They ran in the direction from which the sounds came and found the woman lying on the pavement and the blood flowing from an awful gash in her throat. In these, and in many other ways, it has cocasioned great public and private injury, all of which evils must continue to grow in intensity so long as the present tariff system remains in force.

all of which evils must consider to grow in intensity so long as the present tariff system remains in force.

That the highest interests of Canada demand a removal of this obstacle to our country's progress, by the adoption of a sound fiscal policy, which, while not doing injustice to any class, will promote demestic and foreign trade and hasten the return of prosperity to our people.

That to that end, the tariff should be reduced to the needs of honest, economical and efficient government.

That it should be so adjusted as to make free, or to bear as lightly as possible upon the necessaries of life, and should be so arranged as to promote freer trade with the whole world, more particularly Great Britain and the United States.

We believe that the results of the protective system have greviously disappointed thousands of persons who honestly supported it, and that the country in the light of experience is now prepared to declare for a sound fiscal policy.

The issue between the two political parties on this great question is now clearly defined.

The Government themselves admit the failure of their fiscal policy, and now

The Government themselves admit the failure of their fiscal policy, and now profess their willingness to make some changes, but they say that such changes must be based only on the principle of protection.

We denounce the principle of protection, as radically unsound and unjust to the masses of the people, and we declare our conviction that any tariff changes based on that principle must fail to afford any substantial relief from the burdens under which the country labors.

This issue we unhesitatingly accept, and upon it we await with the fullest confidence the verdict of the electors of Canada.

PRACTICAL EXPERIENCE.

How New Zealand Has Been Saved From Bankruptcy.

Facts and Figures for Old Fogy Political Economists to Study.

Only a very few years ago New Zealand was in a critical condition. The colony had no credit, it was poorly governed and had lost everything except the confidence the working people had in the fruitful soil and in themselves, that is in their physical ability and their intelligence. The leaders, political and otherwise, had run the country in the ground, and the people had become disgusted. The labor party won in the election and gained the majority in Parliament. A labor Ministry was formed, England and the other colonies predicted that New Zealand would soon be bank-rupted.

English capitalists were horrified, the great landed proprietors sold their lands at a sacrifice, and many left the country, as they feared not only financial ruin, but anarchy. But all their tears were ungrounded, as the excellent condition of the colony at present proves conclusively. The property tax was abolished and a land tax levied, the amount of which is determined by Parliament each year. Besides the tax on cultivated land, a tax is levied on uncultivated land that is collected on all land valued at more than £5,000; on land valued at more than this sum, ½d. per pound is collected annually; up to £10,000 the tax is ½d., and so on up to £20,000, on which the tax is ½d. This tax is directed especially against the large and absented proprietors of land, and its success has been so remarkable that that Government has not been required to berrow money for years from the money sharks of London, but has been bothered to know what to do with the surplus.

The Tavistock Dairy School is a Good Place at Which to Learn.

The dairy school at Tavistock was visited last week by Mr. J. W. Wheaton, secretary of the Western Ontario Dairymen's Association, who reports the work there as progressing very favorably. The association operates the school so that a place may be provided where cheesemakers who get into difficulties in making may get help, and also where makers who wish to acquire the best practices in making first-class cheese may get practical and definite knowledge in this regard.

Mr. A. T. Bell, who was instructor in cheese-making at the dairy school in connection with Ontario Agricultural College last winter, is in charge of the work at Tavistock. His capabilities as a first-class maker and advanced dairyman are well known to all the cheesemakers in Western Outario. There has been a fair attendance so far this season, but it is heped that more makers will avail themselves of this means provided for their benefit, and cudeavor to spend a day or two with Mr. Ball during the season.

It speaks well for the future of the cheese industry that young men who have spent several years in making themselves proficient in the latest theories and practices of scientific agriculture do not consider their knowledge complete till they have made themselves thoroughly familiar with the W. O. D. A. system of cheese-making. The milk at the Tavietock factory is paid for according to the percentage of butter, fat, and is giving good satisfaction to those supplying it.

Mr. Wheaten has also visited a number of the factories in Western Ontario this season where this system is in vogue, and reports the patrons and factorymen as being fairly well satisfied with it. There are a few who are dissatisfied with it, that this dissatisfaction is usually found with the man supplying poor milk. He naturally prefers to have his 3 per cent, milk pooled with his neighbor's 4 per cent, milk, and thereby reap more than he has sown in getting a share of the profits that belong to his neighbor.


