



Sovereign Bank Directors Claim There Is \$110,000 Coming to Institution.

Montreal, March 19 .- Mr. Stewart, when seen today in regard to the suit brought against him by W. E. Stavert, for \$110,000 on behalf of the Sovereign Bank, said:

"I have not received any notice of the action, and that is all I can say about it. What this amount is for, I don't know. I can't make it out. It can't be for the stock they hold, as it would not come to that."

It is understood that the \$110,000 mentioned in the action is made up of two classes of liabilities, and that Mr. Stewart will fight the suit. One amount of \$49,000 is for stock bought at the time that the bank had begun to go down. It was decided by the directors to purchase stock to give the bank stock a lift. Each director took a large amount, and the amount which fell to Stewart's lot was \$49,000 He has taken legal advice on this, and is told that he is not responsible for it, and that the bank is. The other part of the claim is said to be personal overdrafts, most of them put through their New York branch. The notice of action is the only thing official, and the statement of the claim is not yet filed.

THE I. C. R. PROVIDENT FUND.

While by wise management the present Dominion Government has sucseeded in raising the Intercolonial Railway from a losing investment to a profitable one-the surplus for the past year, as stated by the Finance Minister in his budget speech, amounting to over \$218,000-the result has by no means been achieved at the expense of the employes of the road. On the contrary, every consideration has been given the workers; "scale" wages are paid in all departments, and the best of feeling prevails between the employes and the management. More than that, the department of railways has adopted means for providing for men Government for many years, and also for abolishing such positions occupied by older men as can be dispensed with without injury to the service. This has been accomplished by the establishment of a provident fund.

Under the system, which is now in full operation, the employes, at their own request, in order to have the right of assisting in the government and management of the fund, contribute a certain sum each year, and the Government contributes a share not exceeding \$100,000 annually. The fund is administered by the minister, through a board of five persons, one being the general manager, two appointed by the Who fears the way is growing steeper?
