

SUMMARY OF NEWS.

The New Brunswick Railway.—Since the publication of our last paper, influential local Committees have been formed both in St. John and in Fredericton, for the promotion of this important undertaking, and we rejoice to observe that a powerful Committee has also been set in operation at Quebec, for the same purpose. The only local Committees requiring to be established now, are those on the line from Digby through Horton, Windsor, &c., to Halifax. From these five districts, which are likely to receive so much benefit by the opening up of two large and important markets, St. John and Halifax, for their surplus agricultural produce, at only six hours' drive from their respective districts at either end, and at comparatively trifling cost, no steps, that we are aware of, have yet been taken for the consummation of this important project. Surely the inhabitants are slumbering at a time when every energy should be put forth. The proceedings of the local Committees, already constituted, have been forwarded to the Provisional Board in London, and we doubt not their effect will be favourable to the establishment of the only practicable and really useful line, viz: From Halifax, across Nova Scotia, to Digby Strait, thence to St. John, and thence, through Fredericton, Woodstock, and Grand Falls, to Quebec. The resolutions of the local Committees in New Brunswick and in Canada, and an excellent Report on the Prospects of the New-Brunswick Railway Company by John Grant, Esquire, a practical and scientific gentleman, engaged in the Surveyor-General's Department in this Province, will be found in our columns.

We observe that the Quebec Committee have not expressed an opinion on either of the contemplated lines; but we doubt not that the advantages offered by that through the Valley of the Saint John, which was first advocated in this paper of the 10th August last, will be prominently kept in view. The diminished distance of transit, the large number of vessels constantly at the Port of Saint John, loading with timber and always requiring something with which to complete their lading, and the low rate of freights, all point to St. John as the terminus with which Quebec must connect, in order to save itself from the ill effects of the competition, now existing, from Montreal to various points in Canada and the United States. The difference on one barrel, arriving at St. John and Halifax by the Railway, for shipment, would be little less than Five Shillings in favour of Saint John.—*Courier.*

Guano and the Potatoe Rot.—Since our last publication several writers have added their arguments in favour of a measure, which though of recent use has been productive already of great benefit to the Farmer. Every body who knows any thing of the history of guano, knows that it is used in cultivation in South America from whence it was first brought, without producing rot, or generating insects—that it contains no signs whatever of animal existence, and so far as experience goes is found to be prejudicial to it—and that its use in the United States has been subsequent to the appearance of the potatoe disease. In fact, that to whatever cause the potatoe rot is owing, no absurdity can be greater than to suppose it is producing by the use of guano. When we peruse our few observations upon the article in the *Recorder*, it was with the presumption that the writer was a candid enquirer after truth, which they were intended to elicit. The utter nonsense of his remarks of last Saturday, leads us however to believe that he is quite ignorant upon the subject, and knows precious little of the organization, either of the vegetable or animal kingdom.—*Halifax Times.*

A Typographical Error!—Printers, or their devils, often make the most ludicrous mistakes, which is so well known that Editors sometimes make the excuse to cover their own errors. A higher personage seems to have profited by the hint, and the Queen's Printer of this Province is said to have made the greatest typographical blunder ever yet perpetrated. The facts are these: a few weeks since a new list of Magistrates for the City and County of St. John appeared in the *Royal Gazette*, by authority, and the following week the names of two of the gentlemen were omitted; and upon the friends of the said gentlemen requiring an explanation of the unheard of transaction, they were told that it was "an error of the Printer!" Oh, lie! Mr. Simpson; how could you?—*Legalist.*

Another.—A gentleman of the County of King's was lately gazetted as a Justice of the Peace, and a few days afterwards the commissioner received an order not to swear him in, as his name had appeared by a mis-print! But the mistake came too late, the gentleman in question having been already sworn in; and thus a Magistrate has been made by a typographical error!—so says the Government.—*Id.*

Tetotalism in the British Colony.—Great progress is being made in this glorious cause.—A second anniversary festival has lately been held at Moulmes, among the officers and many men of the gallant 84th Regt.

Capt. David Russell presided—several Corporals addressed the meeting in convincing and eloquent language. The Serjeant-major reproached the "moderate system"—The had tried it three times in the Regt, and it has failed: once at Kilkenny, once at Jamaica, and once in India. Horrid Affair.—An old man of Tayne (Dordogne) named Jourde, seventy-five years old, and bent double from decrepitude, has murdered his grandson. The cause assigned by the aged murderer is on account of ill treatment from the lad's father—the old man's son in law; to whom it appears he had transferred his property. The bloody hearted old grandfather, struck upon revenging himself by wounding the parent in the tenderest point.—Consequently murdered the son. The old man attempted to escape, but was taken, confessed the crime, and committed for trial.

Burglaries.—The office of Messrs W. Pryor and Sons was entered last night, by some person or persons, through a back window, first removing the shutter. Having then lit a candle, and rummaged all the drawers, and sowed the papers about, the thieves left the premises as they entered. One of the drawers which they opened contained a small box, with £10 or £12 in silver, and a bag of copper, but these having been covered by a book, were fortunately unobserved.

On Monday night the shop of Mr. John Moir, corner of Albemarle street, was entered, and the till rifled of its contents—some three or four dollars in coppers. It is supposed the thief had concealed himself in the shop during the day, as it could not be ascertained by what means he made his entrance.—*Halifax Recorder.*

The new empire in California is to be founded by the Mormons from present appearances. They are to leave Illinois in the spring, and go to California, but this is not publicly told. They have had three emissaries out exploring the country, and they have returned. The sites for their future cities, it is said, are located, and they are delighted with the idea of settling there (in California) and establishing an empire of our own, which they will undoubtedly do. They are more united now than ever.

An Earthquake.—Last evening (Sunday, Oct. 26th,) the shock of an earthquake was felt in several places on Long Island, and more or less distinctly at different points in this city. It occurred at precisely fifteen minutes past six o'clock. The day had been a most delicious one the atmosphere clear and balmy, not a cloud on the surface of the sky, and the wind entirely at rest. The trembling and sound must have lasted about two minutes. The movement of the sound was a very deliberate one, and seemed to us to be in a direction from South to North, or perhaps a little to the East of North.—*New York Eve. Post.*

More Annexation.—The New Orleans *Courier*, speaks of Gov. Reynolds's recommendation for the annexation of Cuba with approbation and interest. It then suggests to the Democratic party, the principles of which it warmly supports, the propriety, or rather the certainty of the speedy annexation of Ireland.

The following extracts are from a new work on the Steam Engine by Professor Renwick, of Columbia College, New York. In those days of improvements in the Steam Engine, it is worth while to peruse the opinions contained in the following extracts:

"The application of steam acting expansively, originated with Watt. One of his single Engines employed it in this manner at Soho as early as 1776; and he used it also in his double acting Engines almost from their first construction. Two brothers of the name of Hornblower, in 1782 took out a patent for the use of the same principle, but by means of two cylinders. In the first of these, the steam acts by its tension, and produces an effect equal to that which it does in the high pressure Engine. On escaping from this it enters a second and larger cylinder in which it expands, and from the opposite side of whose piston the steam flows alternately to the condenser. Thus, then, the resistance which the atmosphere opposes to high steam is removed, and the effect of its expansion brought into play. As the separate condenser interfered with the patent right of Watt, this plan could not be brought into use, nor was it desirable that it should, for an Engine of equal power on this construction is more costly than that of Watt, and it is difficult to make the two cylinders employed—one containing high and the other expansive steam—act in such harmony that one shall not be retarded by the other."

"Hornblower's patent was received in 1804 by Wolfe, with a boiler for generating high steam."

The Steamer Great Britain will not make another trip to New York this year. On her return to England, she will be taken into dock, a false keel put to her, her power increased, and her propeller improved. She will recommence her trips in the spring.

GREAT WESTERN.

Seven Days Later from Europe.

By the arrival of the *Great Western*, steamer, at New York from Liverpool, we have advice a week later than those brought by the *Hibernia*. The *Great Western* left Liverpool on Saturday, the 11th inst., and arrived early on Tuesday morning, the 25th, making the passage in about 16 days and a half. She brought out 128 passengers.

The appearance of the harvest in England was such as to produce an advance in the price of bread stuffs, which it was supposed would be steadily sustained throughout the winter. The Cotton market was dull, and prices of American Cotton had receded a half a farthing since last advices; the business however being limited. There appeared, however, to be no new influence operating upon sales since the sailing of the *Hibernia*.

The prospects of the Harvest were such that breadstuffs were still rising in price, with the expectation of continued scarcity. The following statement on this subject, is from the commercial article of the *European Times*:—

The Grain markets, both here and elsewhere, it will be seen, are on the rise. The London market advanced considerably—nearly 2s. per quarter. The remarks which we have made on one or two occasions recently, still applied to the Corn market. The present harvest will yield indifferently, and this, combined with the failure of the crop on many parts of the Continent, from which we have, in former years, drawn a large portion of our supplies, cannot fail to send the price of "bread stuffs" up to a higher figure than they have yet seen.

The general failure of the potatoe crop is, as we have before stated, one of the primary elements, in this upward tendency of prices. It may be observed, however, that as regards England, the disease in the potatoe, in many districts, has nearly disappeared, leaving only a small scab behind, which will not materially injure the properties of that valuable esculent.

Ireland.—The disunion between the Repeal party in Ireland is spreading. "Young" and "Old" Ireland are at loggerheads, and the establishment of a paper under the latter title, which is intended to represent the O'Connell section of the Repealers, will make the breach wider. In connection with this bone of contention, which brings the party represented by the *Nation* newspaper into open and avowed hostility with the leading spirits of Conciliation Hall, may be mentioned the Bequests Act, the Maynooth Endowment scheme, and the presumed insanity of the Roman Catholic Primate of Ireland, Dr. Crolly. This disunion has been the object of bitter hostility from a portion of the Repeal press. The editor of the forthcoming publication, Mr. Barrett, who conducts the *Pilot* has assumed the insanity of Dr. Crolly; and as there appears no just ground for so serious—and, if it be designed, such an infamous imputation—the "Young" Ireland party has fixed upon this charge, and has hurled denunciations loud and indignant against the perpetrator.—*Wilmor & Smith.*

The *European Times* says that one of the leading London journals receives more in a

week for its rail road advertisements than the President of the United States receives for his services in a year.

M. Thiers in England.—This gentleman and suite went to England in the Queen steamer from Gibraltar, and landed at Southampton on the 9th inst.

Mr. John O'Connell has received a general letter from Mr. T. C. Foster, the Irish "Commissioner" of the London Times, expressing the impotence of the letter, read at the Repeal Association on the 27th ult., purporting to be from him, but signed John Foster. Mr. O'Connell acknowledged the error which led him into low abuse of his supposed antagonist, in a dignified and graceful manner.

The news from Algeria of a fresh outbreak of Abdel Kader, and the nearly total destruction of a French force of 450 men, has excited much attention in France and throughout Europe, and the French Government were taking strong measures to maintain their power in Africa. Some particulars are given in our extracts below.

An attempt had been made to bring about a revolution in the Roman States in Italy. The movement commenced at Rimini on the 24th ult., and at our latest advices the insurgents, after having carried the fort of St. Leo, and freed the political prisoners there confined, were still in arms in the mountains having been obliged to retire from Rimini from the want of sympathy and support from the people generally.

Eugene Sue, the author of the *Wandering Jew*, has been formally excommunicated by the Archbishop of Lyons, primate of France.

Marriage of the Queen of Spain.—The Madrid papers place beyond a doubt the fact that the French Court is carrying the matter triumphantly through. The Duke de Rainzares has returned to Madrid from Paris, where, with M. Donoso Cortes, he went to arrange the marriage question with Louis Philippe in person. The *Augsburg Gazette* states that the Cabinet of Vienna had given in its adhesion to the marriage of Prince Ferdinand of Saxe Coburg with the Queen of Spain, and that the object of Queen Victoria's visit to Ea was to obtain the consent of King Louis Philippe.

The Bank of England returns for the week ending the 27th ult. state the amount of notes issued to be £28,557,990, against which in addition to the Government debt and other securities, there is in coin and bullion £14,557,990. In the banking department the liabilities are set down at £36,047,344, and the assets include £262,703 in gold and silver coin.

The Eclipse.—In our last publication we gave some particulars respecting a very infectious and fatal fever which had made its appearance amongst the officers and crew of this vessel. We regret to say, that although every effort which humanity and professional skill could suggest have been adopted, the fearful malady has not yet been subdued. The medical officers who came home in the *Eclair* have been attacked with the fever, and are dangerously ill; and Lieutenant Isaacson was also seized on the 9th inst.—*W. & S. Times.*

THE REVENUE.—The Quarter's Revenue in the Customs shows a decrease of a million sterling, and an increase in the Excise of about £50,000. In the Post office there is also an increase, and the stamps and Taxes yield a slight increase; but the amount of the Property Tax has decreased, and the Quarter's Revenue, as compared with the corresponding quarter last year, shows a decrease of about £800,000. This is a large sum; but it is accounted for by the reduction of the duty on sugar, and the small quantity of foreign grain that paid duty this quarter as compared with the same period last year.—*Wilmor & Smith.*

FRANCE.—The Paris Journals have been filled for the last few days with the late disasters of the French in Algeria. The French government received the accounts of this disaster on Sunday the 5th inst. It appears that hostilities had been renewed on the part of Abd-el-Kader, and that in an engagement, into which they were treacherously drawn, the French troops had suffered severely.

The French officer commanding at Djemira-Ghezna, a port situated on the frontiers of Morocco, was informed by an Arab that Abd-el-Kader was in the neighborhood. The officer, who was a brave man, immediately took steps to repel the enemy, and placed himself at the head of about 450 men, which was the greater part of the garrison of the place, went out to meet Abd-el-Kader. He had hardly proceeded two leagues when he found himself all of a sudden in front of a large body of Arabs, who attacked him on all sides. The commanding officer was one of the first killed. The troops defended themselves bravely, and made a most desperate resistance, but their ammunition failed them, and they were all cut to pieces. Eighty however contrived to take refuge in a marabout, where they endeavored to defend themselves.

For two days they kept the enemy at bay, but want of provisions, and especially want of water, drove them to the most desperate and disgusting extremes. Ultimately they were all destroyed, and with the exception of fourteen soldiers who contrived to escape into the town, the whole of the rest perished. Abd el Kader, encouraged by this success, marched immediately on Tlemcen, in the hope of surprising General Carraiguac, who happened at the time Abd-el-Kader came up to be in the field at the head of a considerable number of troops. He was immediately attacked by the Arabs and suffered considerable losses, but ultimately the Arabs were repulsed. A Colonel was among the killed. General Lamoriciere has sent large bodies of troops to the Morocco frontier, and is to

place himself at head of them; but it is thought that Abd el Kader will not meet the reinforcements, but, satisfied with his present success, will take refuge in the desert.

The Government are determined not to let the affair pass unavenged. His Majesty held a council on the 6th, at which it was ordered that six regiments of infantry and two regiments of cavalry should be embarked and conveyed immediately to Oran, in Algeria, where Marshal Bugeaud is to proceed forthwith. Reports state that Marshals Soult and Bugeaud had received a telegraphic despatch to proceed to Paris without delay. The comments of the press, with regard to the defeat of the French army, are loud in their abuse of the ministry. The resolve of the government to send 12 000 additional troops to Algeria had a depressing effect for a short time upon the proceedings of the Paris Bourse.

The Prisoner of Ham.—A letter from Paris of the 17th ult., published in a German print, says:—Prince Louis Bonaparte is tired of his prison at Ham, and is said to be disposed to submit to any terms imposed upon him for his liberation. The Minister of the Interior has sent him a person who is provided with confidential instructions. It is believed that the prisoner and his companions of misfortune will soon be restored to freedom, and it is said will proceed to America, some accounts say to *Mexico*.

SPAIN.—The Madrid Gazette publishes the text of a treaty of peace concluded between Spain and the Republic of Chili. A full and complete amnesty is granted to all Spaniards and Chilians who may have taken part in any of the late discussions between the two countries, and the independence of the Republic of Chili is fully recognised by the Queen of Spain. The negotiation with the See of Rome was progressing, though slowly. A courier had been despatched from Madrid with the reply of the Government to the last demands of the Papal Court, and with a declaration of its wish to see the questions in dispute brought to an issue.

THE WEATHER.—During the last few days a large quantity of rain has fallen—the atmosphere still continues warm, however, for the season of the year.

The full term of the Court of Nisi Paus commenced here on Tuesday last.—His Honor Mr. Justice PARKER presiding. There are 20 causes entered for trial.

An Inquest was held on the 25th ult. by the coroner S. T. Gove Esq. upon the body of Mrs. Mary McMaster. Verdict: "that the deceased came to her death, from the excessive use of ardent spirits."
