Mexico City, July 12. — As an indicaiton of the fervor of patriotism that has been aroused in Mexico, the department of the interior announced today that representatives of 30,000 workmen had appealed to the Government for military instruction in order that they might be ready to fight for the national existence.

The newspaper El Pais says it has been visited by a committee of women school teachers, who offered to enter the ranks of the army and fight in case of an international conflict.

Big Demonstration. The students of the federal capital are organizing a demonstration for Sunday, in which they have invited the workingman and all other classes to participate. Although the organitations have cautioned those who will participate to keep order, there is grave fear on the part of conservative Mexicans and also among the American colony. Demonstration will provoke serious trouble.

It is an excellent thing for society that woman should always keep the highest value on herself. It is one of the barricades which protect her from evil.



Jack Johnson Blamed Wife For Smuggling

Necklace With a Tragic History Sold to Chicago Traveller.

[Canadian Press.] Chicago, July 12. - The diamond necklace which belonged to Jack Johnson's former white wife, Etta Duryea, was sold to a jeweler today for \$2,160, at public auction, in the office of the United States marshal.

As appraised by Government officials the necklace is valued at \$3,040, although Johnson bought it in London for \$1,950 at the time of the coronaion of King George.

Johnson's white wife wore the necklace at a party soon after their return to the United States. Its brilliance excited comment and customs officials in Chicago investigated. Johnson was unable to show proper entry on the ewels and the necklace was seized. The fighter claimed that his wife had smuggled the necklace into the United States without his knowledge,

The duty on the circlet would have een about \$1,000. It is composed of 35 white diamonds ranging in weight from 1 7-8 carats to 1-4 carat.







That justi-fled the foresight of those people who saw that his particular punishment of the "cat' would act as a deterrent, for although a doctor certified the prisoner to be fit to receive the punishment, the man made a strong point of his ailment.

SIR JONATHAN HUTCHISON.

"Sir Jonathon Hutchison, surgeon and scientist, whose death occurred this week, will be best known to the general public by his book on 'Leprosy and Fish-eating," says the Manchester Guardian. "The peculiar distribution of leprosy, on islands, shores of coninents, along the course of rivers, in every climate, and in numerous races, ed him to the conviction that a common factor existed in the eating of Ish and of decomposing or bad fish. He travelled to South Africa and India when 73 years old to investigate on the spot difficult points raised against his theory, and in 1906 he published in book form his facts and conclusions. "His most important work was on venereal disease, and there was no higher authority on this subject in

England" His discovery on this subject, says the Times, "was the first step towards the general recognition of the part played by syphilis both inherited and acquired, not only in producing many forms of disease with which its connection had not previously been suspected, but also as a widely diffused cause of family and national degenera-

"Mr. Hutchison watched the phenonena of disease with unremitting vigience, fully convinced of the fruit of Faraday's famous dictum that new knowledge is constantly passing under our eyes but escaping our observation; and in this sense often quoted Browning's line, "I tell you men won't notice; when they do they'll understand,"

The matter of roadmaking had become once more an important social, economic and financial question for the consideration of this country-especially financially

In 1892 the roads of England and Wales cost 81/2 millions to maintain. Twenty years later—last year—they cost 15½ millions—practically double. The roads had become not merely a means of transit of passengers, but for the conveyance of goods as well, and they were becoming more and more so. The more communications were improvised the less there was to be spent on distribution, and the less there was spent on distribution, the more there was left for production. Bad roads meant horses being taken away from the plow and attached to the cart.

New Exit From London. The question of exits from the great towns was a very important one. He was glad to see that the road board of this country had since 1910 made grants to the amount of three millions for the improvement of our roads. He hoped some part of their balance would be spent upon improving the exits of the great cities. He was glad to hear he was not sure it had been announced -that an arrangement had been effected between the road board and the Middlesex county council for a new exit out of London. It was very sadly needed. He believed that it would cost something under half a million pounds the road board undertaking three-quarters of the expenditure, and the Middlesex county council the remaining quarter.
