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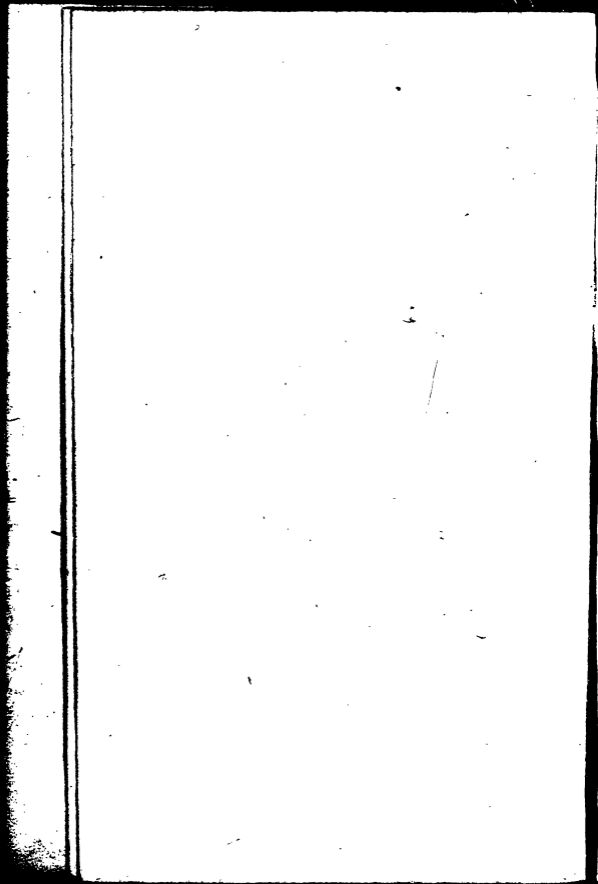

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## Notice.

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Since the last appearance of the CANADIAN PARLIAMENTARY COMPANION, a change of Government has taken place at Ottawa which has been followed by a general election for the House of Commons. The latter event, like the general election of 1872, has effected many changes in the popular chamber of the Dominion Parliament, many of the old representatives having been defeated and new men elected to take their places. Although the general election took place but a few weeks since, the Editor, as will be seen on reference to these pages, has succeeded in furnishing the usual data respecting each new member, and a full and accurate statement of the vote polled in every constituency. *Governor-General*\*—His Excellency The Right Honorable SIR FREDERICK TEMPLE, EARL of DUFFERIN, Knight of the Most Illustrious Order of Saint Patrick, and Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath. B. 21 June, 1826. Ed. at Eton College and Christ Church, Oxford. M., 23 October, 1862, Harriot Georgina

eld. dau. of Archibald Rowan Hamilton, Esq., of Killyleagh Castle, Co. Down. Succeeded as 5th Baron Dufferin and Clandeboye, in the Peerage of Ireland, on the death of his father, 21 July, 1841. Created Baron Clandeboye of the United Kingdom, 1850; and Earl of Dufferin and Viscount Clandeboye (both of the United Kingdom), 1870. Was a Lord in Waiting to the Queen, from 1849 to 1852, and from 1854 to 1858; attached to Earl Russell's special mission to Vienna, Feb., 1855; British Commissioner in Syria, 1860; Under Secretary of State for India from 1864 to 1866, and for War from 1866 to following year; and Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster and Paymaster General, from 1868 to 1872. Appointed Lord Lieutenant of the County Down, 1864; and Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada, 22 May, 1872. (Salary £10,000, *stg.*) Is Honorary Colonel of the North Down Rifles. Author of *A Tour in Ireland during the Famine*, 1847; *Letters from High Latitudes*, 1857; *Irish Emigration, and Tenure of Land in Ireland*, 1867; *Notes on Ancient Syria*, 1867; *An Examination of Mr. Mill's plan for the Pacification of Ireland*, 1868; *Enquiry into the state of Ireland*, 1869.—*Clandeboye, Holywood, Co. Down, Ireland*; *Rideau Hall, Ottawa*; *Citadel, Quebec*.

## PART II.

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### DURATION OF PAST SESSIONS, &c.

1867.

THE first Parliament of the Dominion of Canada met in Ottawa, on the 6th Nov., 1867. On that day the Hon. J. E. Cauchon (who was on the 5th Nov. appointed Speaker of the Senate), took and subscribed the oath prescribed by law, and was then conducted to the Chair at the foot of the Throne, where he received the Governor-General; on the 7th, His Excellency delivered the Speech from the Throne; on the 8th, the Hon. G. W. Allan moved, seconded by the Hon. J. McCully, the usual address in reply to the Vice-regal speech, which was agreed on the same day. On the 21st Dec., the Senate adjourned until the 12th March, 1868, when

it re-assembled and continued to sit until the prorogation on the 22nd May.

1869.

Parliament assembled on the 15th April, when the Speech from the Throne was delivered. On the 16th, the Hon. Dr. Lacoste moved, seconded by the Hon. D. Wark, the address in reply, which was adopted on the same day. Parliament was prorogued on the 22nd June.

1870.

Parliament met on the 16th Feb., when the Speech was delivered by the Governor-General. On the 17th, the Hon. J. R. Benson moved the address in reply, seconded by the Hon. R. B. Dickey, which was, as on the two previous occasions, agreed to on the same day. Parliament was prorogued on the 12th May.

1871.

Parliament met on the 15th Feb. On the 17th Hon. Alexander Macfarlane moved the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne, seconded by Hon. J. F. Armand, which was duly adopted on the same day. Parliament was prorogued on the 14th April.

1872.

Parliament met on the 11th April. On the following day Hon. Marc Amable Girard moved the customary address, seconded by Hon. John Robertson, and the same was duly carried on the same day. Parliament rose on 14th June.

1873 (*1st Session*).

The first Session of the Second Parliament of the Dominion of Canada commenced at Ottawa, on 5th March. On that day Hon. Pierre Joseph Olivier-Chauveau, Senator for *Stadacona* division, whose commission as Speaker bears date 1st Feb., took and subscribed the oath prescribed by law, and was duly conducted to the speaker's chair by Hon. Senators Campbell and Atkins. On the following day the Governor General, (the Earl of Dufferin), delivered the speech from the Throne; and on the 10th, Hon. Alexander Vidal moved the address in reply, seconded by Hon. Matthew H. Cochrane, which was carried on the same day. Parliament was adjourned from 23rd May until 13th Augt., when it was duly prorogued.

1873 (*2nd Session*.)

Parliament met on the 23rd Oct. On Monday, 27th, the address was moved by Hon. George

Alexander, seconded by Hon. Donald Montgomery, and carried on the same day.

1874.

The third Parliament of the Dominion was opened on the 26th October, on which day the Hon. David Christie, whose commission as Speaker is dated 9th January, was duly sworn into office. On the following day, His Excellency delivered the speech from the Throne.

FENNINGS TAYLOR. B. in London, Eng., 10th March, 1817. Educated at Radley, near Oxford, Eng. Came to Can., 1836, and, on the 4th Dec. of that year, was apptd. a Clk. in the L.C. office of U. Can. In 1842 was apptd. First Office Clk. of the L.C. of Canada. In 1846, additional Clk. assistant. In 1855, Clk. Assistant and Deputy Clk. In 1856, under the Great Seal, Master in Chancery. Is a Lt.-Colonel of Militia, a Commr. under the Great Seal for administering the oath of allegiance and declaration of qualification to Members, of the Senate, and a Commr. of the Court of Queen's Bench in Ont. for taking affidavits. Is the author of "*Sketches of British Americans with Photographs, by Notman*," (3 vols., 8 vo., Notman, Montreal.) "*The Life and Death of the Hon. T. D'Arcy McGee*." (1 vol., 8vo., Notman, Montreal.) *The last three Bishops appointed by the Crown for the Anglican Church of Canada*. (1 vol., 4to., Lovell.) Is also the author of several desultory contributions to various Canadian periodicals.

a Vice-Presdt. of the Ottawa Auxiliary Bible Society. Sat for Peel in Can. Assembly from 1854 until g.e., 1861, when defeated. Was mem. for Home Division, Leg. Council, from 1862 until the Union. Sworn of the Privy Council, 9 Dec., 1869, and was Secy. of State of Can. (with charge of the Dominion Lands in Manitoba and the North West Territories), from that date until the resignation of the Macdonald Govt., 5 Nov., 1873. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. A Liberal.—*Toronto; Richview, Ont.; Rideau Club.*

ALLAN, Hon. GEORGE WILLIAM, F.R.G.S., F.Z.S.

S. of the late Hon. William Allan, of Moss Park, Toronto, who was for many years a mem. of the Leg. Council, of U.C., and of the Ex. Council, same Province, during the governments of Sir F. B. Head and Sir Geo. Arthur, by Leah Tyrer, 4th dau. of the late Dr. John Gamble, surgeon of the "Queen's Rangers," a U.E. loyalist. B. in Toronto, 9 Jan., 1822. Ed. at the Upper Canada College. U.C., Hilary Term, 1846. A Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society, and of the Zoological Society, (Eng.) Is Lieut-Col. of the Regimental Division of East Toronto, and an hon. mem. of the "Queen's Own" Rifles; a trustee and mem. of the Council of the University of Trinity College, Toronto; Presdt. of the Upper Canada Bible Society, and of the Western Can. Permanent Building and Savings' Society; Vice-Presdt. of the Church (of Eng.) Union of Toronto, and a dir. of the Canada Landed Credit Co. Was Mayor of Toronto, 1855. Has been Presdt. of the Canadian Institute, same city. Apptd. Govt. Trustee for Municipal Bonus Fund of Toronto and Nipissing Railway, 1869. S. of the late Peter Brown, Esq., merchant, Edinburgh, Scot., who in 1838 emigrated to New York, where he edited the *British Chronicle* newspaper, and thence in 1843 moved to Toronto, where he established the Toronto

*Banner*, as an independent organ of Liberal Presbyterian views, by the only dau. of George Mackenzie, Esq., of "The Cottage," Stornoway, Isle of Lewis. B. in Edinburgh, 29 Nov., 1818. Ed. at Edinburgh High School. M., in the same city, 27 Nov., 1862, Annie, eldest dau. of the late Thos. Nelson, Esq., of Abden House, Edinburgh. Founded the Toronto *Daily Globe* newspaper, of which he became chief political writer, 1844; founded the *Canada Farmer*, a weekly journal devoted to agricultural interests, 1864. Is now Managing Director of the "Globe Printing and Publishing Company;" and largely engaged in cattle raising. A member of the Senate of the Univ. of Toronto, and a dir. of the Isolated Risk Insurance Co. Has been Presdt. of the St. Andrew's Society of Toronto. Was a mem. of commission apptd. to inquire into certain alleged abuses in Provl. Penitentiary, Kingston, 1849. Was for many years leader of the Reform party of U.C., and as such called on to form a Govt. for late Province of Can., 2 Augt., 1858, but owing to the refusal of the Governor Genl. (Sir E. W. Head) to grant dissolution, he and his colleagues retired from office two days afterwards; again entered Ex. Council, 30 June, 1864, as a mem. of the Taché-

Macdonald Govt., with the consent and at the request of the Reform Party, for the purpose of carrying out the scheme of a Federal Union of the B.N.A. Provinces, as laid down and adopted by the Constitutional Committee of the Leg. Assembly of the late Province of Can., of which he was the chairman, but resigned 21 Dec., 1865, before the Union was accomplished, owing to his disapproval of the policy of the Govt., with reference to a Reciprocity Treaty with the U. S. Was a mem of the Charlottetown Union Conference, 1864, to that at Quebec, in same year, and of the Confederate Council of B.N.A. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Haldimand, Apl. 1851; for Toronto East, at g.e., 1861, and for South Ontario, in House of Commons, at g.e., 1867. Called to the Senate, 16 Dec., 1873. BUREAU, *Hon.* JACQUES OLIVIER, *N.P.* (*De Lorimier.*)

Family came from Normandy. S. of Jacques Bureau, Esq., merchant, of Three Rivers, P.Q. B. there, Feb., 1820. Ed. at Nicolet College. M., 1st, 1844, Mdlle. Hélène St. Pierre (she d. 1852); 2ndly, 1868, Madame J. H. Terroux. Admitted as a Notary Public of L.C., 1843. Sat for Napierville in Can. Assembly from g.e., 1854, until Sept., 1862, when elected for De Lorimier Division in L.C., which he represented until the Union. Was a mem. of Ex. Council, and Provincial Secy., Can., (succeeding Hon. A. A. Dorion) from Jan. to May, 1863. Called to Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. Was one of the most active promoters of the anti-seigniorial movement, and a mem. of the Reform Convention that met at Quebec on that subject. Took a leading part in the debate in the Senate on Senator Christie's motion respecting the Pacific Railway; has always been a consistent Reformer.—96, *St. François Xavier St., Montreal.*

CAMPBELL, *Hon.* ALEXANDER, *Q.C.* P.C

Of Scotch descent. S. of the late James Campbell, Esq., M.D., formerly of Hedon, York-

shire, Eng. B. in the East Riding of Yorkshire, 1822. Came to Can. with his father when very young. Ed. at Lachine, at the College of St. Hyacinthe, Que., and at Kingston. M., 1855, his cousin, Georgina Fredrica Locke, dau. of Thomas Sandwith, Esq., of Beverly, Yorkshire. Called to the Bar, U.C., in Michaelmas Term, 1843. Created Q.C., 1856. Is Dean of the Faculty of Law, Queen's University, Kingston; a dir. of the London and Canadian Loan and Agency Co. and Presdt. of the Royal Canadian Bank. Has been a Bencher of the Law Society, U.C. Represented Cataraqui division in L.C., Can., from Nov., 1858, until the Union. Was Speaker of that body from 12 Feb., 1863, until the dissolution of Parliament in May, same year; and a mem. of Ex. Council and Commissioner of Crown Lands, from March, 1864, until the Union. Was a mem. of the Quebec Union Conference. Sworn of the Queen's Privy Council, 1st July, 1867, and was Postmaster General from that date until 1st July, 1873, when apptd. first Minister of the Interior, and in that office he continued to hold until the resignation of the Macdonald Govt., 5 Nov., same year. agriculturist. Has been a mem. of the Board of Agriculture, and of the Council of the Agricultural Assn., since their formation. Has been Presdt. of the Agricultural Assn., U.C., of the new Agricultural and Arts Assn., of Ont., and of the Board of Agriculture. Was also for many years a mem. of the Senate of Toronto University. Was offered and declined a seat on the Bench of the Supreme Court of that Province, Nov., 1855. Has been a mem. of the Council of King's College, Fredericton, and a dir. of the Commercial Bank, N.B. Gall, Esq. Sat for Princetown in the Provl. Assembly, of which he was Speaker for four years, from 1838 until 1862, when the Leg. Co., and of the Miramichi Ship Building Co., and a dir. of the Maritime Bank of the Dominion, and of the Coldbrook Rolling Mills Co. Apptd. to the L.C. of N.B., 1867. Called to the Senate, 4 Jan., 1873. A Liberal.—*Chatham, N.B.*

NORTHUP, *Hon.* JEREMIAH.

S. of John Northup, Esq., and descended from Jeremiah Northup, a loyalist, who came to N.S. from the U.S., at the close of the Am. Revolution, represented Falmouth in the first Provincial Parlt. that sat in N.S., and continued to hold that seat until his death, a period of 25 years. B. at Falmouth, 1815. Ed. in Halifax. M., 1848, Emily, dau. of late John Cochran, Esq., of Newport, N.S. A mem. of the firm of John Northup & Sons, merchants and ship owners. Is a Justice of the Peace, V. Presdt. of the Merchants' Bank of Halifax, a dir. of the Ocean Marine Insurance Association, and a mem. of the Committee of the Protestant Industrial School. Sat for Halifax in N.S. Assembly from g.e., 1867, until called to the Senate, 10 Oct., 1870. A Liberal. 213, *Brunswick St., Halifax; Halifax Club.*

ODELL, *Hon.* WILLIAM HUNTER.

S. of the late Hon. William Franklin Odell who held the office of Provl. Secy. of N.B. for

32 years; and grands. of Hon. Jonathan Odell, a zealous loyalist residing in New Jersey, U.S., who went to Eng. at close of the Am. Revolution, as Private Secy. to Sir Guy Carleton (1st Lord Dorchester), and was apptd. Provl. Secy., Registrar and Clerk of the Council of N.B., on its being constituted a separate Province. B. in N.B. Ed. at King's College, Fredericton, where he graduated B.A., 1832. M. the eld. dau. of the late Hon. Mr. Justice Bliss, of Halifax. Called to the Bar, N.B., 1838. Apptd. One of the proprietors of, and chief political writer for, the Montreal *Herald* newspaper. Author of a pamphlet against Confederation (Mont. 1867.) Called to the Senate 13 March, 1874. PERRY, Hon. EBENEZER.

B. about 1788. Was Deputy Sheriff of Northumberland and Durham for some years. Was a life mem. of L.C., Can., from Feb., 1855 until the Union. Called to the Senate, 2 Feb., 1871. A Conservative.—*Division St., Coloureg, Ch.*

PRICE, *Lieut.-Col. Hon.* DAVID EDWARD. (*Laurentides.*)

Family originally from Wales. Eldest s. of the late William Price, Esq., an extensive lumber merchant at Quebec and the Saguenay, by Jane, third dau. of the late Charles G. Stewart, Esq., Comptroller of the Imperial Customs at Quebec; and grands. of Richard Price, Esq., of Elstree, Herts, Eng. B. in city of Quebec, 11 May, 1826. Ed. here. Unmarried. Is senior partner of the firm of Price Brothers & Co., merchants, Quebec; Vice Consul at the Saguenay, where his firm carry on large lumbering operations, for Norway and Sweden, Denmark, Chili and Peru, and the U. S. of Am.; Lieut.-Col. 2nd Batt. Chicoutimi Militia; Presdt. of the Chicoutimi Agricultural Society; and a mem. of Quebec Agricultural Council. ## PART III.

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### Expiration of Parliamentary Terms and Proceedings.

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ADJOURNMENT.—See Interruption of the Sessions of Parliament.

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AMENDMENT.—See Order.

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AVOIDANCE OF A DECISION.—When a motion has been made upon which the House is unwilling to come to a vote, there are certain formal modes of avoiding a decision, amongst which are “passing of the other orders of the day” and “moving the previous question.” The former means that the House should—casting aside the matter and taking no notice of the matter then before it—proceed to the other business appointed for that day; the latter, that a vote be taken

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ously taken as to the expediency of coming to any decision on the question raised. If "the previous question" be negatived as a matter of expediency, the motion to which it referred is only gotten rid of for the time, whereas a direct negative to the motion itself would be a proscription of it for the remainder of the Session, as well as a denial of its principle. With respect to a Bill, moving that it "be read this day six months," or "this day three months," is a mode of throwing it out without coming to an express declaration against the principle of the measure.

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**BILLS (PRIVATE).**—Private Bills are chiefly introduced to enable individuals or bodies corporate to undertake works of public utility at their own risk, and chiefly for their own emolument and benefit; but there are other private bills which frequently come before Parliament, such as Bills for adjusting claims to property between individual claimants, and Bills relating to divorce, naturalization, &c., &c. The expenses of legislation in such matters must be paid by the parties seeking the relief; and a deposit of \$100 must be made immediately after the second reading of the Bill. After the second reading, if all the rules of the

House have been complied with, Private Bills go to the Committee, and it is before this Committee that proper attention must be given by the parties interested. Individuals or companies may appear by Parliamentary Agents.

**BILLS (PUBLIC).**—A Bill is the draft or skeleton of a Statute. Any bill which the Senate can originate may be introduced and laid on the table by any individual Senator without the previous permission of the House; but in the Commons, no bill can be brought in unless a motion for leave be previously agreed to. Permission having been granted, a Committee is appointed to prepare the bill. It is then brought in and read a first time, without amendment or debate, and a day is appointed for a second reading, previous to which it is printed and a copy furnished to each member. The bill after the second reading, is referred to a Committee of the Whole House, at the sittings of which its details are considered, as its principles were at each of its several readings. Members are at liberty to discuss its principles at any of its stages, but no one is considered to have declared decisively in favor of its principles unless by his vote he supports its second reading. In Committee, the bill is debated clause by clause, the blanks left for names, date

nature and amount of penalties, &c., are filled up, and sometimes the bill is entirely new-modelled. The blanks, as they are called, which are usually filled up in italics, are agreed to without a question being put, unless a member should propose to alter them. The next proceeding is, that the Chairman of the Committee should make a report to the House of the changes that the bill has undergone, which he does by presenting a copy of it to the Speaker in its altered form. The report of the Committee is agreed to without discussion, the bill is ordered to be printed, and it is then read a third time, when any further amendments can be made. If a new clause be added, it is called a rider. The last question but one is that the "bill do pass;" after this nothing remains except to determine the bill's title, which used to be a general one for all the acts passed in the session, but in modern times distinct titles are used for each statute. During the progress of a bill the House may decide on the following questions: 1st, on the second reading; 2nd, that it be committed; 3rd, that the report of the Committee be received; 4th, or that the bill be re-committed; 5th, that it be read a third time; 6th, that it do pass; 7th, the title of the bill. These are quite exclusive of any division in Committee, or any

amendments, or of any clauses added to or expunged from the measure in or out of the Committee. Alterations are not usually proposed in a bill until after its principle has been disposed of on the second reading. Immediately after the passing of a bill, it is taken by a member to the bar of the Senate, desiring their concurrence, where it passes through the same forms as in the Commons. If the bill be rejected, no further proceedings ensue. When the Senate agree with the Commons in the principle of the measure, but differ on matters of detail, a conference usually follows between members deputed from each House, who generally succeed in adjusting the difference; but if both Houses remain inflexible, the bill is dropped. The same proceedings are adopted, *mutatis mutandis*, when the bill originates in the Upper House. The bill having thus passed both Houses, remains with the Senate, except in the case of a bill of supply, which is sent back to the Commons, to be by them presented at the bar of the Senate to the Representative of the Sovereign. The assent of the Crown is the final proceeding which converts a bill into an Act of Parliament. (See "Royal Assent.")



**BUDGET (THE).**—The Minister of Finance makes one general statement every year to the House of Commons, the object of which is to present a comprehensive view of the financial condition of the Dominion. Sometimes there are preliminary, or supplemental, or occasional speeches; but the great general statement of the year has, for a long time past, been quaintly called "*the Budget*," from the French *bougette*, by a common figure of speech, putting the name of that which encloses, to signify the thing contained. The annual speech known by that appellation embraces a review of the income and expenditure of the past year, as compared with those of preceding years; remarks upon the financial prospects of the country; an exposition of the intended repeal, modifications, or imposition of taxes during the session; and a detail of the public expenditure during the current period with its grounds of justification.

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**CABINET.**—The Government of a State or community is understood to signify the exercise of supreme authority, and includes the executive, the legislative, and the judicial powers; but in popular acceptance it means only the first of these, the higher and more immediate functions

of which are exercised by the Cabinet, a select body through whom, for the time being, the principal functions of royalty are discharged.

It is only since the adoption of the system of Responsible Government that any of the B.N.A. Provinces has had a Cabinet of Ministers. Before this took place, those who advised the Executive or Her Majesty's Representative, were called, as they were in fact, Members of the Executive Council. They are here dignified by the same name as that by which they are acknowledged in the Parent State—they are called the Government, when the fact is that this word only applies to the three Estates which constitute the Government; but we have come into the use of the term usually employed in England, and as such it will be best to use it. When speaking of the Supreme Government of the Dominion, the people understand the Members of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada. The Queen's Privy Council for Canada is at present composed of thirty-seven members, but twenty-four of these are not of the Cabinet. It usually includes all those who are bound to retire when a change of Ministry takes place. The Privy Council being more immediately responsible for the conduct of public affairs, their deliberations are always considered confidential.

and are kept secret. The head of the Cabinet, who has been entrusted with its formation, is called "The Premier," but more properly "the head of Her Majesty's Canadian Government." The Cabinet, as it stands at present, comprises the following officers:—"The Minister of Justice and Attorney-General;" "The Minister of Militia and Defence;" "The Minister of Customs;" "The Minister of Finance;" "The Minister of Public Works;" "The Minister of Inland Revenue;" "The Minister of the Interior;" "The Minister of Marine and Fisheries;" "The President of the Queen's Privy Council;" "The Postmaster-General;" "The Secretary of State of Canada;" "The Minister of Agriculture;" and "The Receiver-General." They usually resign when they have lost the confidence of the House of Commons, or they may be dismissed by Her Majesty's Representative, and either House can, by address to the Governor-General, ask for the dismissal of his Cabinet or advisers. The members of the Cabinet or Administration, are supposed to agree upon principles of policy and legislation, and are expected to co-operate in Parliament, upon all matters and questions not specifically agreed upon as "open questions." The office of Premier may be held in conjunction with either of the principal departments of State,

though heretofore, (before Confederation), it has been usually associated with the office of Attorney-General.

CLERK OF THE CROWN IN CHANCERY,—The Clerk of the Crown in Chancery is by right an officer of both Houses of Parliament. His duties are to take charge of all the Poll Books and Election documents; to issue Writs of Election, &c., attend with those at the table when so ordered by the House; and at the closing of each session of Parliament to read aloud the title of each several Bill before it receives the Royal assent by her Majesty's Representative. We reproduce from *Macqueen's Appellate Jurisdiction of the House of Lords* that portion which refers to the duties of this officer in England:—“The duties of the Clerk of the Crown do not now, as heretofore, require his constant attendance in the House of Lords. He assists when the Royal assent is given to Bills; but has no concern with the business of the Appellate Jurisdiction. In an ancient manuscript, preserved in the office of the Clerk of the Crown, the following particulars are given respecting this ancient officer:—The Clerk of the Crown sitteth in the Upper House of Parliament, by the Clerk of that Court upon the Woolsack, attend-

ing there all the Parliament, and is sometimes sent on messages to the Lower House ; and on the last day of the Parliament he readeth the Acts, and the Clerk of the Parliament giveth the King's answer ; where it is to be noted that all the time of Parliament, he sitteth on the right hand of the Clerk of Parliament, and when he readeth the Acts, he standeth on his left hand, which is the higher place, being on the King's right hand."

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CLERK OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.—"The Clerk of the Commons House of Parliament" holds an office of great trust and importance. He, with two assistants, sits at the upper end of the table. The Crown appoints him by commission. It is his duty to make minutes, not of the arguments held in the House, but of the decisions at which it arrives—in other words, to record its votes, resolutions, addresses, orders, reports, divisions, and all other proceedings in which it may be engaged ; to see that they are correctly printed and distributed to the members ; to read aloud all such documents as the House may order to be read ; to perform the duty (without taking the chair) of president or moderator during the choice of a speaker, put-

king a question and directing a division in the same manner that a chairman would do.

**COMMITTALS.**—In common with courts of law and equity, the Houses of Parliament can punish all contempt of their authority, or disobedience of their mandates. Each House is armed with power to repress any aggression committed upon its rights, or any interference with its privileges; but in the case of the Commons the operation of this power is limited to the session of Parliament; committals by that House being invalidated by a prorogation. Either House can delegate to a committee the power of sending for papers and records, and of enforcing the attendance of necessary witnesses.

**COMMITTEES**—Are, first, those of the Whole House, which may be to consider certain resolutions, as to the nature of which considerable latitude prevails; or the House resolves itself into such Committee, to consider the details of a bill, the principle of which may be discussed at any or all of its other stages; or there may be Committees for financial purposes, as those of "Supply," or "Ways and Means" (which see.) Secondly, there are Select Committees

chosen by ballot or otherwise, for some specific purpose—the number composing such bodies seldom exceeds fifteen members, except by permission of the House. Thirdly, Election Committees, which are judicial tribunals, appointed to try the merits of controverted elections. They are appointed by a General Committee on Elections, who, after having selected a certain number from the members to constitute the chairman's panel, divide the remainder into panels, and report the same to the House, marked 1, 2, and 3. The Clerk, in the presence of the House, places the whole three in a hat and draws them forth, marking each in rotation A. B. C. The General Committee then selects four members for the Committee for the first controverted election referred to them, and at the same time the chairman's panel assembles and ballots for a chairman for the particular Committee chosen. Fourthly, Committees on Private Bills (which see.) When the Whole House is in Committee, the Speaker vacates the chair, the Mace is placed under the table, and some other member is called on to preside, who sits in the seat of the Clerk of the House.

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CONFERENCE.—This is a species of negotiation between the two Houses of Parliament, con-

ducted by managers appointed on both sides, for the purpose of producing concurrence, in cases where mutual consent is necessary; or for the purpose of reconciling differences which may have arisen. If the conference be upon the subject of a bill depending between the two Houses it must be demanded by that House which is in possession of the bill, at the time of asking the conference. It is the sole privilege of the Senate to name the time and place for holding a conference, no matter by which House it may have been demanded. Reasons in writing for the course resolved to be taken, are usually furnished to the managers on both sides, in which case it is simply called "a conference." Should this proceeding fail, a "free conference" must be held, which gives an opportunity for the managers individually, and unrestrained by any precise form of argument, to urge such reasons as, in their judgment, may best tend to influence the House to which they are addressed. A free conference is usually demanded after two conferences have been holden without effect. After one free conference, none other but free conferences can be held touching the same subject.



CROWN.—In speaking of the Crown the reader must remember that the attributes and powers are exercised in Canada by a Representative—viz., the Governor-General. Its attributes are :—

To give or refuse to bills "*The Royal Assent*;" to cause the laws to be duly administered and executed ; to act in behalf of the whole community in its intercourse with other countries, (but the Representative of the Crown can neither declare a war nor conclude a peace ; this power cannot be delegated) ; to direct the Naval and Military forces within the limit of his Administration ; to administer the Public Revenue ; to prorogue or dissolve Parliament. The Queen's Representative, in appearing for the Crown, represents the source of justice and mercy, confers office, honors, and emoluments ; but in the same manner as the Monarch acts by Ministers who are amenable to the Imperial Parliament, so the Representative in Canada acts by Ministers who are responsible to Parliament, and the choice of those Ministers is the only prerogative which can be constitutionally exercised without responsible advisers ; but even in this, Parliament, or rather the People's Representatives, exercise the controlling power ; for the appointment of such Ministers by the Crown's Representative can have no practical effect, unless it

rests upon men whose characters and measure prove generally acceptable to the House.

**ESTATE OF PARLIAMENT.**—Parliament fully assembled, consists of the Monarch, or his Representative, the Upper House and the Lower House. They are more frequently spoken of as the three branches of the Legislature. Neither House deliberates in the presence of the Queen's Representative, nor will either of them permit any allusion in debate to the opinions or sentiments entertained by him. The three branches taken together exercise none but legislative functions, and they must all consent, or no law can be passed. But they have separate functions as well. The Monarch, or Representative, holds the whole Executive authority, and while the Lower House alone can originate Money or Tax Bills, the Upper House is deprived of this power. Nor does the Upper House possess the great function of trying impeachments, which is held by the Lords in Great Britain, from the simple fact, we presume, that there is no power invested with the right to impeach. But we will speak of each one separately :

**HOUSE OF COMMONS.**—The Speaker takes the Chair at 3 P.M. daily. If there be a quorum, the business is proceeded with ; if not, the House is

adjourned to the next day, at 3 P.M. Early meetings take place shortly before the termination of the Session, in order to expedite business and bring matters to a close; the House does not usually meet on Saturday, nor does it assemble on any holiday. No one can be admitted to hear the debates without an order from the Sergeant-at-Arms, which is generally obtained through a member. Twenty members, including the Speaker, constitute a quorum.

THE SENATE.—The time for the ordinary meeting of this House is at 3 P.M., unless some other time shall have previously been ordered.

If a quorum is not present at thirty minutes after the time of meeting, the House is adjourned until the next sitting day. Fifteen members, including the Speaker, constitute a quorum.

The Speaker of the Senate is an officer appointed by the Crown.

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EXECUTIVE.—See Cabinet.

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FINANCE.—See Budget.

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INTERRUPTION OF THE SITTINGS OF PARLIAMENT.

The proceedings of the Legislature may be interrupted or suspended either by adjournment, prorogation, or dissolution.

Adjournment, as the term itself implies, is a postponement of the sittings or proceedings of the House, from one time to another specified for the re-assemblage. When the sittings of both Houses are interrupted by Royal authority, it is called prorogation. Dissolution puts an end to the representative character of the individuals who, at the time, compose the House of Commons, and Parliament cannot therefore assemble until after a new election, except in cases hereinafter mentioned. The power of adjournment is a right belonging to each House, and there are no restraints to this power.

The House of Commons can interrupt or postpone any debate, defer the consideration of any measure, or altogether adjourn its sitting, but the practice is always to adjourn to some stated time; and we think there can be no doubt that by the previous permission of the House, the Speaker can leave the Chair for a certain number of hours; but this does not amount to an adjournment, and could not be noted as such by the Clerk. But it must be remarked that the adjournment of one House does not adjourn the other. The Crown may, pending an adjournment, summon by Proclamation either House or both, and may direct either or both Houses to adjourn to any particular day. But when

this power exists, and although in former times it has been frequently exercised in the Imperial Legislature, it has grown into desuetude there, as well as in the Provinces enjoying the privileges of their own local Legislatures.

An individual member may for a time interrupt the progress of business by successive motions for adjournment, which may be repeated indefinitely, with this restriction: no second motion to adjourn can be made until after some intermediate proceeding shall have been had. The motion in committee, that the chairman report progress, is equivalent to a motion to adjourn the debate.

Adjournment does not close the session; nor does prorogation terminate Parliament. The former is an act which either House can perform; the latter is a power vested in the Crown, the duration of which may be subsequently shortened or extended as the Crown pleases. All unfinished business terminates and dies with a prorogation, but during an adjournment they remain *statu quo*, to be revised on the re-assembling of Parliament. A member who moves the adjournment of a debate, or who is in possession of the floor at the time of the adjournment, is said to be in possession of the House with the right to re-open the debate

which has been interrupted. This is not the case, however, when Committees of the whole House adjourn. Prorogation never extends beyond forty days, but it may be repeated from time to time by proclamation, and continue to be renewed until it is intended that Parliament shall meet for the despatch of business. The Crown can summon Parliament at any time by giving fourteen days' notice. Dissolution is the simple death of Parliament, and may be brought about in two ways, either by the pleasure of the Crown, or by lapse of time for which it was called into existence. There was a time when the existence of a Parliament terminated by the demise of the Crown, but a special law removed this provision of the Constitution. But there is no power in the Constitution by which a Parliament in Canada can be extended beyond five years. If parliament, at the time of the Sovereign's death, be separated by adjournment or prorogation, it must assemble immediately, or within a reasonable period. If no Parliament be then in existence, the members of the last must again meet, and may serve as a Parliament for six months, unless sooner prorogued.

**LAW CLERK.**—It is necessary to mention this officer in particular, because the Rules of the House assign to him and the translators under him certain duties which must be performed, to ensure correct legislation. He is appointed by the Crown. It is laid down as the duty of the Law Clerk to revise all public bills after their first reading, and to certify thereon that the same are correct; and in every subsequent stage of such bills, the Law Clerk shall be responsible for the correctness of said bills, should they be amended. The responsibility is increased by the fact of all Bills having to be printed in both languages, English and French, before they can be disposed of.

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**MINISTER (PRIME).**—See Cabinet.

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**MINISTRY.**—See Cabinet; also Executive.

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**MONEY BILL.**—See Supply; also Ways and Means.

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**ORDER.**—By this word is meant an obedience to certain rules and regulations intended to facilitate the despatch of business, and preserve that necessary decorum so essential in all deliberative assemblies. The rules by which the

business of Parliament is conducted are of two kinds; one class the House possesses in common with all deliberative assemblies—another is peculiar to its own existence and powers. For the proper application of all these rules, the Speaker's or Chairman's decision is had, and to this decision due reference is at all times paid. The Speaker, while in the Chair, takes no part in the debate, it being his duty to regulate the manner in which business shall be transacted; to confine those members who address the House to the subject under consideration; to give his opinion in all things which relate to order; to put the matter in dispute into the form of a question upon which the votes of members are taken, and to declare the majority as soon as it is communicated to him by the Clerk. It is also his duty to declare the business of the House closed, and to see that the affairs of the House are correctly and properly recorded. After routine he calls upon the member whose motion stands first on the paper of notices, or who is otherwise entitled to precedence. All motions must be seconded, or they fall to the ground; being seconded, the motion is handed in writing to the Speaker, who has to read it before debate can be had upon it—having been read, objections may be urged. There are several ways

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by which a motion may be opposed; it may be met by a direct negative, or by an amendment, or by a motion to postpone, or by proceeding to the next order of the day, or by moving the previous question, or by the simple motion of adjournment. A motion once read cannot be withdrawn without the permission of the House. It must not be forgotten that unless a speech is made objecting to a motion, neither mover nor seconder can speak a second time except in explanation. If, however, a debate does arise, in which an opposition is given to the mover of a motion, he has the right of reply; but it must be understood that this privilege does not belong to the mover of an amendment. All are permitted to explain. The debate being ended, the Speaker or Chairman puts the question, and calls upon those in favor to say "Yea," and those of a contrary opinion to say "Nay." He then declares that in his opinion the "Yeas" or the "Nays" (as the case may be) have it. If his decision is questioned, the House divides, the "Yeas" rising and their names being taken down; the "Nays" following; the numbers are counted from the record, and declared. When an amendment has been moved, the vote is simply taken on the amendment, and then on the original question. Should the amendment

be adopted, it then becomes the substantive motion, and may be amended in the same way that the original motion was amended. Thus a number of successive amendments to the original motion may be disposed of. Any member is at liberty to interrupt another by "rising to order," which means that he rises in his place, and calls the attention of the Chair and the House to a breach of the orders then being committed. In the debate it is contrary to order to mention any member by name; the same rule prevails in Committee of the Whole, except as regards the Chairman, who is sometimes called by his name, and not Mr. Chairman.

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**ORIGINATING BILLS.**—All Bills relating to public income and expenditure, and all Bills usually called Money Bills, must originate in the Commons, and be introduced by the Government. (*See Bills.*)

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**PARLIAMENTARY AGENTS.**—In England all the business transacted for private Corporations and individuals is attended to by what they call Parliamentary Agents, who are parties generally well up in the practice of Parliament and who take off a great deal of the drudgery from Members. Parliamentary Agents are now

employed in Canada, and are a very useful class of men. Being up in their business they do not annoy the Members, nor neglect the interests they have in charge.

**PETITIONS.**—There are several regulations which govern the presentation of Petitions to Parliament, which should be attended to by those who are interested. Petitions to the House of Commons should be addressed to "*The Honorable the Commons of Canada, in Parliament assembled.*" The petition must be respectful, the statement of grievance or cause of complaint must there be set forth, and the whole must conclude with a specific prayer. Without a prayer to the petition, it would not be listened to, as the mere complaining for the sake of complaining will never be countenanced by Parliament, and the correct form is, after having alleged your complaint, to finish by connecting it with the prayer, beginning, "*Wherefore your humble petitioner, &c., prays, &c., setting forth the redress and relief that is sought.*" Signatures to petitions must be original; no agent should sign a petition to Parliament for any purpose. No chairman can sign for a public meeting, but the common seal of a corporation is received as the petition of the whole.

body. All petitions must be in respectful and temperate language; they should not animadvert upon the conduct of Parliament, the Courts of Justice, or constituted authorities. It is not proper to make reference to any motion or subject under debate, or to a motion in the course of preparation. After presentation, all petitions undergo a close inspection in the Clerk's Department, and when the time comes for receiving them, the Speaker offers such remarks as their nature calls for. In England there is a Committee on Public Petitions, which takes this duty from the Speaker, and it appears to work well, for they frequently find it their duty to report the substance, and frequently the exact words of a petition to the House, and not unfrequently recommend such action to be taken as the case suggests.

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PREVIOUS QUESTION.—See Avoidance of Decision.

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PRIVILEGES OF PARLIAMENT.—There are three kinds. 1st, The privileges which appertain to members individually. 2nd, Those which belong to the House in its collective capacity. 3rd, Those which belong to the two Houses jointly.

It is unnecessary that we should here discuss the points of privilege which appertain to the two Imperial Houses conjointly on the subject of assuming the supreme power of the realm. Amongst the privileges which the Commons claim are:—

The power of committing individuals to prison—the power of publishing matters which, if not issuing from such high authority, might become the subject of proceedings in a Court of Law—the power of directing the Law Officers of the Crown to prosecute persons accused of offences against the laws, or affecting the privileges of Parliament—and finally of doing anything not directly contravening an existing Act of Parliament, which may be necessary for the vindication and protection of its own rights, in the exercise of its constitutional functions.

Questions of privilege take precedence of all other proceedings, and are always in order.

The privileges claimed by individual members are—freedom of speech and person, including freedom from legal arrest and seizure under process from the Courts of Law and Equity.

This does not extend to indictable offences or to actual contempts of the Courts of Justice.

Members of Parliament are exempt from all duties, the performance of which might interfere

with their prompt attendance to their Parliamentary calls. Privilege of Parliament, such as it is, continues for a convenient time after prorogation and dissolution.

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PROROGATION.—See Interruption of the Sit-  
tings of Parliament.

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QUESTION.—See Order.

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ROYAL ASSENT.—The Act by which the Crown agrees to a Bill is called the Royal Assent; this assent is usually given at the end of a Session unless there is urgent necessity for the Act becoming law without loss of time, in which case the Governor-General, or the person administering the Government, comes down to the Upper House, and there, in the presence of both Houses gives his assent. When this is done, either at the close of the Session or on a special occasion the Governor-General being seated on the throne, the House of Commons is summoned to the bar of the Upper House; being there, the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery reads the title of the Bill, hands it to the Chief Clerk, who says in both English and French: "In the name of Her Majesty the Queen, His Excellency ach

Governor-General sanctions this Bill." His Excellency specially manifests his assent to the Supply Bill. Bills to which the Royal assent is not given are pronounced to be reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon, and are mentioned in the "*Official Gazette*" as having been reserved for Her Majesty's consideration. Unless a reserve is made in the Act itself, so soon as the Royal assent is given, the Act becomes a Law, and can be proceeded on before any competent Court. In England, sometimes the Royal assent is given by Commission, but in a Colony such an event has never taken place, although there can be no doubt that the Governor-General has power to appoint a Commission to give this Royal assent.

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**SERGEANT-AT-ARMS.**—This officer, although in attendance on the House of Commons, is appointed by the Crown. It is his duty to obey the commands of the House, to apprehend and take into custody all those who are committed by any offence by the House. All the messengers and servants of the House, except the clerks, are under his orders. He has a seat at the Bar of the House, and directs all arrangements for the maintenance of order in the apertures leading thence, and in the galleries. He is

of course in immediate attendance upon the Speaker, from whom he takes all orders connected with his duties.

SESSION.—The Session is the term occupied by Parliament from its commencement to its prorogation. An adjournment does not close a Session. Parliament is annually assembled for the despatch of business. There are certain important Acts which are renewed every year, and without which the Government could not be carried on, which compels the Government to meet the Representatives of the people, and render an account of the past year's transactions once a year at least. Unless this be done, there will be no supplies. By an understanding, Parliament meets in the month of February although circumstances sometimes arise to postpone the time. While the Crown has a right to summon Parliament where it pleases, it is generally understood that it assembles at the Seat of Government. The House being assembled the Governor General commands the attendance of the members of the Lower House at the Bar of the Upper House, and delivers a Speech from the Throne. This Speech is the first subject taken into consideration; no other business commenced until the answer to it is given.



is stated elsewhere, the mere fact of one or both Houses adjourning does not terminate the Session; it can only terminate by being prorogued by the Crown. All bills and other measures left unfinished, when the prorogation takes place, are dead, and parties who wish to revive them must recommence their labours at the next Session, as if nothing had been done in the premises. The mere assembling of members does not constitute a Session,—one Bill, at least must pass both Houses, and receive the Royal Assent, before it can be called a Session.

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**SPEAKER.**—Beyond all doubt this officer was designated Speaker, from the fact of his being the spokesman of the Commons, in their ordinary course with the Crown. He is the presiding officer of the body. He reads all communications which come from the Queen's Representative to the Commons; he has to present and read such addresses and petitions as are carried up to the Governor-General by the Whole House, and to deliver the usual speeches, on the part of the Commons, when presenting the Supply Bill, and other Bills calling for particular note and remark. Through him, all witnesses and prisoners at the bar of the House are examined, and he directs the arrangements, when the House is to be ad-

dressed by Counsel. It is his duty to deliver the reprimand of the House to any one who has incurred the penalty of receiving it; it is also his duty to issue warrants of committal or release for breach of privilege, to communicate with any parties, when so instructed by the House. It is his duty to closely examine the provisions of private Bills so as to protect the public against any surprise, or undue encroachment or injury; to control and regulate the conduct of subordinate officers of the House; to enforce the Rules of the House; he cannot join in any debate unless in Committee of the Whole House. As the presiding officer of the House, he has all the duties attached to such an office. The Speaker is chosen by the members of Parliament, subject to the approbation of the representative of the Crown, and holds his office until the Parliament in which he is elected is dissolved. Should a member persevere in disobeying the order of the Speaker and of the House, the Speaker may "name him," as the term applies, a course uniformly followed in the case of the House. In extreme cases, the Speaker may order members or others into custody until the pleasure of the House be signified. On divisions, when the numbers happen to be equal, he gives the casting vote, but he never otherwise votes.

SUPPLY.—All proceedings which relate to the public income or expenditure must originate with the Commons, and must be begun by resolution moved in Committee of Supply, which is always Committee of the Whole House. In the course of the Session, estimates are submitted to a Committee of Supply, and resolutions moved thereon, granting to the Crown the sums requisite for the management of the various departments of the Government, and the support of various public and private institutions. Such as are confirmed by the Committee of Supply are reported to the House, where they are again reconsidered and adopted, or rejected, as the case may be: Upon these, a Bill is passed, and this Supply Bill furnishes the authority to the Government for disbursing the various sums appropriated. The Upper House may reject this or any other Money Bill, but they cannot alter or amend the substance of a Supply or Money Bill; such a course would be regarded as an invasion of the privileges of the Lower House. Before any Bill can be introduced authorizing the expenditure of any public money, resolutions must be moved in Committee of Supply, agreed to there, reported and confirmed by the House.

THREE MONTHS (This Day)—See Avoidance of a Decision.

WAYS AND MEANS.—As the Committee of Supply relates to the expenditure of the country, so the functions and duties of a Committee of Ways and Means have reference to the funds by which such expenditure is to be met. Loans, duties, taxes, excise and revenue of every description, are submitted to the Committee of Ways and Means. The propositions of Government on this subject are reduced to resolutions; submitted, considered and decided on, and such as are agreed to are reported to the House. Those which may be adopted are embodied in a Bill or Bills, and in due course and form become the law of the land. As in supply, the Upper House may reject these Bills, but cannot amend them, nor can the Upper House insert a pecuniary penalty in any Bill.

EUGENE URGELE PICHE, Q.C., *First Clerk Assistant*. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1846. Created a Q.C., 1867. Sat for Berthier in the Can. Assembly from 1858 to 1861. Apptd. Clerk. Assist. of House of Commons, Apl., 1873. [Salary \$2,100]. Is a Commr. to administer the oath of allegiance to the members of the House.—*Clerk Assistant's Office, House of Commons.*

JOHN GEORGE BOURINOT, *Second Clerk Assistant*. B. at Sydney, N.S., Oct. 1837. Ed. under tutorship of Rev. W. Y. Porter, and at Trinity College, Toronto, where he took Wellington and other Scholarships. Was subsequently connected with the newspaper press of Canada as Parliamentary Reporter and Editor. Was Chief Official Reporter of the N.S. Assembly from 1861 to the eve of Confederation. ## DURATION OF THE SESSIONS, &amp;c.

[The reader is referred to the Section with the above heading at the opening of PART II. for data which it is unnecessary here to repeat.]

1867.

The first Session of the first Parliament of the Dominion of Canada met in Ottawa, 6 Nov., 1867. Immediately after the return of the Commons from the Senate Chamber, the Clerk being in the Chair, the Hon. Sir John A. Macdonald, *K.C.B. (Kingston)*, moved, seconded by the Hon. G. E. Cartier (*Montreal East*), that the Hon. James Cockburn (*West Northumberland, Ont.*) do take the Chair of that House as Speaker, which was carried unanimously. Mr. Speaker was then conducted to the Chair, where he returned his humble acknowledgments for the great honor conferred upon him. On the 8th Nov. the Hon. C. Fisher (*York, N.B.*) moved the address in reply to the Speech, seconded by Dr. L. L. L. Desaulniers (*St. Maurice*), which was agreed to on the 15th. On the 21st Dec., the House adjourned until the 12th March.

1869.

On the 16th Apl., Mr. W. M. Simpson (*Abogoma*) moved the usual address in reply to

the Speech, seconded by Mr. J. Bolton (*Charlotte*), which was adopted the same day.

1870.

On the 17th Feb., Mr. A. W. Savary (*Digby*) moved the address, seconded by Mr. J. Scriver (*Huntingdon*), which was adopted on the 22nd.

1871.

On the 26th Feb., Dr. Lacerte (*St. Maurice*) moved the address in reply to the Speech, seconded by Mr. G. A. Kirkpatrick (*Frontenac*), and it was carried on the same day.

1872.

On the 12th April, Mr. Henry Nathan (*Victoria, B.C.*) moved the address, seconded by Mr. Edward Carter, *Q.C., D.C.L. (Brome)*, and it was adopted on the same day.

1873 (1st Session.)

The first session of the second Parlt. of the Dominion commenced on 5th March. Hon. James Cockburn (*West Northumberland*), on motion of the Right Hon. Sir John A. Macdonald *K.C.B. (Kingston)*, seconded by Hon. Hector L. Langevin, *C.B. (Dorchester)*, was unanimously re-elected Speaker. On the 11th, Mr. Stephen



Tobin (*Halifax*) moved the usual address in reply to the speech, seconded by Mr. A. L. Palmer, *Q.C. (St. John, N.B.)*, which was carried on same day. On 23rd May the house adjourned until 13th Augt., on which day Parliament was prorogued.

1873 (2nd Session.)

On the 27th Oct., Mr. H. B. Witton (*Hamilton*) moved the address in reply to the speech from the Throne, seconded by Mr. L. F. G. Baby (*Joliette*), and a debate arising, the Ministry resigned, 5 Nov., without any vote being taken. The House rose on 7th of the same month.

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ABBOTT, *Lieut.-Col. Hon. JOHN JOSEPH CALDWELL, D.C.L., Q.C. [Argenteuil.]*

Eldest s. of the late Rev. Joseph Abbott, first Anglican Incumbent of St. Andrew's, Argenteuil, well known as the author of *Philip Musgrave; or, the Adventures of a Missionary in the Canada*; by Harriet, dau. of the Rev. Richard Bradford, first Rector of Chatham, same county. Called to the Bar at St. Andrew's, 12 March, 1821. Ed. there, and called to the Bar at the Univ. of McGill College, Montreal. L. B., 1849, Mary, dau. of the Very Rev. J. Bethune, Bishop of Montreal. Called to the Bar, Montreal, Oct., 1847. Created *Q.C.*, 1862. Is Dean

of the Faculty of Law and Prof. of Commercial Law in Univ. of McGill College; Lieut.-Col. of the 11th Batt. or "Argenteuil Rangers," raised by him during the "Trent" difficulty; Presdt. of the Fraser Institute, or Free Public Library of Montreal; a dir. of the Northern Colonization Railway and of the Intercolonial Coal Mining Co., and author of *the Insolvent Act of 1864; with notes, &c.*, (Que., 1864), a measure which he introduced and carried through the Can. Parl. Apptd. Counsel to Can. Pacific Railway Board, Jan., 1873, and proceeded to Europe in that year with Sir Hugh Allan, Major Walker and Hon. A. G. Archibald to negotiate for means to construct the road. Was a mem. of Ex. Council and Solicitor-General, L.C., from 24 May, 1862, to 14 May, 1863. Was elected for present seat in Can. Assembly, at g.e., 1857, but not returned, and only seated after an arduous contest; continued to represent the county in that House until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867, and again, by acclamation, at g.e. 1872; re-elected at last g.e. Was instrumental in obtaining the closing of Canals from traffic on Sundays; and his legislation includes, in addition to the Insolvent Act, the Jury Law Consolidation Act for Lower Can., and the measures for collecting judicial and registration

fees by stamps. A Liberal Conservative ; and was a supporter of the Macdonald-Cartier Administration.—916, *Sherbrooke St., Montreal ; Senneville Grange, St. Ann's, P.Q. ; St. James' Club ; Rideau Club.*

ANGLIN, Hon. TIMOTHY WARREN. [*Gloucester.*]

B. in Irel. Ed. there. M. Miss McTavish, of St. John, N.B. Came to St. John, 1848, where he founded the *Morning Freeman* newspaper, of which he is editor and proprietor. Sat for St. John (county) in N.B. Assembly from 1861 to g. e., 1866, when defeated on Confederation question, to which he was opposed. Was a member of Ex. Council, N.B., for a few months, 1866. Has sat for Gloucester in House of Commons since the Union. Returned by acclamation at last g. e. Elected Speaker, 26th March, 1874. A Conservative ; and a supporter of the present Administration.—*Waterloo St., St. John, N.B.*

APPLEBY, STEPHEN BURPEE. [*Carleton, N.B.*]

Paternal branch of family came from Eng. ; Maternal ancestors were New England Puritans who moved from Mass. to Sheffield, N.B., and were amongst the first settlers at that place. B. at Florenceville, Carleton, N.B., 1836. Ed. there. Dec., 1864, Harriet Elizabeth, dau. of John H. Stacey, Esq., of Florenceville. Called to the

Bar, N.B., 1869. First returned to Parl. for present seat, Sept., 1873, on death of sitting mem.; re-elected by acclamation at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Administration. "Was strongly opposed to the acts of the late Govt., with reference to the Pacific Scandal and the prorogation of the 13th Augt." — *Woodstock, N.B.*

ARCHIBALD, CYRIL. [*Stormont.*]

Fourth s. of Dr. John Archibald, of Osnabruck, Stormont, Ont., by the eld. dau. of the late Mr. Adam Dixson of Moulinette, same county. Family came from North of Irel., about 1718, and settled in New Hampshire, thence a branch moved to N.S. about 1760, and settled there; in 1796, his grandf. moved to Vermont, whence his father came to Stormont, 1816. B. in Osnabruck, May, 1837. Ed. at Upper Canada College. Unmarried. Is Paymaster 59th "Stormont and Glengarry" Batt. of V.I. Has served in the County and Township Councils. First returned to Parl., for present seat, at g.e., 1872; re-elected at last g.e. "Has always been a Reformer, and is to be classed as a supporter of the present Reform Govt." — *Dickinson's, Landing, Ont.*

AYLMER, *Hon.* HENRY. [*Richmond and Wolfe.*]

Second s. of Sir Udolphus, seventh Lord Aylmer, in the Peerage of Irel., by Mary Eliza, dau. of Edward Journeaux, Esq., of Melbourne, P.Q. The first peer, Matthew Aylmer, Esq., a distinguished naval officer in the reign of James II., and after the Revolution, Rear Admiral of the Red, Governor of Greenwich Hospital, and Ranger of Greenwich Park, was raised to the Peerage of Irel., as a reward for his professional services, 1 May, 1718. (See *Burke's Peerage*). B. at Melbourne, 25 Apl., 1843. Ed. at the Naval College, Portsmouth. M., 6 Oct., 1871, Louisa Blanche Fanny, eld. dau. of H. Aspinwall Howe, Esq., LL.D., Principal of the High School, Montreal. Served for some years as a Lieutenant in the Royal Marine Artillery. Is Captain No. 3. Co. 54th "Richmond" Batt. of V. I., of which his father is Lieut.-Col. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at last g.e. A Liberal and a supporter of the present Administration. "Believes that it requires but two words to indicate the correct policy for any Govt. in Canada, 'Improvement' and 'Progress,' and all measures tending to either he will cordially aid in and support. Is in favor of Civil and Religious liberty and equality, and of encouraging by all means possible the educa-

BABY, LOUIS FRANÇOIS GEORGES, Q.C. [*Joliette.*]

Family one of the oldest and most honorable in the Province of Quebec, the founder of it, Jacques Baby de Ranville, an officer in the celebrated Regt. of Carignan-Sallières, having come to this country, 1663. S. of the late Joseph Baby, Esq., N.P., by Caroline, dau. of late Hon. Louis Guy, in his lifetime King's Notary, and a Leg. Councillor for the old Province of Quebec; and grands. of the late Hon. François Baby, an Executive and Legislative Councillor, and Adj't-Genl. of Militia for the same Province, by Marie Anne Sarien Lanaudière. B. in Montreal, 26 Augt., 1834. Ed. at St. Sulpice College, Montreal, and at the College of Joliette. M., July, 1873, Marie Hélène Adelaïde, dau. of the late Dr. Berthelet of Montreal, by Dame Hélène Guy. Was for several years a Clk. in the Civil Service of Can. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1857. Created Q.C., 1873. Is Mayor of the town of Joliette. An unsuccessful candidate for Joliette at g.e., 1867. First returned, by acclamation, at g.e., 1872; re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative and was a supporter of the late Administration.—*Joliette, P.Q.; Rideau Club.*

BAIN, THOMAS. [*North Wentworth.*]

S. of the late Mr. Walter Bain, of Denny, Stirlingshire, Scot., who came to Can., 1837, and settled in West Flamboro', Ont. B. in parish of Denny aforesaid, 14 Dec., 1834. Ed. in Can. Unmarried. Was for several years Reeve of the Township of West Flamboro', and, in 1870, Warden of Wentworth. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e., 1872; re-elected by acclamation at last g.e. A Reformer. "Believing that the recent change in the Govt. will promote our best interests and result in a more honest, energetic, and economical administration of public affairs, and approving generally of the policy foreshadowed in the Address of the new Premier, and moreover believing, that the Reform leaders will be found, in power, fairly endeavoring to carry into practice those principles which they advocated while in opposition, he will be found giving them a hearty support in maturing such measures as will, in his judgment, forward the best interests of the community at large."—*Strabane, Ont.*

BARTHE, GEORGES ISIDORE. [*Richelieu.*]

S. of the late Capt. Barthe, originally a merchant at Carleton, District of Gaspé, who afterwards, for many years, commanded his own ves-

sels between the St. Lawrence and the Antilles, B. at Restigouche, *Baie des Chaleurs*, 16 Nov., 1834. Ed. at Three Rivers. M., 1861, Josephine Charlotte, third dau. of J. B. Meilleur, Esq., M.D., LL.D., late Supt. of Education for L.C. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1855. A mem. of the law firm of Barthe & Brassard. Is Official Assignee for Richelieu; and has been Mayor of Sorel since 1864. Has been long engaged as a writer on the French Can. newspaper press. Ed. *L'Ere Nouvelle* (Three Rivers) 1852-3. Founded *Le Bas Canada*, in the same city, 1855, and in 1857 removed to Sorel, where he founded *La Gazette*, of which he continues editor and proprietor. Sat for present seat from Nov., 1870, until g.e. 1872, when defeated; again elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, but is thoroughly independent of party.—*King St., Sorel, P.Q.*

**BÉCHARD, Major FRANÇOIS.** [*Iberville.*]

S. of the late M. Fran. Béchard, of Mount Johnson, Que., by Clémence Gozette. B. in Que. Ed. at St. Hyacinthe College. Resided for some years in Illinois, where he m. Mary Eliza dau. of Wm. Townsend, Esq., of Chicago. Is Major in the Iberville Reserve Militia. Has been Mayor of St. Grégoire. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e., 1867; re-elected by acclamation at g.e., 1872, and again at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Mount Johnson.*



BERNIER, HENRI. [*Lotbinière.*]

S. of the late M. Jean Baptiste Bernier, a native of Cap St. Ignace, Montmagny, P.Q., by Marguerite Bélanger. B. in the parish of Lotbinière, Que., 5 July, 1821. Ed. there. M. Mdle. Henriette Paré. Is principal partner of firm of H. Bernier & Co., foundry and agricultural implement works, Presdt. of the Deschambault and Lotbinière Steamboat Co., and a dir. of the Vinegar and Beet Root Sugar Manufacturing Co. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Administration.—*St. Louis de Lotbinière, P.Q.*

BERTRAM, JOHN. [*West Peterborough.*]

S. of Mr. Hugh Bertram. B. at Fenton Barns, Haddingtonshire, Scot., 16 Oct., 1837. Ed. at Dirleton Parish School. M., at Almonte, Ont., 16 Sept., 1863, Miss Helen Shiells, of Edinburgh, Scot. A hardware merchant. Was a candidate for present seat at g.e., 1872, and received the majority of votes, but the Returning Officer returned his opponent (Mr. Wm. Cluxton) on the ground that he was the only candidate who had complied with the provisions of the Election Law. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal, and "will give the Administration in power a loyal, but not slavish support in carry--

ing out the policy they advocated while in opposition. Earnestly desires to maintain 'British Connection' and to consolidate the Dominion, giving to each Province justice and equal rights, thus allaying sectional feeling, and securing prosperity and happiness throughout the land. In favor of opening railway connection with the great North-West without delay, that every facility may be afforded for its settlement. Will advocate the passing of a stringent election law, an income franchise, the use of the ballot, and Free Trade as far as the circumstances of the country will allow, that the burden of taxation may fall as lightly as possible on the great producing classes, the farmer, mechanic and labourer."—*Peterborough, Ont.*

BLACKBURN, ROBERT (*Russell*)

S. of Robt. Blackburn, Esq., merchant, Glasgow, Scot. ; and nephew of the late James Blackburn, of Aylmer, P.Q., who represented the Co. of Ottawa in the L.C. Assembly from 1834 until the suspension of the constitution of the Province, 1838. B. in Glasgow, Scot., 17 Dec., 1828. Came to Can., 1842. M. June, 1864, Mary Ann, dau. of the late John French, Esq., of Burritt's Rapids, Ont. A merchant, and managing partner of the firm of Blackburn & Co., New Edinburgh Woollen Mills. Is Vice-Presdt. Ottawa Reform Assn. Was for several years Reeve of Gloucester, and subsequently of the Village of New Edinburgh. First returned to Parl. for present seat at last g.e. A Liberal. "The country being pledged to construct the Pacific Railway, he considers that this great enterprise should be constructed entirely within our own borders, with a view to build up, strengthen and consolidate the Dominion. Is in favor of a stringently pure Election Law, to the end that

C., for a short time, and subsequently Chancellor of that Province, by Catherine Hume, grand-dau. of William Hume of Humewood, Esq., M.P. for Wicklow in the British House of Commons; and grands. of the late Rev. Edward Dominick Blake, (of the family of Blake of Cashlegrove, Galway) Rector of Kiltegan and of Lough-bucklow, and Rural Dean, by Anne Margaret Hume of Humewood. B. in Tp. of Adelaide, Middlesex, Ont., Oct., 1833. Ed. at University of Toronto, where he was silver medallist in classics, and took the degree of M.A. M. the dau. of the late Right Rev. J. Cronyn, Lord Bishop of Huron. Called to the Bar, U.C., in Michaelmas Term, 1856; created Q.C., 1863. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society of Ont., 1871. A Governor of the Carleton Protestant Hospital, a dir. of the Onta-

rio and Quebec Railway, and of the Marmora Iron Works Railway; a life mem., since its foundation, of the Agricultural Assn. of U.C.; Vice Presdt. for thirty years of the British & Foreign Bible Society, and Presdt. of the Ottawa Reform Assn., established previous to last g.e. Was engaged in mercantile affairs for many years. Has been most prominently identified with the Temperance movement as a leader and worker since 1832, and has filled the position of Chief of the Social Circle, Grand Worthy Patriarch of the Sons of Temperance, M.W.G. Chief of the Good Templars, Vice Presdt. of the Ontario League, and Presdt. of the Ontario and Quebec League. Declined the Inspector Generalship, 1841; but became Inspector of Revenue during the Administration of Sir Charles Bagot, by which office the public revenue benefited over \$50,000 in one year. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council from 11 March, 1848 to 1 Feb., 1850, and from 28 Oct., 1851 to the 10 Sept., 1854, during which periods he filled the offices of Asst. Commr. of Public Works, Presdt. of the Ex. Council, Minister of Agriculture, Postmaster Genl., and a mem. of Board of Railway Commrs.; was also a govt. dir. of the Grand Trunk Railway, then under construction. Was a delegate to Washington on behalf of the Western mercantile community to aid the govt.

S. of the late William Casey, Esq., of Southwold, Elgin, Ont., and formerly of Westmeath Irel., by Sarah, dau. of the late George Elliott, Esq., a native of Omagh, Irel., who came to Elgin, then a portion of the "Talbot Settlement" 1817, and took a prominent part in local affairs. B. in Southwold, March, 1850. Ed. at the Grammar School, St. Thomas, and at the Univ. of Toronto, where he graduated (with honors in Classics), June, 1871. CASGRAIN, PHILIPPE BABY. [*L'Islet.*]

Descended from an ancient French family, originally belonging to Airvault in Poitou, members of which came here in the early years of French settlement in Can., served in the French Army, and became possessed of the Seigniories of La Bouteillerie, St. Denis, and L' Islet de Bonsecours. S. of the late Hon. Charles Eusèbe Casgrain, who sat for Cornwallis in L.C. Assembly from 1830 to 1834, was a mem. of the Special Council of L.C. from 1838 to 1840, and at his death held the office of Asst. Com. of Public Works, Can., by Anne Elizabeth, dau of the late Hon. James Baby, at one time Speaker of the L.C of U.C. B. in City of Quebec, 1827. Ed. at St Anne College. M., 1854, Matilda, dau. of the late Col. Perrault, and grand dau. of the late F. X. Perrault, Esq., for many years Prothonotary of Dist. of Quebec, Called to the Bar, L.C., 1850. Was Deputy Prothonotary of Superior Court Quebec, for thirteen years, an office he resigned, 1873, in order to enter Parlt. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at g.e., 1872; re-elected by acclamation at last g.e. A Liberal; favors Political Indepen-



dence, unless the Colonies have a more direct influence in the Councils of the British Empire.

CAUCHON, *Lieut.-Col. Hon.* JOSEPH EDOUARD  
[*Quebec Centre.*]

Descended from a mem. of the *Conseil Supérieur*, who came to Can. in 1636; a son of this gentleman, Cauchon de Laverdière, was a Judge of the *Cour Royale*, at the Island of Orleans. B. at St. Rochs, Quebec, 31 Dec., 1816 Ed. at the Seminary of that city. M., 1st, 1844 Julie, eld. dau. of M. Chas. Lemieux, of Quebec (she d. 1864); 2ndly, 1866, Miss Nolan, of the same city. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1843. Edited *Le Canadien* newspaper, from 1841 to 1842, and in the latter year founded *Le Journal de Québec* of which he is still chief political editor. Was Lieut.-Col. of the 9th Batt. of Volunteer Militia, or *Chasseurs de Québec*, and Mayor of Quebec for some years. One of the chief promotors of the North Shore Railway and St. Maurice Navigation Co., and its Presdt., from 1870 until 1872. Is author of *Notions Élémentaires de Physique*, (Que., 1841); *Etudes sur l'Union Projetée des Provinces de Britannique de l'Amérique du Nord* (do., 1858); and *L'Union des Provinces de l'Amérique Britannique du Nord*, (do.,

1865.) Was a mem. of Ex. Council and Commr. of Crown Lands, Can., from Jan., 1855, to April, 1857 and Commr. of Public Works from June, 1861 to May, 1862. Called upon, in 1867, to form a Govt. for the Province of Quebec, a duty he failed to accomplish, owing to causes beyond his control. Sat for Montmorenci in Can. Assembly from 1844 until the Union, when he was returned to Commons and Local House by acclamation. Resigned seat in former House on being called to Senate, and apptd. Speaker of that body, 5 Nov. 1867, where he remained until July, 1872, when he resigned in order to re-enter Commons. Resigned seat in Local House, Dec., 1872, and again returned by acclamation. Returned to Commons for Quebec Centre, at g.e., 1872; re-elected by acclamation at last g.e. A Conservative; and a supporter generally of the policy of the present Administration.—17, *D'Auteuil St., Quebec.*

CHARLTON, JOHN. [*North Norfolk.*]

Father came from Northumberland, Eng. B. near Caledonia, N.Y., 3 Feb., 1829. Ed. in New York. M., Nov., 1854, in Can., Miss Ellen Gray. A lumber merchant; and a dir. of the Port Royal Ship Canal Co. First returned to Parlt for present at seat, g.e., 1872; re-elected at last

g.e. A Liberal ; and a supporter of the Mackenzie Administration. " Will favor an election law containing the most stringent provisions against bribery and corrupt practices that can be desired—establishing a system of trial of controverted elections before judges, and providing for vote by ballot, and simultaneous polling throughout the Dominion. Will also favor a reasonable and judicious extension of the franchise; the prosecution of our railway enterprises, and the affording of the necessary railway facilities and means of water communication to the fertile belt of our great North-West, and to British Columbia, so fast as the wants of those regions shall demand, and our ability to perform shall warrant; the development of our magnificent canal system, so as to secure to Canada greater maritime prosperity through the possession of a much larger share than we now enjoy of the vast and rapidly increasing commerce of the Great West; a revision of our system of militia defence, so as to secure if possible greater efficiency with reduced expense; and he will oppose all unnecessary increase in the number and expense of public officers, and shall at no time allow his attachment to party to constrain him to vote for measures which are opposed to the good of Canada."—*Lynedoch, Ont.*

CHEVAL, GUILLAUME. [*Rowville.*]

B. at Belœil, P.Q., 17 April, 1828. Ed. at St. Denis. M. there, Oct., 1852, Miss Hermelimbe Richer. A merchant. Has been mayor of St. Hilaire for four years. Sat for present seat from g.e., 1867, until g.e., 1872, when defeated; again returned at last g.e. A Liberal.—*St. Hilaire, P.Q.*

CHISHOLM, DANIEL BLACK. [*Halton.*]

Youngest s. of the late Col. George Chisholm, a native of Can; and grands. of the late George Chisholm, Esq., who came from Inverness-shire, Scot., settled on north shore of Burlington Bay, near Hamilton, 1794, and d. there, 1842, aged 100 years. B. near Hamilton, 2 Nov., 1842. Ed. at Victoria College, Cobourg. M., 17 Aug., 1864, Addie, eld. dau. of the late Milton Davis, Esq., of Hamilton. Was engaged in farming until 1856. Called to the Bar of U.C., Easter Term, 1864. Has been Presdt. of the Burlington Literary Society of Hamilton. Is Chairman of Provisional Board of Directors of Hamilton and North Western Railway Co.; a dir. of the Mutual Life Assn. of Can., and Supdt. of the Wesleyan Methodist Centenary Church Sunday School, Hamilton. Sat for several years in the City Council, Hamilton, and was Mayor of that city, 1871-2.

Sat for Hamilton, as an independent mem. (although elected under the auspices of the Liberal Conservative party), from g.e., 1872, until the dissolution of Parlt., in Jan., 1874, when he retired from that constituency, and was elected for Halton, under the auspices of the Liberal Conservative party, as an independent candidate, proposing to support the present Administration in all good measures. A Liberal; and in favor of a Prohibitory Liquor Law.—127, *North John St., Hamilton.*

CHURCH, CHARLES EDWARD, *J.P.* [*Lunenburg.*]

will be found, wise and economical, and that it will render justice to all the Provinces of the Dominion." In favor of measures beneficial to N.S. and the Dominion generally.—*Chester, N. S.*

CIMON, ERNEST. (*Chicoutimi and Saguenay.*)

S. of Cléophe Cimon, Esq., N.P., who represented Charlevoix in the Can. Assembly from 1858 to 1861. B. at Murray Bay, P.Q., 30 March, 1829. Ed. at the Seminary of Quebec and at Laval University where he became a Licentiate in Law, 1871. Unmarried. Called to the Bar of Quebec 1871. First returned to Parlt., for present seat at last g. e. A Conservative.—*Chicoutimi, P.Q.*

COCKBURN, ALEXANDER PETER. [*Muskoka.*]

Of Scottish parentage. B. in Finch, Stormont, Ont., 7 April, 1835. Ed. there. M., Sept., 1864, Miss Mary Helen Proctor, of Beaverton, Ont. A merchant. Has been Reeve of Eldon. Sat for North Victoria in Ontario Assembly from g.e., 1867 until g.e., 1871. Elected for present seat at g.e., 1872, but not returned, until writ amended by resolution of the House, March, 1873; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal. "In favor of a new election law, an act for the better security of the Independence of Parliament; greater economy

in the expenses of government; and the extension of the Dominion by taking in Newfoundland."

COFFIN, *Hon.* THOMAS. [*Shelburne.*] *P.C.*

Ancestors came from Eng. and settled at Nantucket; thence removed to N.S. after the Am. revolution. S. of the late Thomas Coffin, Esq., by Margaret, dau. of the late Joseph Homer, Esq., a U.E. loyalist, and for many years Collector of Customs at Barrington. B. at Barrington, 1817. Ed. there. M., 1841, Miss Sarah Evans, (she d. Aug., 1870.) An extensive merchant, ship builder and owner. Has made many successful voyages to different parts of the world in command of his own vessels. Sworn of the Privy Council and apptd. Receiver Genl., 7 Nov., 1873 (*Salary* \$7,000). Sat for Shelburne in N.S. Assembly from 1851 to 1855, and, again, from 1859 until the Union. Returned to Commons for present seat, by acclamation, at g.e., 1867, at g.e., 1872, again on his appt. to office, and again at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Barrington, N.S.*

COLBY, CHARLES CARROLL. [*Stanstead.*]

Paternal ancestors emigrated from Chester, Eng., to New Hampshire, before the Am. revolutionary war. S. of the late Dr. M. F. Colby, a well known medical practitioner, who came to

Stanstead, 1832, and represented that county in the L.C. Assembly from 1834 until the suspension of the Constitution, 1837. B. at Derby Vt., 10 Dec., 1827. Came to Can., with his parents, 1832. Graduated at Dartmouth College, N.H., July, 1847. M., Dec., 1858, Miss Harriet Child, of Waybridge, Vt. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1855. A dir. of the Massawippi Railway, and of the Crown Mining Co. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, at g.e., 1867; re-elected by acclamation at g.e., 1872, and again at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Stanstead, P.Q.*

**COOK, HERMON HENRY.** [*North Simcoe.*]

Fifth s. of the late Capt. Geo. Cook, a U.E. loyalist; nephew of Capt. John Cook, who represented Dundas in the U.C. Assembly, from 1829 until Responsible Govt. was obtained, when he resigned; brother of J. W. Cook, Esq. who represented Dundas in the Can. Assembly from 1857 until 1861; and brother of S. S. Cook, Esq., who now represents the same county in the Ont. Assembly. B. in Tp. of Williamsburg, Dundas, Ont., 1838. Ed. at Iroquois Grammar school. M., 1861, Miss White. A lumber merchant. An unsuccessful candidate for North Simcoe in Local Assembly, at g.e., 1871. First returned



to Parl., for present seat, at g.e., 1872; re-elected at last g.e. A Reformer; and, "so long as the present Govt. prove faithful to their past record, so long will they receive his support."—505, *King St., Toronto.*

**COSTIGAN, JOHN, J.P.** [*Victoria, N.B.*]

B. at St. Nicholas, P.Q., 1 Feb., 1835. Ed. at St. Ann's College. M., 1855, Miss Ryan, of Victoria, N.B. Has been Registrar of Deeds for Victoria, and Judge of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas, N.B. Sat for present seat in N.B. Assembly from 1861 to 1866, when defeated. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867, at g.e., 1872, and again at last g.e. A Conservative; and opposed to the present Administration.—*Grand Falls, N.B.*

**CUNNINGHAM, JAMES J.P.** [*New Westminster.*]

S. of James Cunningham, Esq., Anyevny, Monaghan, Irel., 1834. Ed. there. M., 1864, Miss Mary Ann Woodman of St. Thomas, Ont. A merchant. Has been Mayor of the City of New Westminster. First returned to Parl. for present seat, at last g.e. A Liberal.—*New Westminster, B.C.*

**CUNNINGHAM, ROBERT, M.A., J.P.** [*Marquette.*]

S. of Mr. John Cunningham, by Barbara Newlands. B. in Stewarton, near Kilmarnock,

Ayrshire, Scot. Ed. at Glasgow College and London University and graduated at the former in arts and at the latter in science. M., 1862, Annie, dau. of the late Robert Brown, Esq., of Aberdeen, Scot. Came to Can., 1868. Is joint editor and proprietor of the *Manitoban* newspaper, (Winnipeg). Author of *Geordie Short's Letters*. Was special correspondent for the *Toronto Globe*, and subsequently for the *Toronto Telegraph*, at Red River, during the insurrection there, 1869-70. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e., 1872; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal; and a supporter of the Mackenzie Administration.—*Winnipeg*.

CURRIER, JOSEPH MERRILL. [*City of Ottawa.*]

Of French descent. Seventh and youngest s. of the late Ezekiel Currier, Esq., of North Troy, Vermont, near Canada line. B., 1820. Ed. at North Troy. M., 1st, 1846, Christina, dau. of the late John Wilson, Esq., of Cumberland, Ont. (she d.); 2ndly, 1861, Annie, dau. of F. G. Crosby, Esq., (accidentally killed at Long Island a few days afterwards); 3rdly, 1868, Hannah, dau. of the late Ruggles Wright, Esq., of Hull, P.Q. Came to Can., 1837, and was for many years engaged in the lumber trade; had charge for several years of the extensive lum-

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ber mills of the late Mr. L. G. Bigelow, at Buckingham, P. Q., and afterwards of the lumber business of Messrs. McKay & McKinnon, New Edinburgh, Ont. Commenced business on his own account, 1855. Is Presdt. of the Ottawa Valley Immigration Society, and of the Ottawa Horticultural Society. Was an Alderman of Ottawa for some years. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from g.e., 1863 until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867; by acclamation, at g.e., 1872, and again returned at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative; "pledged not to follow blindly any party leader or to factiously oppose the Govt., but rather to treat all measures they may bring before Parliament strictly upon their merits, without reference to party considerations, and in such a manner as becomes an independent member of Parliament, and to a patriotic course in reference to all Dominion interests."— "*Gorphwysfa*," *New Edinburgh*; *Ottawa*; *Rideau Club*.

DAVIES, Hon. DANIEL. [*Kings, P.E.I.*]

Of Welsh descent. B. in P.E.I., 1825. Ed. there. M., Feb., 1854, Miss Catherine Cameron. A merchant. Is a dir. of the Bank of P.E.I. Sat for Charlottetown in the Local Legislature from 1858 to 1868. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council of

P.E.I. from 1864 to 1866. First returned to Commons, for present seat., on P.E.I. entering the Dominion, Sept., 1873; re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative. Carried the Decimal Currency and other mercantile bills through the Local House.—“Westwood,” *North River Road, Charlottetown.*

DAWSON, JOHN A. [*Pictou.*]

A merchant. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at last g.e. A Liberal; and a supporter of the present Administration.—*Pictou, N.S.*

DECOSMOS, Hon. AMOR, [*Victoria, B.C.*]

B. at Windsor, N.S. Ed. there and in Halifax. Went to California in 1852; to British Columbia in 1858. Founded the *British Colonist* newspaper there in 1858; owned and edited it till 1863. It was then the second largest daily in British North America, exercising a controlling influence over public opinion in the Province. From 1863 to 1870 was not connected with business. Started *Daily* (Victoria) *Standard* in 1870 for political purposes; owned and edited it from that date till 1872, when he sold out. He was the first person to recommend the Union of the Pacific Provinces in 1858, he

finally succeeded in uniting them in 1867. Has been actively engaged in politics from 1858 to the present. Sat first in Vancouver Island Legislative Assembly for Victoria. After Union of the Colony of Vancouver Island with British Columbia, he held a seat in the Legislative Council from 1867 to 1871, except in 1868. Was the first British Columbian to advocate the introduction of Responsible Government. Was the first and most energetic advocate of the Confederation of British Columbia with the Dominion, and was instrumental in securing the unanimous acceptance of the terms of union. Was Premier and Presdt. of Executive Council from December, 1872 to Feb., 1874, when he retired to stand for Commons. He was the only person who ever held a seat in the B.C., and Dominion Legislature at the same time. Was Special Agent and Delegate to Ottawa and London respecting Graving Dock and Loan in 1873-4. Has always been a Liberal in politics. — *Victoria, B. C.*

DELORME, LOUIS. [*St. Hyacinthe.*]

S. of Pierre Delorme, Esq., of Montreal, by Elizabeth, dau. of Patrick Burke, Esq., of Ardfry, Galway, Irel. Paternal grandfather was a French military officer. B. in Montreal,

29 Dec., 1824. Ed. at St. Sulpice College, Montreal, and the College of St. Hyacinthe. M., 1st, 1855, Marie Julie Arma, dau. of R. A. Fortier, Esq., M.D., of Ste. Marie, Nouvelle Beauce, P.Q., by Julie Louise, youngest dau. of Hon. Gabriel Elzéar Taschereau, (she d.); 2ndly, 1871, Flore, dau. of F. X. Paradis, Esq., of Quebec. Called to the Bar of L.C., 1847, but does not now practice his profession. Is Mayor of the parish of St. Hyacinthe, and Warden of the County. First returned to Parlt. by acclamation, Sept., 1870, on death of sitting mem. (Hon. A. Kierzkowski); re-elected at g.e., 1872, and again, by acclamation, at last g.e. "A true Liberal; and a supporter of the Mackenzie-Dorion Administration."—*St. Hyacinthe, P.Q.*

DE SAINT GEORGES, J. ESDRAS ALFRED, *M.D.*  
[*Portneuf.*]

Third s. of the late Laurent Aurez de St. Georges, Esq., N.P., of Cap Santé, by Adelaide, dau. of the late George W. Allsopp, Esq., *Seigneur* of Jacques Cartier and d'Auteuil, who for many years represented Portneuf (then Hampshire) in the L.C. Assembly, and grand-dau. of the late Hon. George Allsopp, Provincial Secretary of L.C. B. at Cap Santé, 4 Augt., 1849. Ed. at Nicolet College, and by

private tuition. Unmarried. Graduated as M.D. at Univ. of Victoria College, Cobourg. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, at g.e., 1872; re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative; and a supporter of the present Govt.—*Cap Santé, P.Q.*

DESJARDINS, ALPHONSE. [*Hochelaga.*]

Family settled in Can., before the Cession to Eng. B. at Terrebonne, P.Q., 6 May, 1841. Ed. at the Masson College and the Seminary of Nicolet. M., 19 May, 1864, Virginie, eld. dau. of the late Hubert Paré, Esq. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1862, and practised his profession in Montreal until 1868, when he abandoned law for journalism, and became one of the editors of *L'Ordre*. Is now, and has been for some years past, editor and one of the directors of *Le Nouveau Monde*. Created a Knight of the Order of Pius IX., 30 July, 1872, after his return from a visit to Rome, where he had the honor of being admitted to an audience with His Holiness. Took an active part in the organization of the Canadian Papal Zouave contingent, which went to the assistance of the Holy See, 1870. Was one of the authors of the *Programme Catholique*, first published Apl., 1871, which was prepared for the purpose of being offered to the Conservative party as a basis on which the differ-

ent opposing sections of that party, then engaged in a warm contest, might agree. First returned to Parl. for present seat, by acclamation, at last g.e. An Independent Conservative, In favor of separate schools; an amnesty to Riel and all others charged with the commission of political offences in Manitoba during the recent Insurrection; of the National route of the Pacific Railway; of a Protectionist policy; and a fair Reciprocity Treaty with the U. S.—757, *Dorchester St., Montreal.*

DE VEBER, JEREMIAH SMITH BOIES. [*City of St. John, N.B.*]

S. of L. H. De Veber, Esq., for many years a leading merchant of St. John; and grands. (maternally) of the late Wm. Hubbard, Esq., who was one of the representatives of Sunbury in the first Parl. of N.B., that met 1785. B. in City of St. John, 1830. Ed. there. M. at Portland, Me., 1856, Elizabeth Robinson, dau. of Robt. Ilsley, Esq. A mem. of the extensive mercantile firm of L. H. De Veber & Sons, St. John; a dir. of the Bank of N.B., and of the Rivière du Loup Railway Co., and Chairman of N.B. branch of the Royal Canadian Fire and Marine Insurance Co. Contested present seat unsuccessfully at g.e., 1872; first returned, by acclamation, Dec., 1873,



on resignation of sitting mem. ; re-elected at last g.e. A Reformer ; and " will support the policy of the present Govt., as foreshadowed by the Premier in his address to his constituents, as well as in all other good measures."—*Seely St., Portland, St. John, N.B.*

DEWDNEY. *Hon. EDGAR, C.E. [Yale.]*

B. in Devonshire, Eng., 1835. Came to B.C. 1859. M., 28 March, 1864, Jane Shaw, eld. dau. of Stratton Moir, Esq., of Colombo, Ceylon. A Civil Engineer. Has been employed on Can. Pacific Railway survey. Sat for Kootenay in the Local Assembly, 1868-9. Returned to Commons at g.e. 1872 ; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal ; and is " perfectly untrammelled, having neither received nor solicited any personal favor from either party. Will support that Govt. that will complete the pledges made to B.C. in the terms of Union ; but, should the electors direct him to assent to a modification of those terms he will do so ; in the meanwhile (believing as he does that no concession of any important feature should be made), he pledges himself to vote with the ayes in favor of a strict fulfilment of the Treaty engagements ; with the Govt., if that is their policy, and against them if, unhappily, the friends of B.C. are only found in the Opposition."—*Victoria ; Rideau Club.*

DOMVILLE, JAMES. [*Kings, N.B.*]

Descended from an ancient Norman family that settled in Cheshire, Eng., at the time of the Conquest, three members of which have at different times been created Baronets of the United Kingdom. S. of Col. James Domville, R.A. lately serving in India as Brigadier Genl., on the staff of the army, by Frances, dau. of Hon. William Usher, a descendant of the celebrated Archbishop Usher. B. 29 Nov., 1842. Ed. in Eng. M., 1867, Isabel, dau. of the late William Henry Scovil, Esq., of St. John, N.B. Went to Barbadoes, where his father was in command of Royal Artillery and of the Garrison, 1858, and entered mercantile firm of Michael Cavan & Co., a branch of the house of Cavan, Lubbock & Co., London. In 1866 came to St. John, N.B., and commenced business as a merchant, establishing a direct trade between that port and British West Indies. He also became the proprietor by purchase of the extensive iron works, rolling mill and nail factories at Moosepath, Coldbrook and Rockland in Kings Co., and entered largely into other commercial business, in which he is still engaged. Is Presdt. of the Kings Co. Board of Trade, Vice-Presdt. of the Maritime Bank of the Dominion of Can., Vice Presdt. and Managing dir. of the Cold Brook Rolling

Mills Co., and Vice Presdt. of the Maritime Warehousing and Dock Co. Sat as chairman of the delegation from St. John, N.B., at Dominion Board of Trade, Ottawa, 1871. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, at g.e., 1872; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative; and "will, as in the past, vote for all measures that may be conducive to the welfare of the Dominion."—*Wellington Row, St. John, N.B.*; "*Kingshurst*," *Rothesay, Kings Co., N.B.*; *Rideau Club*; *St. James' Club*.

DONAHUE, WILLIAM. [*Missisquoi.*]

(she d. 1856); 2ndly, 1867, Susan Agnes, dau. of the late Hon. T. T. Bernard, a mem. of H.M. Privy Council of the Island of Jamaica. Called to the Bar, U.C., in Hilary Term, 1836. Created Q.C., 1846. A Bencher, *ex-officio*, of the Law Society of Ontario. Is the grand representative in Can. of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Eng., and holds the rank of a Past Grand Senior Warden of the Freemasons of Can. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council of Can., from 11 May, 1847 to 10 March, 1848; from 11 Sept., 1854 to 29 July, 1858; from 6 Aug., same year, to 23 May, 1862; and from 30 March, 1864, until the Union; and was during these several periods, Receiver-Genl. from 21 May to 7 Dec., 1847; Commissioner of Crown Lands from latter date to 10 March, 1848; Attorney-General for U.C. from 11 Sept., 1854 to 29 July, 1858, when

as Prime Minister he and his Cabinet resigned, being defeated on the Seat of Govt. question. Returned to office 6 Aug. same year, as Postmaster-Genl., a position he resigned the following day, on his re-appointment as Attorney-Genl., U.C., which he continued to hold until the defeat of the Administration on the Militia Bill, in May, 1862, when he and his colleagues again retired from office. Sir George E. Cartier and he led the Opposition in the Assembly, until the defeat of the Sandfield Macdonald-Dorion Govt. when the Taché-Macdonald Govt. was formed, 30 March, 1864, and he returned to his old office of Attorney-Genl. and was Govt. leader in the Assembly from that time until the Union of the B.A. Provinces, 1867. Held the office of Minister of Militia Affairs jointly with that of Attorney-Genl., from Jan. to May, 1862, and from Aug., 1865, until the Union. Was requested to take the place of Sir E. P. Literary Institute, Woodstock, Ont.; and Commr, *ex-officio*, to assist Mr. Speaker in the management of the Interior Economy of the

House of Commons. Was a mem. of Ex. Council and Treasurer of Ont. from Dec., 1871 until Oct., 1872, when he resigned with Mr. Blake. Several important public measures owe their existence to Mr. M., viz.: the Act amending the Assessment Act of U.C. (1863); that consolidating and amending the acts relating to the Assessment of Property, U.C. (1866); and the highly useful measure for providing means of egress from Public Buildings (1866). Created a Q.C., 1872. Is County Treasurer for Cape Breton. An unsuccessful candidate for Cape Breton in N.S., Assembly at e., 1867, and at g.e., 1871. First returned to

Parlt. at g.e., 1872; re-elected at last g.e. A supporter of the reform party since the Pacific Railway disclosures.—*Sydney, C.S.*

McCALLUM, LACHLIN. [*Monck.*]

A shipbuilder and owner. Was Captain of the Dunnville Naval Co., which he commanded at Fort Erie during the Fenian raid, June, 1866. An unsuccessful candidate for Haldimand in Can. Assembly at g.e., 1863. Sat for present seat, in House of Commons, from g.e., 1867 until g.e., 1872, when defeated; and in the Ont. Assembly from g.e., 1871 until Sept., 1872, when unseated on petition. Again returned to Commons at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Stromness, Ont.*

A Master in the Supreme Court of N.S. Was a Commr., in charge of a detachment of H.M's 17th Regt., to suppress the riot at the Sydney Mines, 1864. Sat for Inverness in N.S. Assembly, from 1863 until 1867, and from B. e., 1871 until Augt., 1872, when he resigned to contest the county for the Commons, in which was successful; re-elected at last g.e. While the Assembly seconded the motion of Hon. Miller referring the Quebec terms of Union to the Imperial Govt., for such modifications as would make them more acceptable to the people N.S. Educated at the Jesuit College, Georgetown, Worcester, U.S., and completed his classical studies at the College of St. Hyacinthe, P.Q. M., 1856, Louise Rachel, eld. dau. of the late Lt.-Col. Alexander McKenzie, and grand-dau. of the late Hon. Rodrick McKenzie, a partner in the North-West Fur Co. Called to the Bar, L.C., Nov., 1859. B.

Assembly from Oct., 1868, until following year when he resigned, and was returned by acclamation to Commons upon the resignation of the sitting mem. RICHARD, EDOUARD EMERY, B.C.L. [*Megantic.*]

Second s. of Hon. Louis Richard, M.L.C., of Stanfold, Arthabaska, P.Q., by Hermine Prince, sister of the late Right Rev. Dr. Prince, Bishop of St. Hyacinthe. B. at Princeville, P.Q., 1844. Ed. at Nicolet College, and at McGill College, Montreal, where he obtained degree of B.C.L. Unmarried. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1868. mem. of the law firm of Laurier & Richard. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at g.e., 1872; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal, and Protectionist.—*Princeville, P.Q.*

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RIEL, LOUIS. [*Provencher.*]

S. of the late Louis Riel, in his lifetime a popular leader of the Red River "Half-breeds," who was b. at Isle à la Crosse, North West Territories, 7 June, 1817, and d. at Red River Settlement, 1864, by Marguerite Boucher, a "Half-breed" woman; and grands. of Jean Baptiste Riel, a native of Berthier, P.Q. B. at Red River Settlement, about 1845. Ed. at the *Séminaire de Montréal*. Unmarried. Was Secy. of the "*Comité National des Métis*," organized, Oct., 1869, to prevent the entrance into the North West Territories of Lieut.-Governor McDougall, and became the "*Président du Gouvernement Provisoire*," 8 Dec., same year, and as such led the insurrection, which prevailed until the arrival of the country of Col. (now Maj.-Genl.) Sir Garnet Wolseley, in command of the Royal troops, 24 Aug., 1870. A reward of \$5000 has been offered for his apprehension by the Govt. of Ontario, for his having, while leader of the insurrection, ordered the execution of Thomas Scott, a native of Ont., then confined as a prisoner in Fort Garry. Returned for Provencher by acclamation, Oct., 1873, on the death of Sir George Cartier, the former mem., but never took his seat; again returned at last g.e. *St. Vital, Manitoba.*

ROBILLARD, ULYSSE JANVIER, *J.P.* [*Beauharnois.*]

S. of M. Joseph Robillard, of Ste. Geneviève, Jacques Cartier, P.Q. B. there 1826. Ed. there. M., June, 1871, Delle Marie Virginie Lannault. A produce and grain merchant. Was Mayor of town of Beauharnois, 1864-65-66. First returned to Parl., for present seat, at 1872; re-elected at last g.e. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867; re-elected at g.e., 1872; returned, by acclamation, on his appt. to office, and again returned at last g.e. Represented Bonaventure in Quebec Assembly from g.e., 1871 until Jan., 1874, when he retired in

order to confine himself to Commons. A Conservative, and opposed to the present Govt.—*New Carlisle, P.Q.*

ROCHESTER, JOHN. [*Carleton, Ont.*]

Family came from Eng. to Am., 1818; removed to Can., 1820, and finally settled at Bytown (now Ottawa City,) 1827. S. of the late John Rochester, Esq., a native of Berwick-on-Tweed, and for some years a contractor to the troops employed in constructing the Rideau Canal. B. at Rouse's Point, N.Y., 1822. Ed. at University College, London, and took degree of B.A. at London University. M., 1854, Anna Letitia, dau. of W. H. Le Breton, Esq., Barrister at Law. A merchant. Is Capt. No. 1 Co. of Volunteer Rifles, Victoria. Has been Commr. of Savings Bank, B.C. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at last g.e. ST. JEAN, PIERRE, M.D. [*Ottawa City.*]

S. of the late M. Silvas St. Jean, of St. Sulpice, Assomption, P. Q., by Elizabeth Casaubon, a descendant of a French military officer of that name. B. in the City of Ottawa, 22 Sept., 1833. Studied at the University of Ottawa; obtained degree of M.D. from College of Physicians and Surgeons, L.C., 1855. M. 1st. Jan., 1856, Rose Lima, dau. of Levi LaRue, Esq., supdt. of Public Works at St. Ours, P.Q., (she d. 1857);

2ndly., Nov., 1862, Louise, dau. of Antoine Fréchette, Esq., of Quebec. Is Presdt. of the Ottawa St. Jean, Baptiste Société and a V. Presdt. of the Ottawa Reform Assn. A Liberal and will give the present Administration his cordial support. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867; re-elected, by acclamation, at g.e., 1872, and again at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Administration.—*London, Ont.*

SCHULTZ, *Hon. JOHN CHRISTIAN, M.D.* [*Lisgar.*]

Of Scandinavian descent. S. of the late Mr. William Schultz, merchant, of Amherstburg, Ont., by Eliza, dau. of — Riley, Esq., of Bandon, Ont.; and grands. of Christian Schultz, an officer in the Danish navy, who was knighted for distinguished services. B. at Amherstburg, 1 Jan., 1840. Ed. in Arts at Oberlin College, Ohio; and in Medicine at Queen's University, Kingston and Victoria University, Cobourg. Graduated M.D., 1860. M., at Winnipeg, 1868, Miss Frances Campbell Farquharson, of Georgetown, British Guiana. Went to Red River, 1860, where he has since resided, practising his profession

and being also largely engaged in mercantile pursuits. Was leader of the "Canadian" party at the time of the Rebellion, 1869-70, and was seized and imprisoned, and sentenced to death by Riel, but escaped to Can., walking almost the entire distance, nearly 600 miles, on snow-shoes. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council for the N.W. Territories, Dec., 1872. Is Presdt. of the Manitoba Board of Trade, a mem. of the Dominion Board of Health for Manitoba and the North West Territories, provisional dir. of the Manitoba Central Railway and of the Manitoba North Western Railway, and commands the "Lisgar Co. of Volunteer Rifles. An unsuccessful candidate for Winnipeg and St. John in Local Assembly at g.e., 1871. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, on Manitoba entering the Dominion, March, 1871; re-elected at g.e., 1872, and again at last g.e. An Independent Liberal; in favor of union and progress.—*Winnipeg Rideau Club.*

SCRIVER, JULIUS. [*Huntingdon.*]

Descended from U.E. loyalists who came Can. from Dutchess Co., N.Y., at the close of the Am. revolution. B. at Hemmingford, P. 26 Feb., 1826. Ed. at the Univ. of Vermont. Miss Frances M. Stevens, of Potsdam, N.Y. merchant. Sat for Huntingdon in Local Ho

from the Union until Sept., 1869, when he resigned, and was returned to Commons by acclamation. Re-elected, by acclamation, at g.e., 1872; and again returned at last g.e. A Liberal, and an independent supporter of the existing Administration.—*Hemmingford, P.Q.*

**SHIBLEY, SCHUYLER.** [*Addington.*]

Of German descent. S. of Henry Shibley, Esq., of Portland, Co. Frontenac, Ont.; grands. of John Shibley, Esq., a U.E. loyalist, who came to Can. at the close of the Am. Revolutionary war, and settled at Bath, Ont., 1783; and a nephew of Jacob Shibley, Esq., a follower of the late Hon. Robt. Baldwin, who represented Frontenac in the U.C. Assembly, previous to the Union of 1840. B. in Portland, 19 March, 1820. Ed. at the Waterloo Academy, near Addington. M., 1854, a dau. of the late Thos. Beer, Esq., for many years a prominent merchant of Kingston. A dir. of the Kingston and Pembroke Railway. Was Warden of Frontenac during three consecutive terms. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g.e., 1867, when defeated by a small majority, but returned at g.e., 1872, by a majority of 1000 over his former opponent. Again returned at last g.e. "A Liberal Conservative, and

until the exposure of the 'Pacific Railway scandal,' an independent supporter of the Govt. of Sir John Macdonald. Believing that the present Administration is entitled to a fair trial, he will support the measures brought forward by them so long as they are worthy of confidence."—*Murvale, Ont.*

SINCLAIR, *Hon.* PETER. [*Queens, P.E.I.*]

S. of the late Peter Sinclair, Esq., by Mary Crawford, both of Argyleshire, Scot. B. and ed. there. A farmer. Has been a mem. of the Board of Education, P.E.I. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council from 1869 until 1871, when he resigned with his colleagues, and, again, from 1872, when he was a mem. of the Board of Work and leader in the Assembly, until 1873. Sat for Queens (1st Dist.) in P.E.I. Assembly from 1867 until Sept., 1873, when returned to House of Commons, as one of the first representatives from P.E.I. as a Province of the Dominion re-elected at last g.e. "A Consistent Liberal but moderate in his views as a politician."

SMITH, *Hon.* ALBERT JAMES, *Q.C.* [*Westmoreland.*] *P.C.*

S. of the late T. E. Smith, Esq., of Co. Westmoreland, N.B. B. there, 1822. Ed. at the

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Grammar School. M., June, 1868, the dau. of J. W. Young, Esq., of Halifax, N.S. Called to the Bar, N.B., Feb., 1847. A Queen's Counsel. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, N.B., from 1856 to 1863, and also for a short period in 1866; Attorney-General from 1862 to 1863, when he retired from the Govt., held same office in his own Administration, 1865. Was a delegate to Eng., with the present Judge Fisher, 1858, on the subject of the Intercolonial Railway; to the same country with the present Judge Allan, on public business, 1865; and to Washington, with Hon. Messrs. Galt, (now Sir A. T.), Howland and Henry, on the subject of reciprocal trade Jan., 1866. Declined the Chief Justiceship of N.B. 1866, and the Lieutenant-Governorship of the same Province, 1873. Sworn of the Privy Council, and apptd. Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Nov., 1873. (*Salary* \$7,000.) Sat in the N.B. assembly from 1852 until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867; re-elected, by acclamation, at g.e., 1872, again on his appointment to office, and again at last g.e. A Liberal; was previous to the Union opposed to Confederation, but has subsequently loyally accepted the new constitution and cordially helped to carry out its terms.—*Russell House, Ottawa; Dorchester; B.; Rideau Club.*

SMITH, *Hon.* DONALD ALEXANDER. [*Selkirk.*]

Has been for many years in the service of the Hon. Hudson Bay Co., and now holds the office of Resident Governor and Chief Commissioner of that corporation. Agricultural Association; and of the Selkirk St. Andrew's Society; Vice-Presdt. of the Dominion Rifle Assn., and of the London and Canadian Loan and Agency Co.; and a dir. of the Bank of Montreal, and of the Railway Equipment and Railway Stock Co. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council for N. W. Territories, Oct., 1870. Was a special commissioner to enquire into the causes, nature and extent of the obstruction offered in the North West Territories to the peaceable ingress of Hon. W. Macdougall and for other purposes, Dec., 1869. Represented Winnipeg and St. John in the Manitoba Assembly, from the first meeting of that body, 1871, until Jan., 1874, when he resigned in order to confine himself to the Commons. First returned to Commons for present seat, on the admission of Manitoba into the Union, 1871; re-elected at

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1872, and at last g.e. Was a township and county councillor for 10 years. An unsuccessful candidate for Peel in Ont. Assembly at g.e., 1867. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at g.e., 1872; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of the Mackenzie Administration.—*Brampton, Ont.*

SNIDER, GEORGE. [*North Grey.*]

Grandfather emigrated from Germany to British Colonies in Am. in the 18th century. S. of Martin Snider, a native of Pennsylvania, and a U.E. loyalist, who served on the loyal side during the Am. revolution, was taken prisoner, but escaped and made his way to N.B.,

and thence to U.C. B. at Eglinton, Ont., 31 Jan., 1813. Ed. in Toronto. M., 1835, Jane, dau. of the late Joseph Maughan, of Northumberland, Eng. Was local agent for the sale of Crown Lands on Toronto and Sydenham Road, 1848 to 1850; Crown Lands agent, same place, from latter date to 1854; and Sheriff of Grey from Dec., 1853, to June, 1863, when he resigned that office. Has been Presdt. of the Mechanics' Institute of Owen Sound, and of the County Agricultural Society, and Mayor of Owen Sound on two occasions. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Grey in Can. Assembly, at g.e., 1863. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e., 1867; re-elected at g.e., 1872; and at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of the Mackenzie Administration.—*Fairview Cottage, Owen Sound, Ont.*

STEPHENSON, RUFUS. [*Kent, Ont.*]

Family originally came from Lancashire, Eng. One of his ancestors, Samuel Chapin, emigrated to Am. as early as 1641. Youngests. of Eli Stephenson, Esq., formerly of St. Catharines, Ont., and nephew of the late Col. E. W. Stephenson, of the same place. B. at Springfield, Mass., U.S., 14 Jan., 1835. Ed. at the Grantham Academy, St. Catharines. M., Oct., 1854,

Georgina Emma, eld. dau. of Thos. Andrew, Esq., barrister, formerly of London, Eng., and grand-dau. of Joseph Sparkes, Esq., of the Co. Kent, Eng., once a dir. of the Hon. East India Co. Is editor and proprietor of the *Chatham Planet* newspaper. Has been a mem. of the Town Council of Chatham for some years, and was Mayor of that town from 1865 to 1869. Is also a mem. of the Municipal Council of the Co. Kent, mem. of the Co. Board of Grammar School Trustees, and Capt. No. 2 Co. 24 Batt. Volunteer Infantry. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e., 1867; re-elected at g.e., 1872, and again at last g.e. A Conservative and opposed to the present Administration.—*Chatham, Ont.; Rideau Club.*

STIRTON, DAVID, J.P. [*South Wellington.*]

Eld. s. of the late Mr. James Stirton, one of the earliest settlers at Guelph. B. in Forfarshire, Scot, 1816. Has been a magistrate for the past twenty years. Was Reeve of Tp. of Puslinch for some years. Is a captain in the Militia. Sat for South Wellington in Can. Assembly from g.e., 1857, until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e. 1867; re-elected by acclamation at g.e., 1872, and again returned at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of Mr. Mackenzie.—*Guelph, Ont.*

STUART, JOHN. [*South Norfolk.*]

A mem. of the firm of Harvey, Stuart & Co., wholesale grocers, Hamilton; Vice-Presdt. of the Bank of Hamilton; and a dir. of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway. First returned to Parlt.; for present seat, at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Administration. *Cor. McNab and Robinson sts., Hamilton, Ont.*

TASCHEREAU, HENRI THOMAS, *B.C.L.* [*Montmagny.*]

A mem. of one of the oldest and most honourable families in the Province of Quebec. S. of Hon. Jean Thomas Taschereau, one of the Judges of the Court of Queen's Bench for that Province; and grands. of the late Hon. Jean Thomas Taschereau, who for many years fought for constitutional liberty in the Parlt. of Lower Canada, was imprisoned, 1810, and subsequently, after his release, raised to the Bench. Is nephew of His Grace the Archbishop of Quebec. B. in the city of Québec, 6 Oct., 1841. Ed. at the Quebec Seminary and at Laval University, from which he obtained degree of B.L., 1861, and B.C.L., 1862. M., 22 June, 1864, the dau. of E. L. Pacaud, Esq., advocate, of Arthabaskaville, P.Q. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1863. A mem. of the City Council of Quebec, and represents

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the city of Quebec on the North Shore Railway Board. Edited *Les Débats*, 1862, and was an unsuccessful candidate for Dorchester in Can. Assembly at g.e., 1863. First returned to Parl. for present seat at g.e., 1872; re-elected by acclamation at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of the Mackenzie-Dorion Administration. —5, *Parloir St.*, Quebec.

THIBAUBEAU, *Hon.* ISIDORE. [*Quebec East.*]

Descended from a French family, mentioned in history as being in existence during the reign of Louis XV., and which, on the breaking out of the Revolution of 1789, migrated to Acadia and thence to Can. B. at Cap Santé, P.Q., 30 Sept., 1819. M., 4 Sept., 1850, Laura, eld dau. of the late Gaspard Drolet, Esq., Advocate, of Quebec, (she d., Dec., 1863). Is head of the firm of Thibaudeau, Thomas & Co., wholesale merchants of Quebec and Montreal, and Vice-Presdt. of *La Banque Nationale*. Has been Presdt. of the *St. Jean Baptiste Société* of Quebec, and a dir. of the G. T. Railway. Was Presdt. of the Ex. Coun., Can., from May, 1863, to March, 1864. Sat for Quebec Centre, in Can. Assembly from g.e., 1863, until the Union, when he retired, and was apptd. to represent Kennebec division in the Quebec L.C., -where he remained, having

charge of all opposition measures, until Jan., 1874, when elected to Commons for Quebec East, by acclamation. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Administration.—3, *St. Geneviève St., Cape, Quebec.*

THOMPSON, Major DAVID. [*Haldimand.*]

Grandfather came from Scot. S. of the late D. Thompson, Esq., who sat for Haldimand in Can. Assembly, from 1841 to 1851. B. in Tp. of Wainfleet, Welland, Ont., 7 Dec., 1836. Ed. at Hamilton Grammar School and Upper Canada College. M., Sept, 1858, Elizabeth, fourth dau. of Ebenezer Stinson, Esq., of Hamilton. A grain and flour merchant. Is Major 37th "Haldimand" Batt. of Volunteer Rifles, Presdt. of the Co. Haldimand Agricultural Society, a dir. of the Canada West Farmers' Mutual and Stock Insurance Co., and a Municipal Councillor. Sat for Haldimand in Can. Assembly, from 1863 until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867; re-elected, by acclamation, at g.e., 1872, and again at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Administration.—"*Ruthven Park,*" *Indiana, Ont.; Rideau Club.*



THOMPSON, JOSHUA SPENCER. [*Cariboo.*]

Descended from a Northumbrian family that settled in Ulster at the time of the revolution. B. in Belfast, Irel., 1828. Ed. there. Unmarried. Is editor and proprietor of the *Cariboo Sentinel*. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, on the admission of B.C. into the Can. Union, Dec., 1871; re-elected, by acclamation, at g.e., 1872, and again returned at last g.e. A Liberal; and "considers that in any case the first duty of every British Columbia member should be to ignore parties and prejudices and give a fair trial to the new Administration, with a cordial support so long as they carry out the Terms of Union in their integrity."—*Barkerville, B.C.; Rideau Club.*

THOMSON, WILLIAM ALEXANDER. [*Welland.*]

B. in Wigtonshire, Scot., Nov., 1816. Came to Can., 1834. Has promoted the construction of the Erie and Niagara and of the Canada Southern Railways, and is local dir. of the latter, and Presdt. of the former. Author of an essay on the Philosophy of Political Economy (Buffalo, 1863), which foreshadows the creation of a currency of national character, that would make credit the exception instead of the rule, in all Government and individual transactions,

the soundness of which doctrine he still maintains. An unsuccessful candidate for Niagara at g.e., 1867. A Liberal.—“*Glencairn*,” near Queenston, Ont. ; Rideau Club.

TREMBLAY, PIERRE ALEXIS, *P.L.S., J.P.* [*Charlevoix.*]

B. 27 Dec., 1827. Ed. at the Seminary of Quebec. M., Sept., 1870, Mary Ellen, eld. dau. of Michael Connolly, Esq., of Quebec. A Provincial Land Surveyor. An unsuccessful candidate for Chicoutimi and Saguenay at g.e., 1857, Sat for Chicoutimi and Saguenay in Can. Assembly from Jan., 1865, until the Union, and for same seat in Commons from 1867 until g.e., 1872, when returned for Charlevoix; re-elected at last g.e. Sat for Chicoutimi and Saguenay, in the Quebec Assembly from the Union until Jan., 1874, when he resigned, in order to confine himself to the Commons. A Liberal, and a supporter of the Mackenzie-Dorion Administration.—*Chicoutimi, P.Q.*

TROW, JAMES, *J.P.* [*South Perth.*]

B. in Newton, Montgomeryshire, North Wales, 16 Dec., 1825. Ed. at Welchpool. Came to Can., 1841. M., 1847, Miss Mary Moore, of Blenheim, Oxford, Ont. Vice-Presdt. of the Perth Mutual and a dir. of the Ontario Mutual Insu-

rance Associations. Is Reeve of North Easthope, an office to which he has been elected by acclamation sixteen years in succession. Has been Warden of Perth. Sat for South Perth in Local Assembly from 1867 until 1871, when defeated. First returned to Commons, at g.e., 1872; re-elected by acclamation at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Govt.—*Shakspeare, Ont.*

TUPPER, *Hon. CHARLES, C.B., M.D., L.R.C.S.*  
(Edin.) [*Cumberland.*]

Family, originally from Hesse Cassel, went to Guernsey, thence came to Virginia, and subsequently, at the termination of the Am. revolution, removed to N.S., with other loyalists; it is connected with the family of the late Sir Isaac Brock, K.B., the hero of Queenston. S. of the Rev. Charles Tupper, D.D., of Aylesford, N.S., B. at Amherst, N.S., 2 July, 1821. Ed. at Horton in same province. Took degree of M.D. at Edinburgh, and obtained the diploma of the Royal College of Surgeons, same city, 1843. M., Oct., 1846, *Miss Frances Morse*, of Amherst. A physician. Is a governor of Dalhousie College, Halifax, (apptd. by Act of Parlt., 1862). Was Presdt. of the Canadian Medical Association, from its formation in 1867 until 1870, when he

declined re-election. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, and Provl.-Secy., N.S., from 1857 to 1860, and from 1863 to 30 June, 1867; and Prime Minister of that Province from 1864 until he retired from office with his Govt. on the Union Act coming into force, 1 July, 1867. Was a delegate to Eng. on public business from N.S. Govt., 1858 and 1864; from the Dominion Govt., March, 1868; leader of the delegation from N.S. to the Union Conference at Charlottetown, 1864; to that in Quebec in same year, and to the final Colonial Conference in London to complete terms of Union, 1866-7. Holds patent of rank and precedence from Her Majesty as an Ex-Councillor, N.S. Created C.B. (civil) by Her Majesty, 1867. Author of *A Letter to the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Carnarvon on the Union Question* (Lon., 1866). Declined a seat in the Can. Cabinet, 1867; and Chairmanship of Intercolonial Railway Board, 1868. Sworn of the Privy Council, June, 1870, and was Presdt. of that body from that date until 1 July, 1872, when he was transferred to the Inland Revenue, and there remained until 22 Feb., 1873, when apptd. Minister of Customs; resigned office with Sir John Macdonald, 5 Nov., 1873. Sat for present seat in N.S. Assembly from 1855 until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867, and again,

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by acclamation, on his accepting office ; re-elected at g.e., 1872, and again at g.e., 1874, making nine times that he has been elected in his native county. The following are some of the measures which were introduced and carried through the Legislature of N.S., by the Hon. member: the Jury Law ; Education Act providing free schools and assessment ; Equity Judge Act ; Windsor and Annapolis Railway Act ; bill providing for a quarantine station and hospital ; Representation Bill ; Executive and Legislative Disabilities Act ; he also moved the resolution for the Union of the Maritime Provinces, 1864, under which delegates were sent to Charlotte-town in that year ; and the resolution authorising delegates to be sent to London to arrange the terms for the Union of N.S. and N.B. with Can., 1866. 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WHITE, JOHN, (*East Hastings*).

B. in town of Donegal, Irel., 1833. Ed. there. M., 1856, Miss Esther Johnson of Roslin. Has been Reeve of Tyendinaga during past two years. Elected Grand-Master of the Grand Orange Assn. for Ontario East, 1874. First returned to Parl., for present seat, March, 1871; re-elected at g.e., 1872, and at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Roslin, Ont.*

WHITE, PETER, JR. (*North Renfrew*).

Of Scotch descent. B. in Pembroke, Ont., 30 Augt., 1838. Ed. there. Unmarried. A lumber merchant. Was Reeve of the Tp. of Pembroke, 1870; and has been Reeve of the Town of Pembroke since 1871. An unsuccessful candidate, for present seat, at g.e., 1872; first returned at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, and opposed to the present Govt.—*Pembroke; Rideau Club.*

WILKES, ROBERT. [*Centre Toronto.*]

Family, of Eng. origin, settled in Irel., in 17th century. B. at Tullehan, near Bundoran, Leitrim, Irel., 24 June, 1832. Ed. there. M., 23 July, 1863, Martha, eld. dau. of Rev. William Cooke, D.D., of London, Eng. Has been a wholesale merchant in Toronto since 1858, and

in Montreal since 1864. A mem. of the Dominion Board of Trade, and of the Council of the Toronto Board of Trade, a dir. of the Bank of Commerce, of the Confederation Life Assurance Association, of the Isolated Risk Insurance Co., of the Muskoka Junction Railway, and of the Upper Canada Bible and Tract Societies, and a Trustee of the Toronto House of Industry. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at g.e., 1872; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal, and will "give an independent and hearty support to the present Govt. in carrying out an incorrupt and economical administration of public affairs, and in prosecuting the great public enterprises which are necessary for the consolidation of the Dominion, for the attraction of population, and for the development of our immense natural resources. Fully approves of the policy of building the Pacific Railway out of the National Exchequer, and in such sections as will utilize our unequalled water highways. Is Presdt. of the Agricultural Mutual Assurance Association of Can., and Major 2nd Batt. Middlesex Militia. Sat for Middlesex in Can. Assembly, (then comprising the present counties of Elgin and Middlesex,) from 1851 to 1854, and for East Middlesex, from g.e., 1863. until the Union, when returned to Commons for same seat, which he represented until g.e., 1872. when he retired. Again returned at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, and opposed to the present Govt.—*Arva, Ont.*

WOOD, ANDREW TREW. [*Hamilton.*]

Family on paternal side, came from Scot., and on maternal, from Eng., and settled in North of Irel. Eld. s. of David Wood, Esq., a merchant of the town of Mount Norris, Armagh, Irel. B. at Mount Norris, Aug., 1826. Ed. there. Came to Can., 1846. M., 1st, 1851, Mary E., eld. dau. of the late Wm. Freeman, Esq., of Saltfleet, Wentworth, Ont., (she d.), andly, 1863, Jennie, eld. dau. of George H. White; Esq., of Yorkville, Ont. Senior partner in the extensive hardware firm of Wood & Leggat; Presdt. of the Mechanics Institute, Hamilton;

Vice-Presdt. of the Mutual Life Assn. of Can. a dir. of the Wellington, Grey & Bruce Railway of the Victoria Mutual Fire Insurance Co., and of the Hamilton Provident and Loan Society. Has been Presdt. of the Hamilton Board of Trade. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at last g.e. A Liberal, and "heartily endorses the policy of the Govt., as contained in Mr. Mackenzie's address to his constituents, and will give the Govt. an honest and hearty support so long as it continues to administer the affairs of the Dominion on the principles laid down by him. Is in favour of the trial of elections by Judges; an election law so stringent as will make bribery or intimidation impossible; simultaneous polling; income franchise; vote by ballot; the abolition of the real estate qualification for members, and of all measures that will tend to make Parliament the true representative of the people, and prevent it from being corruptly influenced by the Executive; of the enlargement of all the canals at the *same time*, and of the building of a new one through Canadian territory at Sault Ste. Marie, so that we may not be dependent on our American neighbours for ready access to Lake Superior and the North-west at all times during the season of navigation. Will advocate the continuance of

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the present Insolvent Law, and a careful remodelling of the tariff, so as to give such protection to our native industries as will enable them to compete successfully with the cheaper labour of foreign markets. Believes that the building of the Pacific Railway, or so much of it as will give us ready access to British Columbia at the earliest possible moment, is of vast importance to the trade of the Dominion."—*East King St., Hamilton.*

WRIGHT, *Lieut.-Col.* ALONZO. [*Ottawa County.*]

S. of the late Lieut.-Col Tiberius Wright; and grands. of the late Philemon Wright, formerly of Woburn, Mass., who came to Can., 1797, founded the village of Hull, on the Ottawa, and became the first representative of the Co. Ottawa, in the L.C. Assembly. B. at Hull, P.Q., 28 Feb., 1825. Ed. at Potsdam, N.Y. M. Mary, wd. dau. of the late Nicholas Sparks, Esq., of Ottawa City. Is Lieut.-Col. of the Ottawa Co. Reserve Militia, and Presdt. Co. of Ottawa Agricultural Society. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1863 until the Union. Returned to Commons by acclamation at g.e., 1867, and at g.e., 1872; again returned at last g.e. as a Liberal Conservative.—"*Ironside,*" *Hull, P.Q.; Rideau Club.*

WRIGHT, WILLIAM MCKAY, *B.A., B.C.L.*  
 [*Pontiac.*]

Descended from a Kentish family, coming from the neighbourhood of Canterbury, that was amongst the earliest Puritan exiles to Am.: they settled at Woburn, Massachusetts, removed to Can., about 1797, and founded the first settlement on the Upper Ottawa at the village of Hull. S. of the late Lt.-Col. Ruggles Wright: and youngest grands. of Philemon Wright, the pioneer of Colonization in the Ottawa Valley. B. at Hull, P.Q., 12 Nov., 1840. Ed. at the High School, Montreal, and at McGill University, where he took degree of B.A., with first class honors, 1861, and that of B.C.L., from Law Faculty, 1863. M., Oct., 1864, *Mary*, eld. dau. of Hon. James Skead, Senator. Called to the Bar. L.C., 1863, and to that of Ontario, Michaelmas Term, 1868. Is 1st Lieut. Ottawa Field Battery, and served with his corps at the front during last Fenian Raid; a mem. of the Council of the Dominion Rifle Assn.; and a dir. of the City of Ottawa and the County of Ottawa Agricultural Societies. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at g.e., 1872; re-elected by acclamation at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative—"Orchard Hill," Hull, P.Q.; Wellington St., Ottawa; Rideau Club.

YEO, Hon. JAMES [*Prince*]

Second s. of the late Hon. James Yeo; of Porthill, P.E.I., who came from Devonshire, Eng., 1827, and held a seat in the Provl. Assembly for a period of thirty years. B. at Porthill, 1832. M., 1855, Sarah Jane, dau. of Wm. Glover, Esq., formerly of Devonshire, Eng. A merchant, ship builder and ship owner. Sat in the P.E.I. Assembly for some years before the Union with Can., and also held a seat in the Ex.-Council of the Colony. First returned to Commons, on P.E.I. entering the Dominion, Sept., 1873; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Reform Govt.—*Porthill, P.E.I.*

YOUNG, JAMES. [*South Waterloo.*]

Eld. s. of the late Mr. John Young, who emigrated from Roxburghshire, Scot., in 1834. B. at Galt, Ont., 24 May, 1835. Ed. there. M., Feb., 1858, Margaret, second dau. of John McNaught, Esq., of Brantford. Was for several years a mem. of the Town Council of Galt, and once Deputy Reeve. Edited the *Dumfries Reformer* (Galt) from 1853 to 1863. Is Presdt. of the Association of Mechanics' Institutes, Ont.; a mem. of the Agricultural and Arts Council; and a dir. of the Confederation Life Assurance Co. of Can.; of the Canada Landed Credit Co.; and of the

Gore District Mutual Fire Insurance Co. Has been Presdt. of the Provincial Sabbath School Convention of Ont. Author of two prize essays: *The Agricultural Resources of Canada, and the inducements they offer to British Laborers to settle in Canada*, and *The Reciprocity Treaty*. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e., 1867; re-elected by acclamation, at g.e., 1872; and at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of the Mackenzie Administration.—*Galt, Ont.*

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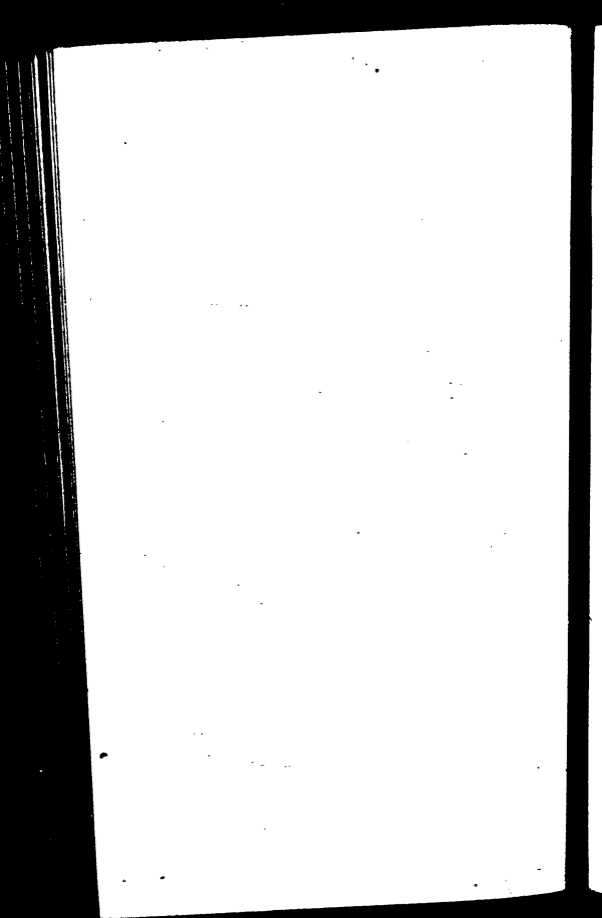

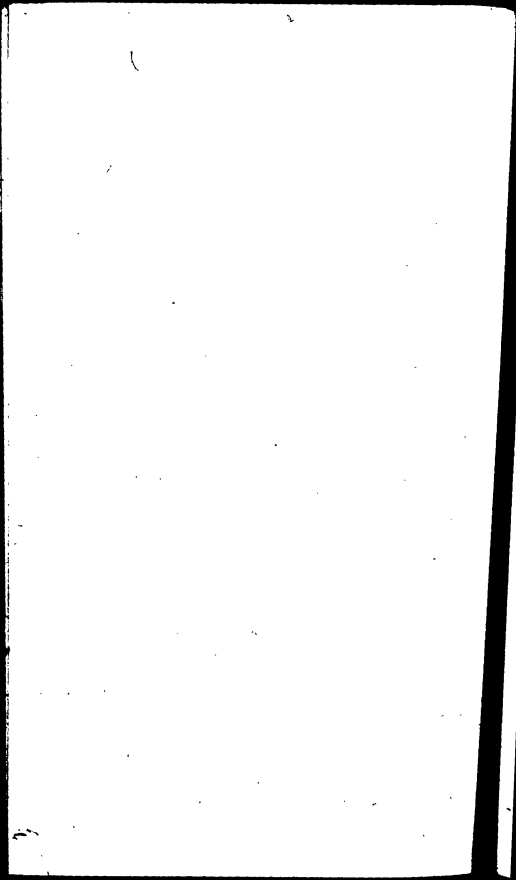

B. at St. Martin's, P.Q. 25th Nov., 1816. Ed. at Terrebonne and Montreal. M. at Quebec, 24 Oct., 1842, his cousin Elizabeth Fraser de Berry. A Notary Public and 1st Major of the Reserve Militia of the Regiment.

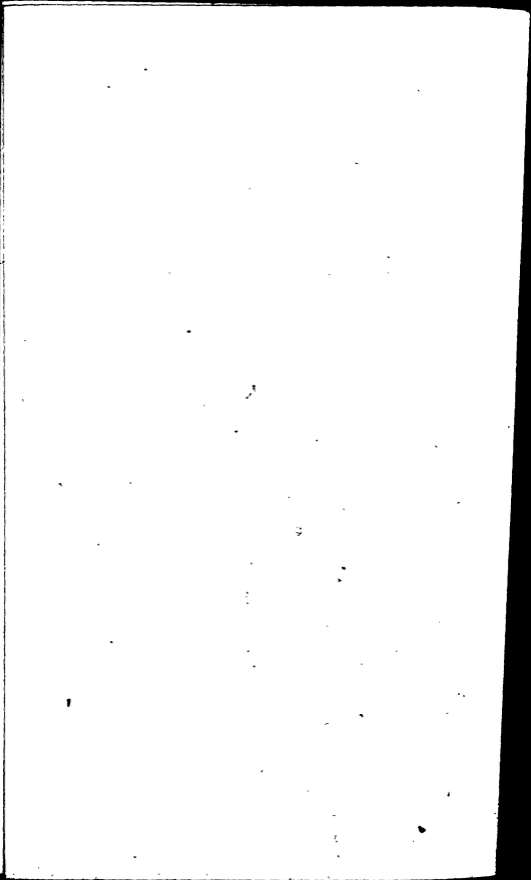

William Morris, who sat in the Provincial Parl., Can., for a considerable period, and held office as Receiver-General and afterwards as Presdt. of the Ex. Council. B. at Perth, Ont., 17 March, 1826. Ed. at the Universities of Glasgow, Scot., and McGill College, Montreal. M., November, 1851, Margaret, dau. of William Cline, Esq., of Cornwall, Ont. Called to the Bar of U.C. in Hilary Term, 1851, and afterwards in July, same year, to Lower Canadian Bar. Called to the Manitoba Bar, Oct., 1872. Has been Presdt. of the St. Andrew's Society, Montreal, and of the Young Men's Christian Association, Perth; a Governor of the University of McGill College; a Trustee of the University of Queen's College, Kingston; and a dir. of the Life Association of Scot. Author of "*Canada and her Resources*," a prize essay; "*Nova Bri-*

*tannia*," a lecture on the extent, resources and future of B.N.A., published, 1858, at the request of the Mercantile Library Association of Montreal, in which he advocated the incorporation of the B.N.A. Provinces under one Confederation; and of "*The Hudson's Bay and Pacific Territories*," a lecture in which he also urged the incorporation of the North West and British Columbia under one Confederation with the older Provinces of Canada and Acadia, and the construction of the Intercolonial and Pacific Railways. In 1864 was one of the active parties in the negotiations, which resulted in the Coalition of that year, and the adoption of the Confederation policy which he had long previously advocated. Sat for South Lanark in Can. Assembly from 1861 until the Union, and for same seat, in House of Commons, from the latter event until g.e., 1872. Was sworn one of the Queen's Privy Council of Can., 16 Nov., 1869 and held the office of Minister of Inland Revenue from that date until 2 July, 1872, when apptd. Chief Justice of Court of Queen's Bench of Manitoba. Apptd. to present office, 2 Dec., same year. (*Salary* \$9,000.) Apptd. a Commr. of Indian affairs for Manitoba and the N.W. Territories, 16 June, 1873.—*Government House*,

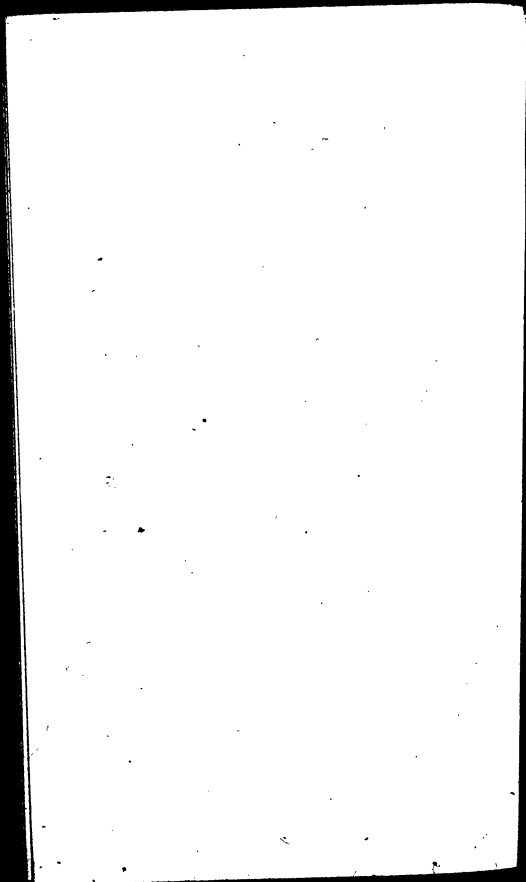

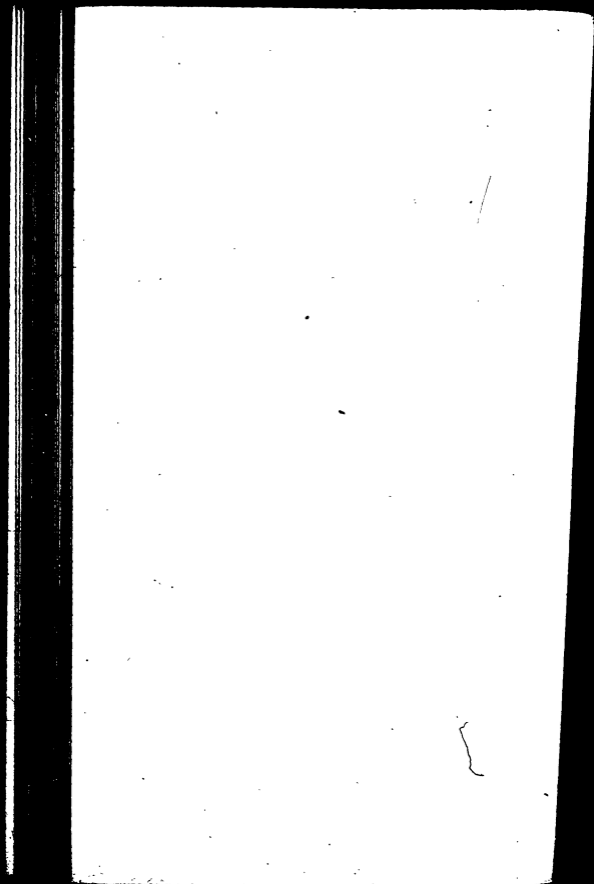

gazetted Captain, and maintained the command for several years ; the Company was subsequently attached to the 1st or "Prince of Wales" Regt., Montreal, and formed one of the Guards of Honor during visit of H. R. H. the Prince of Wales, and thanked in Militia General Orders, Sept., same year.—1861, (19 Feb.) Promoted to rank of Major. (5 Apl.) Received the appt. of Brigade Major to the Active Force of Montreal. 1862, (28 Nov.) When the New Regulations came into effect, under the Militia Act of that year, was selected by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief to fill the post of Brigade Major to the whole Militia Force of Military Dist. No. 11, L.C. Was instrumental in organizing a number of Drill Associations in Montreal in connection with the Militia Force and Colleges.—1865, (10 Feb.) Gazetted mem. of Board of Examiners, at Montreal, of Candidates for admission to Military Schools. (24 Nov.) Passed a first-class examination before Board of Regular Officers, and received First Class Certificate (24 Nov.) Gazetted to rank of Lt.-Colonel. —1866, (2 Jan.) Apptd. a mem. of Board of Examiners of Officers for Commissions in the Volunteer Militia. (March.) Served on the Staff of the Adjutant General of Militia during the threatened Fenian troubles. (June.) When

the Fenian invasion took place in May, he was again selected by His Excellency the Governor-General to join the Staff of Lt.-General LINDSAY as Assistant Adjutant General of Militia, and was present with the Staff who accompanied H. R. H. Prince Arthur to the scenes of action at Eccles Hill and Huntingdon frontier. On the termination of this service, was ordered to join the Staff at Headquarters, and favorably mentioned in his report submitted to Parliament. (30 Nov.) Apptd. Deputy Asst. Adjt. Genl. of Militia, commanding one of the Military Districts L. C., 1869, Under the operation of the present Militia Law, the District then under his command was merged into Nos. 5 and 6 Military Districts, and Col. 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### POLITICAL ADDRESSES; AND PARTY "PLATFORMS;"

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ADDRESS OF THE HON. ALEXANDER  
MACKENZIE, PRIME MINISTER, TO THE  
ELECTORS OF LAMBTON.

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To the Electors of Lambton.

GENTLEMEN.—

Being once again a candidate for your suffrages, I propose to state the circumstances under which I venture to ask a renewal of that confidence which you have been pleased to repose in me for many years.

At the opening of last session a motion of censure on the then Government was proposed to the House of Commons, founded on the evidence taken before the Pacific Railway Commission, and on the conduct of the Government relative to the investigation.

The Ministry having resigned during the debate, His Excellency the Governor-General was pleased to entrust me with the formation of a new Government, which I successfully accomplished. A large number of members of the House of Commons who had supported the late Administration (the late Premier being present) forthwith organized themselves into an Opposition, under the leadership of their former chief, who publicly announced to them their speedy return to place and power. In that House he had commanded a majority of over thirty members, many of whom secured their elections by the corrupt use of Sir Hugh Allan's money.

Believing, after mature consideration, that it was due to the electors of Canada, to give them the opportunity of pronouncing between ourselves and our opponents on the question which has been so much agitated, and convinced that it was essential to a fair representation of the people and to the enactment of good laws that the House should be purged of the members so elected, we have advised a dissolution.

The verdict which our opponents have hitherto succeeded in evading is now to be given at the polls, and Canada is asked to con-



demn the flagrant abuse of a sacred public trust, and the gross acts of corruption, and outrageous violations of the law and the Constitution, of which those recently in power have been guilty, and which their supporters in this contest seek to justify and desire to establish as conformable to the spirit and necessary for the working of free institutions. Canada is asked to send to Ottawa a House of Commons free to do its duty to the State, chosen by the unbiassed voice of the people instead of men bound hand and foot to those to whom they owed their seats.

I do not doubt the result. Already I have received the most satisfactory assurances as to the feeling of the country, and I am satisfied that, with those exertions which a free people must make if they would preserve their freedom, the general election will end in a decisive victory for the Government.

The task of the Administration is such as requires for its successful accomplishment the cordial support of the people.

We will strive to elevate the standard of public morality which our opponents have done so much to debase; and to conduct public affairs upon principles which honest men can approve, and by practices which will bear the light of day.

We shall endeavour by wise legislation and a just and impartial policy to remove those sectional jealousies and local prejudices which were aggravated by our predecessors, and to effect a genuine consolidation of the Union, under which the members from the various provinces shall meet not as delegates from distinct Provinces, but as representatives of the Canadian people, secure in the maintenance of their Provincial rights, and animated by the desire to advance the interests of their common country.

The establishment of a system of trial of elections by Judges forced upon the late Government by the persistent agitation of the Liberal party, affords good hope for the repression during this election of the bribery and undue influences so obviously prevalent in the late struggle. The writs have been issued simultaneously, thus carrying out in spirit the law, which we hope soon to place on the Statute Book, providing for simultaneous polling. The Government willingly foregoes the great advantages which have been derived by its predecessors from the power of controlling the issue of the writs, and rests itself with confidence on the justice of its cause.

We shall endeavour to frame laws for such a

liberal adjustment of the franchise as may best suit the varying circumstances of the different sections of the Dominion; for the taking of the votes by ballot; for the abolition of the real estate qualification for members, thus giving the people greater freedom in the choice of their representatives in Parliament and for increasing the efficiency of the existing agencies for the prevention and punishment of improper practices at elections. But we must not forget that these, as all other laws, will owe their main vigour and efficiency to the spirit in which they are accepted and worked by the people at large; and I trust that the supporters of the Government will in this election set the example of scrupulous observance of the law on their own side, and firm repression of its violation by others.

We must meet the difficulty imposed on Canada by the reckless arrangements of the late Government with reference to the Pacific Railway, under which they pledged the honour and resources of this country to the commencement of that gigantic work in July, 1873, and to its completion by July, 1881. That compact has already been broken. Over a million has now been spent in surveys, but no part of the line has yet been located, and the bargain is, as we

always said it was, incapable of literal fulfilment. We must therefore, endeavour to arrange with British Columbia for such a relaxation of its terms as may give time for the completion of the surveys and the acquisition of the information necessary to an intelligent apprehension of the work, and for its subsequent prosecution with such speed and under such arrangements, as the resources of the country will permit without too largely increasing the burden of taxation on the people.

In the meantime, with a view to obtain a speedy means of communication across the Continent, and to facilitate the construction of the Railway itself, it will be our policy to utilize the enormous stretches of magnificent water communication which lie between a point not far from the Rocky Mountains and Fort Garry, and between Lake Superior and French River on the Georgian Bay, thus avoiding for the present the construction of about 1,300 miles of railway estimated to cost from sixty to eighty millions of dollars, and rendering the resources of the country available for the prosecution of those links of the Pacific Railway which are necessary in order to form a complete line of rail and steamboat communication from east to west.

This will involve the construction of a short

line of railway from the mouth of French River on Georgian Bay, to the south-east shore of Lake Nipissing, and a grant in aid of extension to that point of the existing and projected lines in Quebec and Ontario.

We propose also to facilitate the construction of the ~~U. S.~~ line from Fort Garry to Pembina, already provided for by Parliament, although we cannot hope that this will be accomplished by December next, the time limited by the late Government for its completion.

We shall endeavour to make these ~~great~~ works auxiliary to the promotion of immigration on an extensive scale, and to the settlement and development of those rich and fertile territories on which our hopes for the future of Canada are so largely fixed.

The proper mode of dealing with the question of Insolvency has long been a problem in other countries besides our own. Our present Insolvency law gives great dissatisfaction. It will be the effort of the Government to frame a measure which, while preserving to creditors the advantage of obtaining a summary and fair distribution of the assets of their insolvent debtor, shall be calculated to discourage reckless dealings, to render more difficult the commission and more easy the punishment of fraud, and

to simplify the machinery and lessen the expense of winding up estates.

The time seems to have arrived when the union of the various Provinces may be promoted by the creation of a General Court of Appeal for the Dominion, and to this subject the attention of the Government will be directed.

The work of improving the usual system of the country will be vigorously prosecuted, and every effort made to attract to Canadian channels the traffic of the West, and to foster, by a judicious expenditure in public improvements, the vast maritime interests of the Dominion.

The Militia system demands revision, and will receive the immediate and earnest attention of the Government with a view to increasing its efficiency.

As to the other subjects which will attract our attention—having already exceeded the usual limits of an address—I will take an early opportunity of meeting you in public, and, in the meantime, I will content myself by assuring you that our endeavour will be to promote such an honest, vigorous, just and economical policy as may redound to the true welfare of the Canadian people.

ADDRESS OF HON. DR. TUPPER, C.B.,  
LATE MINISTER OF CUSTOMS, TO THE  
ELECTORS OF CUMBERLAND.

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To the Electors of the County Cumberland:  
GENTLEMEN,—After nearly nineteen years' service as your representative, I again venture to appeal to my native County for re-election.

When I entered the Legislature of this Province I found a large number of office-holders sitting in both branches. The Representation was most unequal; the great mineral resources of our country were to a large extent locked up by a close monopoly in London; but nine miles of railway were in operation in the Province; education languished under an obsolete system of public instruction, and the commerce and industry of the country were paralyzed by the hostile Tariffs which separated us from our Sister Provinces. Under Administrations of which I was a member, a rigid Act was passed to secure the Independence of the Legislature, by the exclusion of office-holders of every description. A Representation Bill was placed on the Statute Book which abolished Township Representation, and rendered the elections a real test of the public sentiment of the whole

country. Our Mines and Minerals were freed from the monopoly which had retarded their development. The Railways were extended to the Gulf of St. Lawrence on the one side, and the Bay of Fundy on the other; while by the Intercolonial this Province was connected with all parts of Canada and the Continent of America. An admirable system of Free Schools was established, and interprovincial tariffs and antagonisms were swept away, by Confederation.

Denounced as was the great measure of the Union of the Provinces, all are now compelled, by the stern logic of results, to admit that it has expanded our Commerce to an incredible extent; given new life to the Agricultural, Manufacturing, Mining, and Maritime Industries of the country; elevated us into a great Dominion washed by the Atlantic on the one side and the Pacific Ocean on the other; raised the credit of our country in a remarkable degree; enabled us, with reduced taxation, to expend surplus millions of revenue in the extension of our Railways and Canals; and by the Washington Treaty it has removed those causes of irritation between Great Britain and the United States which imperilled our peace, while at the same time our Fishermen have obtained free access to the great markets of America.



With these splendid evidences of the successful administration of public affairs before the country, it was not strange that the people should have given my colleagues and myself a good working majority at the last general election.

After the most determined efforts to break down the Government had signally failed, the Opposition, combined with an Agent of the Northern Pacific Railway and others, accomplished their object. We were charged with having sold the charter of the Canadian Pacific Railway to Sir Hugh Allan, knowing that he was associated with United States capitalists. The evidence is now before the country to show that we are a defeated Ministry to-day because we shut the door in the face of Jay, Cook & Co.'s Agents, and refused to allow them any share in our great national work. It is true that two of my colleagues, without my knowledge or consent, accepted a large subscription from Sir Hugh Allan for the elections in Ontario and Quebec, but it has been proved under oath that he was never promised, and that he did not receive any consideration in return ; and although a large number of election committees was struck for the trial of controverted elections, no attempt was ever made to show that any money

had been spent during the elections for corrupt purposes.

The combination of influences to which I have referred, by the most unparliamentary means that ever disgraced an Opposition, succeeded in depriving us of a working majority, and we tendered our resignations.

The Hon. Mr. Mackenzie was sent for, and succeeded in forming a Government. Permit me to state very briefly a few of the reasons which compel me to regard that Administration as unworthy of the confidence of the country.

It has already forfeited all claim to respect, by an utter disregard of the principles advocated by its leading members when in opposition.

For six years Mr. Mackenzie had denounced the late Government on the ground that it was a coalition, and maintained that a pure party Government was the only safe-guard against corruption. When called upon to form an Administration, he offered four seats in his Cabinet to four gentlemen who had been for years voting against him in support of the Government he had so strenuously opposed.

Mr. Mackenzie again and again assailed the number of the late Cabinet of thirteen as much too large. When invited to form one himself he commenced with fifteen members.

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Mr. Mackenzie joined with Mr. Blake in denouncing in the strongest terms the appointment of a member of a Cabinet without a portfolio as fraught with the greatest danger to the independence of Parliament, yet Mr. Blake now sits in Mr. Mackenzie's Cabinet without a portfolio.

Mr. Mackenzie supported a motion to change the constitution of the Senate and prevent the members of that body being nominated by the Crown, yet he has elevated to that House one of the ablest advocates and defenders of a nominated Senate—the Hon. George Brown, thus giving the most conclusive evidence of insincerity.

Mr. Mackenzie, when in opposition, charged the late Government with a reckless disregard of the public interests, because they proposed to secure the construction of a Canadian Pacific Railway, although they limited the liability of Canada to thirty millions of dollars, and fifty millions of acres of wild land. Yet at his Ministerial election he boldly propounded the policy of building this Railway, which he has declared would cost over two hundred millions of dollars, as a Government work, mortgaging the whole revenues of our country for its accomplishment, and assuming the entire risk of its operation.

The organ of Mr. Mackenzie's Government assailed Sir Hugh Allan for proposing to use the American lines, yet Mr. Mackenzie told us at Lambton that his policy was to send our immigrants to the North West, through the United States, over the Northern Pacific Railway.

Mr. Mackenzie has been compelled to bear unwilling testimony in favor of the policy of his predecessors, by admitting that they have left him nothing to reform, and that he can only servilely adopt the policy they have propounded.

In his manifesto, addressed to the electors of Lambton, he is obliged to admit that the law we have placed on the Statute Book effectually secures the purity of elections.—The Independence of the House of Commons had been already provided for by the most stringent Act we could frame, unless a clause was added to prevent the tender of seats in a Cabinet to gentlemen opposite, and forbidding the appointment of Ministers without portfolios.

The Franchise Act introduced by us, providing for simultaneous polling, was only laid over, as Mr. Mackenzie well knows, in order to incorporate the principle of vote by ballot.

The Court of Appeals Bill is in the same manner borrowed from the late Government, and it is only two years ago that Mr. Mackenzie did his utmost to repeal the Insolvency law.

The readers of Mr. Mackenzie's exposition of public policy will search in vain for the enunciation of a single principle which he held when in Opposition, or a measure which he has not copied from the Government he succeeded, save a proposal, on the eve of a general election, to subsidize from the Dominion treasury Railways in Ontario and Quebec.

Mr. Mackenzie fails to account for the unparalleled farce of dissolving Parliament immediately after running a dozen Ministerial elections. It would be but candid in him to confess that he was compelled to violate his solemn pledge not to dissolve, because the policy he had propounded to the country at his Ministerial election left him no hope of meeting Parliament without sustaining a disastrous defeat.

Allow me, before concluding, to refer to one or two matters, especially affecting your immediate interests.

The assurance I gave you, on the authority of the late Minister of Public Works, that the Bay de Verte Canal would be immediately put under contract, was not realized in consequence of the remonstrance of a number of the New Brunswick members, who insisted upon delay, for the purpose of an examination of the surveys by the Chief Engineer of the Public Works

Department.--Parliament has, however, definitely settled the policy of constructing that work, and it must be proceeded with at an early day.—The construction of the Railway from the Intercolonial to the Basin of Minas is a work of great importance to the whole country, and I will strenuously urge Parliament to afford any aid that may be required for its completion; and also the construction of a branch from the Intercolonial to the Ports of Pugwash and Wallace, as the nearest and best means of connecting Prince Edward Island with the rest of the Dominion.

As a member of the late administration I have steadily kept in view the progress and prosperity of the country. If again honoured with your confidence I will, whether on one side of the House or on the other, support every measure which in my judgment is calculated to uphold the honour, elevate the character, and ensure the advancement of our common country.

## "CANADA FIRST."

ADDRESS OF THE CANADIAN NATIONAL  
ASSOCIATION TO THE PEOPLE OF  
CANADA.

FELLOW COUNTRYMEN:—In addressing you thus early, respecting a movement, which has been successfully inaugurated in Toronto, to promote the growth of a Canadian National sentiment, and to secure Canadian unity, we recognize the necessity of freeing that movement from the effects of misconception as well as of wanton misconstruction. We had determined not to fetter the action or embarrass the deliberations of our Party convention (in which all the provinces will be represented) by a premature declaration or any statement other than such as might be considered needful to indicate our objects in a general way. Our language must therefore be taken as expressive merely of local and individual opinion for which our friends outside of Toronto need not hold themselves responsible. As our motives have been impugned, and systematic efforts made to prejudice the public mind against us by distortion of our views and mis-statement of our objects, we are forced for the sake of the

movement whose success we have at heart, to appeal directly to you. The misrepresentation to which we have alluded has, naturally enough, prompted many who sympathize with the movement, and others who, while not in thorough accord, are willing to judge it fairly, to ask for further evidence as to our honesty of purpose and further information as to our objects and plan of action.

Our motto "Canada First," is said to admit of various interpretations—fertile imaginations have almost proved that. Some profess to see in it, Annexation; others, Independence; others, Know-nothingism. The meaning attached to it by us may be gathered from the following expressions of opinion, which will serve to show that the motto is not necessarily ambiguous and has not been misapprehended by all:—

"The germ of a national organization came to the surface during the recent election in the capital of Ontario with the watchword 'Canada First,' which is simply a declaration of patriotism."—*Canadian Monthly and National Review*

"Now, why should not this principle of nationality be applied in Canada? There is more necessity for it here, at present, than anywhere else we know of. It would unite the factions now tearing themselves and the country



pieces, strengthen the weak bonds which hold the Dominion together, elevate our statesmanship, give our young men something worth fighting for, and people the country with a stream of immigration, now flowing into the United States. It is said that encouraging this national spirit is the surest way of hastening annexation to the United States, but we say that nationality is the only sure preventive to annexation."—*Canadian Nationalist*.

"Patriotism and loyalty are distinct, though they may at the same time be agreeing sentiments. The one is devotion to one's country; the other devotion to one's sovereignty; but there is no need whatever for them to conflict with each other. The Englishman, while truly loyal to his Sovereign, gives his love of country to England. The Scotchman and the Irishman while giving full allegiance to their Queen give the first place in their affections to Scotland and Ireland. Why should we in Canada be different? What reason exists why, when Englishmen, Irishmen and Scotchmen give their whole hearts to their respective countries, we in Canada should not place our own land first, and so act and speak as though we felt proud—as we have a right to be—of the name of Canadian. We have a country in which any people might,

glory, we have a future that is dazzling in its promise ; all we need is a sentiment which shall break down all provincial and sectional distinctions, which shall make us feel not as Ontarions or Quebeckers, Nova Scotians, or New Brunswickers, but as Canadians—proud of our country as a whole.”—*Hamilton Times*.

“ And this is the feeling we want more of in this Dominion—a feeling of Canadianism. Are we to be forever jabbering about our respective merits and claims as Englishmen, Scotchmen, Welshmen, French and Germans ; as Irish Catholic and Irish Orangemen ? We have heard a great deal too much of this stuff talked. It is time that all classes of our population, whether born here or elsewhere, whatever their creed or country, should consider themselves above all, Canadians. It is from this standpoint that we bid God speed to those who, in Toronto, or elsewhere, are endeavouring to foster in our midst a National Canadian Spirit.”—*London Advertiser*.

“ You want a principle to guard your young men, and thus only your frontier. When I can hear your young men say as proudly *our* federation, or *our* country, or *our* kingdom, as the young men of other countries do speaking of their own, I shall have less apprehension for the result of whatever trials the future may have in store for us.”—*Thomas D'Arcy McGee*.

"They who hoped for a great future for this country, and who hoped to see its population largely increased, and knew that it had in it all the elements of becoming a great country, thought it necessary, in order to weld it together, that not only should they procure a teeming population, but that they should most *continuously deepen the interest of those who are already here.* Those who had settled here should join together in the earnest effort to wipe out Provincial distinctions and internal dissensions. We must possess these elements of union if this is to be the country which we hope it is to be."—*Hon. Ed. Blake, M.P.*

"It is Canada before any party; the country before any faction."—*Thos. Moss, M.P.*

"There has been that in the history of Canada which rendered it absolutely necessary that all patriotic men, no matter of what creed or nationality, should band together for the purpose of checking the spread of that political fanaticism which has injured us so much in the past."—*Hon. M. C. Cameron.*

The signs of the times cannot be ignored, and whatever the future may have in store for us as a people, it is our duty to prepare for it like sensible men, conscious of the power which lies in massed strength, knowing our obligations and

feeling their fullweight, so much the more by reason of self-imposed burdens of territory.

The Empire is quite equal to the duty of self care; its interests will be best served by our doing, or trying to do, the best possible for ourselves, and the whole be best strengthened by giving strength to its weakest or supposed weakest part. Free government is a matter of compact, and as such involves reciprocal responsibilities, which result in "virtual agreements, even as between the Imperial and Colonial Governments, respecting affairs mutually affecting them." If the power of veto implies mutual assent, and such agreements or assent admit of prior discussion, surely it is not improper for each of the contracting parties to urge its rights to the fullest extent, no matter what the compromise result may be. In fact, it is its duty so to do, and being such, when Canadian interests are made the subject of stipulation, it is natural and proper for Canada to give its best endeavours to advance them and secure justice. In internal affairs there is no sufficient reason why the interests of Canadians should not be regarded when the interests of Canada are intertwined with them. For instance, in the management of our militia, the ambition and spirit of our volunteers have been thwarted and well-

nigh destroyed by a pernicious system, which prevails of sacrificing the volunteer to the army officer, no matter what the superiority of qualification in the former over the latter may be. The consequence is seen in the rapid decay of our volunteer regiments.

It has been alleged that we desire to create antagonism between native born Canadians and Canadians by adoption. The contrary is the fact. Our earnest desire is to do away with all invidious distinctions of nationality, creed, locality, or class, and to unite the people of the Dominion, as Canadians, through affection for and pride in Canada, their home. A serious impediment to our progress towards unity has been, and unfortunately still is, the hostility of creed towards creed, nationality towards nationality, class towards class, section towards section, which faction, for its own selfish temporary purposes, provokes, and political sharpers systematically use. That hostility puts deep cutting weapons into the hands of the unscrupulous, and, though it may seem but to affect the unit, it has influenced the aggregate and tainted legislation.

It has been contended by some that our organization is but the advance-guard of Clear Gritism; by others that it is the Conservative

party under a new name. Notwithstanding the certificates of character which some critics, with all the gravity of fortune-tellers, will thrust upon us in spite of protest, we form a new and distinct political organization for promoting, by a joint endeavour, the national interest upon a particular principle on which we are agreed. Owing to the relation Canada bears to the mother land, as a self-governing country, and the reciprocal obligations and responsibilities which that relation creates and implies, we consider it essential to our present, and still more so to our future, as a country, that the national heart be stirred, and the ennobling sentiments of which home and country is the source, be utilized to infuse into all the members of the Confederation the spirit of unity, vigour, self-reliance, and self-respect, as well as to give bent and impress to political action.

Principles should form the basis of party cohesion; not the memories of the past. A slavish clinging to the skirts of despotic individuals, with whom self is the all-in-all, should not be mistaken or substituted for manly support. Party, as a legislative instrument, should not be fastened to the chariot wheels of mere dictators, however able or troublesome, or made to serve as a yoke, under which all freedom of thought

independence of judgment and honesty of conviction must humbly and submissively pass, else accept the penalty of black letter and ostracism. Public interests should not be subordinated to merely local or sectarian demands; nor power attained and held at the expense of honour and right. A spirit of calmness and judicial investigation should be brought to bear upon the discussion of public measures and the framing of laws, not that of subservient advocacy or dogged opposition. Honourable rivalry and the candid application of the rules of truth and justice should displace that virulence, slander and uncharitableness which characterize the bitter and ungenerous warfare of the two leading political parties in the press, on the hustings, and in Parliament. Such warfare has done much to disgrace the name of Canada abroad, and contributed greatly to the demoralization of our public men at home; has deterred from public life, or participation in politics, many of our worthiest and best; and has, by an incessant interchange of calumny and vituperation, confused the perceptions of the people, weakened their judgment, and well-nigh destroyed all belief in the existence of political morality.

Hence it is we arrive at the conclusion em-

bodied in the resolution passed at the first public meeting of our party.

“ That it is the duty of all Canadians, whether such by birth or adoption, to recognize the pressing necessity for the cultivation of a Canadian National sentiment which will unite the people of the various provinces more closely in the bonds of citizenship, promote a mutual confidence whose common source of affection will prompt acts of toleration and words of respect, and prove the best safeguard for our Dominion against absorption on the one hand and disunion on the other.”

The necessity for a new political party is manifest. Old party lines are obliterated ; party nomenclature has become so diluted as to be almost incomprehensible or at least incapable of intelligent explanation. The ins and outs cannot be segregated under the old names of Reformer and Conservative. Tory and Grit, are merely synonymous with cat and dog, and convey no notion save that of difference in momentum. If so in Ontario and Quebec, how much more so in the other Provinces, where a helpless but contented ignorance prevails regarding the most cherished traditions of our dividing parties. Seven years have elapsed since Confederation was accomplished, and to this day neither one



nor other of our old parties has established itself, as a party, in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Manitoba, or British Columbia. Patronage and vituperation were equally inefficacious to give a lasting foot-hold to either party, and to-day only too many of the parliamentary representatives of these provinces, as well as of our own, think and act as mere delegates, while the patriotic sentiment of the various provinces is left to draw a miserable sustenance from geographical contact and the preamble to the Confederation Act.

There is a very large number of persons in even Ontario and Quebec who acknowledge no allegiance to either of the old parties, and find no political body with which they can act in concert. There are also many who act at present with one or the other but desire a change. It appears to us, therefore, that there is a large field for a new party, and in the present dismembered and unsettled condition of those parties which have hitherto held sway, the present offers the most favourable opportunity for its establishment. Such a party, free from the incubus of despotic repression and distasteful control, unclogged with the weight of past misdeeds, based on principles of a national character, capable of extension with equal facility into

all parts of the Dominion, presenting an intelligible guarantee for united action, availing itself of the experience and prudence of age and the energy and enthusiasm of youth, struggling honourably for success, and recognizing success only in the country's progress and the country's welfare—such a party, we say, is possible, and given a stringent law to prevent bribery and corruption, vote by ballot to complete the severance of old party ties, income franchise to bring into play the energy, hopefulness, and self devotion of the young men of Canada, we assert that such a party will be, and that its watchword "Canada First" will, ere long, echo from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Unless we realize that, we shall have failed to accomplish our purpose. But we have no thought of failure. If such were entertained it could not survive the rapid increase of our organization, both here and elsewhere, the encouragement received from all parts of the Dominion, and the victory which attended our first active interference, as a party, in an election contest.

There is every indication that a newspaper will be established in Toronto in a short time, with such writing talent at its service as no journal in the Dominion can boast of; which, while it will not be the mere mouthpiece of any

party, will yet do the Canadian National Party that justice which is denied to it by any Toronto journal.

A Club, under the auspices of the party, is now being founded in this city, which will combine the social, literary, and political, similar in plan to the English Reform or Carlton Clubs.

11. Pure and Economical Administration of Public Affairs.

## DEPARTMENT OF INLAND REVENUE,

OTTAWA, May 27th, 1873.

**T**HE attention of Traders and others is directed to the following provisions of the Act respecting Weights and Measures assented to on the 23rd instant:—

1st. It is enacted that "A Weight of one hundred standard pounds avoirdupois shall also be, and may be called and described as a 'CENTAL.'"

2nd. On and after the first day of January, 1874, the provisions of the present Law as to the weight of a bushel of the undermentioned articles, namely :

## PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

PARLIAMENT HOUSE.

*Quebec, 1st February, 1873.*

All applications for Private Bills properly within the range of the powers of the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, according to the provisions of the Act of British North America, 1867, whether for the construction of a Bridge, a Railway, a Turnpike road or Telegraph line, Canal, Lock, Dam or slide, or other like works; the granting of a right of ferry; the construction of works for supplying gas or water; the incorporation of any particular profession or trade, or of any Joint Stock Company; the incorporation of a city, town, village or other municipality; the levying of any local assessment; the division of any county for purposes other than that of representation in Parliament, or of any township; the removal of the site of any County town or of any local Offices; the regulation of any Common; the survey of any township, line or concession, otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals, any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or

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making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a notice clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz.:

A notice inserted in the *Official Gazette*, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one in the French language, in the district affected, or in both languages if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the *Official Gazette*, and in a paper published in an adjoining district.

Such notice shall be continued in each case for a period of at least thirty days during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding session and the consideration of the petition.

Before any petition praying for leave to bring in a private bill for the erection of a toll-bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such bill, shall upon giving the notice prescribed by the preceding rule, also, at the same time and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between theabutments or piers for the passage of rafts or vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

**PUBLIC NOTICE** relating to FISHERIES and FISHING in the respective Provinces forming the Dominion of Canada.

The undersigned is directed by the Minister to call the attention of all persons concerned and the public generally to the following provisions of the Fishery Laws and Regulations:—

Net FISHING for SALMON is prohibited—

In Quebec and Ontario, from 31st July to 1st May;

In New Brunswick, from 15th August to 1st March;

In Nova Scotia, from 31st July to 1st March;

ANGLING for SALMON is prohibited—

In Quebec and Ontario, from 1st September to 1st May;



In New Brunswick from 15th September to 1st March;

In Nova Scotia, from 1st September to 1st May.

FISHING for SPECKLED (or *Brook*) TROUT WITH NETS or other apparatus is forbidden at all times. ANGLING for the same with hook and line, extends from 1st January to 1st October in Quebec, and from 1st May to 30th September in Ontario.

Fishing for WHITEFISH, with nets or other apparatus, is forbidden between the 19th November and 1st December in Ontario and Quebec, nor is it lawful to catch this fish with SKINES between the 30th May and 1st August in Ontario, and 31st July and 1st December in Quebec.

Fishing for BASS, PICKEREL (*Dore*), and MASSEMOUGE is forbidden between the 1st and 24th May in Quebec, and from 15th April to 1st May in Ontario.

Fishing by means of nets and other apparatus (except in the tidal deep sea fisheries) without leases or Licenses from the Department of Marine and Fisheries is prohibited in the waters of Quebec and Ontario.

All *applications* for leases or Licenses, or any other *communications* relating to Fisheries, should be addressed to the Hon. Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa.

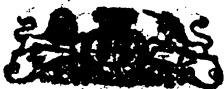

## CUSTOMS CIRCULARS.

The Customs Circulars for 1872 related to :—

*Customs Circular No. 93, January 31st, 1872*  
—Ordered that all invoices of Littlefield and Chamberlin's Wood Screws," dated since December 27th, 1871, filed with the old discount of sixty per cent., must have added to them a value for duty of twenty-four per cent.

*Customs Circular No. 94, 12th February, 1872,* states that by the decision of the Treasury Board the article of "Shoddy" properly "Shoddy Wool" is liable to a duty of 15 per cent *ad. val.*

*Customs Circular No. 95.*—In consequence of complaints from Clifton and other frontier ports all collectors were ordered to return all manifests by mail, immediately after the goods they represent, have been secured by the Collectors; the Collectors affixing the official stamp as well as signature.

*Circular No. 96* decides that "Bristol Sarsaparilla," and all similar compounds containing spirits, are subject to a duty under the present tariff at the rate of \$1.20 per gallon with an *ad valorem* duty of 15 per cent. on bottles and packages; and the Department having ascertained that these articles have been entered at several ports as proprietary medicines

at 25 per cent *ad val.*, the minister of Customs instructs Collectors to allow whatever stock of the above may remain in bond, to be entered for duty at the said *ad val.* rate of 25 per cent., but that all future importations must pay the specific duty of \$1.20 per Gallon, and 15 per cent. on bottles, &c., or unless an alteration is effected in the law.

*Customs Circular No. 97, March 18th, 1872—*

Recites, that there has been diversity of practice at different ports respecting the item of marble, as to admitting it free of duty. The circular goes on to recite, that there are two classes of marble mentioned in the act; the first being "blocks" which means all pieces capable of subdivision, by sawing into two or more slabs of not less than two inches thick, and such slabs to be entitled to free entry, must not have undergone any process of manufacture beyond the terms of the Tariff, viz: "sawn on two sides only." All "blocks" specially shapen such as round, octagon or tapering, being subject to the *ad valorem* duty of 15 per cent. The second class is described as "slabs," and may be defined as oblong or square pieces not over inches thick, not specially shapen, which must have undergone no process other than sawing, and having at least two edges rough—the term "edges" applying either

to the sides or ends; and it should be remembered, that any planing or other preparation for the manufacture of "Head Stones," "Mantle Pieces," &c., render such "slabs" liable to *ad valorem* duty of 15 per cent. I am, Sir, your obedient servant, R. S. M. BOUCHETTE, Commissioner of Customs.

*Customs Circular, No. 98, March 27, 1872.*—Provides for a system of glass seals, for the security of bonded and unaccustomed goods, carried in the cars of the Grand Trunk and Great Western Railway Companies.

*Customs Circular No. 99, May 3rd, 1872.*—Requests Returns of Steam Fire Engines imported.

*Customs Circular No. 100, May, 5th, 1872.*—Informs Collectors that "Foundry Facings" are alleged to have been admitted free of duty at many ports of the Dominion under the name of "Black Sand," and state that "the Sand" mentioned in Schedule C, of the Tariff, is a natural product, while the "Foundry Facings" is manufactured from "Sea Coal," "Charcoal," "Plumbago," and other minerals, and is legally liable to duty at 15 per cent. *ad valorem* as unenumerated.

*Customs Circular No. 101, May 12th, 1872.*—Informs Collectors that it is not considered necessary that they should be required to compile and forward annual import returns.

*Customs Circular No. 102, May, 27th, 1872.*—Advises with directions the sending of Sealed Locks to be substituted for Bar and Shackles for the Grand Trunk and Great Western Railways, with directions for use.

*Customs Circular No. 103, June 8th, 1872.*



Provides for the refund of Tea and Coffee Duties under the Act of last Session.

*Customs Circular No. 104, June 13th, 1872—*

Gives further detailed instructions as to the refund and re-entry of "Tea and Coffee" duties on the same subject.

*Customs Circular No. 105, June 18th, 1872—*

Gives further instructions.

*Special Customs Circular, June 21st, 1872—*

Allows Post Masters to act in certain cases as Customs Officers for re-bonding and re-warehousing packages of "Tea and Coffee."

*Customs Circular No. 106, June 21st, 1872—*

States that by Order in Council on the exportation of "Needles" which have paid duty on importation to be used with "Sewing Machines" manufactured in the Dominion, the duties so paid on the Needles shall be refunded, when the Sewing Machines are exported from Canada together with such imported Needles. *Customs Circular No. 107, August 17th.—*

Referring to Circular No. 93, on the subject of discount on Littlefield and Chamberlin's "Wood screws" states that a further reduction from fifty to thirty per cent. has been allowed by that Board, and stating that this reduction is equivalent to an advance upon the net cost of the screws of forty per cent. The duty is to be collected accordingly.

*Customs Circular No. 108, 6th November, 1872*

Orders Collectors, in consequence of the difference of opinion at several different ports of entry respecting "Calf Skins," or "Kipp," to charge per cent. *ad valorem* on calf or kip, weighing

less than 50 lbs. as being unenumerated, and 19 per cent. *ad valorem* on calf or kip, weighing 50 lbs or more per dozen, such skin being generally known in trade as upper leather, and as such chargeable with the lower duty under the Tariff. I am, Sir, your obedient servant, R. S. M. BOUCHETTE.

*Customs Circular No. 109, 2nd December 1872*—Refers to the sending of returns to the Department.

*Customs Circular No. 110, 7th December, 1872*  
—An order of the Governor General, in Council, dated 14th May last, having reference to the mode of establishing or computing the Tonnage of Foreign Vessels entering or clearing at any of the ports in this country, and subject by law to the payment of tonnage dues when so entering or clearing, has ordered and directed that such tonnage dues shall be levied and collected upon the tonnage of such Foreign Vessels as computed in accordance with the Rules laid down in Part 2 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854—that is to say in accordance with the British Measurement of such tonnage, and you are therefore to be governed hereafter by the Rules so laid down, should you not already have adopted it, in the collection of tonnage dues at your port. It will therefore be your duty to cause Foreign Ships trading at your port subject to the payment of tonnage dues, to be measured under the Rules prescribed by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, referred to; and whenever such ships have been previously measured at any port in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and that satisfactory evidence of that fact shall be produced to you

you are to be governed by the British measurement so shown to have been made. I have also to call your attention to the fact that certain Foreign Countries having adopted the British mode of computing the tonnage of ships, you are not called upon to re-measure the ships of such countries, but that you are to be governed by the Tonnage as shown by the Registries of such ships. The only countries so far, that have adopted the Rule of Measurement laid down by the Imperial Merchant Shipping Act, are Denmark and the United States of America, official notice of which has been given to the Government of Canada, and is now communicated to you for your future guidance in such cases. *Order in Council, December 24th, 1872*—Orders in conformity with the provisions of the Act of the last Session, that from and after the first day of January next, a duty of ten per cent. is authorized, and it is to be collected on Tea and Coffee imported into Canada from the United States.

*Circular 86, 1871*, transmits forms of declaration and certificate for importers of Machinery, entitled to exemption of duty, under the Act 34 Victoria, cap. 10. Said forms are as follows:

## PARLIAMENT HOUSE.

*Ottawa, 31st January, 1873.*

(Extract from Rules relative to Private Bills.

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of Legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for

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making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, and (except in the case of existing corporations) signed on behalf of the applicant, to be published as follows, viz :

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest county in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

## RULES RESPECTING THE LIBRARY OF PARLIAMENT.

A proper Catalogue of the Books belonging to the Library shall be kept by the Librarian in whom the custody and responsibility thereof shall be vested; and who shall be required to report to the House through Mr. Speaker, at the opening of each Session, the actual state of the Library.

No person shall be entitled to resort to the Library during a session of Parliament except the Governor General, the members of the Privy Council, and of the Senate and House of Commons, and the Officers of both Houses, and such other persons as may receive a written order of admission from the Speaker of either House. Members may personally introduce Strangers to the Library during the daytime, but not after the hour of seven o'clock, P.M.

During a Session of Parliament, no Books belonging to the Library shall be taken out of the Building, except by the authority of the Speaker or upon receipts given by a Member of either House.

During the recess of Parliament, the Library and Reading Room shall be open every day in each week, Sundays and Holidays excepted, from the hour of ten in the morning until three in the afternoon; and access to the Library shall be permitted to persons introduced by a Member of the Legislature, or admitted at the discretion of the Clerk or Librarian; subject to such regulations as may be deemed necessary

for the security and preservation of the collection; but no one shall be allowed to take any Book out of the Library except Members of the Legislature, and such others as may be authorized by the Speaker of either House.

The Clerk of this House is authorized to subscribe for the newspapers published in the Dominion, and for such other papers, British and Foreign, as may from time to time be directed by the Speaker; and to import annually the continuation of periodical works in the Library.

During the recess of Parliament, no Member of either House not residing at the seat of Government, shall be at liberty to borrow or have in his possession at any one time more than three works from the Library, or to retain the same for a longer period than one month.

No other persons who may be privileged by card from the Speaker of either House to borrow Books from the Library shall be allowed to have in their possession more than two Books at any one time, or to retain the same longer than three weeks, and all such persons shall return the books so taken when required by the Librarian.

No Books of reference, or Books of special cost and value, may be removed from the seat of Government under any circumstances.

At the first meeting of the Joint Library Committee at every Session of Parliament, the Librarian shall report a list of the Books absent at the commencement of the Session, specifying the names of any persons who have retained the same in contravention of either of the foregoing Rules.



## POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK, CANADA.

1. The following Post Office Savings Banks in Ontario and Quebec are open daily for the receipt and repayment of deposits, during the ordinary hours of Post Office business.
2. The direct security of the Dominion is given by the Statute for all Deposits made.
3. Any person may have a deposit account, and may deposit yearly any number of dollars, from \$1 up to \$300, or more, with the permission of the Postmaster General.
4. Deposits may be made by married women, and deposits so made, or made by women who shall afterwards marry, will be repaid to any such woman.
5. As respects children under ten years of age, money may be deposited:—  
*Firstly*—By a parent or friend as trustee for the child, in which case the deposits can be withdrawn by the trustee until the child shall attain the age of ten years, after which time repayment will be made only on the joint receipts of both trustee and child.  
*Secondly*—in the child's own name—and, if so deposited, repayment will not be made until the child shall attain the age of ten years.

other of such offices, without notice or change of Pass Book, may continue his deposits at any of that Savings Bank Office which is most convenient to him, and can withdraw money his first deposit at the Savings Bank at Cobourg, he may make further deposits at, or Brookville, or any place which the Post Office Bank at Collingwood or Quebec, Sarnia, at Cobourg or remove to some other place.

7. Each depositor is supplied with a Pass Book, which is to be produced to the Postmaster every time the depositor pays in or withdraws money, and the sums paid in or withdrawn are entered therein by the Postmaster receiving or paying the same.

8. Each depositor's account is kept in the Postmaster General's Office, in Ottawa, and in addition to the Postmaster's receipt in the Pass Book, a *direct acknowledgment* from the Postmaster General for each sum paid in is sent to the depositor. If this acknowledgment does not reach the depositor within ten days from the date of his deposit, he should apply immediately to the Postmaster General, by letter, being careful to give his address, and, if necessary, renew his application until he receives a satisfactory reply.

9. When a depositor wishes to withdraw money, he can do so by applying to the Postmaster General, who will send him by return mail a cheque for the amount, payable at whatever Savings Bank Post Office the depositor may have named in his application. Interest is added at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum is allowed on deposits, and the amount of any sum deposited or withdrawn.

10. Postmasters are forbidden by law to disclose the name of any depositor, or the amount of any sum deposited or withdrawn.

11. No charge is made to depositors on paying in or drawing out money, nor for Pass Books, nor for postage on communications with the Postmaster General in relation to their deposits.

12. No charge is made to depositors on paying in or drawing out money, nor for Pass Books, nor for postage on communications with the Postmaster General in relation to their deposits.

## POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.—*Con.*

18. The Postmaster General is always ready to receive and attend to all applications, complaints, or other communications addressed to him by depositors or others, relative to Post Office Savings Bank business.
