ARBITRATORS MAKE THEIR AWARD

International Railway to
Pay Three Thousand Dol-
lars and Expenses.

HAVE APPEALED.

A dispute has been pending for a long time regarding the value of land belonging to the New Brunswick Railway Company which was expropriated by the International Railway Company (the Matapedia road), running across New Brunswick from Restigouche to the St. John River. It was finally agreed, some time ago, to leave the matter to arbitration, the International Railway Company selecting Hon. John Coughlin and the N. B. Railway Company choosing Hon. C. E. Oaks of Bangor. These gentlemen being unable to agree upon a third arbitrator, Mr. Henry Hilyard was named by a Judge of the Superior Court as the law provides. Much time was consumed in hearing evidence and arguments of counsel, and then the arbitrator sat down to fix the amount. It may be mentioned that the International Company had been willing to pay \$200,000, while Mr. Coughlin considered \$500,000. A final session was held on Friday, when a majority of the arbitrators came to an agreement. Messrs. Oaks and Hilyard fixing the damages at \$2,000, the International Company also pay the expenses, \$4000.

Mr. Coughlin dissented. An amusing occurrence followed. The arbitrators agreed that the award should be placed in the Bank of New Brunswick vault, and that the result should be kept secret until the arbitrators' expenses be paid. This was between 11 and 12 o'clock. Before one o'clock counsel for the N. B. Railway Company had been served with notice of appeal by counsel for the International—the notice of appeal being the first information he had of the award being made. Somebody had given away the decision of the arbitrators—Globe.

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SPECIFIC CHARGES AGAINST B. OF HEALTH

Bathurst Correspondent
Making Matters Warm in
Smallpox Matter.

TIME FOR ACTION.

Mr. Editor—I have for a few days granted the Board of Health an interview, but all this time I have been on the alert, and have taken notice that the smallpox is in no way abating in the town and its outskirts.

We have only one undertaken in Bathurst, and should a fatal epidemic strike our town, such as the black smallpox, which this may turn out to be before the fall, if things continue as they are, or other epidemic with fatal results, such as sometimes large cities become victims of, we would then have room for 20 undertakers. If the Board of Health continues to shirk their duty as they have and are now doing, your correspondent presents that the following lines of epitaph would then suit the occasion. Herein lies both young and old. Victims of pest yet untold, Some left behind lots of wealth. Who have blamed alone the Board of Health.

Your correspondent, although not an expert in poetry, will continue to give you a few lines, which in your humble servant's mind, will suit the present occasion.

For their duty they did shirk On them our town will surely turn turk. They seem to want such disease to spread.

For loss with smallpox are going ahead. In houses they're seen day by day. But still the chairman will wants his pay.

This sort of thing our people won't bear. 'Tis enough to make a saintly man swear.

Your correspondent admits that up to the present he has done nothing but criticize the Board of Health, but is now coming out in his corner, and with accusations against the Board of Health, which can be proven beyond a doubt.

Accusation No. 1.—That the smallpox was in the residence of James Burke. That a constable in connection with the Board of Health saw James Burke somewhere around the time he, James Burke, came down from the mines, at his residence, personally, and he told James Burke that he had the smallpox, but his residence was not quarantined. That the said James Burke went to work at Burns & Adams camp, and was told by Dr. Moisan at the camp that he had the smallpox, he was also told the same thing by another medical man. That the said James Burke came down from the camp and returned to work, or was going to return to work, but the men in the camp refused to work with him. He then went to work for Christie Williamson. Why was this house not quarantined. Can the Board of Health answer this?

Accusation No. 2.—A man who came down from the Drummond mines, and put up at Landry's hotel on Water street some five or six weeks ago, and then went to his home in Grand Lake, and was there quarantined a victim to the so called smallpox, the said hotel being left clear of quarantine. Can the Board of Health answer why this hotel was not quarantined? They were not very lenient with the man, but too much so with the hotel.

Accusation No. 3.—The chairman of the Board of Health on Friday of last week had a visit of one named Raymond Baldwin from the mines, who had been sent to the Drummond mines, for some disease which he had. The Chairman pronounced it smallpox, and made a post house out of his medical office, which is situated in the midst of our village people, and locked his patient therein. On Friday evening the Chairman made a visit to his patient, and on Saturday morning he went to make another visit, but when he arrived in the post house, presto change, the patient must have had a malignant wound, for he was nowhere to be seen. The smallpox bird had flown to lands unknown.

Your correspondent was not at all surprised when he heard this, taking into consideration the conditions that the Chairman of the Board of Health was in when he made his visit to the patient on Friday night. Why was there not a guard put on to watch this patient? Where has he gone? I will try and answer, if not, it is about time that we should purify our Board of Health or obliterate it.

I have another subject to write upon, which deals directly with our present Board of Health, and of which I will refer to in another letter.

150 WORSHIPS IN NAVAL REVIEW

CARIBOU CHARGES
ON LOST SHOOTERS

Two Michigan Men Had Thrilling Adventures in Wilderness of Newfoundland

Henry L. Wilson of Detroit, Mich. and George X. Armstrong of Lansing, Mich., arrived here recently on the Florio of the Red Cross line, with a tale of being lost in the wilds of Newfoundland and an exciting experience with a caribou.

The men left New York late in May in search for pine and spruce for a paper manufacturing company with which they are connected, and also to look around for a site for a mill. They crossed the island, and on their return went fishing in Grand Lake.

Their canoe was swamped on June 25, and they were compelled to swim ashore. They lost all their provisions, but saved their guns, ammunition and fishing paraphernalia. They were five miles from the nearest railroad station, and began to tramp through the woods shooting and fishing for food. On July 4 they came upon a herd of about three hundred caribou.

Wilson shot and killed a calf that was running alongside its mother. The mother immediately charged Wilson, who fired at her, but missed. In an attempt to get away he stumbled and fell, breaking his right wrist.

Armstrong, seeing his companion's danger, fired at the caribou, but the animal turned and made for him. By a quick jump he got out of the path of the enraged animal, and as he went he shot her, apparently without effect, as she kept on going.

After Wilson's wrist had been bound the two continued with the aid of the sun, and finally reached the station at Gaff Topsail, where they boarded a train and went to St. John's.

TECHNICAL EDUCATION

King Edward a few days ago, in a public address, intimated that the progress of Britain depends to a very considerable degree on the development of technical education. His Majesty expressed his gratification with the advancement already made along this line, but intimated that the chief of all possibilities, the achievements so far have been merely in the way of preliminary preparation. Britain is by no means backward in this respect, but she is still in the primary stage in comparison with Germany. The King's suggestion comes at an opportune time, for the force of his remark is fully appreciated by Britons, and will no doubt tend to still greater effort in the way of practical instruction for the people.

A few days ago a great educational congress was held at Denver. The president of the National Association, Dr. H. D. Harvey, selected industrial education as the subject of his annual address. He spoke of the steadily growing demand from all parts of the country for technical training and for specific nation in education, such as will best equip students for whatever work they contemplate, and with the smallest waste of effort. President Harvey fully realized that every man who interests himself in this form of education develops his own idea, of what technical training should be, but he adopted as a generally acceptable definition whatever gives definite instruction and training for at least the beginnings of industrial efficiency. Certainly nothing approaching this broad interpretation is found in our public schools of New Brunswick. Practically nothing has been done outside of the colleges for the benefit of those who purpose devoting themselves to other than the so-called learned professions.

Recently a new man, one who is generally regarded as aggressive in his ideas, has been placed at the head of our educational system. Supt. Cohen has been him an opportunity such as is rarely afforded, of winning honor for himself and conferring incalculable benefit on the people by the introduction and development of a more efficient system of industrial training. That instruction which will fit the farmer's boy to become a more successful farmer and will present him stronger inducements to remain at home, which will provide the manufacturer with skilled workmen and qualified foremen or superintendents, which will lead to the expansion of those mental powers by which individual research is directed, and which provides for the prospective professional man a broadened field of educational opportunities—this is the form of education so necessary and now so entirely lacking in our present system. If Supt. Cohen can create some plan whereby those who now leave school at an early age with only a confused realization of what knowledge means, can be educated with at least a fair start along the particular lines of industrial activities to which their lives are to be devoted, he will accomplish something really worth while. Our educationalists know full well that the majority of students must earn their living by their hands, and it is not unlikely that their training which is so necessary for at least the beginning of industrial efficiency.

It is perfectly clear by now, and at any time, that it will be clear still, that she made an egregious mistake in inventing and building Dreadnoughts. G. T. P. RAILS LAID INTO EDMONTON

Mark an Epoch in Western Development—Regular Train Service by the Fall

EDMONTON, July 17.—Another epoch in western development was marked yesterday when the rails of the G. T. P. were laid into Edmonton. The last spikes were driven at Clover Bar bridge, from where the line was previously laid as far as the big parking place. The line will be put in place as rapidly as possible, and the company hopes to be able to put on a regular service in the fall. The line will resume operations west of Edmonton tomorrow.

DEPARTMENT NOTIFIED.

PLAYING INDIANS FATAL TO A CHILD

Gleeful Competitions Bind Rope round Georg Tracy's Throat

Appendicitis Developed

PATCHOQUE, L. I. July 17.—Appendicitis brought on by rope which was tied tightly about his body by other boys with whom he was frolicking caused the death this afternoon of Georg Tracy, nine years old, son of C. J. Tracy, a contractor, living in Bedford, five miles north of this place.

Tracy was playing Indians with half a dozen lads of his own age near his home Friday afternoon when his playmates seized him and bound him to a tree, winding the rope around him until it was so tight he could scarcely breathe. The boy cried out to be released, but the others paid no attention to his shouts and pranced around him, yelling gleefully in a dance until his mother ran from the house.

Mrs. Tracy scattered the little fellows, released her son and carried him into the house. There was no sign that he was suffering from anything worse than fright at that time, but on Friday night he complained of violent pains and early next morning Dr. M. D. Davis of Patchogue, was sent for. He found the boy in a state of collapse and carried him in an automobile to the Prospect Hospital.

There an examination disclosed that the boy was suffering from appendicitis undoubtedly provoked by the tying of the rope about his body. Within an hour an operation was performed, but he did not rally, and at four o'clock he died. His father, who was in Hastings, N. Y., was called home by telegram when the boy's condition became grave. No action will be taken against the other lads, whose names were not disclosed.
