The Minister's Confession of Corruption.

It must have been rather humiliating for the Premier (speaking of the highly moral reform combination at Ottawa) to go into court and confess to having been guilty of bearing public office of trust and emolument for the purpose of corrupting a constituency in the interest of his brother. And yet this is the shameful confession that was wrung from Premier General Macdonald in the trial of the contract election case at Cornwall. As the fact had already been proved by two witnesses the guilty Minister did not dare attempt to free himself out of responsibility for his illegal and immoral proposition of power to personal and party purposes, but he was forced to confess that he had done it.

When a member of the Government is found guilty of immorality there is a great outcry, his professions of holiness increasing the magnitude of his offence. As the Ministers who have been openly professing official corruption, and have been found guilty of it, are now being brought to trial, it is not surprising that they are being treated as criminals, and that the introduction of more of the commercial element would greatly strengthen their hands. At this juncture, particularly when he has the gigantic task of making the country swallow a treaty which gleefully gives up the offensive efforts of decomposition every time it is touched, it has been represented to him that the admission into the Cabinet of a REPRESENTATIVE COMMERCIAL MAN, would have a most beneficial effect; and would, in some measure, be an answer to the serious charge that the proposed treaty is generally considered to be a corrupt bargain.

The presentation of a silver Spurge and watch, chain and seal, to the Hon. Peter Mitchell, took place at Newcastle on Friday night, and was presided over in the Public Hall, which was packed on the occasion with people from all quarters of the county. Alex. Morrison, Esq., presided and presented the address and testimonial. The Hon. recipient made an eloquent address in thanking the people of the county for their kindness.

It is very likely that at the moment the consistent supporters and local defenders of the railway management—Mr. Mackenzie, who were at the same time on their knees begging him to yield, and the hon. Speaker of the House, Many Grits large at this statement, as they say that "Mr. Anglin has St. John well for causing his political orphanage to turn a straw in its behalf." But it is stated, and cannot probably be successfully contradicted, that the Premier told the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to go down to New Brunswick and see if the railway policy could be persevered in, without serious injury to the Government, and if not, will he carefully consider the case. Mr. Mackenzie was reported to have replied: "I have told my people that when I cannot defend their interests I will leave the Government, and I am not so foolish as to do so now."

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Mr. John H. Harding, of the Marine and Fisheries Department, is at present superintending quite extensive repairs on the Beacon in the harbor. The various storms this structure has had to stand have caused it to be in a very bad way. Many of the outside timbers were much injured and torn off, but it was not until a thorough examination was made that the extent of the damage was discovered. Some timbers were found to be warped from their places, the heavy iron bolts broken, and the entire structure much shattered.
