EXPLANATORY NOTICES.

SUN'S RISING AND SETTING.—These calculations are given in mean time, or the time shewn by a watch, and not in apparent time, or that shewn by a sun-dial, as is usually the case. If, therefore, the Garrison gun (morning and evening) be fired precisely at the moment of the sun's rising and setting, persons provided with a copy of this Almanac may not only ascertain the exact time on each day, but will also have the means of correcting their watches.

Double the time of the sun's setting and the length of the day is found—and double the time of the sun's rising and the length of the night is obtained.

In the "Chronological events" of each month all local occurrences are inserted in *italics*.

4 Meteorological Averages.

The principal observations consist of the *average* or *mean* state of the atmosphere, in the different months, in regard to pressure and temperature, and of the extremes to which it is liable in these respects. The barometrical observations are recorded in inches and hundredth parts of an inch of mercury. The temperature registered is that of the air in the shade ending 1839. The averages for Newfoundland are calculated for St. John's upon observations made in the six years ending 1839. Those for England were calculated for London, and are copied from the "British Almanac."

The mean state of the atmosphere, calculated for definite periods from numerous observations, being that state in which all disturbing causes are equally balanced, may be considered when it occurs as least liable to sudden alteration—and whenever, on the contrary, the different instruments indicate an approach to extremes, reason as well as experience teaches us, to expect a change. Rapid alterations also are indicative of violent disturbances, and a sudden approach to one extreme is generally speedily followed by a change to the opposite.

It would appear scarcely necessary to impress upon any mind acquainted with the common principles of science that the computations before referred to are *averages* deduced from long observation, and that as such they are not to be mistaken for prophecies, but are simply to be regarded as the basis of useful anticipations, upon the safe principle that *like causes produce like effects*. Their value is not to be proved by comparing them with the Barometer or Thermometer during a single year, nor at one particular place;—they are *AVERAGES* of long periods, and do not apply to all places without certain modifications. When people have been accustomed to believe in the absurdities of weather prophecies it is difficult to satisfy them with common sense.

To persons possessing Barometers, but who do not correctly understand the principle on which they are influenced by the atmosphere, it is proper to remark that tho' the terms "set fair," "fair," "change," &c., marked on the plates of those instruments, do sometimes, and under certain circumstances, indicate truly the state of the weather, yet as they are calculated much more frequently to mislead the observer, it would be found more satisfactory to observe the state of the surface of the mercury in the tube (whether it be convex or concave) and to note its height by the number of inches and decimal parts shewn on the scale, rather than by the words abovementioned, which, in the present state of science, it is somewhat surprising that the makers of these instruments should continue to use.

On the right hand page of each month of the Almanac is given a copy of the *Meteorological Register* kept by the compiler during the past year (1840), with the exception of the month of December, which for obvious reasons could not be given.

Hence, the nearer the time of the moon's entrance at full, change, and quarters, is to MIDNIGHT (that is, within two hours before and after midnight,) the more fair the weather is in summer; but the nearer to NOON, the less fair. Also, the moon's entrance at full, change, and quarters, during six of the afternoon hours, viz. from 4 to 10, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind. The moon's entrance in all the hours after midnight, except the two first, is unfavourable to fair weather. The like nearly may be observed in the winter.

OBSEVATIONS ON THE WEATHER.

1. *Mists.*—A white mist in the evening over a meadow with a river, will be drawn up by the sun next morning, and the day will be bright. Five or six fogs successively drawn up portend rain.—Where the mist which hangs over low lands, draws towards high hills in the morning, and rolls up to the top, it will be fair; but if the mist hangs upon the hills, and drags along the woods, there will be rain.

2. *Clouds.*—Against much rain, the clouds increase very fast, especially before thunder.—When they are formed like fleets, but dense in the middle, and bright toward the edges, with the sky bright, they

are signs of a frost, with hail, snow, or rain.—If they form high in air, in thin white trains, like locks of wool, they portend wind, and probably rain.—When a general cloudiness covers the sky, and small black fragments of clouds fly underneath, they are a sure sign of rain, and probably will be lasting. Two currents of clouds, always portend rain, and, in summer, thunder.

3. *Dew.*—If the dew lies plentifully on the grass after a fair day it is a sign of another. If not, and there is no wind, rain must follow.—A red evening portends fine weather; but if it spread too far upwards from the horizon in the evening, and especially morning, it foretells wind, or rain, or both.—When the sky in rainy weather is tinged with sea green, the rain will increase; if with deep blue, it will be showery.

4. *Irreverent Bodies.*—If there be a haziness in the air which fades the sun's light, and makes the orb appear whitish, or ill defined; or at night, if the moon and stars grow dim, and a ring encircles the former, rain will follow.—If the sun's rays appear like Moses' horns, if white at setting, or shorn of his rays, or goes down into a bank of cloud in the horizon, bad weather is to be expected.—If the moon looks pale and dim, we expect rain; if red, wind; and if of a natural colour with a clear sky, fair weather.—If the moon is rainy throughout, it will clear at the change, and perhaps the rain return a few days after. If fair throughout, and rain at the change, the fair weather will probably return on the fourth or fifth day.

5. *Wind.*—If the wind veers about, much rain is pretty sure. If in changing it follows the course of the sun, it brings fair weather; the contrary, foul.—Whistling or howling of the wind, a sure sign of rain.

6. *Meteors.*—The Aurora Borealis, after warm days, are generally succeeded by cooler air.—Shooting stars are supposed to indicate wind.

The following observations are by the ingenious Dr. KIRWAN.

1. When there has been no particular storm about the time of the Spring equinox (March 21), if a storm arise from the east on or before that day, or if a storm from any point of the compass arise near a week after the equinox, then, in either of these cases, the succeeding summer is generally dry, four times in five.*

2d. But if a storm arise from the S.W. or W.S.W. on or just before the Spring equinox, then the summer following is generally wet, five times in six.

Her Majesty's Mails for the North American Colonies and the United States are now conveyed in Steam packets, which sail from Liverpool for Halifax and Boston twice in each month (except November, December, January, and February, in which they sail only once.) The mails are made up in London on the 3d and 15th of every month—except as above, and unless these days fall on a *Sunday*, when they are made up the day after; and the Steamers start from Liverpool immediately on the receipt of the mails.—On the average the passage to Halifax occupies about 11 days. The Newfoundland mails are at present brought from Halifax in sailing packets, which remain at St. John's 48 hours, and then return to Halifax with the Newfoundland mails for England.

REGULATIONS OF THE POST-OFFICE AT ST. JOHN'S.

Rates of Postage.

1.—On ship letters between the several colonies, or between the said colonies and foreign ports, not passing thro' the United Kingdom, and not exceeding *half an ounce* in weight, *4d.*; above *half an ounce*, and not exceeding an ounce, *2d.*—and so in proportion.

2. Letters arriving by private ships (either as *base letters* or in the ship's bag) from Quebec, Halifax, Bermuda, Jamaica, Barbadoes, Dominica, Antigua, Nevis, St. Kitts, Tortola, St. Lucia, St. Vincents, Tobago, Grenada, Trinidad, Berbice, Demarara, Essequibos, Curacao, and Montserrat, and not having been forwarded thro' the Post-Office at such places, to be charged, if not exceeding *half an ounce* weight, the sea postage of *4d.*—and so in proportion.

3.—Letters under *half an ounce* weight passing between any of the British North American Colonies and the following countries (through

the United Kingdom) to be charged the following rates—viz.:—

Abstract of the Act 3d and 4th Vict. cap. 96 :—

Owners, charterers, or consignees of vessels inward bound, and the owners, consignees, or shippers of goods on board vessels inward bound, shall have their letters delivered *free of postage*, provided the letters brought by any one vessel to any one such person shall not collectively exceed *six ounces* in weight, and the owner, charterer, or consignee shall be described as such on the address and superscription; and in the case of owners, shippers, or consignees of goods, it shall also appear by the ship's manifest that they have goods on board the vessel; and the persons hereby exempted shall be entitled to have their letters which come within the above conditions before the master of the vessel delivers the other letters in his charge to the Post-Office.

Officers of Customs may search vessels for letters which may be on board contrary to the Post-Office Acts, and seize such letters and forward them to the Post-Office.

Newspapers between the United Kingdom and the Colonies :—*By Packet, free; by Private Ships, one penny each.*

Printed papers, whether newspapers or votes of the Colonial Legislature, may be sent by post on the following conditions :—

1st.—Without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides.

2d.—No word or communication to be printed on the paper after its publication, or upon the cover thereof, nor any writing or marks upon it or upon the cover of it, except the name and address of the person to whom sent.

3d.—No other paper or thing to be enclosed nor with any such paper.

4th.—Printed papers to be put into the Post-Office at such hours, and under such regulations, as the Postmaster-General may appoint.

In all cases in which the postage of any unstamped letter shall not have been paid by the sender, it shall be paid by the person to whom the letter is addressed on the delivery thereof to him; but if the letter be refused, or the party to whom it is addressed shall be dead, cannot be found, the writer or sender shall pay the postage. This regulation to apply to every packet, newspaper, and thing whatsoever chargeable with postage which shall be transmitted by the post.

Extract from Treasury Warrant :—

All printed prices current and printed commercial lists conveyed by packet boat, or by any vessel from any of Her Majesty's colonies, addressed to any place within the United Kingdom, shall be charged *one penny each*; and all such printed prices current and commercial lists, passing through the United Kingdom to any foreign country, shall be charged *two pence each*.

[To ensure the benefit of this regulation it is requisite the 2d. should be paid when posted.]

DESCRIPTION OF THE LIGHTS.

FORT AMHERST LIGHT.—This is a Stationary Light on the Southern head of the entrance of St. John's Harbour.

CAPE SPEAR LIGHT.—This is a powerful REVOLVING LIGHT, burning at an elevation of 275 feet above the level of the sea, and showing a brilliant flash at intervals of ONE MINUTE. In clear weather it may be seen from sea in any direction at the distance of thirty-five miles.

HARBOUR-GRACE.—This is a powerful FIXED LIGHT (situate on "Harbour-Grace Island" in Conception-Bay,) extending Eastwardly or seaward in a direction by Compass from North to Southeast.

Instructions for making the NEW TELEGRAPH SIGNALS, and for repeating them from Cape Spear to the Block House on Signal Hill:—

I.—**DIRECTIONS TO BE OBSERVED BY VESSELS IN THE OFFING:**—Vessels furnished with the Telegraph or Numeral Flags are to carry the number assigned to them (1, 2, 3, 4, 12, 13, 14, 21, 23, 24, as the case may be) at the main, and their proper House Colours at the fore; and they are to hoist them as soon as they get within Signal distance either of the Flag Staff on Cape Spear, or of the Block House on Signal Hill.—Captains of Vessels are requested to pay strict attention to this instruction.

II.—**DIRECTIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT CAPE SPEAR:**—When a Vessel's Signal can be distinctly made out, it is to be immediately repeated to the Block House—the Numeral Signal (that which the Vessel has at the main) under the House Colours—and kept flying until answered. If it should be observed that the Signal has been already hoisted on the Northern Flag Staff at the Block House, before it can be made out from the Cape, it need not in that case be hoisted at all at the latter place.—The Signal Man at the Cape should take care that he can distinctly make out the Vessel's Number and House Colours before he repeats them to the Block House.

III.—**DIRECTIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE BLOCK HOUSE:**—When any Signal is observed flying at the Flag Staff on Cape Spear, it is to be immediately repeated at the Block House on the Southern Flag Staff. This will indicate that the Vessel is either not in sight, or not within Signal distance from the Hill—and should the Vessel not be in sight, the Signal will be hoisted without any ball or pendant for that particular Vessel.—When a Vessel's Signal can be distinguished from the Block House before it is hoisted at the Cape, such Signal is to be made on the Northern Staff (as at present) with the addition of the Numeral Flag under the House Colours. But only

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one distinguishing Signal is to be hoisted at the same time on the same Staff—and each Signal should be kept flying ten minutes, if not sooner answered by the house to which the Vessel belongs.—This, however, is not to prevent any Vessel's Signal from being repeated from Cape Spear on the Southern Flag Staff, at the same time that another may be signalled at the Northern Flag Staff.

RULES FOR RESTORING SUSPENDED ANIMATION,
FROM DROWNING, &c.

1. Some of the plans generally used for resuscitating drowned persons are pernicious, and are founded on erroneous principles; of such a nature are the following.—Hanging a person up by the heels.—Setting him on the crown of his head.—Rolling him on a cask. These practices are not calculated to perform the intended office, but are fraught with danger. There is much hazard of bursting some blood-vessel in the brain, or lungs, by such treatment, and consequently of rendering some cases incurable, which the nature of the original accident had not made so.

2. That as soon as a report of a person's being drowned should be heard, blankets should immediately be conveyed to the water side, in which the body is to be folded up, the wet clothes being first removed. In addition to these a *warm shirt*, or waistcoat from the body of a living person, will have its use. If the sun is out very hot, the body may be exposed to it, while at the same time friction, and the means hereafter to be recommended, are also had recourse to.

3. That when the sun is not sufficiently out, the body should be conveyed to the nearest house where conveniences can be had; but in removing the body to a proper place, an improper position should be avoided. To carry it over a man's shoulder, or lay it on a recumbent body, as a board, with the belly downward, are improper; the chest is by these means compressed, and the natural effort to breathe, if such effort should happen, will be impeded. A cart is the best conveyance, it gives considerable, though temperate agitation to the body, which will never do harm, and often be serviceable. The body when placed in a cart should be kept stretched out—the head and upper parts should be elevated without the neck

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belng bent, and the body laid on its side. When a cart is not at hand, the body should be carried on the shoulders of two men.

4. That when the body is properly situated in a house, no more persons should be admitted than are absolutely necessary. The place immediately to be followed, will depend on the state of the body. Where a little of the natural heat still remains, brisk agitation may recall the latent principle of life, and is therefore in such a case to be followed, together with other aids, especially frequent inflation of the lungs by bellows, the beak of which is to be inserted into one nostril, while the mouth and other nostril are kept closed. This being done, the process is merely to force in air, and compress the chest alternately. If it could be done, it would be much more convenient to pass a curved tube into the windpipe a little way, and inflate through this; as in the former way, it is certain much of the air will pass into the stomach, which the pressure on the chest will force into the intestines. The following method of preparing and using a curved pipe would succeed.

Take a tin tube, five inches long, the bore of which is equal to a large goosequill. This tube must be rounded off smoothly at that end which is to be introduced into the windpipe, and must be curved to an obtuse angle at about one inch from the end that is to enter the windpipe; to the straight end of the pipe is to be tied a bladder, with the cavity of which the tube is to communicate. Having thus prepared the apparatus, the next step is to introduce the tube into the windpipe, and this will be found somewhat difficult to those who are unacquainted with the relative situation of the parts of the throat, but may be attempted by some intelligent person, if strict attention is paid to the rules here mentioned. The person should place himself on the right side of the patient, and introducing the fore-finger of his left hand at the right corner of the patient's mouth, he should push the point of it over the lid that covers the windpipe, and using this as a director, he may pass the windpipe which he holds in his right hand at the left corner of the mouth, till the point of the pipe is beyond his finger, and it will fall into the proper situation. Having fixed the apparatus so far, the next step is to tie the bladder over the beak of a pair of bellows, and so inflate the lungs and compress the chest alternately.

5. That when the heat of the body is extinct, it is much to be doubted if agitation will have any effect, therefore it will be useless to employ time about it which might be better spent. The first step must be to attempt to restore the heat. The body must be kept warm in a hot bed, by the frequent repetition of hot blankets; by placing hot salt or sand to the feet, sides, and armpits, and by rubbing the body with hot salt under the blankets, to keep off external cold. Where hot water can be had, a bath is one of the best means of communicating heat. One part of boiling water to two or a little more of spring water, is quite sufficient at first, as at this time it will be improper to apply too much heat; by the gradual addition of warm water, the heat may be brought to exceed the

healthy degree a little; that is, to about 100 degrees of Fahrenheit. While these, or the means before advised, are going forward, a glyster of common warm water and a spoonful of salt should be thrown into the bowels by a bag and pipe. Tobacco is sometimes useful, but so difficult to apply properly, that we say nothing respecting it, especially as it is sometimes dangerous. The frequent application of spirit of hartshorn to the nose may be used as an auxiliary.

6. That it is dangerous to pour any liquid into the mouth before it appears that the power of swallowing is restored; after which an emetic may be given, and if it succeed in vomiting the patient, a small quantity of warm wine may be got down subsequently to its operation. Blood-letting, in the generality of cases, is of no use.

7. That with regard to the practices here recommended, it is to be understood, that they are not soon to be discontinued, though good effects are not immediately apparent. It has often happened, that though means employed for one hour have not succeeded, the same means continued for two or more hours have at length had the desired effect. It should, therefore, be regarded as a rule, to persist in the attempt to restore life for two or more hours unless the signs of death keep increasing, in which case it will be useless.

Notwithstanding the plans we have now recommended are so perspicuous as to enable any intelligent person to put them in force, yet it is particularly advisable to procure proper medical assistance as soon as the nature of things will admit of it.
