LABOR MOVEMENTS.

A Revival of the Miners' Trouble in Texas Threatened.

Sixty additional convicts from Tracy City, Tex., were taken on Monday to Bruceville, the scene of the recent mine troubles. They will be used in completing the stockade and then be put to digging coals. This movement was a surprise. W. E. Denny, Eugene Kelly and Phil Hickey are under arrest at Butte, Mont., for the murder of Editor W. J. Penrose on the night of June 7. The murder was the result of attacks on labor organizations. Denny is president of the workingmen's union and Kelly a prominent member in the same organization. Hickey is ex-president of the miners' union. Detectives claim to have the necessary evidence.

PARKBILI, Ont., July 28.—Yesterday morning a dwelling house on Station street, owned by John Gleeson, of McGillivray, and occupied by M. Cluney, caught fire and was completely destroyed. Most of the contents were saved. Loss about \$400, partly covered by insurance.

LONDON, July 28.—A school of over 100 whales was recently driven by the tides into Wideford Bay, near Kirkwall, on the Orkney coast, and hundreds of the inhabitants of that district, armed with weapons of every description rallied to the spot and began slaughtering the huge creatures and dragging the carcasses ashore. Not a single one escaped. The scene was unique in whaling annals. Lucas Myers, of Latrobe, who was thrown from the platform, was also killed. Milton Pyle, of Somerset, was hurled through the air and struck on the rocks on the side of the track. COL. VINCENT'S MISSION.

Col. Vincent, a supporter of the Salis bury Government in the Imperial Parliament, spoke at Montreal the other night in favor of the proposed new trade policy which has been squinted at but not formally adopted by the Imperial Federationists. Discussion was not invited, but Hon. Peter Mitchell rose and combatted the arguments of the visitor so effectively that the more ardent supporters of the movement hooted him down. Mr. Mitchell, however, ex- is able, through her trade policy, to supply pressed his desire to have the propositions

We can understand why Col. Vincent should advocate the re-establishment of a protectionist policy in Britain; but it is hard to see wherein lies the justice of the complaint of Canadian protectionists against the old land. The mother country takes all that we send her, and does not impose a tax on it. If we want to sell her ore, let us reduce the taxes which we charge on her goods, and buy more from her. Then we shall be sure to increase our trade with her. This can be done now. We need not wait for any change in Britain's fiscal policy. But the average Canadian protectionist objects to this class of "commercial union" even more strongly than he opposes freedom to trade with the dates. Our protectionists dread the com-petition of the Motherland much more than they fear the competition of their neighbors over the border. That fact is exemplified in the tariff legislation of the exiles. It has the merit of being, like present Administration.

As Col. Vincent expounds it, Imperial Federation has a different aspect from that put on it by some of its advocates. He propounds a policy intended to compel Canadians to charge less duty on British manufactures than on the products of other nations, and in return the imposition of a tax by Britain on all non-colonial produce is promised. But as the pledge is given to the British people that the change would not enhance the price of food products, wherein would the Canadian farmer profit by the change?

It is reported that a Western M. P. has invited Col. Vincent to come and lecture in this city on the scheme which he champions, and it is expected that before the summer is over he will put in an appear ance. Canadians will not be likely to become excited over his imperialist visions, for the reason that the scheme stands little chance of being indorsed either by the people of the Motherland or by the Canadian people. It is certain that Lord Salisbury has received the proposition with coldness and no party in Canada has deemed it wise to champion it.

When we find Canadian protectionists clamoring for a reduction of the duties on British manufactures and British work people demanding the reimposition of the duties on food products, then will it be time to consider the proposition seriously. Meanwhile, it is a mere "Will-o'-the-






