WILL RUSH HYDE CASE TO FINISH

New York Judge Will Allow No Delays in Trial of Truro Man.

PICKING A JURY IN SHORT ORDER.

Two Hundred Talesmen Were Summoned But Only Nine Challenges Sustained.

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—A jury for the long delayed trial of a former City Chamberlain Charles H. Hyde, a native of Truro, N. S., on charges of bribery in connection with the Carnegie Trust Company financial scandal nearly two years ago, was completed at the opening session of the trial today.

Justice John W. Goff started the trial with all the despatch which characterized his conduct of the trial of former Police Lieutenant Charles Becker and the four gunmen in the Rosenthal murder, just concluded.

The justice refused to entertain motions for further postponement of this long standing case and ordered the immediate examination of the panel of 200 talesmen summoned for the trial.

The very first man called, Walter F. Lindsay, a coal dealer, was selected as the first juror, and upon the examination of the fifty-ninth talesman the jury was completed. Only four were sustained by the court.

Justice Goff threatened to discontinue Mr. Hyde's trial and place him in the Tombs during the trial, but postponed his final decision on this point and allowed the defendant to plead guilty for the present at least.

The charge against Hyde is that while City Chamberlain he had caused the Northern Bank to lend \$138,000 to the Carnegie Trust Company, which was then in a state of liquidation.

It is alleged that Hyde promised that if the loan were made he would increase the amount on deposit with the Northern Bank.

EMISSARIES OF WARRING POWERS TO MEET TODAY TO CONSIDER ARMISTICE

Diplomacy Now Succeeds Crash of Arms

Cessation of Fighting For Time Being Has Been Ordered

Balkan States May Insist On Occupying Conquered Territory Pending Peace Terms

London, Nov. 20.—The war has shifted for a time from the field of arms to that of diplomacy. It may be that the war is near to an end.

The plenipotentiaries for the belligerent powers will meet tomorrow at the village of Hademkeul, a few miles outside the capital, for a preliminary discussion of the terms of an armistice.

In the meantime the Turkish, Bulgarian and Serbian commanders have ordered a cessation of hostilities although cannonading, which Nasim Pasha reports as unimportant, occurred this morning.

The sweeping terms which the allies were said to have demanded yesterday, and which the plenipotentiaries may not know the exact terms of, are being discussed.

It is almost certain that it will be on the basis of the Balfour-Bunsen agreement that all the conquered territory until a permanent treaty of peace is signed.

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MARKED FOR BURIAL BY M'NAMARA

Stenographer of Iron Workers Union is Important Witness Dynamite Trial.

MISS DYE KNEW TOO MUCH AND WAS HOUNDED

Positively Identified Letters as Written in Furtherance of Earlier Explosions.

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 20.—Miss Mary C. Dye, a stenographer, who witnessed the trial of James R. McNamara, the Los Angeles Times dynamiter, because she asserted she had been followed by detectives and on one occasion one of the McNamara brothers had forced an entrance to her room at a hotel to search for papers which she desired to destroy.

Miss Dye identified hundreds of papers introduced by the government to sustain its case in furtherance of dynamite plots against non-union firms. The letters were written by John J. McNamara, secretary of the union. The witness testified she quit the employ of the iron workers before the Los Angeles explosion, but she had written many letters which the government charges were in furtherance of earlier explosions.

JAMAICA SWEEP BY THE TIDE

Forty-two People Killed at Montego Bay

Damage from Hurricane Reported Greater

Tidal Wave Swept North and South Coasts

Kingston, Ja., Nov. 20.—The western end of the island of Jamaica has been devastated by a hurricane lasting for five days. A great tidal wave has swept over both the north and the south coast, practically wiping out the town of Savanna La Mar and Lucie, both towns of considerable importance.

The observer of the meteorological station in the western part of the island sent the following report to the British consul at Montego Bay. All along the coast roads have been wrecked along the southwestern coast and incalculable harm has been done. Communications between Kingston and the centre of destruction is not likely to be resumed for a week.

London, Nov. 20.—The new financial resolution of the Home Rule Bill was discussed in committee in the House of Commons today.

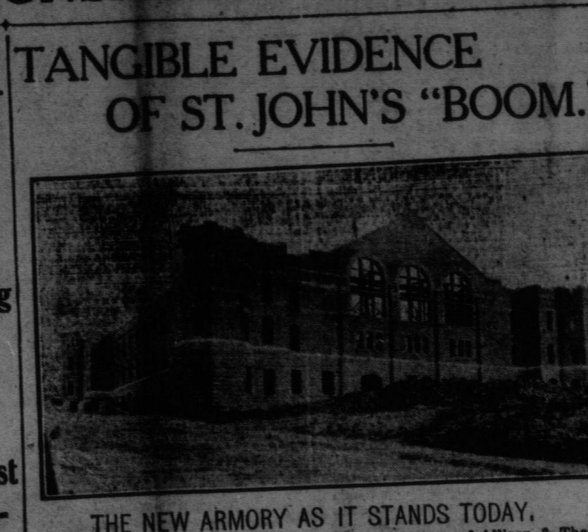
Austin Chamberlain remarked that if Ireland demanded separation she must bear the burden of her own financial responsibilities.

New York, Nov. 20.—When Reynold Forsbrej, confessed murderer, is taken to Sing Sing next Friday, he will have the largest guard ever assigned to one prisoner in this city.

Two deputies will be manacled to him, two others will walk by his side, and the sheriff himself will accompany them. Having pleaded guilty to murder in the second degree, Forsbrej may be sentenced to life imprisonment.

The contract expired on April 1, 1912, in February last the defendant refused to give any further laundry work to the plaintiff, claiming that the work was not being properly done.

NECESSITY OF AN ADEQUATE DEFENCE PLAN

Interests of Canada and the Empire Cannot be Dissociated — Need of Naval Defence of Dominion.

'The Naval Question in the Light of Canada's National Interests,' is the title of a booklet written by John Boyd, of Montreal. In the last Dominion election campaign Mr. Boyd who is an ardent upholder of Canadian nationalism within the Empire, took an active part in fighting the reciprocity proposals as menacing Canada's national interests.

On this question Mr. Boyd maintains that the national interests of the Dominion and the interests of the Empire cannot be dissociated, that if the interests of the Empire are menaced, the Dominion is vitally concerned, as the stability and security of the Empire are essential to the full development of Canadian nationality.

Opinion in the different provinces in regard to naval defence is found to be of a different character. In the Atlantic provinces it is stronger, but through the feeling in favor of naval defence is stronger in some sections of the Dominion than in others.

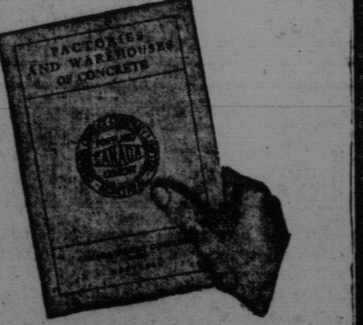

The Street Railway Extension. Com. Anon and H. M. WITNESS SAID NAGLE KILLED

Inquest Opened Last Evening into Death of John Nagle, Killed at Sand Point on Saturday Last.

Evidence given at the inquest held at the Court House last night by Coroner Berryman to inquire into the cause of the death on Saturday last of John Nagle at Carleton Place, was that the methods of operation by the John S. Metcalf Construction Company.

John Anderson, foreman rigger, described Nagle's death as seen, according to his testimony, from a distance of about ten feet. He declared that as an empty car was ordered up an incline after having been emptied because the digger could not keep the cars supplied, Nagle stepped in front of the car and was killed. He testified that he knew no reason why Nagle should be in front of the car, that the warning to stand clear was given without brakes, it was stopped as quickly as possible.

Daniel Mullin, K. C., who appeared for the family of the deceased, in cross-examining Mr. Anderson, drew from him the statements that Anderson did not know Nagle's duties. Anderson explained that when the car was being drawn again up the incline and was knocked down and his body pushed along the rail for a distance of seven feet.

THE NEW IMPERIAL THEATRE: PILLARS ARE OVER THE LINE

Commissioners Examined New Imperial Theatre, on King St., Yesterday, and Found Mistake had been Made.

Owing to a misconception on the part of the architect and contractors, it is possible that the ornamental features in the shape of marble pillars in front of the new Imperial Theatre on King Square, may have to be dispensed with.

Yesterday a report was made to the commissioners that the contractors were setting up pillars outside the street line, and yesterday afternoon the commissioners took occasion to inspect the building. They found that the contractors had set up four oval shaped pillars in front of the building, one on each side of the main entrance, and one on each corner of the building.

When the contractor was asked for an explanation, he said he was under the impression that property holders were allowed to put up ornamental features extending out two feet on the sidewalk, as this, he claimed, was the case in many other cities. The commissioners say that the city by-laws do not permit of such encroachments here.
