## THE LIBERAL REVOLT.

A few days ago there appeared in The Planet an interview with Herbert S. Clements, M. P., upon the political situation in the West, as he viewed it during a recent trip. That interview has since been copied in many of the leading journals of the Province, and in falling into line in this respect the London Free Press offers the following comment:

"What Mr. Clements, M. P., reports of irritation in the West regarding Ottawa methods of administration is perfectly creditable in the nature of the case. Everywhere, he says, the strongest Liberals are heard in denunciation of the graft and corruption that prevails.

"This is to be expected. The men settled in the West are there for honest business, not plunder at the public expense. What they gain from the soil or in legitimate trade is the fair reward of toilsome effort. It must gall them to see how a favored few, by the help of some golden master political key, can get rich quick, and become opulent in a few months or a year or two at farthest.

"How the door to permanent grazing leases was opened until a few favorites, as relatives of those in office, were glutted, and then as suddenly shut to with a snap against the common element, was seen with the clear vision of men on the spot.

"Is it to be supposed that such things can go on under their very noses without strong feelings of just jealousy and resentment? The indignation of even 'the strongest Liberals' can be well understood. They not only revolt at the favors shown as being one-sided and unjust to themselves and all who come after without the mysterious talisman, but they realize that it is the most pernicious kind of politics—not 'bad politics' in the sense of error of judgment, but destructive politics as being the cause of popular disapproval everywhere throughout Canada.

"No party can hope to keep power with such a record. Yet the men at Ottawa are found excusing this and other kinds of graft without a

blush, as if they had lost touch with honest principles.

"The statement given out by Mr. Aylesworth the other day with such an air of innocence, is the key to the whole business of graft as carried on not in the land offices alone, but in every department. Only a short time before he had given Mr. Hyman credit as a comparatively clean administrator of the Public Works. He became Acting Minister in that department and what was his statement? Why, that the Government was 'compelled' to pay excessive prices for what it wanted. He was himself forced to pay \$300 for a small piece of land 'valued at \$200,' rather than have any dispute.

"Could any confession ever made by a public trustee be more damaging in the minds of honest men? Why was this new member of the cabinet 'compelled' to pay a price and a half for the land? Is it not a sure indication of the strong grip that the grafters have secured upon the ministry? It is 'the practice,' the accepted order of things among high and low alike.

"Sir Wilfrid Laurier is called a strong man in his way. He can pose elegantly, look wisely, and speak in tones that please the ear. But he does not control the administrative strings; he has no hand in departmental details. He pleads as a handicap that he 'is not a business

man! Yet as a man of the world he must know that such things as have been done in the West and East are not 'business,' but plunder only, in the way that Mr. Alex. Mackenzie deplored and did his best to prevent in his term of power.

"The business men of the West are not to be fooled by appearance, the truculent prevarications of the minister of the interior, or the miserable excuses of Mr. Aylesworth, which the 'strongest Liberals' must hear with amazement and contempt. They realize that partisan truckling, graft and corruption, though inseparable from a long lease of power, have their limits, and that the limits have been passed in this reign at Ottawa."

## TEN BOMBS EXPLODED

Tiflis, Transcaucasia, Russia, June 27.—Ten bombs were thrown yesterday in the Erivan Square, in the centre of the town, which was thronged with people.

The missiles exploded with terrible force.

Many persons were killed or injured, and windows and doors were shattered over a large area.

The police are preventing all approach to the scene of the outrage.

During the excitement a wagon containing \$125,000, escorted by Cossacks was robbed of all its contents. This was apparently the motive for the outrage.

Tried to Steal Explosives.

St. Petersburg, June 27.—An attempt was made Tuesday night by terrorists to force an entrance into the magazine of the proving grounds, near St. Petersburg, containing a large amount of explosives. A sentry was fired at and wounded by the men engaged in the attempt, but the shots caused a patrol to hurry to the spot and the terrorists fled.

Struck a Mine.

St. Petersburg, June 27.—During the manoeuvres yesterday the torpedo boat Ubedimilny struck a mine, which exploded. The damage done was slight, owing to the deterioration of the mine.

## MUCH MONEY FOR ROADS.

Taking the expenditure on roads in Wellesley Township for ten years makes appalling figures. The cash expenditure for the ten years ending with 1905 amounts to no less than \$40,851, according to the official figures. The statute labor during that time was 63,170 days; if computed at 75 cents per day it would give \$47,377, or a total sum of \$88,229, which Wellesley Township has put on its roads between Jan. 1, 1896, and Jan. 1, 1906. This immense sum would pay for making every inch of roads in the township on the permanent plan. — Wellesley Maple Leaf.

# WAS NOT FOR REVENGE

Orchard Gives Lie to Two Wit-  
nesses For Defence.

Hercules Mine Deal Had Nothing to  
Do With Steunenberg's Murder—  
Was Spotter for Detective Agency—  
Women Give Evidence—Orchard  
and the Mine Owners' Association  
—Witnesses Swear as to Threats.

Boise, Idaho, June 26.—The first direct  
testimony in defence of William  
D. Haywood was offered yesterday.  
The first witness for the defence  
was preceded by a further examina-  
tion of Orchard, to permit the defence  
to complete its formal questions of  
impeachment.

Orchard spoke in the same soft tone  
that he did recently. He again denied  
that he ever threatened to kill Steun-  
enberg because of the Hercules mine  
and again asserted that he sold his  
interest in the mine two years before  
the trouble which drove him out of  
northern Idaho.

The witnesses heard yesterday were  
F. R. Redd, once of Cripple Creek,  
and now of Goldfield, Nevada; and  
Charles A. Sullivan, formerly of Crip-  
ple Creek, and now a watchman in  
the Brown Hotel in Denver.

Redd testified that he heard Orchard  
make the statement and the  
threat in the Miners' Hall in Cripple  
Creek, and Sullivan swore that while  
he and Orchard were fellow board-  
ers, Orchard repeatedly said that but  
for Steunenberg he would be a rich  
man, and that he intended to kill  
him.

The cross-examination showed that  
both witnesses were members of the  
Western Federation of Miners, and  
that Sullivan was a friend of Hay-  
wood, Moyer and many of the union  
leaders.

Dr. I. L. Magee, a mining broker,  
swore that Orchard told him in 1904,  
at Wallace, Idaho, that he was a spot-  
ter for a detective agency. Orchard  
denied this conversation.

Several witnesses, principally women,  
who kept boarding houses at  
Cripple Creek, testified to Orchard's  
being in conference at various times  
with Sterling, the detective for the  
Mine Owners' Association.

## FOR DEFENCE OF CANADA.

Lord Roberts Says Matter Is One of  
Vital Importance.

London, June 26.—In the House of  
Lords, Lord Roberts, referring to Hal-  
dane's army scheme, the merit of  
which he acknowledged, remarked:

"We could not leave out of account  
the most extensive exposed of all our  
frontiers, Canada's. Could we be  
silent about the defence of Canada  
without inevitably conveying to Cana-  
dians the impression that we did not  
consider the defence of Canada of  
vital importance. Surely if there are  
any nations to whom we could not  
afford to give ground for offence they  
are the nations within the empire.  
But how could we offend them more  
deeply than by refusing to discuss  
questions which matters of life or  
death to them."

"If the empire is to be defended at  
all, the co-operation of the colonies  
and India is indispensable."

He looked, in the great imperial  
struggle, not to small contingents,  
ear-marked for our use in return for  
our holding corresponding, though far  
larger, expeditionary forces available  
to help them. War could not be waged  
on limited liability principles.

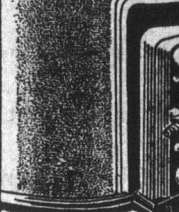

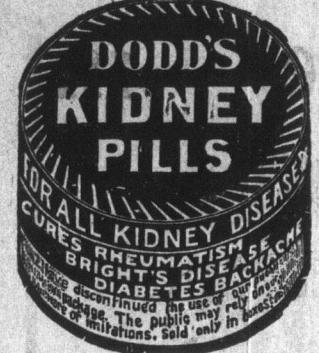

#### WAS FOR PUBLIC GOOD

Judge Landry Will Not Postpone Emmerson Libel Suit.

**Counsel Moves For Crockett's Discharge—Indictment Not Dismissed—Case Goes Over Until January—Defendant's Recognizance Taken—His Honor Criticizes Position of Crown in the Matter.**

Fredericton, N. B., June 26.—The Emmerson-Crocket case has been postponed again, and it now looks like the last postponement unless His Honor finally grants the request of the prosecution.

Yesterday morning His Honor Judge Landry was not fully decided as to whether he had better allow a postponement until after the reserved case is argued before the full bench of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick. The crown has announced that if their demand to the plea of the defence is not allowed, they will stand the case on. Judge Landry has refused the demurrer to stand, and the full bench, it is expected, will sustain his decision.

In the meantime His Honor is going to look up some authorities, in order that he may give the question the closest consideration.

**To Please Everybody.**

His Honor expressed a willingness to give his decision at four o'clock yesterday afternoon, but Mr. J. D. Hazen, the leading counsel for the defence, had an engagement in Sudbury County yesterday afternoon, where he is entertaining the members of the County Council, and he asked to have it put off until six o'clock. His Honor preferred to take time after tea to give out the decision, and when Mr. Hazen suggested seven o'clock, Mr. J. R. Barry, K. C., counsel for the prosecution, wanted to have it made eight o'clock. His Honor split the difference and made it 7.30.

**Mr. Emmerson Away.**

As was the case Monday, Mr. Emmerson was not in court. It is stated he has gone to West Virginia. Mr. Crockett was on hand, and occupied a seat near his counsel. Mr. Barry was the only one of counsel for the prosecution present, and Mr. Hazen and Mr. O. S. Crockett, M. P., were the lawyers present for the defence. Mayor McLeod having left yesterday morning for Camp Sussex, in command of the 71st Regiment, of which he is senior major. There was no stenographer present to take notes of the proceedings of the court. Special Stenographer McPeake, who was on the job Monday, having also gone to Sussex, as captain of one of the companies of the 71st.

**Why the Delay?**

"I had hoped," explained Judge Landry, in giving his reasons for postponing the giving of his decision, "that I could have given my decision as to the question of postponement this morning, but I was engaged here in the afternoon until after six o'clock, and was not able to look up certain authorities which I wanted to consult. I feel that it is due to myself to defer further time to look up these authorities."

Afterwards His Honor told the jurors that they need not be in court unless ordered to come by the sheriff, until Aug. 20, when civil business will be again taken up, and in the course of his remarks His Honor said that the court would adjourn in the evening until that time. He corrected himself in a moment, and then it was that the idea was given that he may order the prosecution to proceed with the Emmerson-Crocket case when he takes his place on the bench this evening.

**May Order Case On.**

"When I said that the court would adjourn this evening," said His Honor, perhaps I said something that I should not have said. I cannot anticipate what will happen. However, the jury need not come back before the 20th of August unless ordered to do so by the sheriff."

**Postponement Refused.**

The last has been heard in the court in the Emmerson-Crocket libel case until January next, with the possible exception of an argument on a legal point or two. Perhaps it should be said that it is all over now.

Judge P. A. Landry last evening refused to allow the application of the crown for postponement.

The court was crowded. The judge, in his decision held that the article was written in the public interest, and again decided that the defendant's plea should stand and that the demurrer of prosecution should not stand.

When court was adjourned and Mr. Crockett was held in his own recognizance, to appear in January next—"if there should be an indictment against him"—it was generally felt among the crowd that the last has been heard of the case.

The defence claim that Judge Landry having refused to grant a postponement, and the crown prosecutors refusing to proceed with the case when a postponement is not allowed, the indictment is killed.

If it is decided by the prosecution to have the point on which they have been granted a reserve case argued before the supreme court, that argument will not take place until November.

"In my opinion," said the judge, "the rights of the crown to get a postponement of trial remain the same as though no reserved case existed, leaving aside, therefore, the consideration of the reserved point, no case has been made by the crown for a postponement. Hence I must refuse it."

"I do not think I am called upon to note or consider in this application what the representative of the crown said on Friday last, viz., that the crown would not go on with the trial till the decision given was reversed."

"If the meaning of that declaration was that the crown would be able to convince me that it had sufficient reasons for asking and obtaining the

postponement, it has so far failed to present those reasons. "If the declaration meant that the crown had means to postpone the trial without an order for that purpose from the presiding judge, then I leave it to the crown to exercise those means or to go to trial. In the meantime the case stands before, so far as the crown is concerned, as a trial, and demanding from me a disposition of it."

#### HOUSE COLLAPSES.

Seven Persons Killed—Buried Under Tons of Debris.

New York, June 26.—Seven persons, six of them members of one Italian family, were killed yesterday in the collapse of a ramshackle tenement in the downtown Italian quarter. Three other members of the same family were rescued from the ruins. An old man was rescued from a two-foot ledge 40 feet from the ground by firemen.

The building was a four-story affair, built over 50 years ago. It had been in a dangerous condition because of excavations next door. The constant rumbling of subway trains a block away was too much for it.

The seven persons who lost their lives were buried under tons of debris. Some had been instantly killed, but others escaped death in the first crush only to be smothered by bricks, broken timbers, plaster and dust.

Some of the younger occupants of the house who reached home shortly before two o'clock yesterday morning, warned by the severe shaking of the house, ran through the building and warned sleeping tenants of impending disaster, and dozens of persons ran into the streets in their night clothing.

#### CHURCHMEN WANT PEACE.

British Dean Heads Deputation to Hague Conference.

The Hague, June 26.—The President of the Peace Conference, M. Nelidoff, yesterday received a deputation from Christian churches throughout the world, headed by Very Rev. Wm. Henry Fremantle, Dean of Ripon, who presented an address urging the conference to ensure peace, justice and humanitarianism. The address was signed by all the leading churchmen of Great Britain, except the British Catholics, who refused to participate, even indirectly, in a conference to which the Pope was not invited. Nine American Catholic Bishops signed the address.

M. Nelidoff thanked the deputation for the interest taken in the work of the conference, to which he said the address would be communicated, adding that everyone earnestly desired the success of its work.

The proposition which France has presented to the second committee (land war) will express the wish that a declaration of war become compulsory before the opening of hostilities.

#### BALLOONIST FALLS IN RIVER.

After Good Exhibition Airship Meets With Accident.

New York, June 26.—A big cigar-shaped airship sailed across the bay from Staten Island yesterday, circled around above the high office buildings in Brooklyn and then swept across East River and alighted gently in the midst of a crowd numbering thousands, which had gathered in Battery Park.

A few moments later the operator set the machine in motion again and the ship rose to an altitude of about 500 feet and started northward over the skyscrapers of Manhattan Island. The ship was in charge of Lincoln Beachey, who seemed to have perfect control of the big machine.

After passing over Manhattan Mr. Beachey sent his airship up over East River toward Long Island Sound. In some manner it collided with a spindle which marks a ledge at the sunken Meadows and the airship was badly damaged and he was thrown into the water, but was rescued by a boatman.

#### FELL ASLEEP ON TRACK.

Charles Shelton of Gloucester Township Instantly Killed.

Ottawa, June 26.—Charles Shelton, aged 22, of Gloucester Township, Russell County, while walking home Monday night after spending some hours in an Ottawa hotel, fell asleep on the O. P. R. track and was run over and instantly killed by a train.

#### Vets At King's Levee.

London, June 26.—King Edward held the last levee of the season at St. James' Palace yesterday, Indian Mutiny veterans again supplying the most feature.

The second group of survivors of the mutiny, including 70 officers, of whom no fewer than 33 were generals, and several civilians were presented by Field Marshal Sir Evelyn Wood.

Among those present was J. Pierpont Morgan.

#### The Age of Understanding.

London, June 26.—The finest tribute which Mark Twain has received in England was the Pilgrims luncheon in his honor yesterday.

After speaking in a humorous strain for some minutes, however, he paused and said: "I have chafed and chafed, but man does not reach the verge of 72 years without knowing life."

#### Killed On the Railway.

Niagara Falls, June 26.—The M. C. R. train from Buffalo picked up Samuel Gladhill, an employee of the Bridgeburg Shipyard, on the tracks near the shipyard, last evening, with both legs cut off. In the hospital he died one hour afterward.

He leaves a widow and one child in Scotland.

#### Acquittal on Bigamy Charge.

Brantford, June 26.—Charlotte Worrell was yesterday morning acquitted of a charge of bigamy by Judge Hazen. She had left her former husband, George Pemberton, to marry John Worrell, believing Pemberton's former wife was dead.

#### STRIKERS MUST STAND TRIAL.

Buckingham Rioters to Be Tried For Killing Detective.

Montreal, June 21.—In the court of appeals yesterday Justice Trenchard decided that the six Birmingham strikers who are charged with manslaughter must stand their trial.
