FURTHER DETAILS OF THE BAT-TLE AT ELANDSLAAGTE-GENERAL WAR NOTES.

Hard Pressed by 10,-

000 Boers.

London, October 24. - A despatch from Ladysmith, Natal, dated 4.15 yesterday afternoon, has just been received. It is a literal repetition of Cape Town's Glencoe advices of yesterday and it is regarded as somewhat ominous that nothing has since been received respecting the result, especially when viewed in the light of Lord Wolseley's statement that Gen. Yule's force felt it necessary to retire from Dundee to Glencoe Junction. General Yule evidently is in a tight corner, as he now has or had to face the main Boer army under Gen. Joubert. Gen. Sir George Stewart White, the British commander-in-chief in Natal, will undoubtedly detach part of the force which was victorious at Elandslaagte to his assistance. Such a detachment, however, will leave Ladysmith poorly protected against the threatened attack from the west, as Gen. Hunter on Saturday wired that the departure of the force to Elandslaagte left him with only a couple of battalions of regulars, a mountain battery and 500 Natal volenteers to defend the town, which is the British military base in North Natal. It is expected that Commandant Erasmus has by this time joined Commendant General Joubert, and that their combined columns amount to some 10,000 or 11,000 men, while the Free State Boers, now threatening Ladysmith from the east, and a column reported to be coming through Zulu-

reported to be coming through Zud-land, must also be reckoned with. In short, Gen. Sir Geo. Stewart White has been unable to follow up his successes, and is obliged to remain at Ladysmith without being able to restore railway communication which is probably broken at other points be-sides Elandslaagte. Thus the enemy, aithough

original plan, supposed to have been Col. Schiel's, failed, may fairly be credited with having isolated Gen. Yule's brigade and divided the British forces in Natal. Gen. Yule may find himself in a tight place, needing all himself in a tight place, needing all his experience in Indian and Burmese

fighting, to extricate himself.

It appears certain that the brilliant victory at klandslaagte was productive of no effect for the relief of Glencoe and the very reticence and brevity of Lord Woiseley's communication are only too ominous. It seems to be worded to prepare the public for bad news, and it is only too likely that Gen. Yale has been compelled to abandon the wounded and the prisoners at Dunder because his force is too weak to hold the four and a hal miles separating Dundee and Gien e. Probably Gen. Yule believes he van better protect

Dundee from an enemy advancing from the northwest by concentrating all his available strength at Glencoe, where there are now 3,500 men and three batteries. In the meantime efforts will be made to reopen the railway and to get reinforcement from Ladysmith.

At Glencoe the Boer hospital has been taken under the wing of the British hospital corps, as the Boers only had a single doctor, with primitive staff, who were quite unable to cope with the wounded.

A private message from Ladysmith to-day says the women there are weeping and wailing on the market place. Three trains have been despatched from Klerksdorp to fetch the wounded from Mafeking. It is estimated there are 700 killed and wounded, and it is stated at Pretoria that the British casualties are only eighteen.

A despatch to the Daily Mail from Pietermaritzburg, Natal, says that Lieut. Gallway, of the Natdl Carbineers, who was reported missing, is a prisoner in the hands of the Boers. An official despatch from Ladysmith says that about 200 Boer prisoners have been marched into the town.

A Cape Town despatch says:—'The capture of Gen. Ben Viljohn is a cause of great satisfaction to the Uitlanders. He is the author of a blasphemous and false pamphet fully intended to incite the Dutch of the colony to rebellion, and it is sincerely hoped that he will be brought to trial and punished as he deserves.



OR LIQUID? SOLID

An Interesting Opinion on Pitch From a Question in the Courts.

An Elderly Man Complains That Moth er's Educate Their Children in Falsehood.

An interesting question called forth an opinion from the courts in Trinidad as to whether pitch is a solid or a liquid. The stratum of pitch in that island is usually from four to seven feet below the surface and when dug through the pitch melts and oozes out. The defense was that an underground stratum of pitch was like so much water, no man's property till appropriated. But the court held that pitch was a material and that one had no more right to ab-stract it from a neighbor by the oozing process than one would have to tap his deposit of iron or silver.-Manufacturer.

THE WORD BLIZZARD.

Said to have Been Used in South Dakota in the Eixties.

The Swiss Bell Ringers Who Wanted an Experience Badly and Got it.

A well known book of reference states that the Chicago Advance was the originator of the word "blizzard" on the 8th of January, 1880. Old timers in South Dakota take exception to the statement. A story is told by the editor of the Hutchinson County Herald, who commenced his newspaper work on the Dakota Republican, at

Vermillion, in August, 1867. The Peake family, Swiss bell ringers, arrived in Vermillion by stage, and William Peake, manager of the bell ringers, said to a party of friends, "I would like to see one of your blizzards I have heard so much about." Mr. True answered: "All right. We will order one for your special benefit and have it here when you come back through here from Yankton."

After showing three nights in Yankton the troupe started homeward to Sioux City, Mr. Peake being on the outside of the stage with the drive-The morning was warm and balmy. Mr. Peake was astonished at the actions of the driver, who suddenly whipped up, and asked what the matter Williams, who was driving, answered that he was afraid Mr. True's order was going to be a little ahead of time. "Look to the northwest," said he. There was the blizzard approaching in all its fury. In almost a minute the blinding snow was being whirled through the air, and Mr. Peake withdrew to the inner part of the stage. It was one of the most terrific storms known to the territory, which is saying considerable. Because the British Government is Holding Back War Despatches.

New York, Oct. 24.-Special cables from London sage: The refusal of the government to give out late despa tches from the seat of war in South Africa is viewed with alarm by many. It is feared that either Kimberley. has fallen, and with it Cecil Rhodes, into the hands of the Boers, or that Gen. Yule has met defeat at Glencoe Junction, where he concentrated his

forces after retreating from Dundee. The redoubtable Gen. Joubert is believed to be in Yule's vicinity with 10,000 Boers, and with them the ven erable President Kruger, while between Glencoe and Ladysmith anoth er Boer force, presumably from the

Free State, is believed to be operating. Among rumors aftoat is one coming via Cape Town that. Col., Powell has captured his besieger, Gen. Cronje and killed 300 of his men; another, via Durban, that the Boer Gens. Viljoen and Kock, with Coi. Schiel and 200 men are now prisoners at Ladysmith, and that the Elandslaagte fight so staggered the Boers that their attack on Dundee, which began on Sunday, was too feeble to do any damage.

BOERS USING BIG GUNS. London, Oct. 24.—One of the most disquieting stories comes from Ladysmith. It is to the effect that an Englishman who arrived there from Dundee on Sunday evening, after escaping through the Boer lines on the previous night, reported that the enemy was then shelling the camp and town, with heavy guns, while the shells of the British were unable to reach the enemy's batteries. Consequently the man is said to have added, the camp has been shifted a mile or so, to be out of reach of the Boers, who

were firing on the magazine in the town. There is no denying, however, the great suspense and anxiety existing, which has been increased by the report in circulation, purporting to emanate from official quarters, to the effect that the Boers have secured

the services of 13,000 natives. The vague and varied estimates of the Boer losses and the absence of anything official on the subject are also arousing misgivings as to whether the beaten enemy suffered prop ortionately to the disastrous losses of the victors.

NEARLY 500, LAID LOW.

New York, Oct. 24 .- A despatch to the World from London, says: The ministers and their supporters are now realizing that they plunged into the war with reckless haste and the Queen's messages-in which she speaks of "dearly bought victories," and "dr eadful loss of life,"-indicate with a plainness which she has never before permitted herself to indulge in under like circumstances, her disapprov al of the war.

The British forces in Natal have al ready lost in killed and wounded nearly 500 men in three days' fighting. The Gordon Highlanders lost only one officer and five men killed in their famous attack on Dargai Hights in the Afridi campaign, while at Elands laagte they had four officers killed and nine wounded, twenty men killed and thirty-three wounded

The Boers distinguish and shoot the officers by reason of their carrying no rifles, their uniform being the same as 'that of the men.

The squadron of Hussars and the section of mounted infantry which pursued the Boers after the first fight at Glencoe, are still missing.



It would be a far better asset than the county buildings are now. If for one year bad weather came along, the general welfare of the fair would

VICTORIA'S DESCENT

PROF. TOTTEN OF YALE CLAIMS SHE DESCENDS FROM KING DAVID.

HE HAS TRACED A DIRECT LINE.

ccording to This Genealogy, the Little Son of the Duke of York, if He Ever Becomes King, Will be the Long-Expected King David Who Is to Rule Over the Hebrew Race.

Lieut, C. A. L. Totten, U.S. A., retired, formerly professor of military science at Yale, believes he has traced a direct line of descent from King David, of biblical times, to the little son of the Duke of York. According to Prof. Totten, if this boy, the third in line of succession to the throne of England, ever becomes king, he will be the long-expected King David, who is to come into the world to gather the Hebrew race from the four corners of the earth and to solidify again this scattered people. In speaking of his theory, Prof. Totten said to me:

"The heir of the Duke of York, if he eventually comes to the British throne, will rightfully be called David. He has always been called David. His full name is Edward Albert Christian George Andrew Patrick David. There is more to this matter than a mere name, for the oung-Prince can trace his descent back to David himself, and that is where the significance comes in, for it is well known to biblical students that there is to be at the termination of these times and the begin-ning of the next age a King David raised up to solidify the original empire of the Hebrews.

"I say his descent from King David can be traced by several lines. This arises from the fact that there are everal breaks in the male line in the one which I shall submit-the line proceeding by queens who are daughters of the preceding generation; whereas spanning across these apparent breaks there are lines which brace the whole together. I have compiled most of this from Grimaldi's Queen's royal descent from King David, the psalmist, have corrected the chronology, and have consulted the references, besides numerous others.

'The possible descent of Queen Victoria from King David was first entered upon in the present day by Rev. F. R. A. Glover, M.A., in Eng-land, in the 'Remnant of Judah,' published in London in 1861. He did not, however, attempt to give the genealogy link of link, nor enter upon the proofs in detail. Since then the whole subject of Her Majesty's Jewish ancestry has been further examined by various students and writers on our Israelitish origin. J. C. Stephens has compiled a genealogical chart, showing the connection between the house of David and the royal family of Great Britain. This gives the descent from Abraham to Zedekiah in full, as found in Matthew. It then gives twelve generations only between Heremon, B.C. 580, and Victoria, A.D., 1819, thus of course, omitting a great number of links. The descent of the royal family from the royal line of Judah is, however, no new discovery.

The Saxon kings traced themselves back to Odin, who was traced back to his descent from David, he seen in cient manuscript in the Herald's College, London, and in Sharon Tur-ner's 'History of the Anglo-'axons.' The full and complete genealogy of Victoria from David does not appear to have been eyer printed. In its compilation reliable works of reference have been used. Perfect accuracy is hardly to be expected in such an attempt, but it is believed that the genealogy is as correct as our present knowledge of this obscure and intricate subject will permit. "Commencing from Adam and numbering the generations serially we



Ducks, geese and swans build their nests on the ground In the nesting area of Alaska it is said that the nests are so thick that it is impossible to walk without stepping on one. The natives are experts in killing this game. They do it with a peculiar weapon. Six sinew strings, about three feet in length, are fastened together by a quill at one end. At the other end of each sirew is a ball of ivory, pear shaped, and about as large as a walnut. The hunter, with this in his hand, approaches the flock at dusk. He sets these falls whirling. When the flock rises to fly, these whirling sinews are thrown into the flock. They catch about the necks or legs of the birds, and they are captured. Sometimes as many as a dozen are captured at one throw, Travellers are sorry to see that the nests of these wild birds are so carelessly robbed of eggs. The eggs are wanted for the albumen which is used in manufacturing, but eggs are taken that cannot be used, and these are thrown away. So great is the destruction of eggs and birds that the birds each year occupy much less space in nesting.

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


It Got Him Ejected From the House of Commons. He Compares Joseph Chamberlain to

London, Oct. 23 .- During the course of the day's proceedings in the House of Commons, while the House was disof Commons, while the House was discussing the report on the supplementary estimates, Patrick O'Brien, Parnellite member for Kilkenny city, declared that the hands of the British Secretary of State for the Colonies, Joseph Chamberlain, were as much stained with blood as those of any murderer who ever mounted the scaffold. The Speaker, William Court Gully, called upon O'Brien to withdraw his remark, but he refused to do so, whereupon the House, by a vote of 316 to 26, resolved to suspend him, and he left the House, remarking:—"You had better bring up another army corps, unless you want it somewhere else." The House then adjourned.

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
