OUR NEIGHBOR, THE NEGRO

(Rev. O. L. Hailey, D.D.)

Sometimes I feel like giving a particular application to the challenging words of John the Baptist when he spoke of Jesus of Nazareth. He said: "There standeth one among you whom ye know not." I think I might speak the same thing to our people concerning our neighbors, the Negro. From my association with our people I am constrained to believe that we are seriously mistaken when we say, so confidently, that "we know the Negro." I have a serious conviction that there is much concerning this people that white people really do not know.

We need to know these things. We know that he is among us and we may think he is as he once was, but such is, by no means the case. We do not know his condition, his aspirations or his endeavors as we should. The Negro is not the same one who was liberated in 1863. Those who think he has stood still all these years are greatly mistaken. Two generations have come to us since emancipation.

Negroes were introduced into Virginia in 1619. There were twenty-three Negroes in 1625 in Virginia and they were not all slaves. In 1860 there were 4,441,830 Negroes in the country, most of them in the South. In 1920 there were 10,463,013, and of these 9,025,096 were in the South. There is something like a million and a half in the North.

The Negro is a very religious man and is considered very emotional, but why not? Is not our response to religious appeal too tame and spiritless?

There are said to be 5,016,415 Negro church members and of these about three out of every four are Baptists. It may be as well to recognize the fact that this is not due to the contributions of service of Southern white Baptists that this condition prevails. It should be a source of humiliation and grief that we have done so little. The Negroes are making the most heroic struggle of any people in our land. With a courage that is sublime, a devotion that challenges admiration, and a faith that honors God and calls down from heaven the benedictions of our Heavenly Father, they are making progress that is truly

Our Seminary is one answer to this question. The Southern Baptist convention allotted \$200,000 for the purpose of building a Theological Seminary for the Negroes. Not all of this sum has been received but enough to build the first unit which will be ready for opening about the time of the gathering of the National Baptist Convention in Nashville, in September. Meanwhile a faculty is being secured for the school.

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Editorial

SERVICE.

In a recent editorial of the London Free Press captioned: "The Secret of Greatness," we read the following sentence: "There is a good deal of community service and philanthropy which does not indicate Christian greatness, because the motive and dynamic behind it are not Christian. It may be selfish, it may be performed to salve a restless conscience." That some of the community service has for itself an ulterior motive we have no doubt. We also believe, with the editor of the Free Press, that many donations to charity are made to salve a restless conscience; but withal we believe the vast majority of social and community service is rendered in the spirit of Christ. We are of the opinion that the world is becoming a better place in which to live and that more and more the human family is beginning to feel its inter-dependence, that more and more men are realizing their responsibility one for the other.

Not many years ago an education was considered a "luxury" which belonged only to the children of the wealthy classes. To-day it is unthinkable that the poorest children should be denied at least an elementary training, and each year witnesses greater provisions being made to give all our children technical and special training.

One of the most inspiring gatherings we have ever witnessed was that band of Social Service Workers of North America which convened in Toronto during the month of June. There these faithful souls discussed the welfare of the foreigner, the black, brown and white man, the rich, the poor, the employer and the employee with the same amount of interest. One could easily discern, from their earnestness of purpose that they had consecrated themselves to the task of bringing "peace on earth." Most of their discussions centered around the underprivileged.

If we are correctly informed, both the Kiwanis and the Rotary clubs have as one of their objects the care of the underprivileged, an attempt at levelling all humanity we might say. From what we know of the directorate and membership of these two organizations and of other organizations which are doing excellent charitable and community service work, their efforts are not motivated by selfishness nor is it done to soothe or salve a restless conscience. Rather we believe it is the spirit of Christ revealing

itself through the children of men. We believe the greater man's vision becomes the clearer he can see the need of others and that the bigger a man grows the more he will heed the Master's admonition: "Feed my lambs."

Not long since, a few earnest souls both white and colored, came together and formed a league for the advancement of colored people. Our white brethren had nothing to gain but something to lose by identifying themselves with a cause which is at present unpopular. The colored brethren, although not too well off with the goods of this world, decided to give of their talent and of their widow's mite that others might be blessed. To the everlasting credit of this league, its very first act was to assist a destitute mother and her four children. Clothing, food, and a house have been supplied for the family and the mother has been placed in such a position that she can help herself. This was no done from a spirit of selfishness nor to salve an uneasy conscience. We truly believe that the world has heard Christ saying: "feed my sheep."

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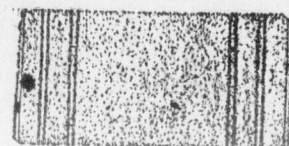
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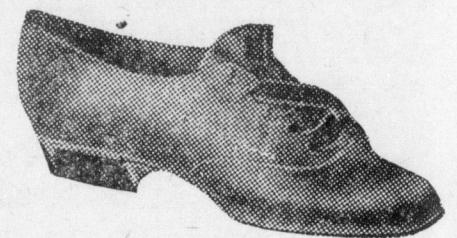

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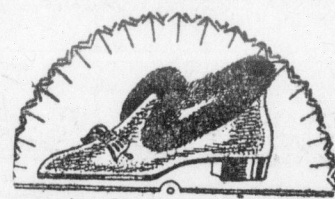
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COLLINGWOOD NOTES
