Eight Companies of Militia Guard Mill District of Lawrence - Several Injured in Clashes with Strikers.

15,000 Operatives Out From Choice and Similar Number From Necessity-Mills May Run Short Handed.

Lawrence, Mass., Jan. 15.—Eight companies of state militia including one field battery commanded by Col. E. Lorey Sweetzer, of the 8th regiment, placed the mill district of this city under martial law tonight, after a day of rioting due to the strike of 15,090 operatives in the big mill and woolen mills.

At least 15,000 other hands were thrown out of work by the stopping of machinery and by the attacks on the mills by the strikers. In one instance a company of militia had to charge a mob with fixed bayonets, one boy being hurt.



"In the case of a child proved to be a juvenile delin-quent the Court may adjourn the hearing from time to time for any definite or indefinite period; and may im-pose a fine not exceeding ten dollars, or may commit the child to the care or custody of a probation officer or any other suitable person; or may allow the child to remain in its own home, subject to the visitation of a probation officer, such child to report to the Court or to the proba-tion officer as often as may be required; or may cause the child to be placed in a suitable family home as a foster child to be placed in a suitable family home as a foster home, subject to the friendly supervision of a probation officer and the further order of the Court; or may commit the child to the charge of any children's aid society, duly organized under an Act of the Legislature of the Province and approved by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-

"Perhaps we allow the child to remain in his own home, and we have him call around and see the commissioner every Saturday, not for punishment, but for addice. Because we are the friends of the boys.

Now, those two boys will come here periodically, and I'm going to win their confidence. any collective money-power in its
ownership of bank shares. The course
here pursued is to limit in the Local
Association the voting privilege automatically, if combined ownership of
bank shares is shown, so that no matter how many banks one interest may
control, it has only one vote—no more
votes, in other words, than if all its
ownings were in one bank. Under
this arrangement it makes no difference how far the money power may
stretch itself out toward the purchase
of banks, because it advances itself,
no further in acquiring power or representation in the local associations
to which thet banks belong.

All this is unnecessary, as the original provisions, in all possible and
supposable circumstances, completely
eliminate single money-power control,
placing the management, immediate
