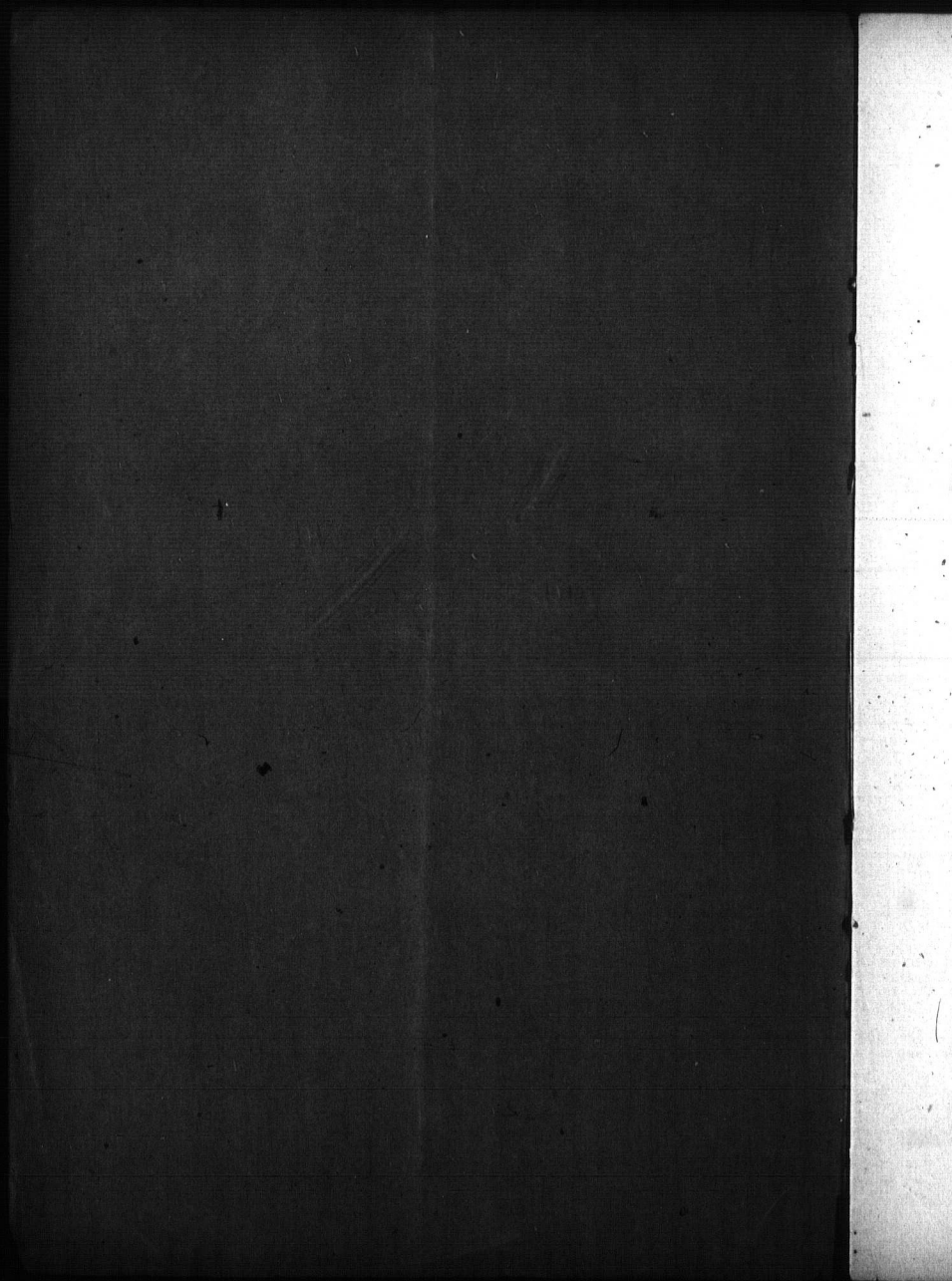

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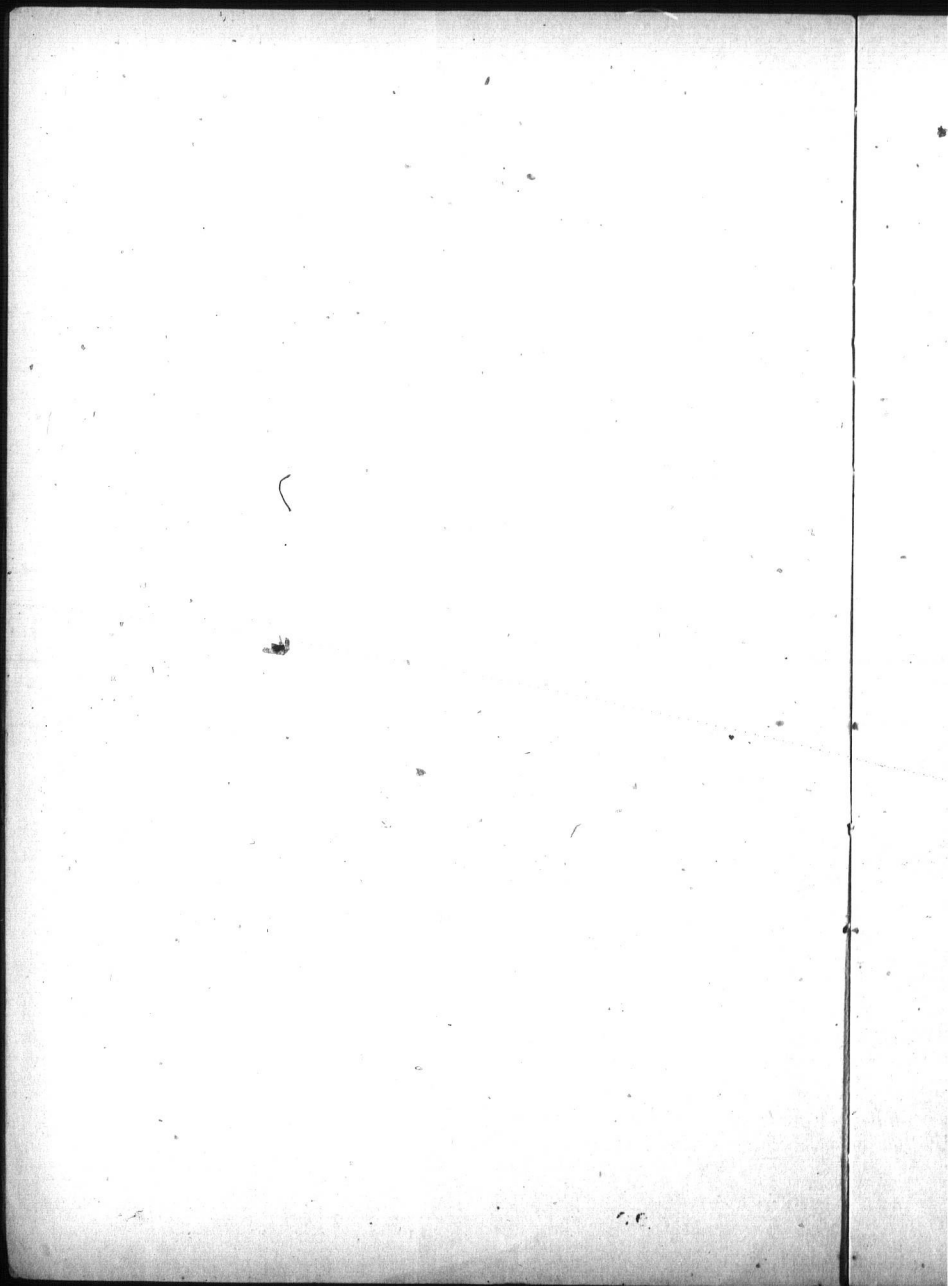
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## TWENTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT.

MINUTES OF THE TWENTY-FIRST ANNUAL  
MEETING of the Governors and Subscribers,  
Held Wednesday, 16th April, 1884.

The meeting was opened with Prayer by the  
Rev. James Patterson.

The minutes of the last meeting of Governors  
were read and confirmed.

The President, in opening the meeting, said  
that he wished to remark that the purposes of  
the Institution had been well fulfilled during the  
year in the care of the poor, that their spiritual  
wants had also been attended to, in directing  
them to a higher life beyond this.

The earnest desire of the Committee is that  
our Fellow Citizens, should by visiting the House  
and seeing the good work done for the aged  
friendless poor, come to our aid with generous  
gifts, so that the debt on our Country House  
may be entirely wiped off; that it is our pur-  
pose to remove to the new House in the early  
part of the summer, as soon as the water supply  
can be completed; he also called attention to  
the good work the Ladies of the Industrial  
Rooms were doing, in providing employment to  
so many poor women—thus enabling the poor  
women to help themselves.

The Secretary then called upon the Honorary  
Secretary, Mr. George Cruikshank, to read the  
Annual Reports of the Board of Management,  
Report of Out-Door Relief, Report of visiting  
Physicians, Report of Industrial Rooms and  
visiting Committee.

The Treasurer, Mr. Richard Holland, then

expenditure for the past year.

THE TWENTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT.

The Board of Management have the honor to submit the following Report for the year ending 31st March, 1884.

INMATES AND EXPENSES.

The average number for the year was 112, the highest number 132, the lowest 99, showing an average of three more than last year.

The cost of maintenance has been \$9,256.68, being \$492.26 more than in the previous year.

The sum of \$5495.10 was expended for food, an advance of \$8.93 on this item over the year 1882-3.

NIGHT REFUGE.

The number of night lodgings given was 26,814—men 23,679; women, 3,135,—being 7,279 more than last year—and of this number 10,889 were given to immigrants recently arrived in the country.

SOUP KITCHEN.

The quantity of soup distributed was 77,456 quarts with extra meals, being 17,454 rations in excess of last year.

## DEATHS.

Fifteen, viz. — Twelve men and three women, most of whom were aged persons.

## KINDLING WOOD.

This industry is carried on as usual—the sales during the year are in advance of any previous year, and the returns satisfactory, as will appear by Treasurer's Statement. A supply is still on hand.

## OUT-DOOR LABOUR.

This department continues to have our careful attention. The men sent out have given general satisfaction to those employing them. The receipts from this source are in advance of last year.

## INDUSTRIAL ROOMS.

The Ladies of the Industrial Rooms and visiting Committee are entitled to the thanks of the Governors and of the community, for their continued efforts in providing employment and means of support to so many families, who would otherwise suffer. Their Report will be laid before you.

## BOARD OF OUT-DOOR RELIEF AND POOR RELIEF COMMITTEE.

The thanks of this Corporation and of the public generally are due to the Poor Relief Committee, and to the Board of Out-Door Relief, for their faithful discharge of very onerous and important duties.

## RELIGIOUS SERVICES.

The religious services every Sabbath afternoon have been faithfully sustained by the Protestant Ministers of the city. Reading to the inmates of an instructive and pleasing kind during the week, as well as other kindly attentions by Ladies of the city, and the City Missionaries are very highly appreciated. The Friday Evening Weekly Temperance Concert Meetings held during the winter by the Cathedral Band of Hope, have been a great source of pleasure, and we trust profit to many.

## TREASURY.

The details of this department classified and duly audited will be laid before you. The total amount received during the year for House purposes was \$10,224.50. The amount expended on all accounts was \$10,340.81, being \$116.31, more than receipts.

## CONTRIBUTIONS.

The usual appropriation of the Provincial Parliament, less 10 per centum, \$720.00; the

City and District Savings Bank, \$500.00, have been received and duly acknowledged.

We might again call attention to the fact, that for the support of the House we make no annual collection, the offerings are purely voluntary.

## IN MEMORIAM.

In the death of Edward Mackay, Esq., this Institution has been called on to mourn the loss of a munificent and warm-hearted supporter, and the city one of its most generally esteemed, and generous Merchant Princes.

## THANKS.

The thanks of the Board are due, and are hereby tendered to Drs. J. B. McConnell, John T. Finfle, and W. H. Burland, for their gratuitous and very efficient services during the year.

To the many friends of the Institution, who during the year have kindly aided in the good work by their labors and contributions in money, provisions, clothing, etc.

To David Morrice & Co., for a liberal supply of ice. To the proprietors of the *Daily Witness* for two copies of that paper, also an account for advertising; to the proprietors of the *Toronto Christian Guardian* and *European Mail*, for copies of their respective publications; to the Bell Telephone Co., for the use of one of their Instruments in the Office without charge. To Messrs. W. C. Edwards & Co., Rockland Mill, Ont., for two barge loads of Edgings; to Xmas for ten barrels of Oatmeal.

Last Fall there arrived in this city a large number of Protestant Immigrants, chiefly English, in a state of great destitution. In the absence of any other means of relief, although not legitimate recipients of our charity, we could not drive them from our door, to which they came, and allow them to perish. We were therefore under the necessity of feeding and lodging an average exceeding 100 men of this class during the past winter. The doing so placed a strain on both our finances and accommodation beyond their normal capacity. From 200 to 300 persons having slept in the house—requiring to preserve its sanitary condition unceasing vigilance.

Your Board believing that the maintenance of Immigrants, in such circumstances, is the proper charge of the Dominion Government, the Honorary Secretary has written to the Honorable J. H. Pope, Minister of Agriculture, with the view of getting recouped for this extra outlay. A mere acknowledgement of his letter has only so far been received.

## NEW GOVERNORS.

An addition of two has been made to the list of Governors during the year: Hon. D. A. Smith, having duly qualified, is placed on the list of Life Governors, and Duncan McIntyre, Elective Governor.

## MANAGEMENT.

The excellent and efficient management of the Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. McMillan, continues to merit and receive the approbation of your Board, and all who visit the House, and take an interest in the good work.

## COUNTRY HOUSE.

About the beginning of June last year, the Country House was completed so far as to be fit for occupation, with the very material exception of the water supply, but as that supply, together with the extra fuel, and additional furniture required, would have involved expenditures, considerably increasing the debt already pressing so heavily on this department of our work, it was deemed prudent to defer the moving until our finances were placed on a more satisfactory basis. Our appeals for the needed aid in this direction, not having met with the general and hearty response they merited at the hands of our Protestant fellow citizens, we were under the necessity of effecting a mortgage loan on our city property of \$8,000, which with an overdrawn bank balance of \$2,262.54, makes our existing debt \$10,262.54. After long and anxious discussion your Board finally resolved, on sanitary and other grounds, to get our chief water supply from the city, and have adopted the necessary steps to that end. The pipes have been contracted for on very favorable terms. The price with the cost of laying is estimated at about \$1,200.

In order to effectually remove all contentions and disagreements regarding the William Workman, Wing, and get the immediate use of the amount offered, the sum of \$3,000.00, was accepted from the Executors in full of all legal claims, which with the amounts formerly received makes \$14,406.66.

The present desire, and intention is to remove to Longue Point as early this summer as possible our permanent inmates, where away from the city temptations, they can enjoy the health and pleasure of the country, and render what help they can to the operations of the farm.

It is very desirable that the Governors and the many friends of the Institution should, at as early a date as possible, visit the Country

House, with the view of being able to appreciate its adaptedness for its purpose and other advantages, so that adequate liberality may be fostered and stimulated on its behalf, and the burden of debt now resting on it, be, at least in some degree, removed.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF OUT-DOOR RELIEF FOR THE WINTER OF 1883-4.

The Board respectfully submit to the subscribers of the Out-door Relief fund, their annual report of the proceedings during the past year, together with the accounts showing the receipts and expenditure for the same period.

Before the Board commenced its operations several meetings were held composed of the City Clergymen, representatives of some of the National Societies and the Committee of this House, which resulted in the formation of a Protestant Associated Charities Organization.

The Board desires to record the valuable services rendered to them by the Charities Organization Society during the winter, particularly in the system of district visitation, which has thus had its first trial; let us hope that in the future, this feature of their work may lead to still better results as to the character of those getting relief. Their Secretary, Mr. Hollis, was daily at the Board, and rendered faithful and unremitting attention. Besides the members of the Board, the Revds. Messrs. Patterson, Doudiet, Hyde, Sadler and Ongert, were weekly at the Board, and were faithful both in visiting and reporting the various cases that came under their care.

The Board in conclusion have to report that they believe the generous gifts of the friends of the poor entrusted to them have been as carefully and as usefully distributed as was possible.

The St. George and German Societies have been united with this Board in the relief of the poor as in the past winter.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE VISITING  
PHYSICIANS FOR THE YEAR  
1883-4.

*To the Board of Management :*

GENTLEMEN, — During the past twelve months, nothing of a very special kind has occurred to warrant particular notice. The health of the inmates has been on the whole very good. Fifteen deaths occurred during the year, thirteen of these happened during the end of September and the 1st of April ; indicating to some extent the effect of the severity of our winter season upon advanced life. The causes of death in the majority of cases were those peculiar to old age.

Out of the fifteen deaths, the average age of thirteen of them was 65 years ; of the remaining two, one was that of a child four months old, the other was a young man, who died suddenly in the Night Refuge from rupture of a blood vessel.

We would respectfully suggest that some plan be adopted to relieve the overcrowding that has been almost of nightly occurrence during the past winter in the Night Refuge.

To avoid an outbreak of disease, either a limit will have to be put to the number admitted or more space supplied.

REPORT OF LADIES' COMMITTEE.

1883—1884.

The Ladies' Committee have much pleasure in presenting to the Board of Management the following Report of their work during the past year.

The House has, as usual, been regularly visited by Ladies appointed at the monthly meetings of the Committee, who have noticed with great satisfaction the comfort and cleanliness of the Institution, and the care bestowed upon its inmates.

The Reading Committee which was organized a year or two ago has continued its operations, and several musical entertainments have been given by kind friends whose efforts to relieve the monotony of lives, otherwise dull and uninteresting, have been much appreciated.

The Christmas dinner, which is now regarded as an annual treat, passed off successfully, and was largely attended.

Nor have the workers at the Rooms been forgotten, as a substantial tea was provided for them by some of the Ladies, and useful presents distributed among all those who enjoyed it.

The work of the Industrial Rooms has been carried on under the able management of Mrs. Milne, whose faithful services are highly valued by the Committee. Hundreds of needy applicants have been supplied with work according to their capacity, and everything is done to encourage them to earn an honest and independent livelihood. These women are visited in their homes in order to ascertain their special needs and circumstances, and cases of extreme destitution are aided from the Provident and Gratuity Fund, established for that purpose.

The difficulty of disposing of the immense stock of clothing made during the winter, is still a great hindrance to the success of this charity. The means at the disposal of the Committee being wholly inadequate to meet the rapid increase in its sphere of usefulness, the Ladies found it necessary to make a special effort during the past year to awaken a more general interest in its behalf. Accordingly, a separate report was published, giving an account of the origin and growth of the Industrial Rooms, together with some facts regarding its history which were not generally understood. To this Report was added a list of the collections towards the Bazaar, which it has been impossible hitherto to make known, also the Constitution and Bye-laws of the Committee.

The Ladies hope in this way without infringing on the rights of the valuable Institution with which they are connected, to draw attention to the exceedingly useful department in which they are specially interested. The Ladies have to record with much regret, the resignation



of their esteemed President, Mrs. Baldwin, on account of her contemplated removal from the city. Her valuable aid and deep interest in this charity have been much appreciated by her fellow-workers, whose sympathies and good wishes follow her to her new home.

The usual Christmas sale was held in the Natural History Society's Rooms, kindly granted for that purpose, at which \$460.50 was realized.

The Annual Bazaar was also held in the same Hall—net proceeds, \$2,699.85.

The following are the denominations and number of those relieved during the season:—Episcopalians, 48; Presbyterians, 26; French Protestants, 24; Methodists, 28; Baptists, 5; Congregational, 1. Total 127.

The following is the amount paid the women for work: \$3,771.11.

The collections in the different churches towards the Bazaar are as follows:—St. Andrews, \$114, fancy work valued at \$142.12; American Presbyterian, \$73.75; Cathedral, \$66.25, fancy work valued at \$5; Erskine Church, \$3.75, fancy work valued at \$52.05; Crescent St. Church, \$51.50; Emmanuel Church, \$80.50; St. George's Church, fancy work valued at \$2.50; St. Bartholomew's Church, \$4.35; Knox Church, \$41.75, fancy work valued at \$7.65; Church of the Messiah, \$87.25; St. Paul's Church, \$81.50, fancy work valued at \$195.

The Ladies would take this opportunity of thanking the Ladies' Associations of St. Paul's and St. Andrew's Churches for visiting, also the Ladies of the Cathedral, Emmanuel, Knox, and St. Matthew's Churches; Messrs. Bentley and Buntin for Printing; the Editors of the Daily papers for insertion of notices, and all other kind friends who have assisted them in their work.

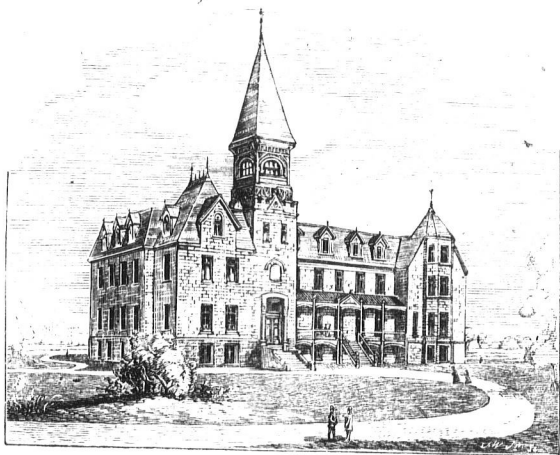
