. F. Smith, formerly weighmaster in the I. R. C. elevator, is now chief weighmaster at Sand Point.

The elevator had yesterday 181,000 bushels of grain, most of which came from Port Nicholson, and the grain is high class, consisting of Nos. 1, 2 and 3 northern. The steamer Montrose, which docked on Thursday afternoon, will take upwards of 88,000 bushels of grain.

ONLY 30 BOYS IN LONDON TO BECOME SCHOOL TEACHERS

London, Nov. 29.—Complaints continue to be made here about the dearth of teachers for elementary schools. The number of young entrants to the profession has steadily declined in London from 1,181 in the year 1905 to 365 this year; while in boys alone are taken, the number had declined from 383 to thirty. In all London only thirty boys could be got this year to enter teaching as a profession. The sub-committee of the London County Council which reported on the matter said that some part of the decline was due to the unemployed teachers' agitation of a few years back, but they seemed inclined to attribute most of it to the period of good trade through which the country has recently been passing.

TONIGHT'S PRESENTATION.

CITY COURT ACT REVISION.

Steps are being taken to revise the City Court Act with regard to some of the provisions of the act, and also with regard to the regulations governing constables. The matter was brought before the commissioners some time ago in a petition signed by city lawyers. At that time an answer was sent asking for more definite recommendations. These have now been received in the form of a series of proposals for the revision of the act, which will be presented to the commissioners this morning evening today. The recommendations are as follows: That the act be amended so as to give effect to the provisions of the act, and that the city recorder be authorized to issue warrants for the common clerk and the city recorder for their report.

ADELAIDE ROAD WATER.

The extension of the water system out to the figures were not satisfactory, and immediately carried on during the winter. Some time ago tenders were called for the construction of a water main, and no action was taken. It has now been decided by the commissioners to proceed with the extension of the water system to expediting a needed extension this winter to give employment to a large number of men who have been unemployed by the city during the summer, and who would otherwise have to be laid off. Most of the excavation will be through solid rock, and this work can be carried on about as well during the winter as during milder weather.

SCHOOL TROUBLE IN OTTAWA.

Ottawa, Nov. 29.—A sensation was caused among local bilingual separate school teachers today by receipt, from the Ontario department of education, of forms to be signed by the teachers pledging themselves to enforce all the regulations with regard to English-French schools.

The circulars were distributed by the bilingual inspectors and the trustees have ordered the teachers not to sign them. The situation has resolved itself into a serious dilemma for the teachers, who must either disobey the trustees or lose their certificates from the department.

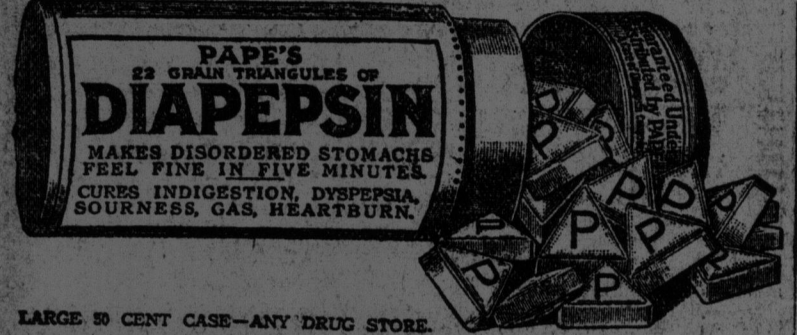

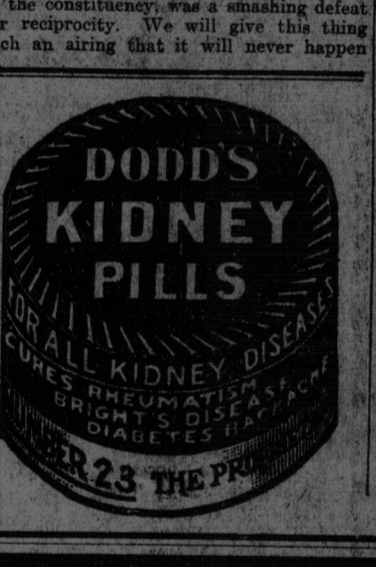

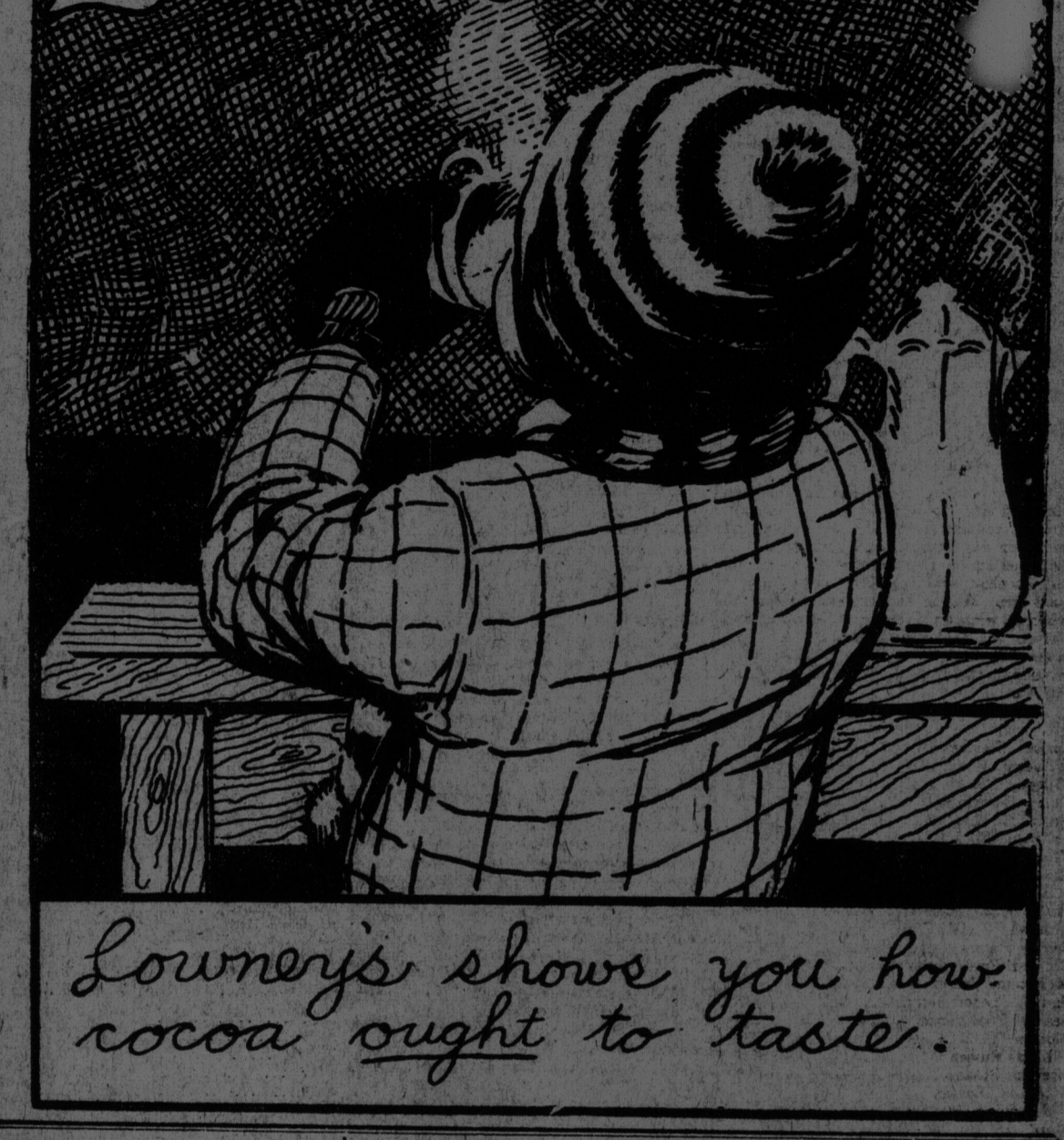

NOW FOR NEW HOUSES THERE

Douglas Avenue Sewer Extension Obstacle Has Been Removed—Boom Next Year

The city commissioners have to their credit the accomplishment of a task which common councils have been wrangling for the last eight years. This is the completion of plans for the extension of the sewerage system to the end of Douglas Avenue.

A route for the outlet has been approved but it led through private property and a right of way had to be secured. Arrangements were made with all the property owners except the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton and this was completed today.

The completion of the sewer will lead to building operations on a large scale in Douglas Avenue. As lease for property owners have announced their intention of commencing operations next year.

LOCAL NEWS

TO SOLEMNIZE MARRIAGE The Royal Gazette contains notice that Rev. James Colburn of Glassville, Carleton county and Rev. J. A. Morrison, of St. John, West, have been registered to solemnize marriages.

IN FIVE SECTIONS The Montreal train coming to the city today brought a great number of passengers for the steamer Empress of Ireland and Canadian. The train came to the city in five sections, four of which went to West St. John with the steamboat passengers and the other, the regular train, came to the depot.

MRS. J. V. BORGAN The death of Mrs. Fannie E. wife of Jeremiah V. Borgan, occurred this morning at her home, 84 Marsh Road, after an illness of about two weeks. She was respected by a large number of friends. Besides her husband, she is survived by four children, four sisters, and two brothers.

SCOTS FROM ST. JOHN St. John's Courier.—The members of St. Andrew's Society will observe St. Andrew's night with a banquet at the Grosvenor hotel this evening, at which Rev. Gordon Dickie will speak for "The day and all who bring it." Mr. Dickie will come from St. John to furnish the enchanting music of the pipes and Fred McNeill, of St. John, will render popular Scottish songs of the day.

THE FIRST SNOW STORM A little more than an inch of snow fell during the first snowstorm of the season in the city yesterday. Snow very falling late in the afternoon and continued until early this morning. A heavy gale blew along the coast of the Bay of Fundy, and the storm was quite severe in Yarmouth, Halifax and several other places in Nova Scotia. The gale fortunately did not strike here so severely. The snow was too light to provide good sleighing.

THE POLICE COURT

Three sailors, Karl Anderson aged 24, Andrew Anderson, aged 24 and Oscar Anderson, aged 24, were arraigned in the police court this morning on the charge of deserting themselves without leave from the schooner Harry which is lying at Starr's wharf, and also with refusing duty on board. The men were given in charge by Captain A. G. Deane. He said that the men were all articled seamen and that they had been signed on in New York. The men contended that the schooner was not fit to live in and was very unsafe. His Honor ordered that if they did not go back to the ship that they could be sent into jail for eight weeks without a fine. One of the men told the court that he would rather go to jail than return to the ship. The men were told by the court that they would have to return to the ship, and instructed the captain to have some repairs made to the forecastle. The men were remanded to jail, until this afternoon when they will be called for by the captain and taken on board.

Agnes Cunningham, charged with being drunk in Brussels street was fined \$8 or two months in jail. Besides this fine she will have to pay one of \$60 or three months in jail, as she was recently before the court on the charge of being the inmate of a house of ill repute in Sheffield street and was allowed to go on suspended sentence. His Honor ordered that this fine should also be imposed this morning. One prisoner charged with drunkenness was fined \$8 or two months in jail.

WINTERPORT NOTES

The C. P. R. liner Empress of Ireland, with between 1700 and 2000 passengers, and a very large cargo on board, will sail from Sand Point about three o'clock this afternoon. Four special trains arrived at Sand Point this morning with passengers and the Point was a very busy place.

The C. P. R. liner Empress of Britain is due to leave Liverpool today on her first voyage to this port this season. She is bringing out quite a few passengers and a good cargo. She is due here on Friday next.

The S. S. Ocean, Captain Coffin, arrived in port last night from the West Indies with a few passengers, and a fairly large cargo. The Allan liner Corsica is due to sail from port tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock for Liverpool direct.

The Allan liner Victoria was reported forty-four miles north of Sable Island at 8:30 o'clock this morning, and is due to arrive in Halifax at six o'clock tonight. After landing passengers at Halifax she will proceed to this port.

The S. S. Manchester, in cooperation from Manchester is due to arrive tonight. She will load here for Philadelphia. An all the year steamship service between St. John and Manchester, England, is to be established by Manchester Lines, Ltd., according to Charles R. Mitchell, traveling freight agent of the company, who is now in the city. At the conclusion of the present winter service the regular summer sailings will commence.

DANIEL GILSON DIES IN ACCIDENT

Well Known Teamster Crushed to Death Between Boiler and Cart

While employed about 11 o'clock this morning in the hauling of a large boiler to the wharf of the Dominion Coal Company, from a siding in the I. C. R. yard, Daniel Gilson, a well known teamster met almost instant death by being crushed between the boiler and a coal cart, in what way is not definitely known.

He had started out with a span of horses to convey the heavy piece of machinery to the wharf to be used in connection with hoisting from the scows or about the wharves. He had it as far as the yard of the company, with the assistance of his son, Daniel, who was standing only a few feet away from his father when the fatality occurred, and who was powerless to avert it.

Although there were more than a dozen men employed in the immediate neighborhood just how the accident happened could not be definitely described. It is supposed that Mr. Gilson was standing alongside the boiler or working at one side of it, and that a coal-cart just a few feet away, was backed up and badly braked about to drive Mr. Gilson forcibly against the boiler and jam his body so that life quickly departed.

His son and another workman, William Swanton, rushed towards the dying man and carried him into a nearby office where Doctor T. H. Lunney was called. But it was too late. The shock had been too severe and badly bruised about the head and shoulders, the man soon passed away. Coroner Harriman was summoned and gave permission for the body to be removed to P. Fitzpatrick's undertaking establishment. Later it will be brought to his home in Mill street where the funeral will take place.

Mr. Gilson, who was about sixty-five years of age, had a great number of friends about the city. He was one of the best known teamsters, and in addition had come to the Depot House in Mill street some time. Besides his wife he is survived by two sons, Daniel P. and Hugh L., both at home, and four daughters, Mrs. Wm. Dacey, Mrs. T. Callahan, Mrs. John Wilson, all of this city, and Mrs. L. J. Ricker of Boston.

MUST KEEP THE SNOW CLEAR FROM THE SIDEWALKS

Bye-Law is to Be Strictly Enforced Here This Winter With the first snow fall of the season comes the announcement that property owners will have to exercise unusual diligence in the future, regarding the removal of the snow from the sidewalks. The matter was brought up at the commissioners' meeting this morning by Mr. McLellan, who announced that he will insist on the strict enforcement of the law. Household property owners are required to remove the loose snow but also the ice and to keep their sidewalks clear right down to the gutter. If they neglect to do so, they are liable to be summoned to the police court and dealt with according to law.

The section of the civic by-law dealing with the matter reads as follows: Every tenant or occupant of any building or lot of land, and in case there is no tenant or occupant then the owner or the agent of the owner, or any person having the care of any such building or lot of land bordering on any street, square, or public way within the City of Saint John, shall, after the ceasing to fall of any snow, if in the day time, within four hours after, and if in the night time, before ten of the clock of the forenoon succeeding, cause such snow to be removed from such footway or sidewalk, so far as such building or lot of land extends along such street or square, or public way, and levelled off to the outer line of the sidewalk, under the penalty of two dollars for every neglect, and the further penalty of one dollar each day for every day such snow shall not be removed. The provisions of this section shall also apply to the falling of snow from any building.

FORMERLY OF ST. JOHN

Wife of Captain J. H. Weldon is Dead in Dighton, Mass.

A telegram received by relatives in the North End brought the sad news of the death of Mary J., wife of Captain J. H. Weldon, of Dighton, Mass. Captain Weldon and his wife were natives of this city and many friends will hear with regret of the death of Mrs. Weldon. She is survived by her husband and five sons and two daughters. The children are Capt. J. H. of Fall River, William M. and Frederick L. of New York, and James S. of Amherst, Mass., and Leslie, at home. Mrs. Sarah of New York and Mrs. Harry Rich of Taunton, Mass.

ST. JOHN YOUNG WOMAN DIES IN WOODSTOCK HOSPITAL

In the hospital in Woodstock on Thursday Miss Mabel Kaye died of typhoid fever. She was aged twenty-four years. Her mother, Mrs. Malcolm Kaye, lives at 50 City Road. Miss Kaye was taken ill in Woodstock about six weeks ago. Her recovery was confidently expected until a few days ago. On Sunday she took a bad turn, which resulted in her death yesterday afternoon. The family are members of Leinster street Baptist church.

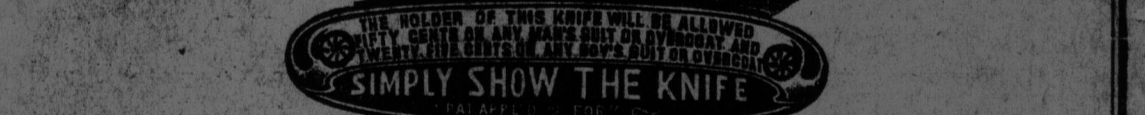
