Plain Evidence.

The swelling of her lips and tongue at that time give unmistakable evidence of arsenical poisoning, but the overdose resulted in stomach sickness, and the consequent expulsion of the poison by vomiting. That dose could not have caused her death a week later. In the meantime the attack of sickness, the causes of which she did not suspect, recurred three or four times, indicating in medical opinion that more poison was administered from time to time until her death was caused. ntil her death was caused.

Kemmel Is Again Under Fire From Haig's Heavy Guns—Three Violent German Attacks Against British Near La Bassee Are Repulsed.

Paris, Sept. 10 .- South of St. Quentin, French troops have captured Gibercourt and have made progress towards Hinacourt and Essigny-le-Grand, according to the official statement given out today by the French war office.

KEMMEL IS AGAIN UNDER FIRE OF BRITISH HEAVY ARTILLERY

British Armies in France, Sept. 10.—The British line northeast of Nieppe, in the Lys salient, was advanced during the night and the British positions in the Ploegsteert region were improved. Kemmel is under fire from the heavy guns.

North of La Bassee, the Germans evidently are trying out th British strength.

They have made three attacks on the British posts, but each time they were repulsed with heavy losses.

HEAVY FOE COUNTER-ATTACKS NEAR CAMBRAI ARE REPULSED

London, Sept. 10 .- The Germans delivered a counter-attack yesterday against the positions won by the British to the west of Gouzeaucourt, fronting the Hindenburg line southwest of Cambrai. Field Marshal Haig announced in his official statement today that the enemy assault had been completely repulsed. In this same sector the British line was advanced during the night south of the

On the Flanders front the British progressed northeast of Neuve Chapelle and north of Armentieres. The text of the statement reads:

"Yesterday evening the enemy launched a second counterattack against the positions gained by us during the morning west of Gouzeaucourt. He was completely repulsed. Our line has been advanced during the night south of Havrincourt.

"Progress was made by us northeast of Neuve Chapelle, and west and north of Armentieres.'

HUNS FEAR AMERICAN COLORED TROOPS WILL SEVER THEIR EARS

With the American Army in France, Sept. 9 .- The enemy heavily shelled towns in the Woevre sector behind our lines this morning. One of his patrols attacked the American outposts, but was easily driven off.

There was considerable patrol activity in the Vosges district last night. One encounter took place, the enemy retiring with one wounded man.

Colored troops have occupied one Vosges village in which French civilians were being held prisoner. The Frenchmen, on coming through to the American lines, declared the Germans were greatly excited at finding themselves opposed by negroes, of whom they are said to be afraid, owing to reports that American colored troops cut off the ears of their prisoners! The negro soldiers in this sector certainly had a sample of German treachery when a German patrol attacked after shouting "Kamerad." They are now thoroughly determined to have their revenge.

FRENCH TROOPS CAPTURE LIEZ FORT TWO MILES FROM LA FERE

Paris, Sept. 9.—Important progress towards the southern end of the Hindenburg line in the neighborhood of La Fere, north of the St. Gobain massif, was made by the French forces today. The The weather was ideal for this afternoon's clash. Although there was an autumn chill in the air this morning, east of the town of Liez, and of wooded regions to the east and southeast of Liez, within two miles of La Fere.

Additional ground was gained in the St. Gobain region south of the Oise, where the Servais station was taken, as well as a wooded area about a mile and a half to the south.

North of the La Fere region, the French pressed in far, capturing the towns of Remigny, Montescourt-Lizerolles, Clastres Seracourt-le-Grand, Roupy and Etreillers, the last two towns being within 3½ miles of St. Quentin.

GERMANS CLAIM ALLIES WERE REPULSED.

Berlin, Sept. 10 .- (Via London) .- British troops continued their attacks on the Peronne-Cambrai road, the German war office announced today. 

Negotiations for the purchase by the Government of the Grand Trunk Railway System are being continued, and, till some conclusion is reached, it is unlikely that a permanent board wil be appointed.

At present the Canadian Northern Railway is being administered by D. E. Hanna, A. J. Mitchell, and Major Bell, deputy minister of railways.

The main difficulty in regard to the Graund Trunk, it is understood, is the Grand Trunk Pacific, but hope is expressed that a solution eventually will pressed that a solution eventually wi

be found.
Should the Government succeed in acquiring the Grand Trunk it is proposed to appoint one board to control. under corporate management, the whole system of Government railways from coast to coast.

In this connection, it will be recalled, the Drayton-Acworth report recommended the incorporation of a new public authority, known as the Dominion Railway Company, and that the Canadian Northern, Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific be transferred to this body.

To Grease M. and M. Palm.

While the new board of directorate of the Canadian Northern, which it is the purpose of the Government to appoint, to have corporate control of Canada's 14,000 miles of state-owned roads, will 14,000 miles of state-owned roads, wil 14,000 miles of state-owned roads, will be temporary in character, pending the reaching of some decision in regard to the Grand Trunk, the Government will go ahead, probably this week, and pay Mackenzie & Mann, the Canadian Bank of Commerce, and the minority shareholders, for the \$60,000,000 of stock—declared worthless by the Drayton-Acworth report—acquired under the legislation of 1917.

Though the legislation of 1914 provided that in case of default the Canadian Northern Railway, lock, stock and barrel, should at once revert to the

barrel, should at once revert to the state, and the equity of redemption be forthwith closed, the legislation of 1917—when the company had defaulted—provided that the stock should only be acquired at a figure to be fixed by arbitration bitration.

Injection of \$10,800,000. A board of arbitration was thereupon appointed, whose duty it was to inject a value into stock which was declared by a Government-appointed commission by a Government-appointed commission to have \$0 value. That board of arbitration fixed its value of the stock at \$10,800,000. But prior to that time, the Government, Mackenzie & Mann, and the Cenedian Park of Commence Outside the Canadian Bank of Commerce, owner and pledgees, respectively, of \$51,000,000 of the stock, got together and agreed on a maximum price of \$10,000,000.

On this basis, Mackenzie & Mann will receive this week some time the health. receive this week some time the handsome sum of \$8,500,000. But the minority stockholders are not party to that agreement. They own 90,000 shares and will be paid on the basis of the award. Their share of the hand-out will therefore be \$1,620,000 and the total payment will be \$10,120,000.

The names of these minority stockholders have not been divulged. It is believed that many of them, however, were prominent in helping Union Government to power.

PLATINUM FIRST DISCOVERED IN COLOMBIA.

The fact that platinum, that beautiful and very expensive metal just now worth about six times as much as gold, was first discovered in South America in a section of what is now the Republic of Colombia is not exactly a matter of common knowledge. Furthermore, it may not be generally known that the scientists, dentists and manufacturers of the most expensive jewelry on this continent must now depend for their supplies of the precious "white gold" practically entirely upon the Colombian mines, for the Russian sources of supply are for the time being "out of the game." Still, there's no imminent danger of Colombia's resources in platinum being exhausted. They have been mining it down there for 150 years, but the output seems to be constantly increasing. As an instance, according to the current number of the Bulletin of the Pan-American Union, Washington, D.C., the exports of the metal during the past three years were valued as follows: In 1915 at \$607,500; 1916 at \$1,350,000, and for the year 1917 at \$2,160,100.

Incidentally, it is interesting to note that at one time—and that not so very long ago—the crude platinum grains that were mixed in with the ore of certain gold mines in Colombia were regarded as a waste product, and thrown away. Dr. Geo. F. Kunz, Tiffany's great expert on precious stones and metals, in an article recently contributed to the Bulletin of the Pan-American Union tells of it as follows:

"The rejection of platinum as a waste product in the operation of refining gold led to some strange happenings in Colombia. The platinum separated from the gold by the dry, or "blowing" system was either cast into the street or thrown through cracks in the building where the work was done. Later, when platinum became valuable, a considerable quantity of the metal was thus discovered in Quibdo, capital of the Choco district, where much gold refining was done. As a result the entire town of some 1,500 inhabitants was turned into a mine, and the natives were employed in working the streets for the Government, while many property owners mined under their houses. In one case a man went so far as to tear down his store, and ws rewarded by recovering enough platinum to rebuild on a larger scale and clear \$4,000 in American gold besides."

Dr. Kunz's article is replete with interesting information about platinum and, among other things, he tells how the world first learned of the existence of such a remarkable metal.

"In view of the many uses to which platinum can now be put and of its inreasing value, it seems strange that European knowledge of its existence is dated not farther back than 1735, when the South American deposits, now within the limits of the Republic of Colombia, were visited by the Spanish traveler, Don Antonio de Ulloa (1716-1795), who had been appointed with Don Jorge Juan to accompany a French scientific expedition sent out by the Government to execute the measurement of an arc of the meridian on the plain of Quito. Although the first publication of Ulloa's observations was made in his 'Relacion historica del viaje a la America meridional,' issued in two folio volumes at Madrid in 1748, specimens of the new metallic ore had already been brought to England from Jamaica as early as 1741, by Mr. Charles Wood, an English metallurgist, the naterial having reached him by way of Cartagena in the then New Granada, later a part of Colombia. Of the appearance and qualities of the new metal Mr. Wood tated that the 'Platina de Pinto' otherwise called 'Juan Blanco,' was smooth and brilliant, of uniform structure, and not liable to rust or tarnish on exposure o the air. He adds that the Spaniards did not take it from veins as ore, or as metallic masses, but in powder or small grains. He believed that it was rarel secured entirely pure, since in all examples he had seen he always observed a admixture of black and shining grains, similar to those found on the coasts of Virginia and Jamaica, this being a rich vein ore, attracted by the magnet; there were also generally certain particles of a yellowish hue which seemed to be of a different nature. He asserted that the Spaniards had learned the secret of melting it, and since they made many sword-guards, buckles, snuff-boxes, etc., of it, he concluded that it must be quite abundant. * * * The designation, 'Platina le Pinto,' had been given it, because the specimens in question came from the River Pinto, the name 'platina' itself was equivalent to 'little silver,' from its

The first veritable platinum ingot was made by a French chemist, Chabaneau, in 1783. Charles III. of Spain had called him to Madrid and created a special chair of mineralogy, physics and chemistry for him. In his laboratory he found the secret of rendering the new metal malleable, and this is the way he revealed the fact to one of his patrons:

"Three months later, at the home of the Count of Aranda, there appeared upon a table an ingot, some 10-centimeters cube (about four inches), with a beautiful metallic lustre; it was malleable platinum. The enthusiastic count started to pick it up, but failed to move it. 'You are joking,' said he to Cabaneau, 'you have fastened it down.' 'No, indeed,' said the professor, and he raised the little ingot easily, though it weighed some 23 kilograms (about 50 pounds). The count had not thought that the light platinum sponge would thus appear as the heaviest of all (then known) metals."

THE OUTLOOK FOR AUTOMOBILES, MOTOR TRUCKS AND FARM TRACTORS FOR EXPORT TRADE.

It is a foregone conclusion that the United States will exert its main efforts for foreign trade in those lines in which it is naturally pre-eminent regardless of questions of tariffs and competing prices. In this connection, motor trucks are bound to enter very largely into the calculations of the future. Spurred on by the war demands, the automobile industry of the United States has developed a capacity for production which will put that country on the first line of opportunity with respect to foreign markets. Perhaps nothing has done more to carry forward the prospect of American export trade than the automobile. Even with embargoes in practically all the countries of Europe last year the American automobile trade exceeded \$85,000,000 for 65,792 passenger cars and 13,347 trucks. Exports of the automobile industry in 1917 almost equalled the combined exports of agricultural machinery, electrical machinery and apparatus, and all locomotives and railroad cars.

FARM TRACTORS

Another American product which is bound to figure largely in the new trade opportunities of that country is the farm tractor. Only 14,500 tractors were built in 1914, while in 1915 the output was 21,000, in 1916, 50,000, and in 1917, 100,000. It seems to be a fact that this year the measure of the output will be factory capacity. Horses and mules have been sent to the war, and tractors have taken their place. In the United States alone there are more than 6,800,000 farms, and of these over 4,000,000 comprise more than 50 acres each. What this means for farm tractors is obvious. The future of the farm tractor in Argentine and China, as well as Mexico, and many smaller countries, is at the present time beyond the scope of imagination. Considering the grand introduction, the magnificent and heroic work of our Canadian troops has given Canada to the world, it is just possible our capitalists and manufacturers are not yet fully alive to the opportunities lying at our door for Canada to take her place in the markets of the world in many lines which can be produced here as well as in the United States.

The manufacturers licensed by the Canada food board are obliged to observe most drastic regulations in regard to the use of sugar in their trade.

"For example, the jam manufacturers are now limited to 25 pounds of sugar to 100 pounds of prepared fruit. Even with the sugar thus conserved, there will not be enough for preserving and canning to take care of this year's fruit crop unless people in their homes will observe some of the regulations which apply to restaurants and other public eating places."

The foregoing statement was made to The Advertiser yesterday by S. Roy Weaver, chief of the educational section of the Canada food board, who is in town in connection with the food board exhibit which is to be a feature of the Western Fair.

"But what are householders going to do about canning with the small amount of sugar available?" asked a reporter.

In the third place, it is asking housewives to discontinue making heavy preserves and jams requiring a large proportion of sugar, and to use lighter syrup. In the fourth place, it is asking housewives to help out the sugar situation by using less sugar in beverages and to exercise the utmost care in the use of sugar for cooking. Two pounds of sugar for ninety meals would be about a quarter of a cup of sugar for a family of two for a day for all table purposes, outside of preserving."

Mr. Weaver enumerated the many interests that would suffer through shutting down candymakers without warning on an industry so widespread, an industry which is a "desirable" one for normal times.

"Thirty thousard tons of sugar are used in normal these for candymaking in Canada," he said. "This year, manufacturers have been limited until the total amount which will go into candymaking is 15,000 tons. This may seem a good deal. It is only 5½ per cent of the allotment of sugar for Canada. If the people who drink tea and coffee in Canada would take one spoonful of sugar instead of two, for a cup, that self-denial of one spoonful would effect a saving of 50,000 tons of sugar in a year in the Domlnion.

The program and other committees were appointed, an extensive and varied list for the dairy exhibition completed, and the dairy men look forward to holding one of the best conventions in their history.


The Masonic Hall will be the meeting place and the basement utilized for the dairy show. It is eleven years since the dairymen's convention was held in London.
