been as good as our words. The tariff was reformed in 1897, chiefly by my friend, the Minister of Customs, Mr. Paterson, and everybody today must admit, be he friend or foe, that the tariff which was framed and devised and put on the statute book in 1897 has and put on the statute book in 1897 has been of an eminently useful and practical character. True, our friends, the Tories, may speak to the contrary. It is an old saying that the eating of the pudding is the best proof of it. Well, gentlemen, the Tories, who make such clamor against the tariff, have in their mouths today the pudding of it, and they like it. They are very much like the Hebrews, who, when fed upon manna, still clamored and complained and whined and wanted to have the fleshpots of Egypt. (Cheers and laughter). So it is with the Conservatives; after seven years of unexampled prosperity they are not satisfied; to satisfy them I have given up the task, but if we can satisfy the reasonable people of the country that is all we can care for, all that we could hope for, all that I ask for at this moment (Cheers).

"In a country like Canada, in which conditions are always changing, it is impossible that the tariff be permanent like the laws of the Medes and Persians. But it was never intended that the tariff should be permanent; it was intended that there should be stability, and stability there has been in it. (Cheers). We have refused, positively refused, time after time and year after year, to tinker with the tarin, not because we knew there was no need for a change. We told our friends who came to us in order to have it amended here and there, 'No, we cannot afford Co. to indulge in that policy, we cannot follow the footsteps of our predecessors, we shall not tinker with that tariff, but from time to time revise it and take up all complaints made to us in order to remedy it and give to the people a still better one than it is at the present

"We have now only one line of duty which we apply to all countries alike, except to Great Britain, to which we give the preference, (Applause). But we propose to add a new chapter; we propose to have a double class of duties, to have a minimum and a maximum tariff. The minimum tariff we will apply to such countries as will treat us fairly, to such as will trade with us fairly; that is to countries that not only sell to us but buy from us. The maximum we propose to use against those countries which are selfish in their methods, which insist upon selling to us, but will not have elasticity or reciprocity of fair trade arrangement with us. (Applause).

THE BRITISH PREFERENCE. "Gentlemen, there is a feature of the time, the preferential tariff to England, to which I wish to refer. The Conservatives practically have never shown much sympathy for the preference. It would be very difficult for Mr. Borden and his party generally to meet on a common platform on this subject. He never attacked it himself but some of his lieutenants have attacked it. They never attack it here in this Province of Ontario, but go into my own Province of Quebec, and you will find his lieutenants, such as Mr. Casgrain, telling the people of Canada, the people of Quebec, that the greatest mistake which was ever made by the Liberal party was to grant the preference to England, Sir, it is the old, old story, England. 




