A very large audience assembled at the Auditorium last evening to witness the interesting convocation ceremonies of the medical faculty of the Western University. In the center of the gallery were the medical students themselves, who were in evidence from start to finish, and gave frequent signs of the close interest with which they followed the proceedings. In the wings of the gallery and on the floor of the house were assembled a number of the friends of the university, who also manifested the keenest interest throughout. On the platform were the following gentlemen: Provost Watkins, Dr. Moorhouse, dean of the medical faculty, Canon Smith, Prof. Harrison, Rev. Canon Dann, Drs. Bucke, Ferguson, Eccles, Williams, Wishart, Gardiner, Hodge, J. B. Campbell, Meek and Waugh.

As the faculty made their way to the platform they were greeted by the chorus: "Good morning! Have you used Pear's soap?" by the brazenlunged students in the gallery. PROVOST WATKINS. Provost Watkins occupied the chair.
