

The Shadow of Death Hangs Over Belgium

3,000,000 People are Living Within A Few Days of Actual Starvation.

In 1865 London was honored with the exhibi-tion, and to this can in a large measure be traced the awakening of ambi-tion to hold a yearly exhibition on a larger scale than had been done. Far-sighted men saw in such an exhibition great benefit for the city apart from the educational advantages.





These resolutions affirmed that "inasnuch as the work of conciliation and romotion of amity is essentially a Christian task, it is expedient that the hurches in all lands should use their influence with the peoples, parliaments, and governments of the world to bring about good and friendly relations between the nations, so that, along the path of peaceful civilization, they may reach that goodwill which Christianity has taught mankind to aspire after."



Length of the fair extended to four days in 1871.

Western Fair Association became incorporated in 1887. Queen's Park was purchased in 1887 and the fair grounds moved to

TWO POLAR EXPEDITIONS LOST FOR FOUR YEARS

Russian Authorities Offer Reward for Information.

OTTAWA, Sept. 8 .- Rewards are offered for information concerning two Polar expeditions, which have been astray since 1912. Both are Russian, and the counsel of that country has sent out a call for information. The steam schooner Saint Anna, under the command of Lieut, Rousanoff of the Russian navy, and the motor vessel Hercules, under the command of a geologist.

Rousanoff sailed north in quest of information as to the condition of navigation and sealing grounds from the sea of Kars to the Behring Straits. ther has been reported, and it is

they have been overwhelmed in the Arctic. The Archangles Society, for the study of Northern Russia, has raised a fund of 25,000 roubles, which will be distributed in prizes as a reward for information. It is calculated that traces of the expedition may be found in the vicinity of North Greenland. The Heroules was last heard from in August, 1912, from Matolihkin Shara, when Rousanoff sent word of his intention to proceed east. Lieut. Broughloff met with disaster. Two members of his party were met on Franz Joseph Land, near Cape Flora, and they stated the schooner Anna had been abandoned in April, 1914.

THREE U. S. AVIATORS FIGURE IN ACCIDENTS

Biplane and Hydroaeropiane Fall During Manoeuvres.

NEW YORK, Sept. 8 .- Flying at a height of between 600 and 700 feet over Governor's Island today, a biplane containing J. Walter W. Struthers and Charles D. William, student aviators in raining for the United States Aero Reserve Corps, became unmanageable for some unknown reason and fell to the ground after a series of short spirals, by which Struthers, who was piloting the machine, was unable to avert the accident. Each aviator had one leg broken, and received cuts on the head. Both are expected to recover.

FALLS INTO RIVER. WASHINGTON, Sept. 8 .- Lieut. W. . Child, one of the navy aviators, fell nto the Potomac River today with a hydro-aeroplane. He was rescued unared by a passing excursion steam-The machine sank.

FIVE MONTHS' REVENUE.

OTTAWA, Sept. 8 .- Dominion revenue figures for the first five months of the fiscal year show a comparative increase of \$20,000,000. The chief advance was in customs returns, which advanced from \$35,220,000 to \$53,029,-000 Excise returns were \$9.770.000 as against \$8,417,000. Railway and canal returns increased by \$4,000,000, but there was a 20 per cent decline in postal revenue.

Revenue receipts in August were \$15,-506,000 against \$14,240, in August last year. August war expenditures totalled \$24,986,000, and for the five months \$76,310,000.



Cleaning the Car's Top. Road tar is about the most damaging thing there is on the road for car surfaces. It is doubtful if there after it has once become dry and hard. In fact, it becomes part of the surface so that very often to remove it, from the car that is to be repainted, it has to be chipped off. Gasoline will dissolve tar, but it will also destroy the varnish coats and the same with other preparations. Those that will take off the tar will also take off the finish.

After the body of the car, the next in importance is the top. How a top shall be cleaned depends on the nature of the composition of which it is composed. As mohair is quite com-mon, the principles may be illustrated with this material. A great many people clean mohair tops with gasoline. They think that since mohair is a cloth that gasoline should be the material to take the spots out. 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

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
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
