Wrecked in a Tunnel

Awful Disaster at One of Phila delphia's Suburbs.

Two Trains Collide at Full Speed and Then Take Fire.

The Loss of Life Supposed To Be Very

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 24. — A terrible wreck occurred this morning about 9:10 o'clock. The scene of the accident is at West Manayunk, a suburb of this city about 10 miles distant. It seems the Shamoken express on the Reading road due here at 9:30, and carrying a large number of passengers was the ill-fated train. This train usually leaves the upper coal regions Monday morning loaded with workmen and laborers who are employed along the line, and who take advantage of the Sunday rest to go home on Saturday night and spend the holiday with their families. It would appear that the passenger train entered the tunnel at West Manayunk at regular speed and ran into a coal train with disastrous results. The first rumor to reach the city was to the effect that eight persons had been killed and a number injured. This was followed later by the more alarming statement that no less than 28 lives had been lost, and later still the figures rose to the appalling total of 52 killed. Inquiry at the offices of the company met with no information. The officers admitted there had been a wreck, but refused to give any further information or even the slightest detail. It was learned, however, that the wreck had taken fire and was burning rapidly in the tunnel. The chances of reacuing such of the passengers as are in the burning cars are slim.

M'KINLEY'S BAD BLUNDER.

May Result in the Defeat of a Republican Congressman.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Oct. 23.—A blunder made by Gov. McKinley is seriously embar rassing Col. O. J. Hodge, Republican cardidate for Congress in the 21st district, and may accomplish his defeat. Hodge, as a member of the General Assembly, opposed the passage of a bill presented by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, and was published by the union as opposed to legislation in the interest of railway employes. The secretary of the brotherhood, C. G. Knight, of this city, became the leading candidate for appointment by Gov. McKinley to be State railway commissioner last spring, and Hodge wrote the governor aletter de nouncing Knight, the brotherhood and rail way employes generally, and protesting against his appointment. On this the governor refused to appoint Knight, and in returning his indorsements got the Hodge eletter among them and sent it to him. The mistake has just been discovered and the letter recalled, but the engineers have had it photographed and circulated in face-simile among the railway employes at Cleveland. The blunder may result in the re-election of Tom Johnson for Congress.

RECAPTURED.

AUBURN, N. Y., Oct. 23.—Oliver Curtis Perry has been recaptured and is now safe within a dungeon cell in Auburn prison. The celebrated train robber, who escaped from his cell yesterday afternoon, enjoyed his limited freedom for just eight hours, when he was again thrust back into confinement more secure than ever before. This ended the scrimmage and the bold express robber was carried to a cell from which it is unlikely he will ever escape. Perry was game to the last and remarked that he would make another attempt to escape as soon as he was able.




